Carmel adds its vote...

It's now up to County Council

The final piece in the Hamilton County Commissioners' attempt to build an emergency training center appears to be



in the hands of the Commissioners' own Hamilton County Council.

Earlier this week Carmel joined Noblesville, Fishers and Westfield in its support of the project. Those four cities approved a plan to provide \$40,000 a year to support building the facility on land owned by Westfield and located on the west side of Noblesville.

The vote by the Carmel Common Council was, as it was in Noblesville, Westfield and Fishers, unanimous.

The vote by Carmel followed the appearance of two Hamilton Councilmen, Rick McKinney and Brad land? Who will be in charge of running the center? The

commitment of \$3 million to the project.

McKinney told The Hamilton County Reporter that he saw nothing unusual to have appeared at the Carmel meeting.

said. "I just have questions. We're being asked to commit \$3 million and I haven't seen anything on paper."

Currently, the land is owned by the City of Westfield, purchased seven years ago from the Beaver family.

"Westfield bought the land near the river to drill water wells, which supply Westfield with its water," Beaver said.

All questions will be answered, said Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt, before the County Council is asked to vote on funding the \$3 million.

"I think you'll see coming out of our Commissioners meeting on Monday a

Sheridan Schools receive Digital Learning Grant

Sheridan Community Schools was recently awarded the Digital Learning Grant from the Indiana Department of Education. The District will use the \$100,000 grant to expand its 1:1 Technology Initiative to middle school students.

According to the Indiana Department of Education, the Digital Learning Grant gives up to \$100,000 to selected school districts that are either implementing a 1:1 plan or expanding a program already in place.

This year, between Jan. 16 and Feb. 6, the Indiana Department of Education received 88 applications for the grant. Nineteen school districts throughout Indiana were awarded the grant, according to the IDOE Lea Jessup, Director of Technology for Sheridan Community Schools stated, "IDOE accepted written applications in mid-January. After reviewing the applications, the IDOE selected 30 schools for round II, which involved traveling to the IDOE to make a pitch or presentation to the

With the city so interested in attractive and useful amenities, surely there is no more likely project than this proposed walking and biking trail. The popularity of the Monon Trail and the Potters Bridge Trail attest to the attraction of such linear parks or greenways.

Last year it appeared the Midland had been placed on the front burner. Studies had been conducted, grants sought and property ownership established. This was progress on a project that has been under consideration for 20 years. So, now what?

There is still work to be done, mainsecuring lv money from federal alternative transportation funds and various details. The money is coming, but federal bureaucracy moves slowly in giving back our tax money. So, we're looking at another year before construction.

What could have been a big hurdle was overcome when studies showed that the former railroad bridges over White River and Cicero Creek are adequate for the trail.

Meanwhile work is underway on a north-south trail to link Riverwalk at

ALICE arms Heights students with essential survival skills

Deputy Brad Osswald, a resource officer with Hamilton Heights School Corporation, explains to students that the primary objective of the ALICE training protocol is to be able to get students evacuated and not be sitting ducks hiding under desks. However, if escape is not possible and students and staff are barricaded behind closed doors to avoid the shooter, there are still steps to take to increase safety and survival.

As part of Hamilton Heights School Corporation's ongoing safety education and training initiative, the corporation has introduced ALICE to parents, students and staff. ALICE isn't a person but a safety protocol.

Providing a safe and secure learning environment for students has always been a priority at Hamilton Heights. The district continues to take leading role in school safety efforts with numerous practices, procedures and protocols to help ensure a safe learning environment. Beginning in the spring of 2014, the district began conducting meetings and training sessions for staff, students and parents on the ALICE safety protocol designed to enhance current lockdown procedures.

The U.S. Department of Education, U.S. Department of Homeland Security and other educational leadership and governmental agencies have recommended that school districts develop a protocol that provides options to students and staff when facing threat or harm from an aggressive intruder. ALICE best fit the requirements.

ALICE stands for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter and Evacuate. ALICE em-



Heirbrandt said he expects that the workshop sessions will be open to the public and that dates and locations of the meetings will be announced once they are finalized.

Apparently, there will be no quick vote by the Council. Some had thought the training center would be on the agenda of the next County Council meeting, which is April 1. 'Anyone can place things on the agenda, and I've seen fast votes

Heirbrandt said no way will that happen.

"The series of workshops will answer all questions," said the Commissioner.

Beaver said that at this point the strong and united vote of Hamilton County's four largest cities to support the project has not changed his mind.

"I can see where the cities would benefit from having a training center," Beaver said. "But, they're being asked to put up \$40,000 and we're being asked for \$3 million.'

County Councilman Steve Schwartz, a strong supporter of the training center, said the workshops being planned by the County Commissioners should answer all the questions.

"It's a no-brainer," said Schwartz. "I support the training center 110 percent. This is Hamilton County so we should have the best of the best to train our people."

There are different opinions on how the vote, if taken today, would come out. Some believe it's a 3-3 vote with a seventh councilman undecided.

In a "big brass" meeting conducted by the County Commissioners and attended by judges, mayors, trustees and others throughout the county, Commissioner Steve Dillinger pointed out that cities in the county already are paying more for fire and police training than the dollar figure being asked for funding the training center. Also at that meeting was Superior Court 1 Judge Steve Nation who

said, "We first started talking about this in 1980. We didn't have the land then. We do now.

The gathering at the earlier meeting drew a crowd of government leaders, arguably, unmatched in Hamilton County history.

"Westfield has offered 96 acres for this project. The location is in the center of the county and is in the center of state," she added.

Main Street in Carmel to close Monday for reconstruction

east of the U.S. 31 interchange, beginning Monday, March 23. The \$4.4 million project calls for expanding and reconstructing the roadway with new curbs and gutters, storm sewers and sidewalks. All utility lines will be buried. The roundabout at Old Meridian and Main Street will also be expanded to accommodate two lanes of traffic west of Old Meridian.

Main Street will be closed between Old Meridian and Pennsylvania Streets beginning Monday, March 23, until the project is completed, which is estimated as sometime in mid-July, weather permitting. E&B Paving is the primary contractor that will manage the construction.

Access to the Main Street bridge over U.S. 31 will remain open at Pennsylvania this project. Access to St. Vincent Carmel Hospital will be available at the entrance


The Main Street reconstruction is a City of Carmel project funded mostly by state transportation funds. It is being done to meet a larger traffic demand brought about as a result of the new interchange at Main Street and U.S. 31. The funds come as part of a new program that allows the state to swap \$1 in federal funds with 75 cents in state funds. The city's portion of the project cost will be roughly \$1 million, funded through a combination of existing funds from the Engineering Department, Utilities and a portion from a previously issued road bond.

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

Work Zone Awareness Week brings attention to safety

March 23-27, 2015 as Work Zone Awareness Week in Indiana. Work Zone Awareness Week marks the ceremonial start to speeding, up to \$5000 for driving recklessly highway construction season and intends to or aggressively, and up to \$10,000 and/or a draw awareness to motorist and worker safety

More than \$1.3 billion will be invested in construction projects to build and maintain Indiana's highways in 2015. As IN-DOT increases its focus on preservation, drivers will see more work on existing state highway roads and bridges. INDOT's goal is to maximize both the safety and mobility of motorists and workers while maintaining as much access as possible to businesses, residents and emergency services.

INDOT is dedicated to continuously improving work zone safety for workers and motorists. Last year, 11 people were killed and more than 600 people were injured in Indiana highway work zones. Most pickup trucks or other police vehicles. of these injuries and deaths are caused by rear-end collisions, following too closely or making improper lane changes.

Ivy Tech increases number of dual credit agreements

Ivy Tech Community College has increased its number of dual credit agreements and now has a direct relationship with 93 percent of Indiana's public high schools. This is up from 88 percent of schools in 2013-14.

Ivy Tech's dual credit program allows high school students to simultaneously earn both college credit at Ivy Tech and high school credit. Dual credit courses are free to students, saving parents even more on their child's college education.

The college has dual credit agreements with a total of 419 high schools and career centers, which is an increase from 388 schools in 2013-14. Dual credit plays an important role in strengthening the connection between high school and college, making the transition between sectors easier for students while providing high school stu-

dents with a realistic understanding of col- In addition, there has been a 16 percent credit agreement for a course taught in a lege-level academic expectations.

We are extremely pleased by the support we have received from Indiana's public school system," said Ivy Tech President Thomas J. Snyder. "The dual credit program is an integral part of preparing the state's high school students for the rigor of college course work and for the K-14 system, which is becoming the norm in the United States. The dramatic increase in dual credit opportunities demonstrates the commitment by school corporations and Ivy Tech to prepare students for the future."

The college has also experienced a 24 percent increase in the number of Core Transfer Library/Liberal Arts dual credit agreements between last year and this year, as well as a 112 percent increase over two years. The Core Transfer Library consists of courses that will transfer among all Indiana public college and university campuses.

ratio of Core The Transfer Library/Liberal Arts to Career and Technical Education agreements has risen to 44 percent/56 percent. This compares to 42 percent/58 percent last year and up from 18 percent/82 percent just six years ago.

Ivy Tech uses dual credit to encourage greater participation in higher education and to help students overcome real or perceived obstacles to higher education.

The most common form of Ivy Tech dual credit involves courses taught in a high school, by a high school instructor, and offered during the regular school day. To reach a dual

high school by a high school instructor, Ivy Tech works with the high school to establish that the high school class and the college class are equivalent, or if necessary, to suggest changes in order to qualify as a dual credit course. Dual credit agreements are reviewed every year to promote collaboration and to ensure continuity of professional staff, course content, textbooks, and other key teaching and learning factors.

Ivy Tech enrolled 45,819 Indiana high school students in dual credit last year, saving Indiana students and their parents more than \$29.8 million in tuition costs.



Guerin battles Vincennes

With all the stats, team and individual, which will be looked at as Guerin Catholic faces Vincennes Lincoln Saturday in the southern Class 3A semi-state at Southport, here's one to watch.

26-7.

That's Guerin Catholic's eight-year record of playing post-season basketball.

When Pete Smith's Golden Eagles take the court, they're dangerous. Guerin has been there, done that. Including winning a state championship three years ago.

No current member of the team knows that any better than senior Alex Mazanowski, the only Eagle still around from that 2011-2012 state championship team.

"Maz" didn't play the past two seasons. Lately he has been bothered with his meniscus that he had surgery on last season. A valuable leader, Mazanowski Saturday will come off the bench.

Now, the man to watch for Guerin Catholic is a senior who wasn't even at the school or in the community when Guerin Catholic won the state. Senior Matt Holba moved into town last season.

Holba certainly, without question, will be an Indiana All-Star this summer. A signee at Lehigh University, Holba is near averaging a double-double. He is scoring at an 18.4 clip and is averaging 9.5 rebounds game.

"He has been a warrior," Smith has said several times this season.

Even more impressive in Holba's stats is that when hot-shooting guard Christian Munson missed two games due to a concussion, Holba stepped up and averaged 25 points and 10.5 rebounds.

Munson is back and the junior wing will be a key for Smith's club on Saturday. He's averaging 15.3 points a game.

"Munson was our leading scorer until his injury," said Smith. "The charge he took on Trevor Waite in the Terre Haute South game with under a minute to go may have been his biggest play of the season."

Guerin has even more talent to throw at Vincennes.

Starting point guard junior Cameron Lindley missed four games this season while playing soccer for Team USA in Spain and also missed some starts due to the passing of his grandfather in late December. He has verbally committed to the University of North Carolina to play soccer.

Sophomore Matthew Godfrey is Guerin's third leading scorer and lately has been the team's No. 2 rebounder.

"The lefty (Godfrey) comes off the bench and can fill in for several positions," said Smith. "He was 6-of-9 from behind the 3-point line in the two games at the Greencastle Regional."

Perhaps the best all-around athlete on the team is senior Matt Labus, a three-sport athlete who has started three years on the basketball court, along with three years as football quarterback and four seasons on the baseball team. He will play football in college.

Nick Schneider is an undersized lefthanded senior forward.

"Schneider had a great sectional, guarding Aaron Banks of Brebeuf," Smith said. "His brother, Jasen, was a forward on our 2010 sectional championship team."

Add to those seven players, Smith also has the advantage of senior Brian Mathews and junior Calen Cunningham coming off the bench.

Smith has indicated that Lindley, Holba, Munson, Schneider and Labus will get the starting call Saturday.

With Vincennes playing most of its games in the south and Guerin staying mainly in Central Indiana, its hard to compare the two teams.

They have played one common opponent. Vincennes, in a late-December holiday tourney, defeated Chatard 57-44. On Jan. 9 in the Eagles Nest, Guerin defeated Chatard 73-50.

Guerin Catholic has played well down the home stretch. The Eagles won three of their final four regular season games, losing only to Pendleton Heights in overtime.

In the post-season, Guerin has won four of five games by double digits. The Eagles battled Tri-West to a 52-46 victory in the championship game of the regional.

Vincennes had to fight for its life in the two regional games, upsetting Greensburg 64-57 in overtime and edging Evansville Memorial 45-44.

Guerin Catholic will take a 20-8 record to the semi-state and Vincennes will come with a 21-6 mark.

According to the experts, neither Guerin or Vincennes should be playing tomorrow. In the final Class 3A poll of the season, the Eagles were ranked 11th and the Alices were ranked only 16th.

"We've never played Vincennes," Smith points out. "Ironically, next season we're playing in the Vincennes Holiday Tourney."

Run fast, throw far, jump high and long. It seems the Fishers girls track and field team can do it all this year. The Tigers have got several great runners on their roster, and they will be well-represented at this Saturday's Hoosier State Relays at Purdue University.

But watch out for Fishers in the field events. The Tigers have qualifiers in all four: Long jump, high jump, shot put and pole vault.

"Our field events are really strong," said Fishers coach Andrew Belloli. The coach noted that the Tigers' performances in the field "were pretty key to our winning the meet last Saturday at Wabash."

Fishers' field events aren't just strong, they're experienced as well. Senior Alexxus Smith earned a medal in the IHSAA state outdoor meet last June, placing seventh. Smith cleared 18 feet at state last year; she's already at 16 feet, 10-1/2 inches in the indoor meets.

"She's off to a good start," said Belloli. He said that Smith's success from last season has motivated her to keep it going this season.

"I think she has high expectations on herself this year," said Belloli. "She's very intrinsically motivated right now to do well."

Senior Emily Fletchall will represent Fishers in the pole vault at the HSR. Fletchall just missed a medal at last year's outdoor state, finishing 11th with a vault of 11-3. Going into Purdue, Fletchall is already over that, with a best effort of 11-4.

"She's actually just recently decided that she is going to be vaulting for Miami of Ohio next year," said Belloli.

Junior Megan Graves is tied for ninth among the best of the high jump, with a leap of 5-2.

In the shot put, two Tigers are ranked in her mind to," said Belloli. the top 12. Senior Blake Inglis is eighth at

37 feet, 1/2 inch, while junior Katie Thompson is 12th at 36-2 1/2. Inglis has recently committed to Olivet Nazarene University.

Inglis and Thompson finished first and second respectively at Wabash, helping Fishers to jump in front of the team standings. Belloli said the Tigers "definitely are expecting the field events to provide a lot of points" and help with winning meets this season.

In the running events, freshman Danielle Harrison is making a splash in her first high school season. Harrison earned the 18th best time in the 60 dash this indoor season, with a time of 8.02 seconds.

Three Fishers relays have qualified: The 4x400 is third, the 4x200 is fourth and the 4x800 is 12th. Two of those relays feature returning state medalists: Paris Carver was part of the Tigers' third-place 4x400 team, with Carver and India Johnson running on the seventh-place 4x100 team.


At the Hoosier State Relays, Carver will run on the 4x400 and 4x200 relays, with Johnson joining her on the 4x200. The other 4x400 relay runners will be Kayla Crose, Adrianna Murphy and Toni Grace, while Crose and Salynda Berndt will complete the 4x2 line-up.

Fishers' 4x800 team will consist of Kennedie Rush, Corinne O'Leary, Liz Rogers and Kamya Lapsley.

Murphy was recently named one of the IBCA's Supreme 15 for her efforts in the basketball season. She has been a solid performer for the track team, and Belloli said Murphy could be in the mix for a spot on the 4x800 squad.

"She's very talented and extremely hard-working," said the coach. Belloli said that Murphy is the second best long jumper on the Fishers team, with a best leap of 15 6-3/4.

"She can do just about anything she sets her mind to," said Belloli.

Groups join Indy Eleven to support multipurpose



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stadium legislation

Indianapolis Mayor Greg Ballard and Indiana State Representative Todd Huston (Fishers - District 37) were joined by representatives from Indiana Soccer Association, Indy Eleven Professional Soccer and the Brickyard Battalion independent supporters group to announce their support for House Bill 1273, which will enable construction of a new 18,500-seat multipurpose stadium proposed for downtown Indianapolis.

"Soccer is part of the experience that young families are looking for, and to have a professional team and a professional stadium is absolutely critical," said Mayor Ballard.

The stadium would serve as a permanent home for all Indy Eleven games and more than 30 other sports and entertainment events to be held every year starting with the venue's anticipated opening in 2017.

Representative Huston filed HB 1273 to extend a sports and entertainment development area to include the future stadium site and a new downtown Indianapolis hotel to be developed by the owner of Indy Eleven. The bill received strong bipartisan support from the Indiana House of Representatives, which voted in favor by 74-21. HB 1273 is currently assigned to the Indiana Senate Tax and Fiscal Policy Committee. Senators Jim Merritt (Indianapolis – District 31) and Pete Miller (Avon - District 24) are the Senate sponsors.

Among those attending today's rally were players and coaches from several youth soccer clubs. The Indiana Soccer Association governs youth and adult soccer around the state and counts more than 65,000 players, coaches, referees and volunteers from all 93 Indiana counties amongst its ranks.

"The Indiana Soccer membership is committed to supporting the entry level player as well as those who achieve the highest level of play, and is proud of the young men and women who apply the lessons learned from playing soccer to become better individuals, students and citizens," said Dave Guthrie, executive director of the association. 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hand, you would understand how this momentum will sustain itself for years to come, and that's the reward for our efforts."

A venue built to showcase the world's most popular sport has been part of Indy Eleven's strategy for growth and long-term stability since the club's official welcome to the North American Soccer League in January 2013.

'Indy Eleven appreciates the support of soccer fans from around Indiana who have been cheering for our team on and off the field. They understand the need for building a permanent home for professional soccer in Indiana, and the many benefits such a stadium would give Hoosiers," said Ersal Ozdemir, owner of Indy Eleven. "We look forward to working with the Senate to make the bill more effective so that we can bring this world-class facility to the people of Indiana."

The projected \$82 million cost to construct the facility is considerably less than similarly sized venues geared towards soccer that have been built throughout North America in the last ten years. The proposed funding mechanism under consideration in the General Assembly will not result in any increase in city or state taxes, nor will it divert taxpayer dollars earmarked for services or programs funded by the City or State.

Sales and income tax revenues generated at the stadium site would go towards payment of the venue's construction costs, as would a payment of 10 percent of ticket revenues from events by Indy Eleven. While an independent feasibility study concluded these revenue streams would pay for the venue's construction debt, it has been proposed that a portion of the new taxes generated by the new hotel site could be used only if necessary to provide greater security for the stadium's financial mechanism.

The proposed stadium and hotel development is expected to generate significant economic activity, which may attract new businesses and encourage existing businesses to remain or expand in central Indiana; protect and increase state and local tax revenues; and encourage overall economic growth.


