In dramatic double overtime...

Huskies hold off Yorktown for championship

The Sectional 24 championship game at Muncie Central was short on style points, and long on melodrama.

And no one that was there will ever forget it. Especially if they were Hamilton Heights fans.

The Huskies held off Yorktown 55-52 in double overtime to win Class 3A Sectional 24, reclaiming the trophy they won in 2013 but lost to the Bearcats last season. Heights advances to the Blackford regional, where it will take on Bishop Dwenger in the 10 a.m. semi-final.

The Huskies actually never trailed in the second half and both extra periods. But the Tigers kept making huge baskets to tie the game, including a 3-pointer at the end of the first OT to tie the game at 42-42.



"They hit big shots and they're a good basketball team," said Heights coach Chad Ballenger. "They won 17 games for a reason. They were able to make some big shots."







It was, arguably, one of the greatest sectional performances ever in the Carmel Sectional, dating back to the days of the Carmel Mr. Basketball Shepherd brothers.

Senior Ryan Cline, after scoring 30 points in the Greyhounds' 56-48, double overtime win over Fishers in the semi-final round, last evening in the championship game at the Eric Clark Activity Center poured in 32 points in Carmel's 51-44 victory over Hamilton Southeastern.

Thirty-two points on a night during which Cline was hounded and pressured by the Royals' fastest player, Chris Ford, and the Royals' strongest player, Tyler Janney.

"They really did a good defensive job on me," Cline said after cutting down the nets.

"They were bumping and hanging all over him throughout the game," said Carmel coach Scott Heady. "But, Ryan kept his head and played through it."

We had good defense on him and still Cline scored 32 points," said Southeastern coach Brian Satterfield. "There's a reason why Cline is being mentioned as a Mr. Basketball candidate."

Cline hit five 3-pointers and scored 19 points in the first half as Carmel took a 29-22 lead to intermission. He got only two shots and didn't score in the third period. before coming back with a clutch performance in the final frame.

Carmel needed the late explosion from its super star. Southeastern opened the fourth quarter on a 3-pointer by Janney, which at that time tied the game at 34-34.

With 5:27 left in the battle, Cline drilled a boomer to put his team ahead at 37-34. Keegan Culp followed with a 3-pointer for a 40-34 edge. Two free throws by Cline gave Carmel a 42-34 lead, and at that time Heady brought out his cat-and-mouse offense.

From the 3:38 mark to the 1:50 mark when Cline was fouled and made two more free throws, the Greyhounds never shot the basketball.

"It was a rough year, battling through Ry injuries and other things," said Satterfield, "but our kids never gave up. They kept fighting.'

Southeastern has been the only team to win against Heady in this his fifth year as Carmel coach. The Royals won the sectional last year and they won five years ago (both times in the championship game) before the Gr Greyhounds went on a two-year run of winning state championships.

Heady, who picked up with 100th victory Bro as Carmel's coach in the win over Fishers on Friday has lost only 23 games as a Greyhound coach in this his fifth year. In a 20-year career, Heady has won 317 games as a varsity coach. The victory last evening was a toughie. "Our offense has struggled a little," Heady said. But, as always, Carmel's defense against the Royals was brilliant. It was outstanding, especially in the second half, against HSE star sophomore, Zach Gunn. Carmel limited Gunn to only five points, all at the charity line, in the second half after Gunn had poured in 10 points in the second quarter.

Gunn got few good looks at the bucket. He was 4-of-14 overall and 1-of-8 from 3-point range.

We had Cline on him a little, but most of the night Keegan (Culp) was on Gunn," Heady said.

Southeastern was just 12-of-43 shooting the pill; only 5-of-22 from 3-point territory. Gunn led HSE with 15 points and Ford

also was in double figures with 11. Cline was the only Carmel player in

double figures. Culp finished with nine points.

Carmel skipped to a 13-6 first quarter advantage, with Cline scoring eight points and Preston Flamion adding five.

Cline and Gunn gave a big sectional crowd a great show of shooting the basketball in the second quarter. Cline hit a trio of 3's and scored 11 points and Gunn had a 10-point quarter.

Carmel's offense struggled in the third quarter, scoring just five points, allowing Southeastern to get back in the game. When the period ended, the Greyhounds had just a 34-31 lead.

There was a period of time when the Royals missed a real opportunity.

"We had four or five possessions in a row without scoring," Satterfield agreed.

Carmel didn't exactly sizzle the nets against Southeastern's defense. The Greyhounds were 13-of-33 overall, but 10-of-22 from 3-point range, with Cline hitting 6-of-11 and Culp 3-of-8. The Greyhounds were 15-of-17 at the line, with Cline hitting 12-of-12.

Berries junior Kelley Platt swept all the events, sailing to a 38.35-point effort in the all-around. Ramey noted that some of the younger girls on the team hadn't seen competition like they had today at the sectional.

"And they all kind of have a little fire lit underneath them for skills over the summer and things we can improve on next year," said Ramey.

That's one of the best things about this team - they all come back next year.

"I don't foresee any one of my gymnasts going anywhere for next season," said Ramey. "We bring back our whole entire team next year. These girls are capable of over 100 points easy."



Pacers win fifth in a row

It wasn't nearly as easy the second time around, but the Pacers (28-34) rallied in the fourth quarter to beat the New York Knicks (12-49) for the second time in four days, 92-86. Indiana has now extended its longest winning streak of the season to five games.

On Wednesday night, the Pacers dominated essentially from start to finish at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. They led by 24 points at halftime and cruised to a 23-point victory over the owners of the NBA's worst record.

But the Knicks were much more competitive on Saturday night on their home floor. New York capitalized on an Indiana squad playing the second night of a back-to-back, holding the visitors to 29-percent shooting in the first half to take a five-point lead at halftime.

New York remained in front for much of the second half, leading by as many as nine points with 9:52 remaining in the fourth quarter.

But the Pacers clawed back, eventually taking the lead when C.J. Watson drained a 3-pointer from the right wing and drew a foul with 6:36 to play, capping a 16-4 run by the visitors.

The Knicks tied the game twice more, but George Hill's 3-pointer with 2:34 left gave Indiana an 86-83 lead and the Pacers maintained the advantage the rest of the way.

Rodney Stuckey led Indiana with 17 points and four assists. David West scored eight of his 14 points in the third quarter and also collected 11 rebounds. George Hill finished with 16 points and five rebounds, while Watson added 13 points off the bench.

Knicks forward Andrea Bargnani led all scorers with 21 points on 10-of-14 shooting, but fouled out with 3:22 to play and was sorely missed in the final minutes. Alexey Shved added 15 points off the bench for New York.

After a quick trip to New York, the Pacers return to Indiana for another four-game homestand, beginning on Tuesday night against Orlando.

Fuel fight back in 4-3 loss to Wheeling

In the fourth of four head-to-head meetings between the two teams this season, the Indy Fuel were defeated by the Wheeling Nailers on Saturday at Indiana Farmers Coliseum by a final score of 5-4. With the loss, Indy fell to 24-24-4-4 overall this season and with 56 points, remain alone in fifth place in the ECHL's North Division standings, one point shy of playoff position. After a fight between Indy's Johnny McGuire and Wheeling's Chaz Johnson electrified the crowd off the opening faceoff, the Nailers grabbed control of Saturday's game with three first period scores, from Derek Army on the powerplay at 5:39 and Jarrett Burton and Shawn Skelly at even strength at 13:39 and 13:55 respectively, to take a 3-0 lead into the first intermission. In the middle frame, the Nailers extended their advantage just 42 seconds into the period on Alex Boak's first of the season, but after a hard-fought second stanza, Garett Bembridge put the Fuel on the board at 17:38 thanks to even-strength feeds from Chris DeSousa and Nicklas Lindberg. After a Patrick McGrath major penalty early in the third, the Fuel took advantage of a five-minute power-play and clawed within a goal at 4-3 thanks to a pair of extra-man markers, from Justin Holl at 3:42, assisted by Jamie Wise and Matt White, and Bembridge's second of the game at 4:32, from Lindberg and Pete Massar. Despite a furious rally down the stretch from Indy, the Nailers hung on for a onegoal win and ended the Fuel's five-game winning streak and six-game point streak. Mac Carruth took the loss in net for the Fuel following a 22-save performance and Franky Palazzese earned the win for Wheeling thanks to 31 stops on 34 Indy pucks faced. Saturday's game featured 103 combined penalty minutes, including 52 for the Nailers, a new single-game season high for a Fuel opponent this year. Next up for the Fuel, it's a Sunday matinee clash vs. the Kalamazoo Wings with the opening faceoff set for 3:00 pm at Wings Stadium in Kalamazoo, Michigan.
