\$76.4 million privately funded:

Fishers pavilion passes 1st reading

The Fishers City Council Tuesday evening passed on first reading a proposal made by Mayor Scott Fadness for a \$76.4 million privately owned and operated multi-purpose sports and entertainment facility.

The facility was described by the Fishers Mayor as a “world class facility.”

The Council on May 18 likely will pass on the second, and probably third, readings. A final vote will be taken at that time.

Before then, Fishers will host three community information sessions to discuss the project with residents, including a 6 p.m.

kickoff session this evening, Wednesday, at the Crosspoint Church. Located at 13678 Silverstone Drive, Crosspoint is the meeting site closest to the facility location. The location for the proposed project is near the Lake District at Saxony Village at the intersection of 136 Street and Ohio Road.

The other two information sessions will be held on April 30 at 6 p.m. at Launch Fishers, 7 Launch Way, and on May 7 at 6 p.m. at the City of Fishers Auditorium, 1 Municipal Drive.

Fadness, at the Tuesday session, stressed the importance of community input into the project.

When completed, the facility will provide space for the city’s huge youth sports program and also facilities for walking by senior citizens and other adults, plus other benefits.

There are three components to the project:

*Arena. A 4,200 to 6,000 seat arena with suite level seating that can stage athletic events, trade shows, concerts and other forms of entertainment. The arena would include two sheets of ice (one in the main arena) and is capable of supporting hard courts for basketball and volleyball; mats for wrestling and gymnastic, and staging for

musical arts. This investment is priced at \$27 million.

*Fieldhouse. A 245,000 square foot facility built with logistics technology that allows the flexibility and a myriad of different uses. The building would be equipped with both hard court surface and turf, and could hold up to 32 basketball/volleyball courts; at least one full football field; a mezzanine level with a track for walking and jogging and a 200-meter running track. Price tag, \$32 million.

State Senate’s Budget Bill provides \$22.3M to county public schools

The State Senate has approved the so called Budget Bill which includes the all-important school funding formula for next year. It provides an additional \$22.3 million for Hamilton County public schools, bringing the total state support to \$332 million. But, the amount is still less than the estimated statewide average per student of \$6,670.

The money funds general operations including teacher salaries while the cost of new school construction, debt retirement and transportation is the responsibility of local school districts through the property tax.

The Senate version of the school funding measure is now subject to conference committee consideration along with the rest of the budget bill, but is expected to be adopted in much the same form that it left the Senate. It is slightly less generous than a bill passed earlier in the House of Representatives.

Noblesville Schools which receives about \$56.9 million in state funding this year will get \$60.7 million next year. That amounts to \$5,597 per student, up from \$5,343 this year.

Sheridan, the county's smallest school system, will be getting \$6.6 million next year, a \$200,000 increase from this year. That will amount to \$6,563 per student which is closer to the state average than any other county system.

Hamilton Southeastern, the county's largest district, is scheduled for \$119.9 million in 2016, up from \$110.7 million this year. But, the per student contribution will be \$4,970, up only slightly from \$4,587 this year.

Carmel Clay can look forward to \$90 million, up from \$84.2 million this year. This year state funding amounts to \$5,497 per student and will be going to \$5,848 next year.

Hamilton Heights is slated to receive \$13.2 million in 2016, a

*Parking. A 600-space, three-level parking garage is proposed as part of the project. There will be 700-space surface parking lot initially that could be used for future development. An \$8.4 million investment.

Future development in the complex could include a sports medicine facility, additional office space and a hotel and conference center.

Billed as a center “for athletics, concerts and community events for decades to come,” the facilities come nearly “free” to the City of Fishers.

The economic development agreement that the City Council has considered includes:

*A 10-year tax abatement for the arena and parking garage (\$200,000 annually).

*Waiver of impact and permit free for the entire project.

*A 20-year lease agreement with the City of Fishers, which includes an annual payment of \$805,000 to be paid by project property taxes, park impact fee and ticket charges.

Benefits to the City are huge. According to a Hamilton County Sports Corp. economic impact study, the new complex could bring an estimated \$110 million in annual economic impact. In addition the project would bring nearly \$80 million in new assessed value to the Saxony Village.

The City of Fishers, through a 20-year agreement will lease a portion on the fieldhouse to be used for the growing intramural sports programs, as well as a track for walkers and joggers. The agreement includes: 1, use of 12 courts or turf Monday-Thursday from 3 to 9 p.m.; 2, community access to a walking/jogging track six hours a day Monday-Friday.

Also at Tuesday’s session the City Council approved a \$3.1 million purchase of the former DECA Financial Services Building for a major expansion of Launch Fishers

The City Council will vote on the financing plan on May 18.

The unanimous approval paves the way for the Center of Entrepreneurship and Innovation as part of a partnership with Ball State University.

slight increase from their \$13 million this year. That amounts to \$6,303 per student vs. \$6,102 this year.

Westfield Washington is allocated \$41.5 million next year. This year the schools are receiving \$38.5 million, so that per student benefit goes from \$5,864 this year to \$6,188 next year.

Inner city schools and poor, small districts traditionally get more state funding, but the formula, likely to see final approval next week, moves slightly more money per student to the growing school districts, something that suburban leaders have been urging for years.

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Separate car crashes claim two lives

Two separate crashes in Hamilton County claimed two lives over the past three days.

On Sunday morning, a fatal single car crash occurred on State Road 37 at 211th Street, north of Noblesville. Dustin A. Mullins, age 29 of Arcadia, was pronounced dead at the scene of the crash.

Hamilton County Sheriff's deputies originally responded to a report of a crash shortly after 3:30 a.m. and found a 2004 gold Mercury Sable involved. The car, which had been travelling southbound on SR 37, left the roadway, rolled over the guardrail on the west side of the road and hit several trees before landing in a ditch. Deputies found the passenger, who was treated for non-life threatening injuries, but were unable to locate the driver. According to the initial crash report, the passenger told officers he believed Mullins had possibly left the scene. A search of the area failed to locate Mullins and deputies attempted to make contact with Mullins at his home but were unsuccessful.

The passenger returned to the crash scene around 7:15 a.m. to retrieve some belongings and saw what he believed to be a body lying near the dam on the White River. The Sheriff's Office Crash Team was dispatched to complete an investigation of the scene and, after cutting through a tall fence, found Mullins, who had been ejected from the vehicle. Deputies believe Mullins was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash.

This is an on-going case and deputies are investigating if alcohol was a factor in the fatal crash. A final determination cannot be made until toxicology results are returned which may take several weeks. Anyone with information on the crash should contact the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office Crash Investigation Team at 317-773-1282.

Indiana State Police troopers are investigating a fatality crash that occurred just after 10 a.m. Monday morning on westbound Interstate 465 at the 32.6 mile marker, near the Marion/Hamilton County line. Preliminary investigation and witnesses statements revealed that a female subject was standing on the right side emergency shoulder near a 2014 Subaru passenger car that is registered in her name. A witness to the crash stated the female walked WB away from her vehicle then ran into the I-465 travel lanes and was struck by a dump truck. The 2003 International dump truck is registered to V & S Transport INC. of Pendleton. and was being operated by Phillip Bates, 56, of Fountaintown.

The female was pronounced deceased at the scene by the Marion County Prosecu-

Legislation protecting Hoosier children signed into law

Legislation sponsored by State Representative Donna Schaibley (R-Carmel) regarding speed limits in school zones was signed into law by the governor.

Senate Enrolled Act (SEA) 35 allows a city, town or county to reduce the speed limit in a non-urban school zone to 20 mph. Current law provides that the speed limit may not be less than 30 mph outside an urban district.

"I decided to carry this legislation in the House as a result of recent discussions in Zionsville regarding lowering speed limits in school zones as a means of increasing student safety," said Rep. Schaibley. "However, by law, they discovered that they were obligated to keep the speed

limit at a minimum of 30 mph because they are a non-urban district."

As a result of this law, the minimum school zone speed limit may now be set at 20 mph for both urban and non-urban districts.

"SEA 35 simply provides an option for districts to lower their speed limit," said Rep. Schaibley. "As a former substitute teacher, I am pleased to see this bill signed into law to provide more flexibility to districts when it comes to the important task of keeping our children safe."

The penalty for speeding in a school zone is a Class B infraction, and SEA 35 will go into effect on July 1, 2015.


