Midtown West development proposed for Carmel

Two developers have joined forces and announced a new \$45 million mixed-use project for Carmel's Midtown area, a three-to-four story project that will bring about 250 residential units to within walking distance of Carmel's Arts & Design District and City Center projects. A major, first-floor business will anchor the two-building project that will be connected by a sky-bridge.

The announcement was made jointly by Old Town Development and Barrett &

Stokely and will be situated on land west of the Monon Greenway, south of Bub's Café along 4th Avenue SW and 3rd Avenue SW, just south of 2nd Street SW. The Carmel Redevelopment Commission plans to sell vacant land it owns to the developers for the project, with construction anticipated to start in late fall 2016.

"This project will be a perfect fit to what we want to see in our Midtown area, a mix of residential and commercial in a walkable, sustainable environment that is good

for business, good for the city and a key part of our economic development efforts to bring more jobs and a high-quality workforce to Carmel," said Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard.

Midtown West will feature approximately 250 units, 200 one-to-two bedroom apartments for rent and 50 two-to-three bedroom condominiums with a ground floor restaurant anchor. The project also will include a

550 space parking garage, with up to 100 spaces open to the public, on the main level and a rooftop swimming pool and fitness center overlooking the Monon Greenway.

“We are proud to be part of this project. The demand for a mix of uses made this collaboration a great idea,” said Bryan Barrett, Director of Acquisitions for Barrett & Stokely of Indianapolis. “Working with Old Town and sharing ideas to make this project come together has been very exciting.”

This is the second project announced this week by Old Town Development, which is taking a lead role in development of the \$150 million Midtown project. Earlier this week, Justin Moffett, founding partner of the firm, unveiled plans for a \$16 million building that will house The Edison Business Lounge and Vintage Coffee/Wine Bar is part of a work-sharing space designed to attract entrepreneurs, small companies and others seeking space to work and network with others.

“We knew when we announced the overall Midtown project last fall that it would draw interest from residents and businesses who want to live and work and play near Carmel’s bustling Arts & Design District and City Center,” said Moffett. “But we have been pleasantly surprised at how quickly these projects are coming together.”

Noblesville Main Street announces  
Upstairs Downtown tour

On Friday, May 1<sup>st</sup>, several downtown Noblesville properties not normally open to the public will be available to tour as part of “Upstairs Downtown,” the May First Friday event with Noblesville Main Street sponsored by Peterson Architecture. Upstairs Downtown is a self-guided walking tour of select properties around the historic courthouse square.

The evening will begin at the Adler Building located on the southwest corner of Ninth and Maple streets, celebrating its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary as it transitioned from a church to an office building and is the starting location for the tour, where passes can be purchased for \$10 each. Tour-goers also may purchase tickets at the Visitors Center at 839 Conner Street. The Adler Building will also feature a complimentary hog roast courtesy of Adler Tesnar & Whalin prepared by Chef Brooks of The Ville.

An additional feature of the tour will be the newly remodeled Noblesville Main Street office located over the Visitors Center where passes will also be on sale. The staff of Main Street embarked on a mission to incorporate local art and goods into their work spaces, as well as feature items from local retailers to help promote the “shop local” philosophy.

“This annual event is unique to Noblesville with our history as the county seat. We are happy so many building and business owners are inviting the public to tour their space and see Noblesville from a different view than the public traditionally has seen,” said Chris Owens, executive director of Noblesville Main Street. “I’ve enjoyed some great conversation with our local business owners while we’ve been working on our office, and I think it reflects not only the fun nature of what our group does but also features some unique local items.”

Local author Kurt Meyer, and his novel *Noblesville* will be featured at The Wild during this event, as well as a wine tasting hosted by Matteo’s Italian Restaurant in their alley. Finally, a party in the loft at Syd’s will cap the evening starting at 8:30 p.m.

hatred. To stand by and watch one reach into the fire not knowing the destruction to come and to not sound the warning, this one's blood may be at your hand (Ezek 3:17-19). "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15) - the sacrifice has been made for salvation, the price has been paid for redemption! But, "Do not give what is holy to the dogs; nor cast your pearls before swine, lest they trample them under their feet, and turn and tear you in pieces" Matt 7:6 (NKJV). We need to "be wise as serpents and harmless as doves" for we are sheep among the wolves (Matt 10:16) and the wolves will deliver us up to silence the message by whatever means is at their disposal. # County makes impact at Midwest Prep

"I think they ran really well," said Carmel coach Aaron McRill. "We ran most of our varsity distance girls last night, so mainly it was our sprinters and some of our JV girls that got a little practice in, and a little meet time."
