Fire OPS 101 event conducted for Indiana Legislators

The Professional Firefighters Union of Indiana (PFFUI) put eight Indiana legislators from around the state through a rigorous day in the life of a firefighter.

Held at the Hamilton County Training center in Noblesville, the group of came face to face with the hands on, often hazardous and difficult work that firefighters encounter as they serve and protect their communities.

The day started at 9 a.m. with a breakfast, gear sizing, medical checks, mask fit and group assignments. Opening remarks from PFFUI President Tom Hanify were followed by a flashover classroom session and an initial briefing of the day's activities. Hanify stated that his objective in making this opportunity available was to "Give the decision makers in Indiana a better understanding of the challenges that firefighters face every day. To stress the importance of up to date and advanced training opportunities for all firefighters ...so they can keep their communities safe and themselves safe. It is imperative that at the end of every shift...every firefighter goes home safely to their family."

Whenever I write about parking problems 50 some years ago, the young people of today talk about how Noblesville's population is so much larger today. True, but in those days people from all over Hamilton County came to Noblesville to shop. When all those folks came to Noblesville to shop, they shopped in the downtown. No shopping centers back then.

Back in those days people actually did erase the chalk marks put on their tires by the local police department people, drivers who parked too long in spaces in the downtown. I'm not sure how the police kept track during the horse and buggy days. I would think the city's street cleaning people would have been more important than the police marking tires.



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Huskies advance to championship

Even though the Hamilton Heights boys basketball team led by double digits for the majority of the Friday Sectional 24 semifinal game, that advantage never felt safe.

That's because the Huskies were playing Muncie Central, in the historic Muncie Fieldhouse. The intensity level was high for the entire game, which eventually ended in Heights' favor by the score of 75-58. The Huskies will play for the sectional championship at 7:30 p.m. tonight, taking on Yorktown.

"With the team that they have, and the speed and the quickness and they way that they trap, no lead was safe with them," said Huskies coach Chad Ballenger.

Central actually scored the first five points of the game before Grant Weatherford got Heights on the board with a basket. That started a 9-1 run, with Weatherford scoring seven of those points. Kurry Miller had the other two, a pair of free throws which tied the game at 6-6.

Grant then hit a 3-pointer to get the Huskies ahead 9-6, and Heights never trailed again. The Huskies' lead expanded very slowly throughout the course of the game, with the Bearcats making enough big baskets to get their crowd going, and make it seem like they were still in it.

But Heights always had an answer. For example, Central's Andre Jones made a huge dunk in the first minute of the second quarter, getting his team to within 18-14. A couple plays later, Weatherford got a breakaway, and then put down a dunk of his own. That accounted for two of Grant's 28 points on the night.

Weatherford's putback basket with under six minutes left gave Heights its first 10-point lead, at 27-17, then Miller's jumper got the Huskies up 12. Weatherford later hit a free throw to give HH a 31-21 lead, and the Huskies would remain ahead by double digits for the remainder of the game. Sterling Weatherford made a 3-point play to push Heights ahead 36-23 at halftime.

"It was a fight," said Ballenger. "We played extremely well and I couldn't be more proud of our guys."

The Huskies' lead stayed around 12 to 16 points for most of the second half, until

Heights pulled away in the final three minutes. Most of that was attributed to the Huskies' free throw shooting: Grant Weatherford was 6-of-8 in the final 3:17, with Hunter Crist making a couple of foul shots as well. Crist scored all of his 13 points in the latter three quarters, including a big 3-pointer early in the second period.

Everybody had some good minutes. Sterling Weatherford reached double-double territory with 16 points and 13 rebounds. Caymn Lutz came off the bench to score eight points in the second half, including a couple layins that halted any momentum that the Bearcats may have been getting.

"Lutz did a great job for us," said Ballenger. "He's a kid that went from playing JV for us to being a full-time varsity player. He's done a great job helping us out. He's really came on strong here down the stretch for us."

Next up is Yorktown, which beat Blackford 69-20 in the first Friday semi-final. Both the Tigers and Heights bring 17-7 records into the championship game.

"They can shoot it, they can absolutely shoot it," said Ballenger. "Obviously their guys are a little bit rested. They went home pretty quick tonight. It's a 15-minute drive, and we got an hour.

"We've just got to get home and get some rest," the coach continued. We're going to come back in tomorrow morning and we've got our game plan ready. At this time, it's 'suck it up and play.' It's big boy basketball, and it's a chance to cut the nets down."



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Carmel wins in 2 overtimes

The state's No. 2 ranked team, Carmel, and the defending sectional champion Hamilton Southeastern Royals Friday evening advanced their way to Saturday's championship game in the Carmel Sectional.

Barely and barely.

Before a packed house at Carmel's Eric Clark Activity Center, the host Greyhounds fought off a tremendous upset bid by Fishers' Tigers to win a 56-48 double overtime thriller.

Then in the nightcap, Southeastern led a close game all the way to defeat Zionsville 42-38.

Now, at 7:30 p.m. tonight, Carmel and Southeastern will play for all the marbles. On Feb. 12, in a game also played at Carmel, the Greyhounds defeated the Royals 48-31.

In the opening game last evening, Carmel junior Trenton Richardson did what several players have done this season. He took the spotlight away from superstar teammate Ryan Cline with great clutch play down the home stretch.

Richardson hit a clutch free throw with 28 seconds remaining to force a second overtime. He scored the first four points in that second overtime. And, he grabbed three key rebounds in that second extra session.

Richardson finished the night with eight points and eight rebounds.

"He also played a good defensive game," said Richardson's coach, Scott Heady. "He defended against their big guy (Cam Wolter), who is a very good player.

Wolter scored 13 points and yanked six rebounds for the Tigers before fouling out in the first overtime.

Cline had a special evening of his own. The Purdue University bound senior scored 30 of Carmel's 56 points and twice in the first overtime hit unbelievable 3-pointers just when it looked as if Fishers had the Greyhounds on the ropes.

Cline played some great defense, too. He defended all evening long against Fishers scoring ace Keegan Kollmeyer, holding him to nine points.

"Cline is our best defender," said Heady.

After Cline's 30 points, Richardson was next in line for the Greyhounds with eight. Wolter and Wehner shared scoring

honors for Fishers, each with 13 points. Wolter and Kollmeyer led Fishers on the

boards, each with six rebounds Carmel beat Fishers badly on the boards,

35-21, with Cline, Keegan Culp and

Carmel had defeated Fishers 59-46 on Jan. 3 at Fishers.
