



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

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As Christ followers, we abide in Him

Christian. "Christianos". Not one who



merely goes to church, nor one whom has made a confession of faith with the lips but, with that profession goes no further as even the demons believe and tremble" James 2:19 (NKJV), but one who is a follower (a convert to, an imitator of) of Christ.

The word Christian(s) appears three times in the King James Bible. In Acts 26:28 King "Agrippa said unto Paul, Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian" and the Apostle Peter refers to the pagan applied title when he writes "Yet if any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed" 1 Peter 4:16. And, "the disciples were first called Christians in Antioch" Acts 11:26 (NKJV). In around 42-43 A.D. the pagan world dubbed the followers of Christ "Christian" out of contempt and vehemently rejected this group of people as did the Jewry. As those from the Kingdom of called such as they hail from Syria, Christians are called Christian because they are of the Kingdom of Christ. While it was said, we would suffer as followers of Christ neither Jesus nor his disciples ever called us Christians, fellow followers were referred to as disciples, servants, brethren, the elect or saints. The title was applied to the Christians based on what was observed about them. Despite severe persecution the followers remained faithful to Christ and His teachings. The brethren abided in Christ.

As Christ followers we abide in Him and He abides in us (John 15:4)! To abide-"meno" - means we stay in, stand in, continue in, dwell in, endure in, and tarry in (which is to remain in place). We abide in Him through Him. Christian, we don't just believe in God the external. When we came to our knees in repentance and took Him as savior we became indwelled with His Holy Spirit. 

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

"Sectional 8 is one of the most competitive sectionals in the entire state," offered Noblesville mentor Brian McCauley. "Two of the last three season the state champion and Mr. Basketball have come out of our sectional."

While this will be McCauley's first season coaching in Sectional 8, he isn't new to winning sectional titles. He came to Noblesville this season after winning four straight and five of six sectional championships at Kokomo. Four seasons ago, McCauley led the Wildkats to the state championship title game, losing to Bloomington South. Two of the last three seasons McCauley's Kokomo team was eliminated by Carmel in the regional.

First out of the gate, in the only Tuesday contest at the Eric Clark Activity Center, will be a rematch of North Central and Fishers. North Central defeated Fishers 69-47 back on Dec. 29 at Central. Coach Doug Mitchell's NC machine is 3-0 against Sectional 8 teams, having also beaten Carmel 66-59 and Hamilton Southeastern

68-51. Fishers is 4-2 against sectional foes with wins over Noblesville 55-42, Hamilton Southeastern 50-45, Westfield 60-56 and Zionsville (for the HCC title) 68-55. The Tigers lost 59-46 to Carmel.

"When you think of it," said Fishers It should be an interesting week at the coach Joe Leonard, "there are a lot of teams that could win the state this season. 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
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Fuel sweep Komets with 5-4 shootout win

In the ninth of 11 head-to-head meetings between the two teams this season, the Indy Fuel defeated the Fort Wayne Komets in a shootout on Saturday at Allen County War Memorial Coliseum in Fort Wayne, Indiana by a final score of 5-4. With the win, the Fuel's fourth straight victory and second straight over the Komets, Indy improved to 23-23-4-4 overall this season and with 54 points, vaulted into fourth place alone in the ECHL's North Division standings and into playoff position.

The Komets stormed out to a 2-0 first period lead on Saturday thanks to goals from Matthew Pistilli and Shawn Szydlowski at 3:17 and 11:51, respectively. The Fuel responded with three consecutive goals from Chris DeSousa at 14:07 of the opening frame, Evan Vossen on the powerplay at 8:39 of the second and Pete Massar just over four minutes later to claim a 3-2 advantage. Late in the middle stanza, the Komets came to life with back-to-back unassisted scores, from Christian Ouellet and Szydlowski at 17:24 and 19:16, to claim a slim 4-3 lead through 40 minutes of play.

Fuel leading scorer Garett Bembridge potted the third period's lone goal on the power-play at 3:26 to tie the game at four and after a scoreless overtime frame, Nick Bruneteau provided the shootout's lone tally either way, a second round conversion that, when combined with Indy goaltender Mac Carruth's five-for-five showing, delivered Indy a 5-4 victory. Carruth set a new single-game personal season high with 53 saves on Saturday and with the win, the Fuel extended their ECHL-best road point streak to 13 games.
