# Commissioner talks parking

Hamilton County Commissioner Steve Dillinger, when talking to the Noblesville Parking Task Force Wednesday afternoon, likely surprised his audience with a couple of opening statements.



**Dillinger**

"I don't think Noblesville has a parking problem," Dillinger said. "I can drive around the courthouse square anytime during the day and find open spots."

"Whatever problems you do have," Dillinger added, "we (Hamilton County government) are the root of all evil."

"We have provided parking for our employees," Dillinger said, "but we haven't provided parking for those who visit the Courthouse and Judicial Center on business. Surveys I've seen and have been a part of suggest that 70 to 80 percent of people coming to downtown Noblesville do so for government business."

Dillinger pointed out that the situation hasn't changed down through the years.

"Parking was an issue when I was elected to the Noblesville City Council in 1980," the Commissioner said. "There have been at least four committees studying parking since that time, with no results."

Dillinger said more than 15,000 visitors went through security entering the Judicial Center in January. That figure doesn't

include others who had business at the Courthouse.

Dillinger said many of those people are there paying taxes; voting, and using the probation department. Many are there on court business.

The official count of traffic through the metal detector at the Judicial Building so far this year is 15,034 in January, 12,974 in February and 14,679 in March.

There are approximately 441 employees in the Judicial Building and the Courthouse. The County owns 353 parking spaces for its employees to use. Two are located north of the Judicial Center, about two blocks away.

The third and largest lot is located south across Conner Street

Another County parking area is the "Sally Port," located under the Judicial Center. There are 16 spaces....seven for judges, three for Commissioners, one for a trash truck; one for the Clerk one for the Auditor, one for the Surveyor, one for the Prosecutor and one for the Sheriff.

"We instruct our people to park in these lots, and not around the Courthouse Square," Dillinger said

Challenged by some members of the Task Force that this isn't happening, Dillinger responded, "Prove it to me. Get license numbers. We'll do something about it, if that is true."

The probation department draws large numbers to the Judicial Center, but perhaps

**Political Puzzle Awaits the Weather**  
Candidates are making their final appeal to the voters of Hamilton county this weekend in order to have their houses in order by Tuesday May 5th Primary Election at which time the election will be held throughout the county.



Weather conditions will govern more or less the vote throughout Hamilton county. Towns and cities will vote as usual, but the rural vote will be heavy if weather conditions are such that the farmers cannot work in the fields. the lateness of the season makes it necessary that every available machine be in the field if the farmer can get them there. The heavy rains the last few days have again postponed all farming activities but plenty of sunshine over the week-end would dry the ground sufficiently so that farmers can plow the corn. This will govern the vote in the rural sections.

The contests in the Republican party is nearing the end and as one candidate stated Tuesday morning, "I'm just about completed as far as seeing voters is concerned. I believe I've seen as many as it is possible to see." Another said, I am going to be at the factory tonight at midnight when the night shifts change, then I'll be all through."

## Carmel Marathon is Saturday

The streets of Carmel will be filled with runners Saturday morning and afternoon, when the Carmel Road Racing Group hosts the fifth annual Carmel Marathon.

The marathon is a full-fledged, USA Track and Field certified race, and is listed as an official qualifier for the 2016 Boston Marathon. There are three other races that will take place for those who want to run, but might not want to go the full 26.2 miles: A half marathon, the Horizon Bank 8K and the Stay Healthy Hamilton County 5K.

All races begin at 7:30 a.m., with both the start and finish lines at the intersection of 3rd Avenue Southwest and City Center Drive. Full course maps are available by going to the Carmel Marathon Web site's Course Maps page.

Due to the day's races, there will be several street closures throughout the city Saturday morning and afternoon. Some are temporary, lasting no more than 35 minutes. Others will be longer, especially at the start/finish line. Both lanes of City Center Drive, eastbound and westbound, will close in front of Divvy at 11 p.m. on Friday and remain closed until 4:30 p.m. on Saturday for the start/finish area of the race. Traffic will be able to access City Center during those times.

In the Arts and Design District, southbound Range Line Road between Main Street and 126th Street, and eastbound Main Street between Guilford and Range Line roads will be closed between roughly 7:30 a.m. and 2:35 p.m. Traffic will be permitted to travel to northbound on Range Line and westbound on Main Street - keep that in mind while planning your commute on Saturday.

Other temporary single-lane delays will occur between 7:15 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. as follows:

116th Street: 7:55-9:10 a.m. (between Hazell Dell and River Road)  
116th Street: 9:18 a.m. - 12:56 p.m. (between Pennsylvania and College)  
126th Street eastbound: 7:30-9:25 a.m.

## 15,121 Voters for Election Noblesville No. 5 Tops Registration List of Forty-Five Precincts

All candidates particularly the Republicans who are opposed on their ticket are winding up their campaigns which each on eagerly hoping that he will get the necessary majority of the 15,121 registered voters in Hamilton County.

Precinct No. 5, Noblesville tops the list with 725 voters according to the list of voters in the 45 precinct released. The Sheridan precinct No. 3 is second with 520 voters. However the number of registered voters do not bear weight if they do not visit the polls. In past elections a few supposedly strong precincts do have as many voters as the smaller ones with loyal voters. Approximately thr-fourths of the registered voters are expected at the polls.

## April is Distracted Driving Awareness Month

April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month, an effort to increase motorist's awareness of the dangers of distracted driving. Distracted driving is a dangerous traffic safety epidemic. Last year alone, 3,154 people were killed and an estimated 424,000 people were injured in the United States in distraction-affecting crashes.

Distracted driving is any activity that diverts a person's attention away from the primary task of driving. All distractions endanger driver, passenger, and bystander safety, but electronic device use is becoming American's ultimate attraction. American's desire to constantly be connected, even while driving, won't go away without a concerted effort. Because text messaging requires visual, manual, and cognitive attention from the driver, it is by far one of the most alarming distractions.

•According to a study by the Virginia Tech Transportation Institute (VTI), sending or receiving a text takes a driver's eyes off the road for an average of 4.6 seconds, the equivalent of driving blind at 55-mph for the length of an entire football field.

•According to another NHTSA study (the 2012 National Occupant Protection

Use Survey on Driver Electronics Use), at any given daylight moment in 2012, an estimated 660,000 drivers were using hand-held cell phones.

•According to a 2014 special article in the New England Journal of Medicine, the risk of a crash or near-crash among novice drivers increased with the performance of many secondary tasks, including texting and dialing cell phones.

Indiana's Texting While Driving Law (IC 9-21-8-59) states:

(a) A person may not use a telecommunications device to:

(1) type a text message or an electronic mail message;

(2) transmit a text message or an electronic mail message; or

(3) read a text message or an electronic mail message;

while operating a moving motor vehicle unless the device is used in conjunction with hands free or voice operated technology, or unless the device is used to call 911 to report a bona fide emergency.

Trooper Scott Probasco received the District DUI Award and 2014 Life Award DUI. The District DUI award was presented to Trooper Probasco for his efforts in removing 61 impaired and intoxicated motorists from Indiana's roadways. The suicidal male then led Greenwood Police units on a short vehicle pursuit until he stopped and exited his vehicle while pointing a gun to his head. Trooper Cunningham responded to the scene and was able to speak to the suicidal male using his PA system. After several minutes of negotiations, the male surrendered peacefully without further incident. Trooper Cunningham's actions and dedication to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of law enforcement and reflect great credit upon himself and the Indiana State Police.

"These fine men represent what the Indiana State Police do every day and are fine examples of all the employees under my command at the Indianapolis Post," stated Lt. Jeff Payne, commander of the Indianapolis Post. "I am proud to work with them."

entertain Westfield.

Action will shift to Fishers and Westfield on Friday and then back to Southeastern and Noblesville for the series finals on Saturday.

Among the four Hamilton County teams, Southeastern and Fishers are off to the best starts. Southeastern has defeated Avon 7-1 and 8-4 and lost to the Orioles 8-1. Fishers has defeated Noblesville twice, 6-2 and 3-2, and lost to the Millers 11-0.

Westfield won its first game over Zionsville, 5-3, but then fell twice to the Eagles 3-2 and 8-7.

Battles get a little closer to home, if you will, tonight at Southeastern because the winner there will walk away not only with a 1-0 series lead but with the Mudsock Trophy championship.

"Fishers is going to have good team chemistry and they will play hard," said HSE coach Scott Henson while looking at the HSE-Fishers cross-town rivalry.

"Fishers is always going to be a tough game because of the rivalry aspect. We try to approach it as the next game, the next series to making us better as we progress toward the state tournament," Henson added.

"In order to beat Southeastern we need to continue to get quality starts from our starting pitching and continue to take care of the baseball defensively, making the routine plays routinely," said Fishers coach Matthew Cherry. "Offensively we need to maintain our approach at the plate and not try to do too much if we fall behind early in the game."

"Our depth is as deep as it's ever been," Cherry continued. "We still have two pitchers who we want to throw who haven't pitched an inning yet this season. We have another pitcher who we believe is going to be one of our top conference relievers, but he hasn't thrown since we were in Tennessee."

"We are deep at the plate, too, platooning five outfielders. Our hitters have been delivering two-out hits with runners in scoring position."

"Obviously, our three starting pitchers have all pitched well, and then Elliott Gilmore has been lights out in the pen. He came in two games against Noblesville and worked out of jams for saves," Cherry added. Henson also likes his HSE pitching staff. "We likely will have Tanner Sizemore (Hillsdale College) on the mound tonight," Henson said. "The staff, which includes four other college level pitchers in David Herrmann (Hanover) Carter Poiry (D1 interest), Michael Pachmayer (Ball State) and Andrew Bohm (D1 interest), have settled in nicely to what our weekend rotation has become."

"Offensively, we have been hitting the ball all the way through the lineup and having someone like Matt Gorski (IU

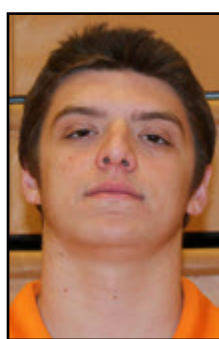

Groves has been head coach at Triton for 10 years, compiling a 188-58 record that includes six sectional, four regional, four

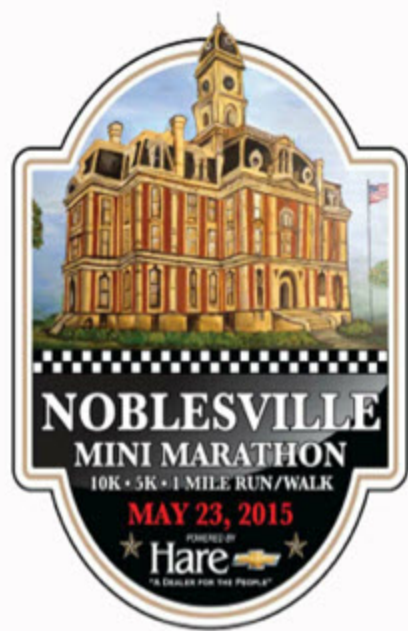

He then returned to Silver Creek as JV coach for seven years before being elevated to head coach in the spring of 2010.

# Pacers fall to Memphis, just short of playoffs

The Pacers put together a memorable run for the playoffs over the final two weeks of the regular season, but they ran out of gas at the end. Indiana saw its six-game winning streak snapped in Wednesday's regular season finale in Memphis, as the Pacers (38-44) fell to the Grizzlies (55-27), 95-83.

The Blue & Gold controlled their own destiny heading into Wednesday, but because they lost and Brooklyn defeated Or-

lando earlier in the evening, the Nets earned the eighth and final playoff spot in the Eastern Conference.

After a dramatic double-overtime victory over the Wizards back in Indianapolis on Tuesday night, the Pacers had a quick turnaround against a Memphis team that needed a win to secure homecourt advantage in the first round of the playoffs.

"I'm proud of this group's resiliency and their ability to overcome a ton of adversity dating all the way back to the summer," Pacers head coach Frank Vogel said after

the loss. "We gave ourselves a chance to get in but I certainly am very disappointed."

The Pacers got off to a solid start on Wednesday, leading by as many as eight points after Ian Mahinmi's tip shot with 3:01 remaining in the first quarter. But the Grizzlies dominated the second quarter, reeling off a 19-4 run midway through the period to seize control of the game.

The Pacers never got within two possessions in the second half, as the Grizzlies grinded out the victory by pounding the ball

into their bruise brothers in the post, Marc Gasol and Zach Randolph.

Gasol, Memphis' All-Star center, was listed as questionable coming into Wednesday's game due to a sprained ankle, but it didn't hamper him at all on Wednesday. Gasol had a career-high 33 points on 13-of-19 shooting and reeled in 13 rebounds, five of them on the offensive glass.

Randolph played the Robin to Gasol's Batman, scoring 18 points on 7-of-12 shooting and collecting nine boards.

"It seemed like every time we got a couple of plays, they would get a couple of big plays back," Pacers shooting guard C.J. Miles said. "We could never break that."

The Pacers, conversely, relied heavily on their starting backcourt. Miles led Indiana with 26 points, going 5-for-12 from 3-point range. Point guard George Hill added 20 points, five rebounds, and six assists in the loss.

Unfortunately for Indiana, no one else could get much going offensively. Sixth man Rodney Stuckey was the only other Pacers player in double figures with 11 points, but even he was just 3-for-13 from the field.

Pacers forward Paul George exited the game with 10:37 left in the fourth quarter. George was carried off the court by teammate and David West and diagnosed with a sore left calf. He did not return and finished the night with two points in 15:01.

"I just came off a screen and felt a pop," George said of the injury. "(The training staff) looked at it, and it's nothing more than just a calf strain. It's tough. I worked so hard in rehab to come back and to have something else pop up now, it's tough. The good thing is that I have a long summer and a lot to look forward to."

Memphis will move on to face Portland in the first round of the playoffs. The Pacers will miss out on the postseason for the first time since the 2009-10 season.

**Inside the Numbers**

Miles finished the year on a high point. The veteran swingman scored in double figures in all eight games in the month of April and topped 20 points in his last four contests. Miles shot 41.5 percent from 3-point range over his final eight contests.

George Hill finished the year by scoring in double figures in 19 of his final 21 games. In his seventh, NBA season, the Hometown Hero had career-best averages for points, rebounds, and assists.

Gasol's 33 points were one more than his previous career best. He scored 32 points twice earlier this season, on Oct. 29 against Minnesota and on Nov. 21 against Boston.

The Grizzlies owned the glass, out-rebounding Indiana, 48-36. The Pacers finished the year just 10-23 when losing the battle of the boards.
