Westfield to add seat belts to school buses

Westfield will announce its plans to become the first school district in Hamilton County to have students wear seat belts on school buses.

Mayor Andy Cook, along with Westfield-Washington school officials and city leaders, will announce the program at 10 a.m. Friday. The goal is to provide better safety for students traveling out of town on their school buses.

"The most valuable asset in the Westfield community is our children," Mayor Cook said. "We are proud to partner with IMMI to help keep our kids safe."

"Today we use our school buses for more than traveling short distances to

and from school. We use them to take our athletic teams, performing arts groups, and students on field trips where we are traveling on interstates for long amount periods of time. "We hope this pilot program will allow us to better evaluate seatbelts on buses," said Nick Verhoff, Westfield-Washington schools.

"School buses are the only vehicles traveling down our highways at 65 miles per hour that don't offer the protection of seat belts for our kids. We can do better, and in Westfield, we will," said Tom Anthony, president and owner of Westfield-based IMMI, which is the leading provider of seat belts for school buses. "We're thrilled to partner with the city and the school district. Their commitment to take the next step to better protect kids on school buses is just one more reason why Westfield is one of the best cities to live for families."

Friday's announcement will be held at the Center for Advanced Product Evaluation (CAPE), on IMMI's campus at 18881 IMMI Way in Westfield. CAPE has safety tested more school buses and school bus seats every test facility in the world combined. Just last month, ABC News featured IMMI and CAPE on Good Morning America, World News Tonight, and Nightline for their work on seatbelts on school buses. As a result of those stories, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration is re-evaluating whether seat belts on school buses should be mandated. More than 600 school buses have been involved in rollover accidents in the past 5 years, and annually, 17,000 students are injured in school bus accidents.

Indiana legislators are currently considering a bill that would mandate seat belts on all new school buses.

The effort to place Indiana in the Central Time Zone (where it geographically belongs) is still alive. Sue Dillon, Carmel resident formerly of Noblesville, is a leader in the movement. A resolution is being developed for the state legislature's consideration which seeks the change from Eastern to Central time.

Last week the nation's attention was directed to the story of runaway llamas that led authorities on a lengthy chase in Los Angeles. Hamilton County has probably the largest llama population at least in the Midwest. They are probably enjoying our winter weather because they are native to cold climates. Many of our local llamas show up at the annual county fair and are kept happy in possibly the only air-conditioned llama barn. Indoor facility will provide winter opportunities

Dear Sports Enthusiast:

The introduction of Grand Park into an already robust Hamilton County group sports tournament environment has been a game changer. Added to an amazing complement of quality facilities, Grand Park and its resident teams now drive tens of thousands of visitors to this community. In fact, for nine weekends between March 1 and July 30, local hotels are sold out – a combination of local market forces as well as Grand Park and other sports activities.

At the Eric Clark Activity Center last night Zionsville outscored Noblesville from the line, 20-3.
"We trailed by 12 at the half and then cut their lead to four points late in the game," said Noblesville coach Brian McCauley.
"I'm proud of this team and I'm proud of the seniors. They are a group of battlers. We have kids who never quit."

Noblesville started the night down 10-4 at the end of the first period, and the Millers trailed 24-12 at halftime. Zionsville still had a comfortable 31-21 lead entering the fourth frame, and near the end of the third period the Eagles held the game's biggest lead at 31-28.

Noblesville made its run with a 20-point (one point fewer than the Millers scored in the first three periods) fourth quarter. John Kiser netted 10 points in the quarter; Jake Mills hit a couple of 3-pointers, and Sean Wilson added another 3-pointer. Mills' second shot beat the game's final horn.

Kiser finished with a team-high 16 points and Mills also was in double figures with 11. Wilson added nine points. The trio of Kiser, Mills and Wilson notched 36 of Noblesville's 41 points.

"Our shots weren't falling in the first half," said McCauley. "We did a better job in the second half. We did a good job on the boards. In the earlier game they beat us 17-6 on the boards and we outrebounded them tonight 26-20," the coach said.

Kiser led Noblesville with seven rebounds.

The closest the Millers got was 42-38, coming off a 3-pointer by Wilson.

"Zionsville is a good team with a frontline of 7-0, 6-9 and 6-6," McCauley said.

With 105-82 victory over Knicks...

Pacers cruise to third straight win

Dickens never saw a basketball game, but he would have a definite appreciation for Wednesday's contest. The Pacers' best of times collided with the Knicks' worst of times as Indiana (26-34) rolled to a 105-82 victory over New York (12-48).
It is the season of Light in Indiana, where the Pacers have won three straight and nine of their last 11.
And it is the season of the most profound Darkness in New York, where another blowout loss preserved the Knicks' ownership of the worst record in the NBA.
Pacers coach Frank Vogel elected to give starting center Roy Hibbert the night off on Wednesday, allowing his big man a little extra rest heading into the final six weeks of the regular season. Despite Hibbert's absence, the Pacers excelled on both ends of the court against the lowly Knicks.
The Blue & Gold had the game essentially won by halftime, when they headed to the locker room with a

24-point lead. They shot 60 percent and scored 65 points in the first half, five more points than they had scored in any first half so far this season.
It was unclear how much the Pacers beat the Knicks and how much the visitors beat themselves. New York committed an astounding 16 turnovers in the first 24 minutes, leading to 19 points on the other end.
"Coach said at the beginning of the game that we have to have active hands, we have to turn it over," Pacers point guard George Hill said. "I think every guy that came in the game had that mentality."
The Knicks never threatened in the second half, as the Pacers cruised to their sixth win in their last seven games at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.
"A couple things we're working on are to get off to better starts and putting teams away when we get the chance," Vogel said. "And we did a pretty good job of that tonight."

George Hill finished with a season-high 21 points to lead Indiana. Hill made 8-of-13 shots and also dished out six assists.
Three other Pacers players scored in double figures in the victory. Rodney Stuckey continued to produce coming off the bench, scoring 13 of his 17 points in the second quarter to help put the Knicks away. C.J. Miles added 16 points, while David West chipped in 13 points and five rebounds.
Knicks forward Andrea Bargnani led all scorers with 25 points on 10-of-17 shooting. Tim Hardaway, Jr. added 13 points for the visitors.
The Pacers return to the court on Friday night, when they host the Chicago Bulls at The Fieldhouse at 7:00 PM ET.
"They're well coached," Miles said of Friday's opponent. "They play hard. They have guys that are capable of making shots and plays. We have to come in like we came in tonight and like we came in (Sunday's win over Philadelphia) and be ready to go out there and focus."
