

Noblesville Main Street announces Upstairs Downtown tour

On Friday, May 1st, several downtown Noblesville properties not normally open to the public will be available to tour as part of "Upstairs Downtown," the May First Friday event with Noblesville Main Street sponsored by Peterson Architecture. Upstairs Downtown is a self-guided walking tour of select properties around the historic courthouse square.

The evening will begin at the Adler Building located on the southwest corner of Ninth and Maple streets, celebrating its 25th anniversary as it transitioned from a church to an office building and is the starting location for the tour, where passes can be purchased for \$10 each. Tour-goers also may purchase tickets at the Visitors Center at 839 Conner Street. The Adler Building will also feature a complimentary hog roast courtesy of Adler Tesnar & Whalin prepared by Chef Brooks of The Ville.

An additional feature of the tour will be the newly remodeled Noblesville Main Street office located over the Visitors Center where passes will also be on sale. The staff of Main Street embarked on a mission to incorporate local art and goods into their work spaces, as well as feature items from local retailers to help promote the "shop local" philosophy.

"This annual event is unique to Noblesville with our history as the county seat. We are happy so many building and business owners are inviting the public to tour their space and see Noblesville from a different view than the public traditionally has seen," said Chris Owens, executive director of Noblesville Main Street. "I've enjoyed some great conversation with our local business owners while we've been working on our office, and I think it reflects not only the fun nature of what our group does but also features some unique local items."

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
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136th Street closed east of Ditch starting Tuesday

County makes impact at Midwest Prep

The Midwest Prep track and field invitational is a meet that showcases some of the best athletes in the Midwest.

This year's edition, which took place Saturday at Lawrence Central, included many Hamilton County runners and fielders, and they made a big impact.

Westfield had a terrific meet, with its girls team winning two events and the boys team winning another. Both the girls and the boys won their respective editions of the 4x800 meet: The Lady Shamrocks' victorious team consisted of Taylor Rogers, Lauren Bailey, Gabby Dilick and Devon Leahy, who clocked in at 9:50.77. The Westfield boys team of Johnny Crawford, Sam Henthorn, Alec Hartman and Aaron Bennett won their race in a time of 7:55.19.

"Alec Hartman split 1:55 on the anchor, so that was a really solid relay for us," said WHS boys coach Roger Wachtel."So we're real happy with that."

Karen Hubbard, a state medalist last year in the 100 dash, easily won that event Saturday. Hubbard's time was 12.34, not too far off of the 12.32 she ran at state.

Carmel also competed in both the girls and boys meets. Vincent Laconi continued his domination of the shot put, winning that event with a toss of 54-6.5. Jake Herr made it a 1-2 finish for the Greyhounds.

Two Carmel girls placed fourth in their respective events: Corrine Miller in the 1600 and Lucy Allan in the 3200.

"I think they ran really well," said Carmel coach Aaron McRill. "We ran most of our varsity distance girls last night, so mainly it was our sprinters and some of our JV girls that got a little practice in, and a little meet time.

Hamilton Southeastern and Fishers also had competitors in the boys meet. Tiger Guillory won an event for the Royals, leaping to first place in the long jump in 23-9.5. The Tigers' Tres Carver was second, one of four runners-up for Fishers. The others were Peter Werling in the 800, Nick Butler in the 1600 and Trevor Thompson in the 3200.

Tigers coach Nathan Warnecke said his team ran "really well top to bottom," with many season and personal bests.

"I was really happy with the way we competed today," said Warnecke.

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

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
