Westfield expands trails system with utility proceeds

Last Spring, the city of Westfield sold its water utility to Citizens, and this Spring residents are seeing the payoff in infrastructure improvements, including connections to the city's 12 miles of

"We are passionate about trails in Westfield," Mayor Andy Cook said. "Westfield has consistently been identified as one of the best communities in Indiana for young families who want to stay active and healthy. Maintaining and expanding our trails system provides these folks with plenty of opportunities to do just that."

Westfield's sale to Citizens netted the city around \$90 million. City leadership was able to utilize these funds to retire bonds and lower the community's debt, and also set aside remaining funds to be used for infrastructure projects like trail connections, paving and roundabout construction.

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



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Millers break away from early slug fest

Pacers win in double OT, stay in playoff hunt

Before Tuesday night's game against the Wizards, in a tunnel beneath Bankers Life Fieldhouse, Pacers coach Frank Vogel told reporters he expected the game against Washington to have a playoff feel to it. He said that his players seemed to be dialed in

during both practice and morning film ses-

And after overcoming a slow start on the offensive side of things, the Pacers began to embody the focus and determination Vogel had spoke of earlier, as Indiana roared past the Wizards using a 5-0 run in the second overtime of a double-OT, instant-classic at The Fieldhouse to grab a 99-95 victory and remain in control of their playoff destiny.

'I couldn't be more proud of our guys, just all out heart, will and perseverance," said Vogel after the game. "We had so many opportunities to give in. Our defense carried us. It was exceptional."

For much of the game, the Pacers struggled to find their footing on the offensive end against the playoff-bound Wizards. So it came as little surprise that in the first overtime period, it took Indiana four minutes to get on the board. But luckily for the Blue & Gold, the Wizards were also restricted on offense, scoring only four points as well.

Vogel's risk to put the recently returned Paul George back into late-game situations paid quick dividends when PG nailed a floating jumper to tie the game at 85 with 22.4 seconds left in the first overtime. The Wizards thought they had what would be the game's final possession, but as Bradley Beal drove to the basket David West slapped the ball from his grasp as it tumbled off Beal's legs and out of bounds, giving the Pacers the ball with 2.3 heart-pounding seconds left.

George inbounded the ball to West, who quickly shoveled it back to him as he launched the potential game-winner. The shot, however, was a hair off as it bounced off the rim with the backboard lit red, signifying the end of the first overtime period with the game tied at 85 apiece.

"I thought our defense really came through in that second overtime," West explained. "You know, we just made enough plays to win."

Although the Wizards were able to nudge the deficit back to just two points after the Pacers' 5-0 run in the second overtime, a 3-pointer from George Hill — who had a 24 points, nine rebounds, and 10 assists — put Indiana up five with 27 seconds left. From there, the Pacers were able to finally shut the door on the Wizards' inspired comeback attempts.

Back in the fourth quarter, however, the Pacers started off trailing Washington by three, but that changed quickly when George shook off his defender and found himself open on the right wing. PG drilled the open 3-pointer to tie the game up 59.

But from there, the Wizards cracked off an 11-2 run that had the Pacers down nine with a little more than six minutes remaining in the game.

Sprinting down the baseline past his defender with three minutes remaining in regulation, C.J. Miles received a pass and quickly threw up a layup that fell right down the middle of the hoop. When the ref whistled a foul to signal the and-1, the crowd screamed loudly in approval. When the Hometown Hero George Hill came down and laid one in to put Indiana up 76-75 on the following possession, the crowd became deafening.

However, despite the thunderous cheers of "De-Fense" from the crowd, the Wizards were able to score on consecutive possessions and tie the game up at 79. Until of course, Rodney Stuckey, who had 10 second-half points, hit a short jumper to take the lead.

The Wizards responded with a basket in the paint on the other end to once again knot things up 81. Washington ended up with regulation's final possession as John Wall — who had 16 points and 11 assists attempted a floater that caromed off the rim.

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
