

Desire to lead Noblesville

The one obviously thing coming across to the audience at the League of Women Voters forum for the upcoming Noblesville city primary election was that: Noblesville can't lose come election time.

It was a talented, dedicated, passionfilled group which Wednesday evening took the stage at Noblesville City Hall. A group which has and is putting in hours and hours trying to convince the voting public that each is the best candidate to lead Noblesville in the present and the future.

It will be a new Noblesville, for sure, in money. 2016 when the city becomes a second class city. (Only Indianapolis is first class in the state). But that means changes, highlighted by the City Council increasing from seven to nine members and by the Mayor of 2016 naming Noblesville's first City Manager, replacing what was an elected City Clerk Treasurer.

The two men running for mayor, current Mayor John Ditslear and second-time challenger Mike Corbett, were featured, appearing last in what were four groups of candidates. Ditslear and Corbett took off the gloves and slugged it out, a little. Mayor Ditslear talked about his achievements and his plans for the future of the city. Corbett suggested things could be done better.

A question was addressed concerning the mayor's salary. Ditslear said it was about \$110,000 annual and that he hadn't received a raise in two or three years.

Corbett said he was not in it for the

Ditslear touted his record as mayor, pointing to bringing Ivy Tech to the city, enhancing the downtown, and he said 44 percent of the investments in Hamilton County came in Noblesville.






