Indiana House reaches midpoint...

2015 session halftime accomplishments

know that halftime can be a turning point. It's a chance to build motivation, rally the team and set high expectations and goals for the second half. The same is true for lawmakers and the legislative process.

Last week, we reached the midpoint of the legislative session. Up against bill deadlines, we worked long hours and late nights to ensure that only the best legislation for Indiana passed out of the House. At the start of session, 650 bills were filed in our chamber alone, and at the end of the first half, roughly 200 were sent to Senate for further consideration. While this might seem like a lot, we were able to accomplish this by working hard and placing our political differences aside – putting the needs of Hoosiers first. In fact, a majority of the bills we voted on in the House passed with unanimous

With the second half of session just round the corner. I would like to highlight some of the accomplishments made during the first half; many of which reflect the House Republican legislative agenda announced in October. Our agenda focuses on passing an honestly balanced budget, improving the quality of our education system, increasing public safety and strengthening our ethics laws. Although each goal is important, with our state's finances up for review, our top priority is to pass an honestly balanced budget which will ensure Indiana can continue to operate for the next two fiscal years.

The House Republicans have a long history of fiscal integrity and protecting Hoosier taxpayers. This ensures that future generations are not left with a deficit, but rather, the financial flexibility to grow the economy and help more Hoosiers in need. I am proud we continued that tradition this session.

The budget bill, House Bill (HB) 1001, is not only structurally balanced but does not increase taxes on hardworking Hoosiers. Planning for the future, it ensures that our spending levels are sustainable for years to come and fosters an environment that will strengthen the economy. It also maintains our healthy reserves which provide a cushion so we can weather another economic recession if one should occur.

Most importantly, at the heart of the budget is education. We understand that it costs money to run a school, heat a cafeteria and provide a safe environment for students, which is why I am pleased our budget makes the largest



investment in K-12 education in Indiana's history. It also increases the foundation amount, or the minimum guarantee, that each school would receive per student.

Success in the classroom also requires support for teachers. They work tirelessly to prepare the next generation of leaders, and teachers know what works best for their students. We must ensure that they have the 1004 creates the Safety P.I.N. (Protecting tools are resources necessary to succeed, without spending their own personal dollars. That is why our budget includes a \$200 tax credit for teachers that purchase classroom supplies. Additionally, the budget also rewards effective and highly effective educators by allocating \$60 million in teacher performance grants.

While the budget and education are among our top priorities, public safety is equally important. Several bills that have public safety and language from these bills have been adopted into the budget. For example, HB 1006 works to help local communities provide alternatives to incarcera-

tion. This bill created the framework for the budget to allocate \$80 million over the next two years to support local corrections programs and capacity building.

The budget also doubles funding for domestic violence prevention and treatment each year, which was the goal of HB 1007. In an effort to reduce infant mortality, HB Indiana's Newborns) grant program, and \$13.5 million was allocated in the budget to support it.



You had to fake Barney out sometimes! I saw more than one boy come flying out of the yard with Barney right behind them! In high school I actually got to the point that I could hit a mensely! league I held my own and played fairly Jim was an owner of a gas station in town. His sons were good athletes at Noblesville High School. He taught me a lot about just learning how to play. When I became 11 years old, I really came into my own. I played for Coach Eddie Collins. Eddie was a great coach and an inspiring person to play for. I became a dominant player and started to become a dominant pitcher. I am thankful for all of my coaches who played a part in me being the first player in Noblesville ever being drafted by a major league baseball team. In 1973, I was the 78th player taken in the free agent draft out of high school by the San Francisco Giants. There were good coaches in Noblesville who all played a big part of my develop-

ment, men like Jim Gilliam, Eddie Collins, Al Beadle, Don Jellison, Ron Fleming, and my mentor Don Dunker, whom the current high school baseball field is named after. Just as a digression, Don Jellison was the only coach who ever asked me to hit an opposing player with a pitch. A big kid from Terre Haute had hit 7 of our guys during a game. Don brought me in since I was a hard thrower to just pitch to this kid. He handed me the ball and said "Hit him!" I was stunned for a minute and said, "You really want me to hit him?" Don said, "Yes!" More about Don in future articles! He was a great coach and helped me im-

Eddie Collins coached the Dodgers, the 11 and 12 year old team. Playing for the The first couple of years in the minor Dodgers, gave me a life-long love of the Los Angeles Dodgers. I mean it was the well. Jim Gilliam was my coach. I believe two great pitchers Sandy Koufax and Don Drsdale who led the Dodgers! Great they were! Sandy was a remarkable pitcher and one who could really bring it. When I played in minor league baseball for San Francisco the minor league hitting coach was Hank Sauer, who loved to chew tobacco. You had to sit beside Hank in a folding chair prior to going into the on deck circle to hit. The tobacco juice and the wisdom would fly round! Hank was the most valuable player in the National League in 1952, playing for the Chicago Cubs, two years before I was born! I am sitting there and here I am talking to the great Hank Sauer! 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

These honors recognize up to four outstanding high school seniors for their exemplary performance in science, math, engineering, and technology (STEM). Winning students receive \$1,000 college scholarships through Indiana's CollegeChoice 529 Direct Savings Plan.

"It is a privilege to continue this tradition of awarding exceptional students with science, math, engineering or technology interests with college scholarships," said Governor Pence. "As our state continues to grow in life sciences and technological industries, it is important that students recognize these fields as impactful to our state's future."

Indiana's Mr. and Miss Math and Science awards honor the top high school

seniors in STEM classes, as well as extracurricular activities, work/research projects, leadership roles, and community service. The nominations will be reviewed by a panel of STEM experts, including teachers, college and university instructors, and staff from the Indiana Department of Education and the Indiana Education Roundtable.

With an estimated one in four Hoosiers experiencing a medically diagnosable mental health condition each year, that means long wait times to get treatment from a practicing psychiatrist. Community Health Network will address this problem by establishing a psychiatry residency program in 2016 that will utilize Community's broad continuum of behavioral health services to train the next generation of psychiatrists. It will be only the second psychiatry residency program offered in the state of Indiana.

Community Health Network received approval to be a multi-specialty sponsoring institution for Graduate Medical Education 2012. The network already has four medical residency programs (family medicine, family medicine osteopathic, podiatry, and proctology). Community's psychiatry residency program received accreditation in February by The Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME) to accept learners through The National Resident Matching Program® (NRMP®), and will begin recruiting for the first class that begins July 1, 2016. 

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

The top three teams advance from sectionals to regionals. The Millers will be battling with McCutcheon and Harrison for that third spot. Logansport is the favorite to win, as the Berries have gone as high as 107.675 in their team score this year. Western has made it up to 100.075.

The Mavericks' best score is 97.55, with Noblesville right there at 97.35. The Millers achieved that mark in their second-to-last meet at Marion last week.

"That 97 is still given with a decent amount of falls and wobbles and bobbles throughout the competition," said Ramey. "We definitely can produce that 100 scoring team."

Two Noblesville gymnasts will compete in the all-around: Esma Taylor and Ronnie VanBuskirk. Both are sophomores, but more importantly, both have competed in the post-season. Taylor and VanBuskirk were part of the Millers' regional line-up, which got switched around at the last minute when one of Noblesville's senior gymnasts was injured.

Ramey said Taylor was expected to "rise to the degree of potential that I know she has. And she has done very well for us this season." Taylor has scored as high as an 8.80 in the yault.

As for VanBuskirk, Ramey said she has "certainly matured" as both a gymnast and an individual, calling her an excellent listener.

"She will be doing new skills on the balance beam," said Ramey. "We hope that she can continue to remain solid on that balance beam."

Freshman Anna Dorris will compete in three events: The floor exercise, the vault and the uneven bars. Dorris has gone as high as 8.70 on the vault, and has had good floor exercises as well.

"She is definitely a strong gymnast for us," said Ramey. "We've been lucky to have her on the team this year. She is very beautiful to watch. She's got a lot of grace, is very fluid throughout her routines, and just the grace alone, she just has such beautiful movements on floor."

Emily Denham, another freshman, will compete on the floor and the beam. Ramey said she has quite a bit of "raw talent" and will continue to improve as she goes through her high school career.


