Noblesville Common Council approves preliminary resolution for...

Memory care facility

The Noblesville Common Council has approved the preliminary resolution for Poets Walk of Noblesville, a 37,000-square-foot memory care facility with 60 rooms (68 beds) of memory care private pay assisted living facility at 9600 E. 146th St.

“This is another opportunity to create jobs and additional economic development for the City of Noblesville,” Mayor John Ditslear said.

Poets Walk will be built by Noblesville Senior Real Estate, LLC., whose parent company is Silver Companies, a real estate developer who has been a family-owned business since the 1940’s out of Boca Raton, Fla. Total capital investment for this project will be approximately \$10.9 million. Real property capital investment is estimated at \$4.9 million.

“As Noblesville’s population grows, we need facilities like this to take care of our citizens countywide,” Economic Development Director Judi Johnson said.

As part of the resolution, the common council has approved the location as an economic revitalization area eligible for a four-year tax phase-in. Currently, the City of Noblesville receives no property taxes on the land. Subject to the adoption of a confirmatory resolution, the tax phase-in allows 100 percent of the assessed value of the building to be deducted the first year and 25 percent less each of the following three years.

During those four years, the city will earn \$221,852 of net property taxes and the developer will save \$369,754. In exchange, Silver Companies will create 55 new jobs with an average wage of \$37,400 with benefits.

“We have a health care corridor at 146th Street and Cumberland Road. We have Prairie Lakes Health Campus, Hamilton Healthcare Campus, Community Surgery Center, some doctor offices on the west side of the surgery

Donaldson represented Hamilton County like his own home

John W. Donaldson, longtime popular state representative, died Monday. He lived his whole life in neighboring Boone County, but represented Hamilton County as if it was his home. A practicing attorney in Lebanon, in recent years he and his wife, Sara, lived in Zionsville where he died at the age of 88.

As a newspaper reporter during John's tenure, I felt he gave true meaning to the word 'representative.' He served in the State House of Representatives more than 30 years and was a frequent visitor here. He was found at fish fries, basketball games, various community events and of course political functions, always willing to listen to constituents' concerns.

John was a graduate of DePauw and IU and an avid fan of Hoosier sports. He had been a member of Lebanon's 1943 state finals basketball team, and veteran of the U.S. Navy. He retired from the legislature in 1990 as the senior member of the House. During most of his tenure he represented Hamilton County as a joint state rep with Boone County.

An early supporter of Dr.Otis Bowen for governor, John himself never sought higher office despite having the seniority to be considered for Speaker of the House after Bowen was elected governor in 1972.

Besides his wife, John is survived by a son and two daughters, nine grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. Funeral services will be Saturday, May 2 at 10 a.m. in the First Presbyterian Church of Lebanon where he had been a lifetime member. Burial will be in Oak Hill Cemetery.

HAND calls for halt of... Elevator demolition

Dear Editor,

The grain elevator site in Noblesville is a technological marvel, built in 1904 to serve a flourishing and dynamic agricultural economy. These structures stand as a testament to the contribution local farmers have made to Noblesville, the place most proud to claim the Miller identity. HAND and various community partners believe the plans to demolish the entire site is not in the best interests of North Central Coop (NCC), Hamilton County, Noblesville, or the neighbors in the Southwest Quadrant.

We believe this site should be preserved to recognize local farmers and the role farming played in establishing and shaping adaptive prosperity in Noblesville. We understand why the owner does not want to be perceived as allowing a blighted property to persist, or may believe a flat piece of dirt will sell for a higher price. However, this is a costly endeavor and since operations only ceased six months ago, the community has yet to weigh in.

Adler Building: Past, present and future

It was 25 years ago when Raymond Adler took a leap of faith and saved one of the county's oldest Christian churches from the wrecking ball. Adler, whose law practice, Adler Tesnar & Whalin is now located at 136 S. 9th Street in Noblesville, said it was his love of the brick and limestone building that encouraged him to rejuvenate the building.

To understand the move, you have to understand a little bit about Adler himself. Adler, a self-described country lawyer, has a strong faith, love of history and a passion for the community in which he lives, works and plays. A resident of Hamilton County with strong family ties, Adler long aspired to become a lawyer. To become the owner of a historic downtown building--that was actually a twist of fate.

The First Christian Church has a long and proud history in Noblesville dating

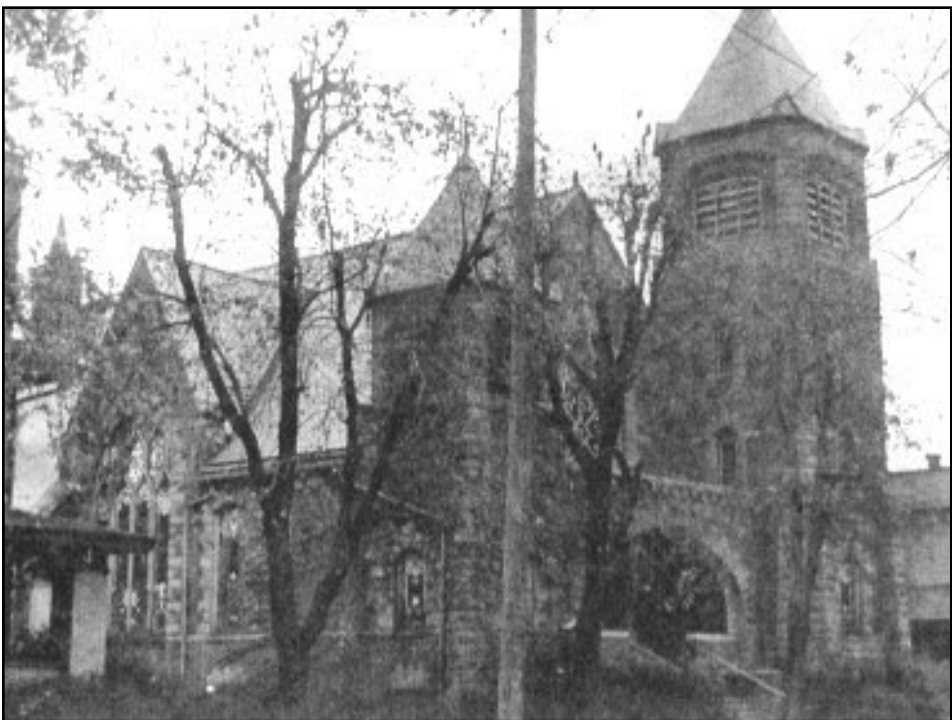

Noblesville has vital plans for downtown, and this property could play a pivotal role in kicking off broader redevelopment. HAND requests six months to pull together a plan that could potentially reuse the site and maximize the value of this site. Six months will cause a delay in demolition, but the potential outcome could benefit generations.

At its completion in 1904, workers at the top of the grain elevator could see forests and rivers for miles into the distance. They could not have envisioned that today, from the top of the elevator, one can view downtown Indianapolis, Conner Prairie, and much more. This inspiring view is what HAND hopes Noblesville will get an opportunity to explore.

We envision not just salvaging pieces of the foundation, but saving substantial portions of the 85 foot tall elevator and silos. We envision keeping history intact so children can tour the inner workings of their agricultural heritage. We envision sound economic redevelopment that breathes life into the Southwest Quad.

Lastly, we envision a redevelopment plan that supports the city’s dream of an urban hub connected to downtown Indy. Transit may be a long way off, but redeveloping a site in this location should strongly consider what would draw transit riders into Noblesville, and this kind of supportive development is ripe for the taking.

We ask NCC to postpone demolition to give us an opportunity to engage the community in a competitive design process to illuminate the best possible strategies that could save the thousands of dollars and preserve a magnificent piece of history. Plans for the development of flat ground can occur anytime, but we can never plan ways to preserve the buildings once they are gone.

center and this memory care facility,” Johnson said. “It improves the industry we have established at that location in the city.”

April 28 was the preliminary resolution, which is the introduction to an economic development project and lays out the initial request for approval with council. Because the “first look” resolution was passed, a public hearing and confirmatory resolution will be held at the next council meeting on May 12.

back to the 1820’s. The building located at 136. S. Ninth Street was designed by Fort Wayne architects, Wing and Mahurin in 1897. The brick and stone building with limestone corners and peaked slate roof was built and furnished for \$16,163.69. At the turn of the century, the church was one of three large brick churches in downtown Noblesville.

Over the next 150 years, the church would undergo a number of repairs and renovations. The building was badly damaged by a gas explosion in 1901. Repairs were made and a rededication was held in early 1902. In 1911, the church purchased a residence located on the immediate corner of Ninth and Maple Streets. It was remodeled and turned into a parsonage. The building grew again with the addition of a two-story educational wing in 1923. By the 1970’s, additional updating and remodel-

ing were needed to accommodate the growing congregation including demolishing the parsonage.

By 1984 the church population swelled to over 1,000. Outgrowing its current facilities and unable to secure additional downtown property to accommodate their growth, the congregation would ultimately relocate to a new home built on a 12-acre site at the corner of Greenfield Avenue and Herriman Boulevard. The church held its last Sunday services in the Ninth Street location on July 16, 1989.

After Adler purchased the building, he spent the next year transforming the Romanesque Revival style, sometimes referred to as “Victorian Gothic” building for professional office suites while maintaining the integrity, character and original exterior charm of the church. This brought with it both challenges and opportunities. Many of

the congressional members wanted mementos and there was just enough to go around. The large sanctuary had to have a floor added which required steel posts going to new piers in the basement. This was no small feat and became a labor of love but done without grants. Ralph Waltz of American National Bank and later Chuck Crow of Community Bank provided the funding secured for the renovation. The building was renamed the Adler Building and immediately became home to a number of local businesses from Times, newspaper; Kristo Psychological Services; Mike Marinaro, professional engineering; Mike Mackin, financial planner; Kevin Yaney, Marketing/Graphic Designer; Karisma, Internet clothing; Open Door Methodist Church; Bob Eppink, Corey McConnell and Mark Kimmel’s public accounting firms to Workforce 1; King Real Estate

Appraisals; Fax Mobile Abstracting; Joe Duepner, attorney; Indiana Transportation Museum; Tempco; Insight Drug Abuse Testing; Total Court Services; On Time Transportation, trucking company; Pinnacle Behavior Services; DayStar Directional Drilling; Larry White, White construction; and many others.

In 1991 Adler was recognized by the Indiana Main Street Organization with its Best Adaptive Reuse Award for his outstanding renovation of the building which left the exterior relatively untouched. The hallmarks of the structure include a stunning second floor rosette window that is approximately 12-foot in diameter and a bell tower that reaches over four stories high which housed the original church bell. This earned the City of Noblesville its second Main Street award. Adler was among the first to renovate an existing downtown structure into professional offices. “It takes a village,” said Adler, who is quick to credit Eden Construction; Rick Vincent, interiors; Kay Hartley, floor covering; Michael Simone, exterior restoration; Anderson Glass; Schuler Plumbing, Sexton HVAC, John Ogle, wall coverings, and Fred Jones Electric with many others.

Today, the Adler Building is one of downtown Noblesville’s most beautiful and historic treasures anchoring the downtown historic district. The building houses some 20 diverse businesses including Adler, Tesnar & Whalin Attorneys. In fact, there have been over 40 businesses that have called the Adler Building home over the past quarter of a century.

A consistent part of the downtown’s economic vitality, The Adler Building is an integral component of the community’s tangible past with a myriad of options for the community’s future. The building serves as a reminder of the city’s substance and complexity and how the past and present can be blended for the future. The Adler Building has become a hub of innovation, collaboration, growth and a local success story.

Adler will be hosting a 25-year celebration party on May 1, 2015, from 5-8p.m., in the North parking lot of The Adler Building, 136 S. 9th St., Noblesville. 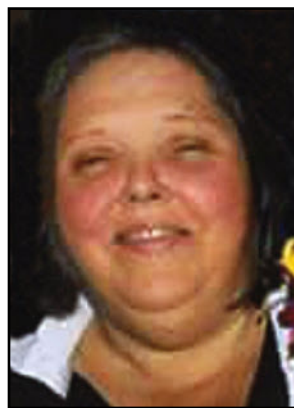

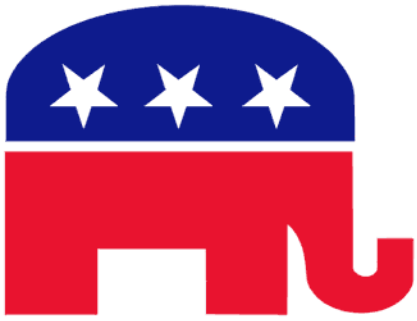

Former City Councilor challenges mayor’s progress

Dear Editor,
As the longest serving City Councilor in Noblesville history, I have to challenge the mayor on the so-called “progress” he’s made over the past 12 years.
According to his current ad, he is “growing our economy,” “strengthening our home-town,” and “enhancing our downtown.” Let’s look at the facts.
Growing our economy: The mayor claims we led Hamilton County in capital investment last year. His \$100 million figure is based on info from Invest Hamilton County and consists of just four investments, none of which can be attributed to the mayor’s effort. He admits the money wasn’t all spent last year. Most of the \$100 million is potential investment, not actual.
Strengthening or Hometown: The mayor claims he continues to grow recreational amenities but his 85 miles of trails consist of “fantasy trails” that exist on paper only, not in reality. In his mind we have trails on 10th St., Conner St. and Greenfield Avenue, but they don’t exist. He has yet to explain why his maps show that they do.
Enhancing our Downtown: This mayor’s enduring legacy will be his neglect of downtown. His own city attorney admitted before the City Council that we haven’t seen any significant capital investment downtown in more than 10 years. Despite what he says in his ad, he didn’t establish the façade grant program. It was designed by John Elliott and Ball State University, and adopted by the city in the 90’s.

The fact is that very little has been started under this mayor. He grudgingly goes along with funding for downtown projects but has never championed an initiative and has no vision for downtown’s future. In fact, two commissions that were formed specifically to improve downtown dissolved due to his lack of leadership.
I could go on: stalled economic development, loss of our place on the 50 best places to live, the second highest tax rate in the county, the loss of businesses such as Warner Bodies and Weaver Popcorn, the loss of the Noblesville Symphony Orchestra. Yet, the mayor wants us to believe that we’re going to start seeing “progress” if we re-elect him for another four years.
12 years is a long time and we’ve lost so much momentum under John Ditslear that it is going to take awhile to get back up to speed. But the time to start is now. That’s why I support Mike Corbett for Mayor and encourage you to support him too. He has solid ideas for improving our downtown, spurring economic development, connecting our trails and more. He’s a hard worker and has a passion for this city. He will help Noblesville reach the potential we all know we can achieve with the right leader.

In Riverwood housing addition...

Early morning fire causes \$10,000 damage

The Noblesville Fire Department responded to a reported residence fire at 158 Tippecanoe Drive in the Riverwood Housing addition early Tuesday morning.

Upon fire suppression crews' arrival at 1:54 am, they encountered smoke and flames on the front steps of the home. The exterior service entry door and exterior siding were on fire.

The home owner, Charles Dupree stated that he and the other four occupants in the home had been awakened by the sound of the smoke detectors. Mr. Dupree said there was smoke inside the home, and they discovered the exterior entry door in the kitchen was on fire. Mr. Dupree said all occupants inside the home safely escaped the blaze.

The fire department determined that the fire has originated on the front exterior steps of the home. There are no accidental fire causes that have contributed to the ignition of the fire. The intentionally set fires damaged the exterior of the home, and cause minor smoke damage throughout the inside of the structure.

The Hamilton County Sheriff Department is investigating the incident.

The fire has caused approximately ten thousand (\$10,000.00) dollars damage.

No one was injured in the fire.

US 31, SR 32 ramp closures begin next week

Construction crews plan to close access from northbound US 31 to State Road 32 and from State Road 32 to northbound US 31 beginning on or after Wednesday, May 6. During the closures, contractors will connect pavement for the new northbound ramps at the single-point urban interchange being built as part of The New US 31 Hamilton County freeway.

Crews anticipate opening the northbound US 31 exit ramp to State Road 32 before Memorial Day (May 25), followed by the State Road 32 entrance ramp to northbound US 31 about one week later. This schedule is subject to change, pending unforeseen circumstances, such as inclement weather.

Both the southbound access from US 31 to State Road 32 and the State Road 32 access to southbound US 31 will remain

Detour for northbound US 31 access to State Road 32:

Motorists traveling northbound on US 31 must continue north to the interchange at State Road 38, exit and reenter US 31 going southbound and take the southbound US 31 exit to State Road 32.

Detour for State Road 32 access to northbound US 31:

Motorists traveling in either direction of State Road 32 must enter southbound US 31, exit to the 161st Street roundabout interchange and reenter northbound US 31.

Many county schools receive Four Star designation

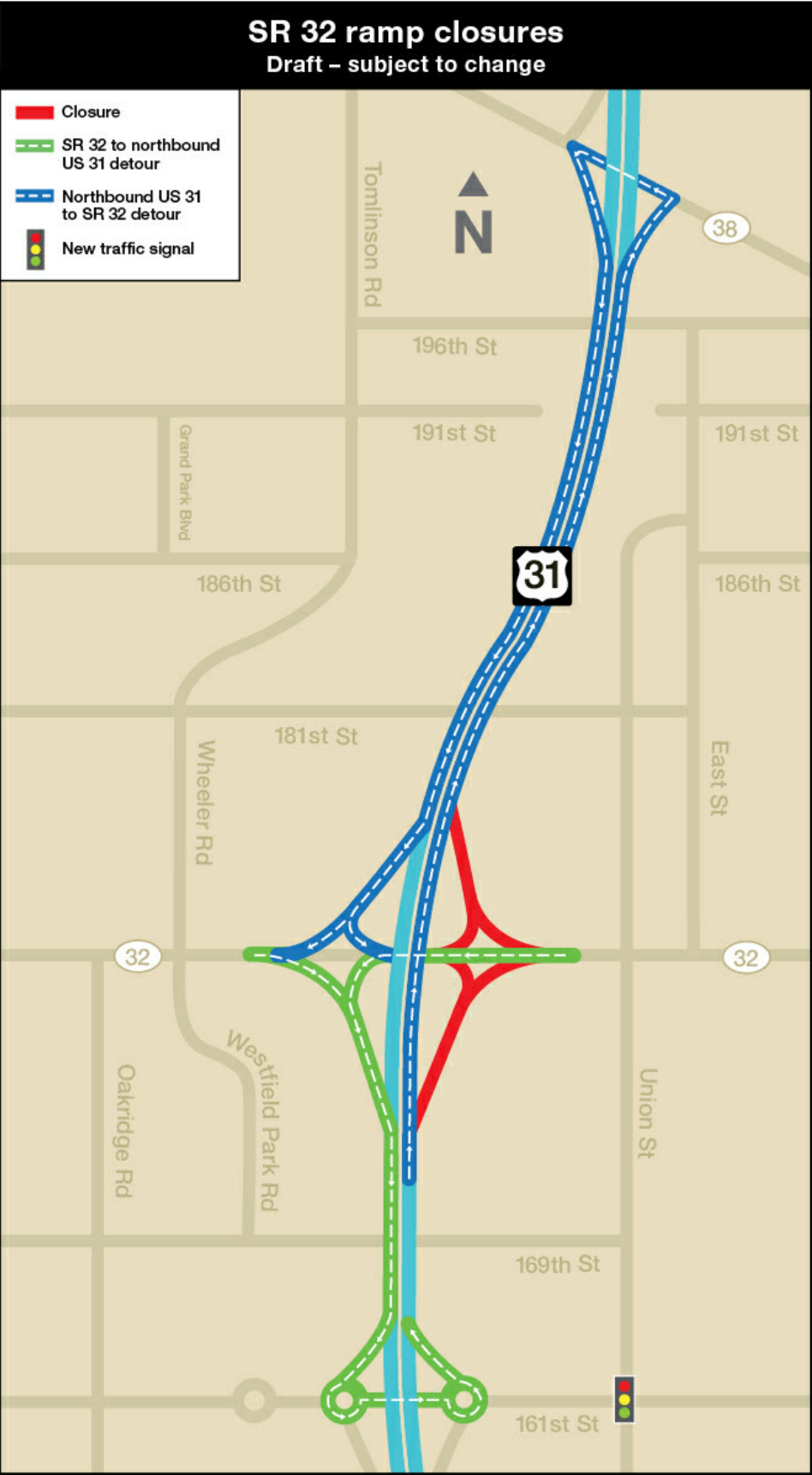

The Racing Cars of Dan Gurney - An All-American Exhibition
May 1-Nov. 30, 2015

Retired Grand Prix and Indianapolis 500 driver Dan Gurney is the focus of the Hall of Fame's latest special exhibit, which highlights 11 cars he built or drove. The exhibit includes several examples of Eagle racing cars produced by Gurney's All

American Racers of Santa Ana, California. The three Indianapolis 500-winning Eagle race cars displayed were driven by Bobby Unser in 1968 and 1975, and by Gordon Johncock in 1973. The 1973 winning race car is on loan to the Museum by a private owner and the 1975 race car is on loan from The Revs Institute for Automotive Research Inc. The exhibit also features the Gurney-Weslake V-12 owned by The Revs Institute for Automotive Research Inc., with which Gurney won the 1967 Belgian Grand Prix, the only World Championship

Grand Prix race won by an American driver in an American car. The exhibit includes the 1991 Eagle GTP Mark III Coupe, one of six constructed. It was driven by Juan Manuel Fangio II and won 21 of 27 events entered, including an amazing run of 14 victories in succession. That vehicle is on loan from the Malloy Foundation, Inc.

Ferrari Type-375: As spring reaches Indiana, the Hall of Fame Museum is featuring the Ferrari Type-375, which showcases a 2.5 liter, 12-cylinder Ferrari engine.

Four updated 1951 Ferrari Grand Prix cars were prepared for the 1952 Indianapolis 500, three of which were sold to American customers. Scuderia Ferrari campaigned the fourth itself.

Future world champion Alberto Ascari passed up the Swiss Grand Prix in order to drive the "works" car, the only one of the four to qualify. The choice of wire wheels over "mags" proved costly, however, as Ascari was forced out at 100 miles with a collapsed wheel just after having entered the top 10. The private entries were assigned to Johnnie Parsons and Bobby Ball, plus Johnny Mauro, who entered the car on display. Although the paint work on the display car resembles Ascari's car number 12, at the time Mauro's number 35 was white with blue numbers and lettering. Ascari did drive this car briefly during practice.

1972/73 Sugaripe Prune Eagle No. 2: May will feature a turbocharged Drake Offenhauser-powered, 1972 Dan Gurney All American Racers Eagle, owned by sportsman Jerry O'Connell and driven in 1972, 1973 and 1974 by Bill Vukovich Jr., who finished second in the rain-shortened Indianapolis 500 in 1973. This vehicle will complement the 11 race cars included in the Museum's special exhibit about Dan Gurney race cars, which are on display from May 1-Nov. 30, 2015.

1950 Cummins Diesel No. 61: Commissioned for the 1950 Indianapolis 500 by Cummins Engine Co. of Columbus, Indiana, this Kurtis-Kraft chassis housed a 401-cubic-inch supercharged Cummins Diesel truck engine. Driven by Jimmy Jackson, who later broke several speed records with it at the Bonneville Salt Flats in Utah, it was eliminated after 52 laps in 1950 with supercharger drive failure.
