# Charges dismissed against 6 drug raid cases

Criminal charges against six of the nine individuals arrested seven months ago in an alleged drug-related raid on a Carmel doctor's office have been dismissed. Hamilton Superior Court Judge Steven Nation entered his decision to dismiss last week. The decision does not affect individuals charged in other counties as a result of raids conducted at the same time.







Watching the IHSAA tourney pairings show on television last Sunday afternoon, Fishers basketball coach Joe Leonard became more than a little upset when one of the TV folks talked about how great a match-up would be between North Central and Carmel in the Friday session of the Carmel Sectional.

"I plastered that comment all over our dressing room walls," said the coach after his Tigers pulled the upset of the season by stunning No. 8 ranked North Central, 70-64, in the sectional's opening game Tuesday evening.

The Tigers put on a show.

"This is one of those games fans will be talking about 20 years from now," said Leonard. "The story will get a little better each year."

It was a game dominated by two Fishers seniors.

Keegan Kollmeyer was uncanny while leading the Tigers in scoring with 27 points. He canned four 3-pointers in Fishers' attack.

Cameron Wolter, the 6-8 center, was overpowering, pouring in 23 points and pulling eight rebounds.



# Golden Eagles handle Herron's press

"The first-game jitters are out of the way, and looking forward to Friday night and playing Brebeuf again," said GC coach Pete Smith.

Guerin Catholic started out well, scoring the first eight points - in fact, GC never trailed. Matt Labus opened the game with a 3-pointer, Nick Schneider scored on a layin, and Cameron Lindley hit a downtown shot as well.

The momentum carried the Golden Eagles to a 17-9 first-quarter lead. The Achaeans began to cut the lead down a little in the second quarter, getting as close as 22-19 in the early part of the period.

A '3' by Christian Munson put Guerin Catholic up 25-19 midway through the quarter, but Herron then scored five straight points, with Tyson Schumpert's jumper getting his team within 25-24. That put the Golden Eagles ahead by 10, at 46-36.

"Once we got the press broke, like we normally do, we finished really well around the basket," said Smith. "Christian took advantage of it."

"I thought we matured against their press in the third quarter, late in the third and fourth. Just made better decisions."

Guerin Catholic's lead ballooned to 20 points rather quickly after that, as another layin by Munson pushed GC ahead 65-45. Herron used one last 13-5 run to get back to 70-58, scoring a couple baskets off steals. Schumpert scored nine points in that run, but fouled out with 2:23 left. With the scoring threat neutralized, Guerin Catholic held at least a 12-point lead for the remainder of the game.

Another junior, Westfield's Jalyn Foland, led the county Three teams finished with 20 or more wins, Noblesville in 3-point shooting, nailing 47 percent of her attempts. Tied for second were a pair of seniors, Noblesville's Becca Bergman and Fishers Brooke Sugg at 45 percent.

> Westfield junior Haliegh Reinoehl led in rebounding, averaging 9.1 boards a game. She edged Sheridan's Katie Hybarger, a senior who pulled 6.6 rebounds a contest.

> Fishers senior Adrianna Murphy was the county's assists leader (5.0) and also led in steals (3.6). Bergman was second in assist at 4.9 per game. Carmel senior Amanda Shaw was second in steals (3.0)

> A Hamilton Heights sophomore, Taylor Boyd, was the leader in block shots (2.1). A Carmel freshman, Blake Smith, was second at 1.5.
