### Carmel's new Midtown project building

A Carmel developer has announced plans for the first major project in the city's Midtown area, a \$16 million, four-story building that will feature a co-working space to be known as the Edison Business Lounge. The project will also include The Vintage Coffee/Wine Bar as an attached caf . The announcement was made by Old Town Development, which is the primary developer of the \$150 million Midtown project near Carmel's Arts & Design District.

The Edison will offer 20,000 square-feet of up to 50 private offices and another 50 desk spaces on the second floor of what is currently referred to as Building One and will be located on the east side of a Plaza planned for the Midtown project, a few blocks south of Main Street. The Edison is designed to be used by individual entrepreneurs, small companies or other workers who want a

## "Waist Reduction" weight-loss challenge

Riverview Health, through its corporate wellness program, recently completed the third annual "Waist Reduction" weight-loss challenge. Beginning on January 12, employees from the City of Noblesville, Hamilton County, Meyer Najem, Noblesville School Corporation, Riverview Health and Westfield Washington Schools competed against one another in the spirit of health and wellness. This eight-week program was developed to build a sense of community and to provide an incentive for the new year to make lifestyle changes through healthy eating, exercise and weight loss.

Participants were challenged to lose weight, with the top prize—a \$200 Amazon gift card provided by Riverview Health—awarded to the participant with the highest percentage of weight loss at the end of the program.

This year's winner was Mitch Mosbey of Noblesville School Corporation with a 14 percent body weight loss.

"I always knew weight loss was needed to live a healthier life. Being a competitive person, I knew this weight-loss competition would motivate me to exercise more," Mitch says. "In addition to attending the exercise classes offered through the program, I began to increase my physical activity throughout the week. The information sessions also helped me improve my diet."

With an average weight loss of three percent, the traveling trophy has been given to the City of Noblesville for being the winning organization.

## Noblesville trail connectivity continues

The Noblesville city council agenda is filled with items dealing with building new homes and subdivisions. But on Tuesday night, the council broke up the development discussions with the announcement that it will attempt to close some gaps in its system of trails.

Mayor John Ditslear said that Noblesville currently has about 85 miles of trails, many of which are built on property that was donated by developers. That process has led to some gaps in the trails' connectivity.

Ditslear said that the city had made a real push for the past three years to fill in

the gaps. Its latest effort aims to purchase the right-of-ways for trails on nine pieces of property for approximately \$225,000. It's unknown how much the land costs will total, because the council just granted approval for City Engineer John Beery to

“A total of 257 pounds were lost by all participants throughout the eight-week program,” said Mindi Matthews, director of Health & Wellness at Riverview Health. “Aside from the weight loss, the great thing about this program is it gets people to establish a healthier lifestyle. A follow-up survey reported more than half the participants who started a fitness program will continue it.”

Program offerings included two weekly 50-minute exercise classes at Riverview Health Rehab & Fitness in Noblesville. convenient place to work and network with others. Meanwhile, The Vintage Coffee/Wine Bar will be a main-level, 1,800 square-foot café serving breakfast, lunch and cocktails in the afternoon. It will also be open to the public.

“We are excited to hear the news that our Midtown redevelopment project is already beginning to take shape. Our vision is to see this area attract a broad array of uses, including residential, retail and business. This project will fill a need for start-ups who need office space but are not quite ready for a lot of square footage,” said Mayor Jim Brainard.

The Edison will be open to members who will pay fees to use office space, desk space, conference rooms, small meeting rooms and other on-site business services such as office equipment and high-speed

internet service. In addition to the café, the general public will also be able to rent a conference room for meetings, even if they are not members.

Justin Moffett, partner at Old Town Development, added: “This is not just for the high-tech entrepreneurs, but also for anyone seeking a way to grow their business by connecting with others and developing new relationships simply by being in the same work space on a consistent basis.”

The Edison project will be headed up by William Waldren, who founded the concept in Milwaukee several years ago and Randy Jaunzemis, an Old Town Carmel resident with an expansive career in the logistics business. In addition to offering services such as an on-call IT staff, Waldren plans to attract business seminars and mentorship programs that benefit all members.

begin negotiations. And the actual construction cost of the trails is unknown at this point as well.

But if approved and built, the new trail sections would connect or extend existing trails along 156<sup>th</sup> Street, Cumberland Road, the Levee Trail and a connector to Little Chicago Road.

Beery said that the city’s goal is to prevent cyclists and runners from walking on grass or having to be next to a roadway. He also noted that public input has helped to determine which prospective areas need the trail extensions most.

“It’s going to be a tremendous improvement in the whole system,” Ditslear said.

“It will definitely help me get places,” said city councilor and avid runner Mark Boice.

He also noted that the Little Chicago Road connector will help people who live in South Harbor make better use of the trail network.

City Council President Rick Taylor said, “Once we get the land, we can move ahead quickly once we get the funds.”

**New subdivision approved**

The city council also approved a new subdivision just west of Hazel Dell Elementary School.

The proposed Trailside Woods subdivision will feature 41 new homes on 21 acres southeast of the intersection of S.R. 32 and Gray Road. A representative for builder Fischer Homes said the houses

would cost between \$350,000 and \$500,000.

But most of the conversation about the proposed development prior to its approval centered around one topic—drainage.

An engineer that represented the developer noted that grading and a series of new retention ponds associated with the project would actually dramatically improve the drainage situation for neighbors.

**More development news**

Another new subdivision is scheduled to come before the city council at its next meeting on April 7.

Gradison Building Corp is proposing to build 115 homes on 54 acres of what is currently a farm field south of Sagamore Golf Club. The new subdivision would be on the west side of Summer Road, north of 156<sup>th</sup> Street.

It had received a unanimous favorable recommendation from the plan commission.

It is the latest in a wave of growth that began two years ago when the housing market rebounded following the Great Recession.

The Noblesville building spree was kicked off by the approval of the Lake Forest subdivision at the northeast corner of 161<sup>st</sup> Street and Hazel Dell Road. But two years after its approval by the city council, that subdivision is back on the council’s agenda—this time to approve architectural standards.

The subdivision was long the target of opposition from its neighbors to the south, and one of those neighbors, Alan Bechtel, no-

ticed that the standards were incomplete. He said his concern is that another builder might be allowed to build homes in the subdivision with no windows on the sides of the homes or with sub-standard porches.

“I just want to make sure the intent of the architectural Review Board is not circumvented,” he said.

Boice said the ordinance before the council would just clean

up the original ordinance so future builders couldn’t cut corners.

Planning Department Director Christy Langley said that the issue arose due to a staff oversight because no new subdivisions had come through the department in the past six years prior to its consideration.

“In no way, shape or form is it (Boomerang Development’s) fault that we are back here,” she said.

**In other news**

The city council allocated \$75,000 from the Logan Street TIF district to help fund façade grants downtown. The city has two current applicants for funding.

The city council also agreed to pay the building permit costs for three Habitat for Humanity homes that are currently being constructed in the 1800 block of Cherry Street.

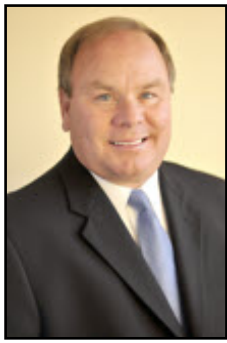

# Fishers Fire responds to two blazes in two days

The Fishers Fire Department responded to two fires over two days. On Sunday, Fishers firefighters responded to a call at 9726 Woodlands Drive at 10:36 a.m. Upon entry into the residence, firefighters found fire in the basement. It took firefighters eight minutes to extinguish the fire - they were on the scene at 10:41 and the fire was out at 10:49. Residents called 911 when they smelled smoke in the basement and evacuated without incident.

Alarms did not activate but when the family smelled smoke, they did the exact right thing by getting out of the residence. Firefighters remind the community that things can be replaced, lives can't. Check your detectors and practice your escape plan. The initial estimated loss is \$80,000, and the cause is under investigation. Just after 9 a.m. Monday morning, Fishers firefighters responded to 10485 Greenway Drive for a reported garbage truck fire. Upon arrival, firefighters had a large trash

fire on the street where a Republic driver dumped the load when he saw smoke coming from the trash compartment. Firefighters extinguished the fire quickly but had extensive overhaul to pull the trash apart and put out hot spots. While cause is undetermined, likely source could be fire-place ashes or cigarette butts still smoldering. ## HAND conducts first March Madness Casino Night Event

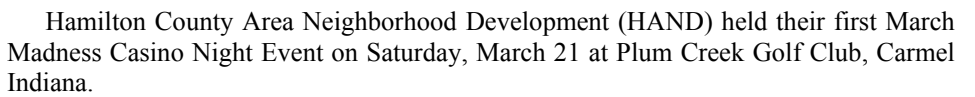

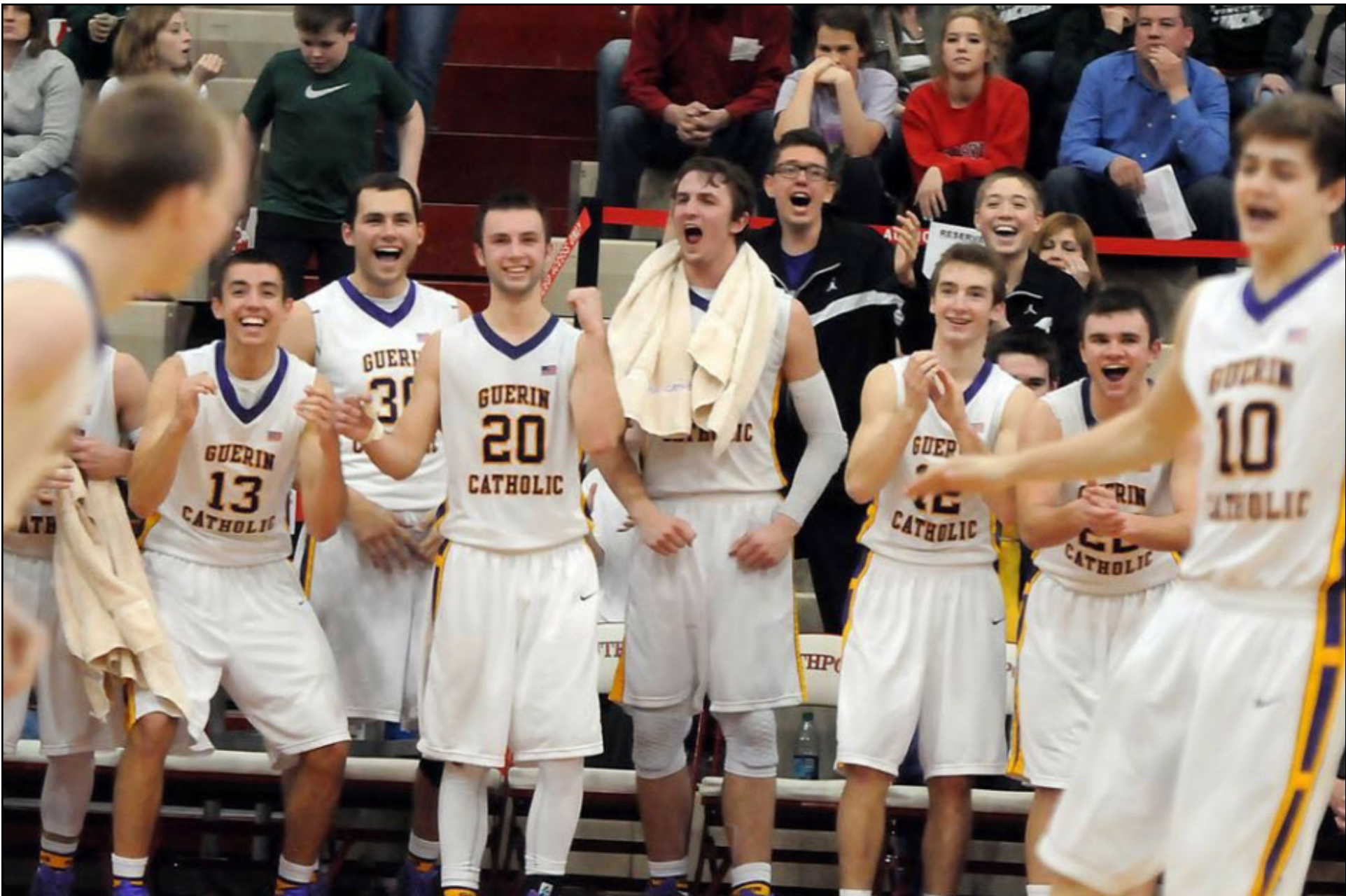

# Is local sectional next for GC?

If Guerin Catholic defeats Griffith Saturday at Bankers Life, the big prize, of course, will be the IHSAA’s Class 3A state championship trophy.

Then will come the net cutting. Everyone will climb the ladder and slice away a piece of the nets.

After all of that IHSAA Commissioner Bobby Cox might well walk up to Guerin Catholic coach Pete Smith with another prize.

“Pete, old buddy, you just won an opportunity next season to battle for the Class 4A championship,” the Commissioner might say.

That, moving up a class, is what happens to teams which become too successful during a two-year period.

It’s called the “success factor.”

“If that is the consequence of winning a state championship then it's well-worth it,” Smith said when asked by a not-too-smart writer during a period of time when the coach has more to think about than next year.

“That is all I can really say about it, as I don't want to be presumptuous. This Griffith team is really, really good,” Smith added.

Okay, let’s do another “if.” What if Guerin Catholic does jump to 4A next season. In which sectional will the Golden Eagles play?

Noblesville and Carmel take turns every other year of hosting the 4A sectional in this area. Guerin Catholic is located in Noblesville. Guerin Catholic is a 3-point shot away from Carmel High School.

So, the “if” game continues, if Guerin Catholic is placed in the Noblesville/Carmel sectional, what happens to that sectional? Currently, it’s a seven-team tourney. That means one team gets an opening bye. Nobody likes that situation, unless it’s the school that gets the bye.

So, does Noblesville/Carmel become an eight-team sectional? Or, staying with seven teams, would the IHSAA move-out Zionsville, or North Central?

Guerin Catholic, which started playing IHSAA basketball nine years ago, started out as a Class 1A School. Then 2A. Then 3A.

Since Guerin Catholic began playing 3A ball in 2011, the Eagles are 84-23 overall. Guerin won the state championship in 2012; lost to No. 1 Mt. Vernon in 2013 and lost to No.1 rated Greensburg in 2014.

In the nine seasons playing in the post-season, Guerin Catholic is 27-7 in tourney play.

“Quite honestly, when we won the state championship in 2012 we really wanted to win at least the regional in 2013,” Smith said.

Had that happened then, Guerin Catholic would have moved to Class 4A.

“We optimistically thought if we ever had a team to really have a great chance of succeeding in 4A, last year’s team with Aaron, Whit and Cris as seniors could have done it. I still contend that Greensburg was the best team in the state last season, including 4A schools.

“However in 2013,” Smith added, “we were beaten by then No. 1 Mt. Vernon. So, we stayed in 3A last year and this season.”

It is, as Smith indicated, a big hurdle for the Eagles to fly over this week because Griffith is, indeed, very, very good.

“Griffith is fresh and hungry,” Smith continued. “They had three weeks off of organized practices, so they are much fresher than us. We had our 88<sup>th</sup> practice on Tuesday. That’s

"After the season is over, we always have individual meetings with each of our players," Lansing

said. "Even though we won 11 Missouri Valley Conference games and finished third to two Top Ten teams, we were very disappointed in how we started and finished the year. We are always trying to get better. After our player meetings, two of our players will not be with our program in the future." He averaged 8.0 points and 2.5 rebounds and shot 38.9 percent from the field including 34.7 percent from 3-point range. Bennett's career high came with 16 points at Evansville. He added nine rebounds in a home win over

Southern Illinois and dished out a season-best six assists on four different occasions. "Tre' Bennett would like to find a school closer to home," Lansing said. "He has a Grandmother who is very ill and that has had some effect on him being a distance from home. Tre' is a good player that did a lot of good things for us. Being on the Missouri Valley All-Bench team was a great accomplishment. Sycamore Basketball thanks Tre' for all that he has done for us and wish him the very best as he moves forward with his career on and off the court." Etherington, a 6-5 guard/forward, was a member of the program for two years and appeared in 26 games scoring 79 points and

averaged 3.0 points, shot 36.0 percent from the field and 29.1 percent from 3-point range. Etherington scored a career-high 13 points in a home win over Evansville as he hit a trio of 3-pointers. The 6-9 Swanigan scored 40 points with 17 rebounds and three blocked shots in leading Homestead to a 90-69 victory over South Bend Riley in the Class 4A semistate at Huntington North. The Spartans will carry a 28-2 record into the 4A State Finals against Evansville Reitz. Swanigan previously was an IBCA Player of the Week for the week of Jan. 12-17. Okafor, a 5-10 guard, produced 26 points and seven rebounds as Richmond dropped a 92-75 decision to Evansville Reitz in the Class 4A semistate at Seymour. The Wisconsin-Green Bay recruit finished his career with 1,092 points as the Red Devils completed their season with a 26-4 record.

The 6-0 James played a huge role in helping Barr-Reeve to 56-54 victory over Clay City in a Class A semistate at Seymour. He tallied 17 of his 26 points in the fourth quarter while adding five rebounds, four assists and one steal for the Vikings (26-2). For the game, James made 6-of-9 shots, 3-of-3 3-pointers and 11-of-12 free throws, including two freebies that gave his team the lead for good. Barr-Reeve is in the State Finals for the fifth time. Stein provided Reitz an all-around game in the Panthers' 92-75 win over Richmond at Seymour. The 6-3 wing netted 27 points with eight rebounds and six assists as Reitz improved to 29-1 and earned the program's second berth in the State Finals and first trip since 1951. He made 8-of-13 shots, including 1-of-1 from long range, plus 10-of-15 free throws. This is the seventh season for the Indiana Basketball Coaches Association Player of the Week program and the third season it is presented by Subway Restaurants of Indiana, a banner sponsor of the IBCA. Subway, in its fifth season as an IBCA sponsor, encourages athletes to "train hard and eat fresh." Player of the Week winners are chosen each week from each of the IHSAA's three districts. # Depth will again be Noblesville's strength

The Noblesville softball team, once again, will be playing deep this season.

Millers coach Mike Ramsey said that depth is the strength of his 2015 team. There's no arguing that, since Noblesville has six seniors - including some big hitters - on the roster, along with some experienced underclassmen and a few new players on the team who will be expected to contribute.

"Fans can come to expect offensive fireworks and defensive gems from this very deep and talented squad," said Ramsey. "Their overall quickness, power and style of play will make them an exciting team to watch and follow during the 2015 season."

The top returning hitter is a senior, Zoe Schafer. The first baseman was a First Team All State player last season, and has committed to Southern Illinois University - Edwardsville. Schafer averaged .540 last season, and brings back 36 runs batted in and six home runs.

We will have a nice combination of small ball and power.

Smith is a freshman who Ramsey said has "D-I" potential. Blankenship and Box are juniors with varsity experience.

Noblesville's defense will be solid as well.

I'm very excited by our defensive glove work," said Ramsey. "The staff is having a tough time plugging in players because of our depth. Maddie Moore and Grace Smith have great range in the infield while Taylor Bounin and Ariel Gaskill have very steady gloves and strong arms.
