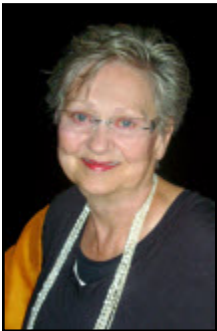

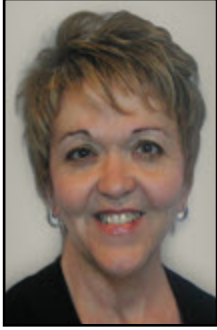

To capture this beauty in your weariness, even if your story doesn't look like mine, will enrich your moments, give you a new perspective, and help you lift your head in the impossibility and pain in living. Hard is hard." These are words of wisdom that Kara Tippetts shared in her book "The Hardest Peace".



Kara passed away March 22. I had written a column about Kara a few months ago. She was the 38 year old wife of Jason, mother to Eleanor, Harper, Lake and Story Jane. For two and a half years Kara wrote the blog "Mundane Faithfulness" and she fought breast cancer.

Kara wrote of her celebrating the moments of her days, days which the doctors had said would be fewer than she had hoped them to be. She savored the moments with her loves, the taste of sweet morsels of joy in the ordinary days. She was not afraid to speak of her anger with cancer and her passionate faith in God, whom she said was good...even in the hard. He met her with grace and she shared that grace with everyone who knew her.

Her book, "The Hardest Peace" taught so many of her readers how to live, all the while knowing that she was dying.

Kara wrote a letter to her readers to be read upon her death. She became undone. She said it was like being a little girl at a party and her daddy was

Patricia B. Gibbs, 87, passed away suddenly on Thursday, April 2, 2015, in Noblesville.

Patricia Eileen Bowman was born in Alexandria, Indiana, on August 5, 1927, the first child of John G. and Mildred Elliott Bowman. Pat grew up in Elwood, Indiana, and was valedictorian of the 1945 class at Wendell L. Willkie High School. She earned an associate's degree from Christian College (now Columbia College), Columbia, Missouri, in 1947; and a bachelor's degree in business administration from Northwestern University in 1949, where she was the only woman in most of her business classes. Pat was a member of Delta Zeta Sorority and met her husband, Richard W. (Dick) Gibbs, at a sorority open house. They were married at the First Christian Church in Elwood on March 12, 1950. Their first home was Evanston, Illinois, where Pat worked in cost accounting for Northwestern University Department of Buildings and Grounds. When Dick accepted a job transfer to Indianapolis in 1952, the couple chose Noblesville as their new home, becoming some of the first suburbanites to settle in the town. Pat then devoted her life to keeping their home and being a loving, fulltime mother. She and Dick were members of the "Greatest Generation" whose lives taught them hard work, patience and frugality - traits they instilled in their children. The couple were members of the First Presbyterian Church of Noblesville for many years, where Pat sang in the choir and taught Sunday school. She was a devoted volunteer who furthered history and education in the community. Pat was one of the founding members of the Noblesville branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW) established in 1956, serving as president and treasurer, and was a member of its literature study group. She was a member of the Hamilton County Historical Society, Hamilton County Sesquicentennial Committee, and a 30 year member of the Hamilton County Cemetery Commission, serving as its secretary/treasurer, retiring in 2013. She indexed vital records for the Noblesville Public Library, answered genealogy queries for the Noblesville Daily Ledger, and helped many with their family histories. Pat researched numerous lines in her own family history, leaving a priceless legacy to her family. A lifelong cat lover, Pat's life was not complete unless she had a cat to cuddle. Pat loved anything related to history. Family was utmost in her life. Pat devoted her earlier years to raising her daughters, and in later life she cared for her mother and aunt. In addition to her loving, caring, giving spirit, her family will always remember her amazing organizational and cleaning skills.

Pat's survivors include two daughters, Pamela (Warren) Ferber of Hebron, IN and Kay (Jerry) Taylor of Springfield, IL; a sister, Sue Svehla of Winter Park, FL; one grandchild, Richard W. We write a letter that can be read over and over reminding someone that they matter. We look for ways in which love still exists in the memories and in the moments that we rewind when we need a "Kara moment" or a whomever moment.

Love never dies. It just looks different. Kara wrote about her legacy. She knew how she wanted to be remembered.

Now what do you want your legacy to be? What do you want to be said about you when you have to leave the party?

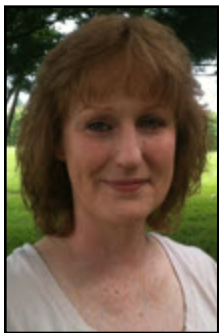

By Divine Providence - the Physics of God

Gen 1:1-27 In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Laying down the laws of time and space He said, let there be light and there was light. He divided the light from the darkness calling the light Day and the darkness Night. He made a firmament calling into existence the beauty that is Heaven. He said "let the dry land appear" calling this Earth and He gathered the waters into the seas. He brought forth grass, the herb and the fruit tree. He hung the sun, the moon and the stars in the firmament called Heaven, to rule over the day and the night. He created the creatures of the seas and formed the birds and the animals. And - He made man!

"For thus says the LORD, Who created the heavens, Who is God, Who formed the earth and made it, Who has established it, Who did not create it in vain, Who formed it to be inhabited: *"I am the LORD, and there is no other"* Isaiah 45:18 (NKJV). "For by Him all things were created that are in heaven and that are on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or principalities or powers. All things were created through Him and for Him. And He is before all things, and in Him all things consist." Col 1:16-17 (NKJV). This is the sovereignty of God. His is supreme and ultimate power with absolute authority independent of any external force. This is an unqualified attribute of God. Out of His sovereignty flows the Providence of God. In Greek, His "*pronoia*" – by forethought, the plans laid by advance consideration for the care of His creation in order that His ends may be accomplished. It is the divine means which He laid out before the beginning of time, to accomplish His work for His plan. And the work of God is, "that you believe in Him whom He sent" (John 6:29 NKJV)! The earth was made to be inhabited, inhabited by a people made in the image of God who would freely love and praise Him. His providence is the means He uses to govern, care for and supply all things in the universe to bring about His predetermined plan for creation, the creation that was made to bring glory and honor to Him. This plan has not changed, as scripture says "For I *am* the LORD, I do not change..." Mal 3:6 (NKJV).

The marriage of His sovereignty, His providence and our free will - this is the Physics of God (at least my interpretation of it). His sovereignty and providence are the energy and force combined with the physical properties of His creation creating cause and effect. And the variable, this would be our free will. We have free will to do or not do, say or not say, to think or not think. However, He works directly and indirectly in and through our free will to bring about his plan. Directly God works to achieve His ends through the laws of nature and the universe and by supernatural means via miracles. By example, Paul's conversion was a miracle that God wrought to bring about His plan for the Gospel to be brought to the gentiles. Prior to his conversion, Paul struck fear in the hearts of the early Christians with a zealous persecution of the church (Phil 3:5-6). Acts 9 tells the history - He was called Saul at this time, while "still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord", Saul set out to Damascus to round up any Christ follower he could find with full intention to the poor soul bring back to Jerusalem for torturous imprisonment. But God had another plan. Thrown to the ground and blinded by divine light, Saul heard the voice of our Lord Jesus saying "**Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting Me?**" Then by divine direction Saul was led into the city where he was left blind and without food or water for 3 days. In the meantime a disciple named Ananias was given a vision by God. In this vision the Lord told to Ananias to "**Arise and go to the street called Straight, and inquire at the house of Judas for one called Saul of Tarsus, for behold, he is praying. And in a vision he has seen a man named Ananias coming in and putting his hand on him, so that he might receive his sight.**" Ananias knowing Saul's reputation and quest to persecute and harm the Christians did as the Lord instructed for the Lord revealed to him: "**Go, for he is a chosen vessel of Mine to bear My name before Gentiles, kings, and the children of Israel.**" When Ananias found Saul he laid hands on him saying "Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on the road as you came, has sent me that you may receive your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit." Saul's sight was restored and from that point forward Saul, renamed Paul, preached Christ and the Good News!

Throughout the book of Judges we see an interplay of indirect forces at work on the free will of the Israelites. The Israelites had taken an oath to serve God who had

brought them into the promised land. But the Israelites, who were called a "stiff-necked people" by God, would frequently by free will, walk into disobedience and begin to serve false gods and follow foreign practices. When this occurred, God removed his hand of protection from the people and the Israelites would fall into the hands of enemies who would severely oppress and enslave them. This led the Israelites to call out to God for deliverance, and God in His mercy would raise up a judge who would conquer the enemy and free the people. During one of these times of disobedience the king of the Canaanites, King Jabin, had been cruelly oppressing the Israelites for 20 years. Deborah, a prophetess, was the judge God rose up at this time. Under God's direction she sent for Barak; together the plan was for Deborah to lure Sisera the commander Jabin's army to Barak for battle. However Barak refused to go into battle without Deborah at his side, a demand Deborah conceded to but because Barak was not obedient to God's will he would be denied the honor of defeating Sisera in battle. This honor instead would go to another woman. The battle ensued and while Barak and his men had successfully killed every last troop of Sisera, Sisera himself had escaped the sword. Sisera had fled and was hiding in the tent of a woman named Jael whose husband was friend to King Jabin. But Jael's family had been friends with the Israelites. Jael comforted Sisera warm milk, covered him with blankets and after he had fallen comfortably asleep she thrust a tent spike through his temple, hammering the spike securely to the ground. The Israelites regained their might through the grace of God and eventually totally overthrew Jabin but the honor of the great defeat of Sisera went to a woman.

The whole biblical text screams of His providence. The account of creation and the fall, Noah and Abraham, Moses and the Exodus, Job and Jonah, Mary and the birth of our Savior, and The Revelation. Not to be cliché but it really is the greatest story ever told! His work and His plan to reconcile a fallen creation to Himself were laid out before He laid the foundations of the earth. By providence His plan for salvation was known before time began just as it says in 2 Tim 1:9 (NKJV) ".....God who has saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works, but according to His own purpose and grace which was given to us in Christ Jesus before time began". By His sovereignty "....He chose us in Him before the foundation of the

world, that we should be holy and without blame before Him in love, having predestined us to adoption as sons by Jesus Christ to Himself, according to the good pleasure of His will..." Eph 1:4-5 (NKJV).

God is omniscient. Meaning He has complete, unlimited knowledge and understanding. He knows all things (1 John 3:20), He numbers the very hairs of your head (Matt 10:30), he knows the things that come into our minds (Ezek 11:5), and He knows what we will do before we take a single action (Job 23:10). He has known you from the womb and has ordered your steps – Under direction of the Holy Spirit David composes "...I was made in secret, And skillfully wrought in the lowest parts of the earth. Your eyes saw my substance, being yet unformed. And in Your book they all were written, The days fashioned for me, When *as yet there were* none of them" Psalms 139:15-16 (NKJV) and Solomon writes "A man's heart plans his way, But the LORD directs his steps" Prov 16:9 (NKJV). In the 11th of 11 head-to-head meetings between the two teams this season, the Indy Fuel defeated the Fort Wayne Komets on Saturday at Indiana Farmers Coliseum by a final score of 3-2, to claim Indy's first-ever home win over their arch-rivals. Shane Owen made 14 saves to claim victory for the Fuel in 40 minutes of play in relief of Indy starter Mac Carruth while Fort Wayne net-minder Roman Will took the loss, despite a 25 save performance for the Komets.
