Conner Prairie's Balloon Voyages enter new era

It's a sure sign of spring in Hamilton County: Conner Prairie is preparing its helium balloon for the upcoming season of Balloon Voyages.

This year, Conner Prairie will have a new balloon for adventurous types to make the 350-foot high flight above the prairie. The introduction of the new 140-foot tethered helium balloon also marked a new era for one of the museum's most popular attractions.

Westfield's growth surpasses surrounding communities

Westfield is growing more than any other Indianapolis-area community as the building season begins. The city has 79 permits for January and February of this year.

According to numbers released from the Builder's Association of Greater Indianapolis, Westfield is growing more than any surrounding Indianapolis community as 2015's building season gears up.

In a report of single family building permits for the nine counties that make up Central Indiana, Westfield comes in second with 79 permits, only surpassed by Indianapolis with 108 permits.

Reporting is for January and February of this year.

"We are thrilled to attract families to Westfield," said Mayor Andy Cook. "The amenities, schools and quality of life in Westfield are clearly what families are looking for when deciding where to put down roots."

Steve Lains, CEO of the Builders Association of Greater Indianapolis, says that consumer traffic in the market for new construction is surging following years of pentup demand from the recession.

'These are strong indicators that the housing market is back, which is extremely impactful to our overall economy," Lains "Hamilton County, particularly Westfield, is showing very strong permit



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Angel of Hope board member's daughter's story told in film

A special screening of "Someone You Love: The HPV Epidemic" will be shown on Wed., April 1, 7:30 p.m., at the AMC Theatre at Trader's Point, 5920 W. 86th St., Indianapolis, IN, 46278. This film received the "Power of Film" Award at last month's Beloit International Film Festival. Voted the film to most likely influence how people live their lives, it shows the cause, treatment and prevention of HPV caused cancer.

The film, which follows the lives of five women struggling with the disease, details their diagnosis, treatment and prognosis over a period of several years. One of the women featured in the film is Kirk and Brenda Forbes' daughter Kristen who died of the disease in 2008 after a yearlong struggle. She was 23 years old. Kirk Forbes is one of the board members of the Angel of

"Someone You Love" is a feature length in-depth documentary on HPV and the stories of tragedy and triumph surrounding this complicated and often misunderstood infection. This documentary lifts the veil and reveals some of the faces of HPV and sheds light on the risks, myths, problems, politics, misconception and hard truths about what the Chief Medical Officer of the American Cancer Society, Dr. Otis Brawley called "one of the epidemics of the 21st century".

Conner Prairie starts a new outdoor season on March 26.

The Balloon Voyages opened in 2009, but the original balloon reached the end of its lifespan in December. Museum officials determined that the time was ideal to create a new exhibit experience that shares the story about the first successful delivery of air mail in the U.S., which occurred in 1859 in Lafavette.

Brian Mancuso, the director of exhibits, said that the new Balloon Voyage exhibit will re-enact the experience of John Wise. a famed balloonist back in 1859. Wise is known for making the first airmail delivery, taking a trip from Lafayette to Crawfordsville aboard his balloon, which he named the Jupiter.

To enhance the experience, Conner Prairie created interactive store fronts representing downtown Lafayette in 1859. Visitors can explore the science and technology of gasworks used to inflate and fly a balloon, learn about balloonist John Wise and details of his historic flight in Indiana and explore the science of ballooning today before taking their own flight.

"You learn a little bit more about the story and also the science behind balloons," said Mancuso.

One of the more frequently asked questions is how many helium party balloons it takes to lift a person off the ground. Mancuso said the number is "about 7000 for your given person," although a 20-pound oneyear old would require around 900 party balloons.

"You'll explore that in lifting gas, then you'll find out actually what happened on his flight," said Mancuso. "We have this really cool floor map that talks about his flight from Lafayette to Crawfordsville and then you can enter and kind of experience a little bit what he experienced by going up into our helium balloon."

Since 2009, nearly 91,500 visitors have experienced the 15-minute flight that takes them 350 feet above the prairie in a gondola.

The new balloon, made possible by corporate sponsor Reynolds Farm Equipment, was manufactured at a cost of \$530,000. Construction of the new exhibit is estimated at \$165,000. Gary Reynolds, the owner/president of Reynolds, was on hand Wednesday afternoon.

"We think it's probably the best thing we've sponsored," said Reynolds. "It's local and we started local here, and it's a very family-oriented exhibit here at Conner Prairie, so we're just excited."

Touring the exhibit is free for members and included with paid general admission to Conner Prairie. Flights cost \$12 for members and \$15 for non-members.

Kroger Central Division announces \$5.3 million in K-12 education grants and commitments



Scoring Central/Runners - 4 volunteers

Each volunteer in this area would be responsible for relaying scorecards and scores from holes 9 & 18 green to scoring central. A volunteer will also be responsible for relaying scores from scoring central to the official scoreboard. These volunteers would be needed in the afternoon by the time the first tee times finishes, which is approximately Noon and be available for 2 to 3 hours.

Shuttle Drivers - 2 volunteers

The shuttle drivers would be responsible for transporting players from holes 9 to 10 and 18 to 1. The drivers for these holes would need to be available in the afternoon for 2 to 3 hours. One of these shuttle drivers can also help in shuttling players from the practice tee to hole 10 tee in the morning. That process would also last 2 hours and start at 7:30 a.m.

Media Room – 1 volunteer

This volunteer would be responsible for assisting our media director in checking and distributing credentials, answering questions, and various other tasks. This volunteer would need to be present for up to 5 hours.

Spotters - 14 volunteers

Checkpoint Volunteers - 4 volunteers

Each checkpoint volunteer would be tasked to sit at a specific hole and monitor the progress of each group as they move from one hole to the next. The guidelines for this will be outlined by the NCAA. The duration for this shift will last up to 5

Hotel Check-In Table - 4 volunteers

Two hotel check in volunteers will be placed at each host hotel to answer questions concerning the area: restaurants, entertainment etc. Teams will check in on the Tuesday prior to the tournament for the most part and these shifts will be expected to last from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. Local knowledge of the Hamilton County area and strong people skills are vital to this position. This will be the team's first interaction with anyone from the tournament administration.
