With the win, Noblesville finished with a 2-4 HCC record. That put the Millers in a three-way tie for fourth place, with Hamilton Southeastern and Avon.

"We had 12 assists on 22 baskets, so over half of our baskets came off an assist,"

Noblesville was the very model of efficiency in the first quarter, making its first six baskets and ending the quarter 8-of-10 from the field. Jake Mills had the first two baskets on 3-pointers, with David Cory and Joev Brewer both making lavins.

Sean Wilson got into the act with a 3-pointer, and John Kiser added a layin. That's five Millers scoring in the first six minutes of the game.

Avon battled and was still within 20-16 early in the second quarter. But Noblesville scored 11 unanswered points to take a 31-16 lead, again using balanced scoring to extend its advantage. The Millers led 33-21 at halftime.

The lead continued to grow in the third period, up to 50-31 by the time the quarter was finished. Kiser scored eight points. He ended the period by making two foul shots.




