

"We are the root of all evil"....

Commissioner talks parking

Dillinger, when talking to Force Wednesday afternoon, likely surprised his audience with a couple of opening statements.

"I don't think Noblesville has a parking problem," Dillinger said. "I can drive around the

courthouse square anytime during the day and find open spots.

"Whatever problems you do have," Dillinger added, "we (Hamilton County Hamilton County Commissioner Steve government) are the root of all evil.

"We have provided parking for our employees," Dillinger said, "but we haven't Noblesville Parking provided parking for those who visit the Courthouse and Judicial Center on business. Surveys I've seen and have been a part of suggest that 70 to 80 percent of people coming to downtown Noblesville do so for government business."

> Dillinger pointed out that the situation hasn't changed down through the years.

"Parking was an issue when I was elected to the Noblesville City Council in 1980," the Commissioner said. "There have been at least four committees studying parking since that time, with no results."

Dillinger said more than 15,000 visitors went through security entering the Judicial Center in January. That figure doesn't

Dillinger said many of those people are there paying taxes; voting, and using the probation department. Many are there on court business.

Political Puzzle Awaits the Weather

Candidates are making their final ap-



peal to the voters of Hamilton county this weekend in order to have their houses in order by Tuesday May 5th Primary Election at which time the election will be held throughout the county.

Weather conditions will govern more or less the vote throughout Hamilton county. Towns and cities will vote as usual, but the rural vote will be heavy if weather conditions are such that the farmers cannot work in the fields. the lateness of the season makes it necessary that every available machine be in the field if the farmer can get them there. The heavy rains the last few days have again postponed all farming activities but plenty of sunshine over the week-end would dry the ground sufficiently so that farmers can plow the corn. This will govern the vote in the rural sections.

The contests in the Republican party is nearing the end and as one candidate stated Tuesday morning, "I'm just about completed as far as seeing voters is concerned. I believe I've seen as many as it is possible to see." Another said, I am going to be at the factory tonight at midnight when the night shifts change, then I'll be all through."

Motorists take note...

Carmel Marathon is Saturday

The streets of Carmel will be filled with runners Saturday morning and afternoon, when the Carmel Road Racing Group hosts the fifth annual Carmel Marathon.

The marathon is a full-fledged, USA Track and Field certified race, and is listed as an official qualifier for the 2016 Boston Marathon. There are three other races that will take place for those who want to run, but might not want to go the full 26.2 miles: A half marathon, the Horizon Bank 8K and the Stay Healthy Hamilton County 5K.

All races begin at 7:30 a.m., with both the start and finish lines at the intersection of 3rd Avenue Southwest and City Center Drive. Full course maps are available by going to the Carmel Marathon Web site's Course Maps page.

Due to the day's races, there will be several street closures throughout the city Saturday morning and afternoon. Some are temporary, lasting no more than 35 minutes. Others will be longer, especially at the start/finish line. Both lanes of City Center Drive, eastbound and westbound, will close in front of Divvy at 11 p.m. on Friday and remain closed until 4:30 p.m. on Saturday for the start/finish area of the race. Traffic will be able to access City Center during

In the Arts and Design District, southbound Range Line Road between Main Street and 126th Street, and eastbound Main Street between Guilford and Range Line roads will be closed between roughly 7:30 a.m. and 2:35 p.m. Traffic will be permitted to travel to northbound on Range Line and westbound on Main Street - keep that in 126th Street westbound: 7:45-8:45 a.m. mind while planning your commute on Sat-

"It seemed like every time we got a couple of plays, they would get a couple of big plays back," Pacers shooting guard C.J. Miles said. "We could never break that."


