
# In front of home crowd (and soon, national TV)... Cline wins 3-point contest

He commented in between signing autographs and posing for pictures once the Slam Dunk contest was finished. Cline had a supporting role in that contest, helping those athletes out with their incredible dunks.

The crowd was loudly pro-Cline - not exactly breaking news, of course. Cline beat Brevin Pritzl of De Pere, Wis. 22-19. The final was a contest between two future Big Ten rivals as Cline is headed to Purdue, Pritzl has committed to play in Madison at Wisconsin.

The women's championship was next, with Kennedy Burke of Northridge, Calif. beating Dannie Williams of Clovis, N.M. 15-13. Cline and Burke faced off in the 3-Point Battle of the Champions, with Cline victorious by the score of 20-16.

"There was a little bit of home-court advantage," said Cline, although he admitted there was a little bit of pressure,

"I just really didn't want that pressure to get to me," said Cline. "Whenever I got, like, past the second or third rack, I really heard everybody behind me. So it was pretty big motivation."

After Cline won has championship, many stayed on hand to watch the Slam Dunk contest, which did not disappoint.

Derrick Jones of Marcus Hook, Pa., topped Rayjon Tucker of Kannapolis (Northside Christian), N.C. Jones, a UN-LV recruit, made some spectacular dunks; he dunked over four of his fellow players for a show-stopping finale. Tucker, headed to Florida Gulf Coast, incorporated his mom into his final effort, falling just short.

If you didn't get a chance to see the contest live, you can watch it on TV: It will air at 3:30 p.m. Sunday on CBS (WTTV-4).





# Pacers fall to Boston, 11th in conference

The Pacers headed into Boston on Wednesday knowing that it wasn't a mustwin game in a literal sense, but also fully aware that a loss could be very damaging to their playoff hopes. Still, the Celtics (34-41) jumped in front early and never trailed in the final three quarters, handing Indiana (32-43) a 100-87 loss.

The Pacers have now dropped nine of their last 11 contests, falling into 11th place

in the Eastern Conference. The Pacers managed to climb within six points on three occasions in the second half, the last occurring when a pair of free throws from Rodney Stuckey made it a 77-71 game with 8:23 to play. But Boston responded with another 10-3 spurt and never let the visitors back within single digits the rest of the way.

"We scrapped and clawed and tried our best to make it a game," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel said after the loss. "But they made more shots, they made more plays, they were quicker to the ball...Their style of play won out."

George Hill led Indiana with 21 points, six rebounds, and six assists in the loss. Hill was very efficient, making 9-of-11 shots overall and 3-of-4 from beyond the 3-point arc

In the most important game of the season-to-date, both starting shooting guard C.J. Miles and sixth man Rodney Stuckey played in the first half despite dealing with injuries. Stuckey, hampered by a sore right wrist, scored 16 points on 6-of-9 shooting in 19:45 off the bench. Miles, who sprained his ankle in Tuesday's loss in Brooklyn, scored 12 points on 5-of-11 shooting.

But beyond Hill, Miles, and Stuckey, Indiana struggled mightily from the field. The rest of the Pacers' roster made just

The Celtics won the battle of the boards, 46-39. The Pacers are now just 8-22 on the season when outrebounded by their opponents.

Roy Hibbert had a rough night for the Blue & Gold, getting into early foul trouble and having trouble covering Boston's big men on the perimeter. Hibbert also missed his first three free throw attempts, snapping a streak of 28 consecutive makes from the charity stripe.

Hibbert's partner in the post, David West, had 10 points and eight boards but went just 4-for-12 from the field and 2-for-6 from the free throw line.

Boston won despite making just 6-of-27 attempts from 3-point range (22 percent). The Pacers were 6-for-15 from long range (40 percent).
