

# Westfield to add seat belts to school buses

Westfield will announce its plans to become the first school district in Hamilton County to have students wear seat belts on school buses.

Mayor Andy Cook, along with Westfield-Washington school officials and city leaders, will announce the program at 10 a.m. Friday. The goal is to provide better safety for students traveling out of town on their school buses.

"The most valuable asset in the Westfield community is our children," Mayor Cook said. "We are proud to partner with IMMI to help keep our kids safe."

### Dear Sports Enthusiast:

The introduction of Grand Park into an already robust Hamilton County group sports tournament environment has been a game changer. Added to an amazing complement of quality facilities, Grand Park and its resident teams now drive tens of thousands of visitors to this community. In fact, for nine weekends between March 1 and July 30, local hotels are sold out - a combination of local market forces as well as Grand Park and other sports activities.



Wednesday's first-round sectional game

at Tipton between Sheridan and Elwood was probably a game that the Blackhawks were happy to get over with.

Just as long as Sheridan won. And it did. The 'Hawks clawed their way to a 44-41 victory over the Panthers, and thus advanced to Friday's semi-finals. Sheridan will take on host Tipton at 7:30 p.m., following the first semi-final with Madison-Grant and Alexandria.

Sheridan coach Chris Schrank is aware that other coaches have said it before, but he said it after the game: "You just want to survive and advance."

"We practice tomorrow," said Schrank. "We play Friday night. That's what we're looking forward to. It wasn't pretty, but we're still playing. And that's the big thing."

It seemed like every basket was a big one, especially in the back-and-forth first half. Sheridan trailed 4-3 in the first quarter, but then Garrett Chesney made a 3-pointer to get the Blackhawks ahead 6-4. Elwood scored the next five points, however, to end the first quarter with a 9-6 lead.

Sheridan opened the second period with a 7-0 run of its own, all by the hands of Brock Kitchel. The senior hit a couple layins, including one off a steal, and was 3-of-4 from the free throw line during the run.

Elwood ended the run with a basket, and got as close as 15-14 midway through the quarter, but a basket by Elliott Barker right out of a Sheridan time-out gave his team a cushion, and Kitchel made another pair of free throws to put his team up 19-15. That was at the 2:32 mark, and neither team would score for the remainder of the half.

The 'Hawks held their largest lead, 23-16, early in the third quarter, with layins by Barker and Kitchel making that possible. But the Panthers began chipping away at the lead, and soon took it, thanks to a '3' by Tyce Towner. That got Elwood ahead 29-28.

Kitchel got the lead back with a '3', but Elwood responded with a 6-0 run for a 35-31 advantage. The Blackhawks toughened up in the final minute of the third quarter, scoring five points. A layin by Chris Roberts gave Sheridan the lead, 36-35 at the end of the period.

"I told these guys afterwards, I was proud of the way that they fought through it," said Schrank. "All night, it was just one of those games that didn't feel like it was going to go our way. It just didn't feel like it was our night. It felt like Elwood was going to make it happen." The Blackhawks crept up to a 40-36 lead with three minutes left in the game. Remarkably, Sheridan held the Panthers to a free throw in the first seven minutes of the fourth quarter. Eventually, Sheridan led 44-38 with 20.2 seconds to go, and held off Elwood in the time remaining.
