How about?

Trolley to downtown

A few months ago I talked with a long-time friend, a businessman in Noblesville, about parking in the downtown. He came up with an idea which at the time I kind of chuckled and then forgot.

The idea was this:
When Farm Bureau Coop closes its grain terminal and brings down the aging solos, turn the property on south 9th Street in Noblesville into a huge parking lot and then run a street car (a trolley car, if you will) on the railroad



tracks straight down 8th Street, stopping between the courthouse and the Judicial Center.

Why not?

As Fred Swift pointed out in The Hamilton County Reporter earlier this week, the grain terminal dates back to the post-Civil War times. It has been a part of Noblesville forever.

I once worked in a building next to the terminal. It was fun looking out the window and seeing local farmers bring in their grain. Heck, I remember back to the days when the farmers hooked wagons to tractors and headed into town.

So, why not use the land for something which would solve Noblesville's biggest headache, parking in the downtown? Folks coming to town could be directed by signs to the 9th Street location; hop on a street car, and five

minutes later be downtown to shop; eat; drink; eat ice cream; go to court; whatever.

Would the guy running the trolley make any money? That's another matter.

I've taken my own parking survey this week and what I discovered is what I think all of us old-timers have known for years, Noblesville doesn't really have a parking problem. It has a walking problem.

Lori Schwartz reminded me of this with an email and a suggestion to the recently-formed parking committee.

"Walk," was Lori suggestion. "One memory of my childhood was when my father drove around the courthouse several times, not giving up on finding a parking space. And, yes, sometimes we had to walk a block."

Money to be used for payments, refinancing and property renovations...

Financing arranged for Wentworth at West Clay

Press Release

HFF announced today that it has arranged \$6.5 million in financing for Wentworth at West Clay, a 186-unit, Class A multi-housing community located within the Village of West Clay in Carmel, a suburb north of Indianapolis, Indiana.

HFF worked on behalf of the borrower, Gibralt Capital Corp. (Gibralt), to secure the three-year, floating-rate loan from Bedrock Capital Associates. Loan proceeds will be used to refinance the existing debt, pay transaction costs and finance property renovations.

The Wentworth at West Clay has 101 apartments and 85 condominiums. There are 26 one-, 60 two- and 15 three-bedroom units averaging 1,129 square feet. The 95-percent-occupied property was built in 2004 and features a clubhouse, playground, barbeque, picnic area, tennis court, 24-hour fitness center, business center, movie theatre, billiard room, private garages and three swimming pools. The community is located at 12880 University Crescent within the Village of West Clay, a master-planned community that replicates a small town and provides more than 16 miles of walking and jogging trails, in addition to more than 20 ponds and lakes in the area.

The HFF debt placement team was led by associate director Zachary Roden from HFF's Indianapolis office and managing director Rob Rizzi with HFF's New York office.

you've got to convince the folks who work downtown to park elsewhere, opening the spaces to the customers.

But, where do these downtown employees park?

The two businesses in downtown Noblesville which employ the most people are Hamilton County government and Noblesville City government.

They solved their own problems years ago by grabbing up a big hunk of downtown parking. Some say 51 or 52 percent of the downtown parking.

Commissioner Steve Dillinger has many times said to me that downtown Noblesville would be a nightmare hadn't the county purchased its own parking. Think about that. All the people who work in the Judicial Center and the courthouse. The City has done the same at City Hall.

The biggest difference is that the City also has parking for its "customers." The

county does not. Many (more than many) parking spaces around the courthouse square are taking up by drivers doing business at the courthouse or at the Judicial Center.

In my study this week I also discovered something else. I can drive you, any time during the day, within a 1-2 block area of the courthouse and find 50 or more empty parking spaces.

It goes back to what Lori suggested. Walk.

Seems simple to me. My wife tells me everything seems simple to me because I'm so simple.

Change the parking time limitation to 3-4 hour around the courthouse square for those who really need that much time. Provide better signage for those 50 empty spaces I found. And, convince the downtown workers to ride the trolley.

Heck, with a trolley we finally could out do Carmel at something.

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Four plants with the healing power to cure what ails you

A fever, stomach pains or a simple case of the sniffles can send people rushing to the pharmacy for a drug to battle their symptoms.

But Mother Nature provides a number of medicinal plants with healing properties that also can nurse you back to health, a fact more Americans are beginning to discover.

"The use of herbal medicine, although traditional in many Eastern cultures, had been only a minor fad in Western medicine until recent decades," says Dr. Virender Sodhi, founder of the Ayurvedic and Naturopathic Medical Clinic (ayurvedicscience.com), which provides complementary and alternative medicine.

That trend has been shifting as a growing body of studies and research has demonstrated the effects of traditional remedies

on chronic diseases, such as diabetes and hypertension, says Sodhi, author of the new guide, "Ayurvedic Herbs: The Comprehensive Resource for Ayurvedic Healing Solutions" (www.ayush.com).

That's not necessarily news to ailing people in other parts of the world, such as Asia and Africa. For centuries, they have found relief through herbal medicines derived from shrubs, vines, trees and other plants, Sodhi says.

Here are four examples, a couple of which are recognizable by better known names and purposes.

- **Glycyrrhiza glabra.** Most people would recognize this plant by its more common name – licorice. It has been used for centuries in the traditional and folk medicines of Asia and Europe to treat ailments

ranging from the common cold to liver disease, Sodhi says. Most Americans likely encountered licorice as children because the sweet root of the plant is used to make candy. Licorice can cure more than a sweet tooth, though. It can protect people from the influenza virus. In cell line studies it was shown to reduce titer of the influenza virus by 90 percent and have strong immune modulation properties. It's an important ingredient in many herbal preparations, Sodhi said, especially for bronchial conditions. Because of its expectorant properties, powdered licorice has been used for centuries to treat coughs. Modern cough syrups often contain licorice extract.

- **Piper nigrum.** This flowering vine's berries, when still unripe, are used to produce black pepper, but spicing up food isn't

its only talent. Piper nigrum has anti-inflammatory, anti-microbial and anti-spasmodic properties that make it ideal for treating digestive disorders, Sodhi says. It doesn't stop there. Drug resistance is a major concern in cancer patients. Piper nigrum can reverse multiple drug resistance many fold and significantly increase the apoptotic effect of many pharmaceutical drugs.

- **Boswellia serrate.** Commonly known as Frankincense, this herb has powerful anti-inflammatory effects. Several patients with ulcerative colitis and Crohn's colitis have gone in to remission using a Boswellia preparation. In brain tumor patients it has reduced cerebral edema by 75 percent. Sodhi has mentioned case studies of many patients with rheumatoid arthritis, psoriatic arthritis, polymyalgia rheumatica and ulcerative colitis who went into remission.

- **Bael.** This fruit-bearing tree indigenous to the hills and plains of central and southern India has numerous uses. The fruit promotes healthy digestion and is used medicinally to treat such conditions as diarrhea, dysentery and cholera. The leaves, roots and bark of Bael also have medicinal value. They help relieve acute bronchitis, heart palpitations, intermittent fevers and many other ailments. Dr. Sodhi has observed 100 percent success in treating patients of clostridium difficile, who did not respond to standard medical protocol of metronidazole (Flagyl), Difidol (fidaxomicin), or vancomycin.

Heights’ Defoe is sizzling

Michael Defoe is serving notice early that he will be someone to watch this spring in Hamilton County track and field.

A junior, Defoe is a member of Mike Hippensteel’s Hamilton Heights team. Actually, he isn’t a newcomer to the local world of track and field. Michael finished 14th in the high hurdles at the IHSAA’s state meet last season.

Currently, Defoe, like many Hamilton County athletes, is participating in the

indoor qualifying meets for the Hoosier State Relays, which will be held in two weeks at Purdue University.

Defoe had another standout performance on Thursday in a meet at West Lafayette. He won the 55 meter hurdles and now has the fastest time, entering the weekend, in the state in the Small School Division and he would be ranked third in Big School times.

At West Lafayette, Defoe also was fourth in the 55 meter dash and was on

Heights’ 4x200 relay team which finished seventh and currently is ranked No. 2 in Small School standings. Other members of that relay team are Jesse Brown, Nick Peterson and Nathan Roth.

Westfield, with a limited squad, joined Hamilton Heights in the boys competition. Senior Ryan Rubicz placed seventh for the Shamrocks in the high jump.

Rubicz has been busy for Westfield so far this indoor season, running five events and competing in the high jump.

Westfield’s 4x800 relay team did not run at West Lafayette. Sam Henthorn, Johnny Crawford, Aaron Bennett and Alec Hartman have recorded one of the best times in the state.

Hamilton Heights also competed in the girls meet, as did a few athletes from Westfield and Hamilton Southeastern.

The top-finishing Lady Husky was Macey Policka, a sophomore who placed third in the 55 meter hurdles.

For Westfield, senior Becca Carr was fourth in the 3200 run and sophomore Sydney Spears was fourth in the long jump.

Hamilton Southeastern senior Hannah Conrad placed third in the high jump and teammates Emily Obear and Allie Hogan were fifth and sixth, respectively, in the pole vault.

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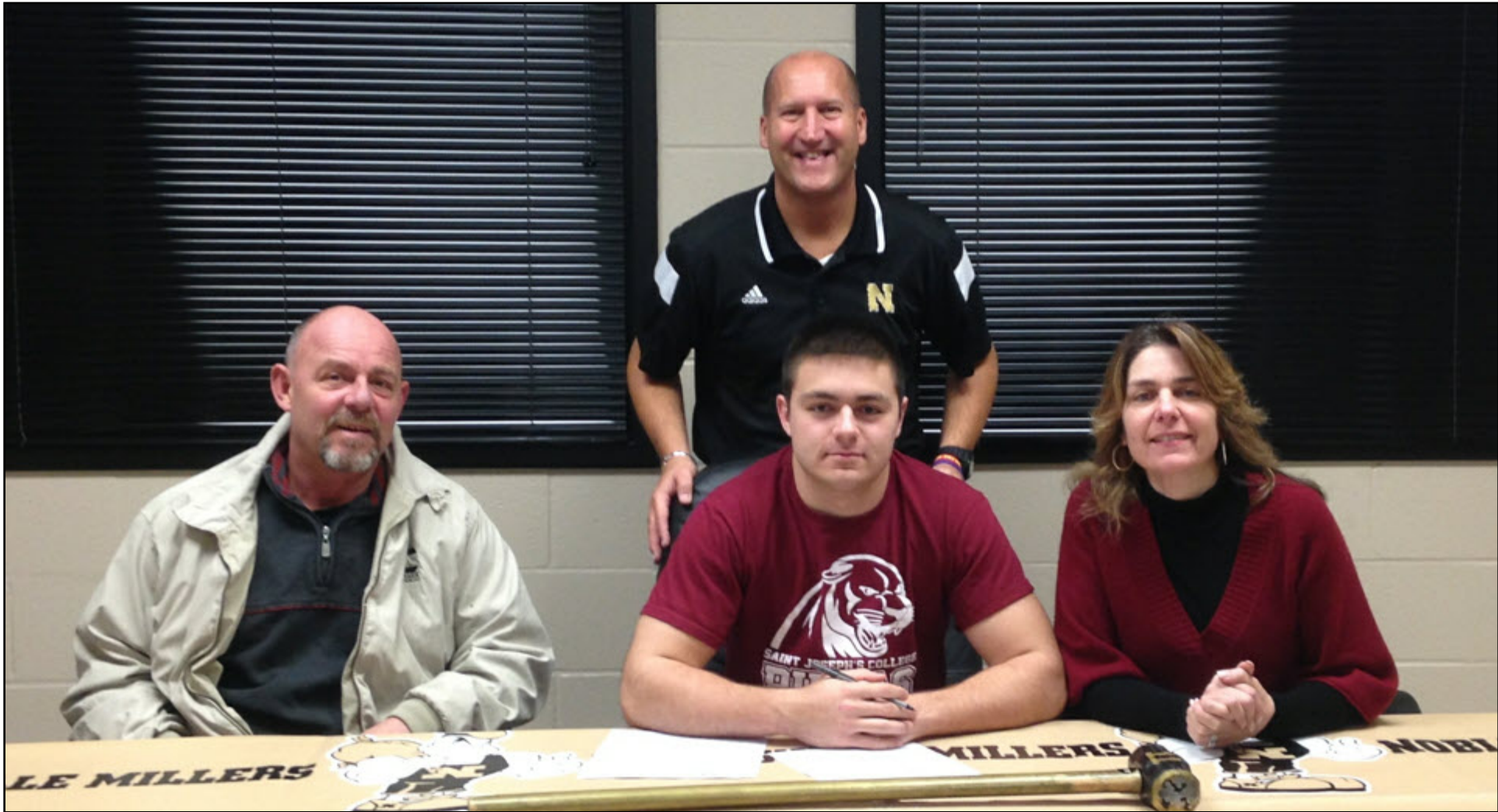

Media Room – 1 volunteer
