### Noblesville Parks offering six bus trips

If you're ever looking for a chance to get out of town, then the Noblesville Parks and Recreation Department has some opportunities for you.

Noblesville Parks is once again sponsoring its Bus Trips, with six planned for 2015. The trips have been a mainstay of the Parks Department for over 15 years. While the line-up has stayed mostly the same over the years, there is a new trip in store for Spring Break, and there's still time to regis-

On April 8, the Noblesville Parks bus will travel to Fair Oaks Farms for what's being billed as a Spring Break Family Trip. Fair Oaks is located several miles northwest of Rensselaer, at the intersection of I-65 and State Road 14. Fair Oaks offers such attractions as the Dairy Experience and the Pig Experience, as well as fresh ice cream, cheeses and a restaurant.

One of the more popular offerings is the twice-yearly trip to the Shipshewana Flea Market. The flea market is located in the small northeastern Indiana town that says

it's in "the heart of Amish Country." Almost 900 vendors take part in the flea market. This year, Noblesville Parks is conducting the Spring trip on May 19 and the Fall trip on Sept. 15.

Another twice-yearly excursion is to Chicago. The Summer in Chicago trip is set for Aug. 1, with the Chicago Christmas Shopping trip to take place on Dec. 5. The Christmas shopping trip is so popular that two buses are needed to accommodate all of the participants. Noblesville Parks' remaining bus trip is a trip to Nashville, Ind. for shopping and sightseeing; that is scheduled for Oct. 28.

The costs of these trips vary. The Fair Oaks and both Chicago trips are \$50 per person, while both Shipshewana trips are \$46. The Nashville trip is \$38.

Noblesville Parks requires preregistration, and must be done no later than two weeks prior to the trip. Registrations can be done either over the phone (317-776-6350), online (www.noblesvilleparks.org) or by stopping in the Parks Office at Forest Park.

#### INDOT public hearing regarding I-69 expansion, interchange modification

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) will hold a public hearing on Thursday, March 19, 2015 at the Fishers City Hall Auditorium, One Municipal Drive, Fishers, Indiana 46038, the public hearing will begin 6:00 p.m. The purpose of the public hearing is to offer all interested persons an opportunity to comment on current plans for a proposed I-69 Interstate

travel lanes from 106th Street to 0.5 mile north of Southeastern Parkway/Campus Parkway and added travel lanes from 0.5 of north Southeastern Parkway/Campus Parkway to 0.5 East of S.R. 13 in Hamilton and Madison Counties. In addition, the proposed project involves an interchange modification at exit 210

(Campus Parkway/Southeastern Parkway) in Hamilton County.

involves the construction of additional lanes within the existing median from Exit http://www.indot.in.gov Greenfield District 205 (116th Street and SR 37 in Fishers) to 0.5 mile north of Exit 210 (Southeastern Parkway/Campus Parkway). An outside auxiliary lane will be added on SB I-69 from 106th Street to 116th Street. Existing pavement will be resurfaced. All mainline bridges will be widened in the median (including the Sand Creek NB bridge and SB bridge). In addition, the project will construct additional lanes within the existing median from 0.5 mile north of Exit 210 to 0.5 mile east of S.R. 13. Existing pavement will be resurfaced. All mainline bridges will be widened in the median (including the Mud Creek NB bridge and SB bridge, the Thorpe Creek NB bridge and SB bridge, and the S.R. 13 NB bridge and SB bridge. The interchange at Exit 210 (Campus Parkway/Southeastern Parkway) is proposed to be modified. The project also involves noise analysis as part of the interstate expansion. INDOT is evaluating noise impact to determine abatement measures as part of this project. Additional details regarding the interstate expansion and interchange modification will be presented in greater detail at the public hearing. This project does not involve the acquisition of right-of-way as work is proposed to take place entirely within existing right-of-way. The proposed maintenance of traffic plan will be presented as part of the formal presentation. Public statements for the record will be accepted as part of the public hearing procedure. All verbal statements recorded during the public hearing and all written comments submitted prior to, during and for a period of two (2) weeks following the hearing date, will be evaluated, considered and addressed in subsequent environmental documentation. Written comments may be submitted prior to the public hearing and within the comment period to: INDOT Public Hearings, IGCN Room N642, 100 North Senate Avenue, Indianapolis, IN 46204.

## God desires mercy

Written around 750 to 722 BC to primarily the northern Kingdom of Israel but also to Judah, the theme of the book of Hosea is one of

ensample, God had told Hosea to take a "wife of harlotry" (Hosea 1:2) leading the prophet Hosea to marry a woman named Gomer. Many believe Gomer to have been either a shrine or temple prostitute while others think she was referred to in this way only after being unfaithful to her loving, patient, and merciful husband, Hosea. Either way, God was providing a living example of the Israelites disloyalty toward Himself, the personification of an unfaithful bride, for His unfaithful bride. Gomer as a wife would go after my lovers (Hosea 2:5) just as Israel would run after many foreign gods. Gods covenant people had turned to Baal worship which included the use of shrine prostitutes for blessings of abundance in field, flock, and family and they were worshiping calf images in Samaria while engaging in a multitude of sins detestable to God. "Treacherous" is what God called Israel's unfaithfulness (Hosea 7:16) as there does not appear to have been a single commandment that His betrothed was not breaking. Of this time Hosea proclaimed "there is no truth or mercy or knowledge of God in the land. By swearing and lying, killing and stealing and committing adultery, they break all restraint, with bloodshed upon bloodshed" Hosea 4:1-2 (NKJV). In the midst of this treacherous sin God's bride was treating The God like a god amongst a host of gods violating the first of the ten commandments "You shall have no other gods before Me" Ex 20:3 (NKJV) – this being the greatest of their sins and primary problem. The land had committed great harlotry by departing from the LORD (Hosea 1:2). Yet their spiritual harlotry did not stop them from performing the external duties of their religion to which God said, in the book of Amos, "I hate, I despise your feast days, and I do not savor your sacred assemblies. Though you offer Me burnt offerings and your grain offerings, I will not accept them, Nor will I regard your fattened peace offerings. Take away from Me the noise of your songs, For I will not hear the melody of your stringed instruments" (Amos 5:21-23). God heralds for our transgressions based on the strength to his adulterous bride - "I desire mercy and of our loyalties? Where would we be in the not sacrifice, and the knowledge of God end of days? I do not remember where I more than burnt offerings" Hosea 6:6

context is "checed" (kheh-sed) or, as some say, Hesed meaning kindness or loving kindness, by implication, toward God. There is a mutuality to the word that speaks of relationship, as in the relationship between a husband and wife, or between God and His people, or between the saved and the savior. Many theologians think the chasten those He loves (Heb 12:6), pales in word as used in this scripture would have been better interpreted as loyalty. It was the lack of loyalty whilst feigning loving faithfulness with superficial praises, prayers,

and sacrifices that hurt and angered God (yes, God can feel pain and grief read Gen "For I desire mercy and not sacrifice, 6:5-6) and the covenant of God and His and the knowledge of people demanded for loyalty and faithful-God more than burnt ness. God speaking through Moses said to offerings" Hosea 6:6 His people "be careful to do as the LORD your God has commanded you; you shall not turn aside to the right hand or to the left. You shall walk in all the ways which the LORD your God has commanded you, that you may live and that it may be well with you (Deut 5:32-33) and Jesus has said "No one, having put his hand to the plow, and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God" Luke 9:62 (NKJV). Scripture, including the love, disloyalty and forgiveness. In way of Old Testament, teaches us the nature, attributes, expectations and promises of God and God does not change for He is the LORD (Mal 3:6). The Good Book is not a book of antiquity no longer applicable today. God still desires, demands, mercy, our loyalty, over even the best of sacrifices which become a stench to God when done with the wrong heart making the sacrifice unacceptable. This remains the first and greatest commandment "You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. And the second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets' Matt 22:37-40 (NKJV).

Are we today any different from Hosea's bride, from God's backslidden betrothed? Most of those calling themselves Gods people do nothing more but go along to get along when what we are called to be is salt and light in a world gone upside down calling wrong right and right wrong. Evil thrives across the nations where Christianity was brought into being and governments do, at best nothing and, at worst aide the atrocities. As a nation founded on Christian moralities God is cast aside for a god of political correctness. As individuals do we claim to know Him but walk with the world? Do we sing praises to His name while skipping along the wide road knowing He has called us to walk the narrow path? Do we practice a superficial piety which is our devotion and reverence toward God demonstrated through loyalty? We live in a time where we have become increasingly self-centered. We look out for ourselves, position ourselves to maximize self-potential, whole households are run around children and childhood egos. In our self-centered, materialistic what's in it for me society we don't regard God above all. If the extent of your walk consists of an hour and a half on Sundays with occasional lip service to the Lord, your loyalty may be questionable – God calls all this whoredom. What if we did receive the just recompense read this quote - "mercy leads man up to God, for mercy brought down God to man". The Hebrew word for mercy used in this Just as Gomer was bought back by her loving and forgiving husband, Hosea, God has bought us back with the life of His Son Jesus. With arms stretched across that cross the nails pierced deep into His flesh and it was finished. We need only to repent and believe. We have forgiveness by Gods own sacrifice; any chastisement, and He does comparison to the sufferings of the cross. "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and

The Golden Eagles got it when Christian Munson took a charge with 38.1 seconds left. Tri-West had to foul, which it did, and Holba made two more free throws to make the score 50-46.

The Bruins put up one more 3-point attempt that didn't go, and Holba rebounded. The ball wound up in Munson's hands, he was fouled, and made his two free throws. Soon, the regional plaque was in the hands of all the Golden Eagles.

"I just thought we played very good defense, good help-side defense by Christian Munson to take the charge, and we executed well on offense," said Guerin Catholic coach Pete Smith.

The Golden Eagles' nine straight points turned out to be the longest run of the night. That's what made the game so memorable it was just simply that close. In fact, the only other time Guerin led by six points was early in the game, when GC skipped off to a 9-3 lead on the strength of 3-pointers by Munson, Godfrey and Cameron Lindley all right in a row. It was a run nine straight points - the Golden Eagles ended the game where they began.

Heights had managed to keep Bishop Dwenger at arm's length for most of Saturday morning's first Class 3A regional semifinal game at Blackford. But a stunning 10-2 run by the Saints turned a four-point Husky lead into a four-point Dwenger lead midway through the fourth quarter. Two of the Saints' leading scorers took over: Kyle Hartman scored five points, then Ryan Christman added the other five, with a back-to-back combination of a '3' and a jumper. Suddenly, the Saints were up

Heights tried valiantly to come back, with Paull hitting three layins - each of them cut Dwenger's lead to one point. The third of Paull's baskets made the score 54-53 with 42.5 seconds left, but that turned out to be the Huskies' last stand. The Saints won the game from the line, successfully making all four of their free throw attempts in the last 32.2 seconds.

Paull wound up with a double-double of 20 points and 11 rebounds, while Crist scored 15. Grant Weatherford, who is headed to Purdue next season, scored 12 points.

Heights finished its season at 19-8, which is a school record for wins. Remarkably, the Huskies did that and won a sectional too despite having to deal with injuries. Paull missed several games, as did Jadon White and Sterling Weatherford. White will play basketball at Cincinnati Christian, which Ballenger said is a "good NAIA school" that has been ranked in the Top 20 in the country.


