Dillinger shifts gears....

# On building expansion

Commissioners talk about morgue, new city police station on jail property

Speaking to Main Street Thursday morning, Hamilton County Commissioner Steve Dillinger dropped a bomb on the downtown Noblesville organization.

Dillinger said he may have changed his mind for future

development of the Hamilton County Judicial Center.

For months the County Commissioners have talked about adding a third floor to the building. The problem has been funding that project. By Indiana law, government agencies can spend only \$12 million on any such building project without going to, in this case Hamilton County, with a referendum. In both the House and Senate, that law was changed in the recent session of the Indiana General Assembly and now the bill is on the desk of Governor Mike Pence, waiting for Pence to sign.

But, now, Commissioner Dillinger has thrown a curve ball when speaking to the Main Street group.

Dillinger's new plan is just in the "thinking stage" and he said he has not approached fellow commissioners Christine Altman and Mark Heirbrandt for support.

Extra space is needed in the Judicial Center in order to accommodate a growing court system in Hamilton County. Currently, there are seven courts working in the building.

"I'm changing my mind," Dillinger told The Hamilton County Reporter. "I'm concerned about keeping the look of the

building the same. I'm also concerned that there isn't enough space on the west side of the building and still allow us to tie into the River Walk and to do other things on the green space we have in that area."

What Dillinger, who represents the Noblesville district, wants to do is to expand across Conner Street to what currently is a Hamilton County parking facility.

"We could build a facility which would meet the needs of the surveyor, prosecutor's office and the clerk, thus allowing the courts to expand in the building they already occupy," Dillinger said.

### Winter not as bad on Hamilton County roads

Winter may have been rough on streets and roads, but probably not as bad on most Hamilton County roads as was the case in neighboring Marion County and some other areas of the state.

County Highway Director Brad Davis says the numerous freeze and thaw cycles made conditions a little worse than usual, but his department has been able to keep up reasonably well with patching the chuckholes that have developed.

The highway department is now looking toward its summer paving season when 50 to 60 miles of road surface will be improved. That will include up to 12 miles of contract reconstruction on Mill Creek Road from 161st Street to Ind. 32, 256th Street from DeVaney Road to Scherer Road, 241st from Ind. 19 to Overdorf and 96th Street west of the Hancock county line.

Another 45 miles of chip seal will be laid down at various locations on rural roads. Two more roundabouts are set to be built, one at Carrigan Road and Hague Road and another at 96th and Cumberland. And, the department will continue its replacement of "small structures" which means culverts and bridges of less than 20 feet in length.

The highway department has "a little more money this year" for its projects than last year, Davis said. About \$3 million will be spent of road surfaces and probably \$2 million on the roundabouts. The county is responsible for

Phyllis Reddick Manier, age 90, of Sheridan, passed away peacefully on Wednesday afternoon, April 29, 2015, at Wellbrooke of Westfield. Phyllis was born in Lebanon, Indiana on October 22, 1924, to the late Clarence B. and Edna Mae (Wills) Reddick, and was a proud graduate of Sheridan High School. On April 9, 1944, Phyllis would marry the love of her life, William E. “Bill” Manier. He preceded her in death on February 5, 1977. While her husband was serving in the Navy during WWII, Phyllis worked as an elevator operator for Raymond’s Department Store in Boston, Mass. After the war, Phyllis and Bill moved back to Sheridan to raise and be closer to their family. Phyllis was affectionately known as Mom when she was working at the Scoop and Scoot Restaurant in Sheridan. Later, she would work for Allison’s in Indianapolis and also work as a seamstress for Aero Drapery in Jolietville.

Phyllis was a very active member of the Sheridan community. She was a member of the Sheridan First Christian Church, where she was active in C.W.F. and taught Sunday school for many years. She served twice as President and once as the Chaplain for the K.V. Elliott American Legion Ladies Auxiliary. Giving back to the community was also a very important part of her life. Phyllis and her sister Virginia were both Charter Members and long time volunteers for MAMA’S Cupboard in Sheridan. Many in the Sheridan community might remember Phyllis on Election Day. She was a familiar fixture, working at Sheridan’s polling centers for over 30 years.

In Dillinger’s thought process he also sees other uses for the parking lot, joining with the City of Noblesville of Noblesville and also making the project a public/private venture.

“We could add a parking garage, offices, retail space and even condos along the river,” Dillinger said.

Dillinger suggested that a tunnel or an overpass bridge could connect the facility with the Judicial Center.

“The City (Noblesville) is talking about expanding its downtown west. This would be a great way to do so. Riverview (hospital) hasn’t decided on what it will do with its parking lot (on the east side), but all of this could tie in together” said Dillinger. “It would be a great idea for Riverview to build a parking garage, which would free up ground space for other things.”

A parking garage long has been discussed in Noblesville to help solve the parking problems in the downtown.

“I like what Commissioner Dillinger is thinking,” said Main Street President Perry Williams. “I would like to hear more details.”

Dillinger, at the Commissioners’ meeting earlier in the week, talked about other building needs.

“We have grown to a county of 300,000 population and we’re running out of space to put bodies. We need a county morgue,” Dillinger said. “Riverview is running out of space in its morgue and the new hospitals which have come into the county have not built morgues.”

Dillinger believes it would be a good idea to build a morgue at the Hamilton County Jail.

“It makes sense because of the security issue,” he said “There are times, for various reasons, why bodies need to be held by the County Coroner, and we’re running out of space.”

At the same Commissioners session Dillinger said the County has been approached by the City of Noblesville with the idea of building a new police station on land at the jail.

“I like the idea,” said Dillinger, “because it would allow us to share space for our detectives with the city’s detectives. Right now our detectives are located in the old jail (on the jail property). They don’t have the space they need.”

about 600 miles of roadways outside the county's cities and towns.

In addition, this year will see completion of another mile of dual lane 146th Street from Spring Mill west to Ditch Road, a project that is already underway. And, bids for a new bridge on 276 Street over Little Cicero Creek have been solicited.

Among the cities, Carmel got the jump on road work earlier this month with the repaving of Range Line Road and other streets in the near-downtown area. Noblesville is also gearing up for resurfacing on older streets in the inner city.

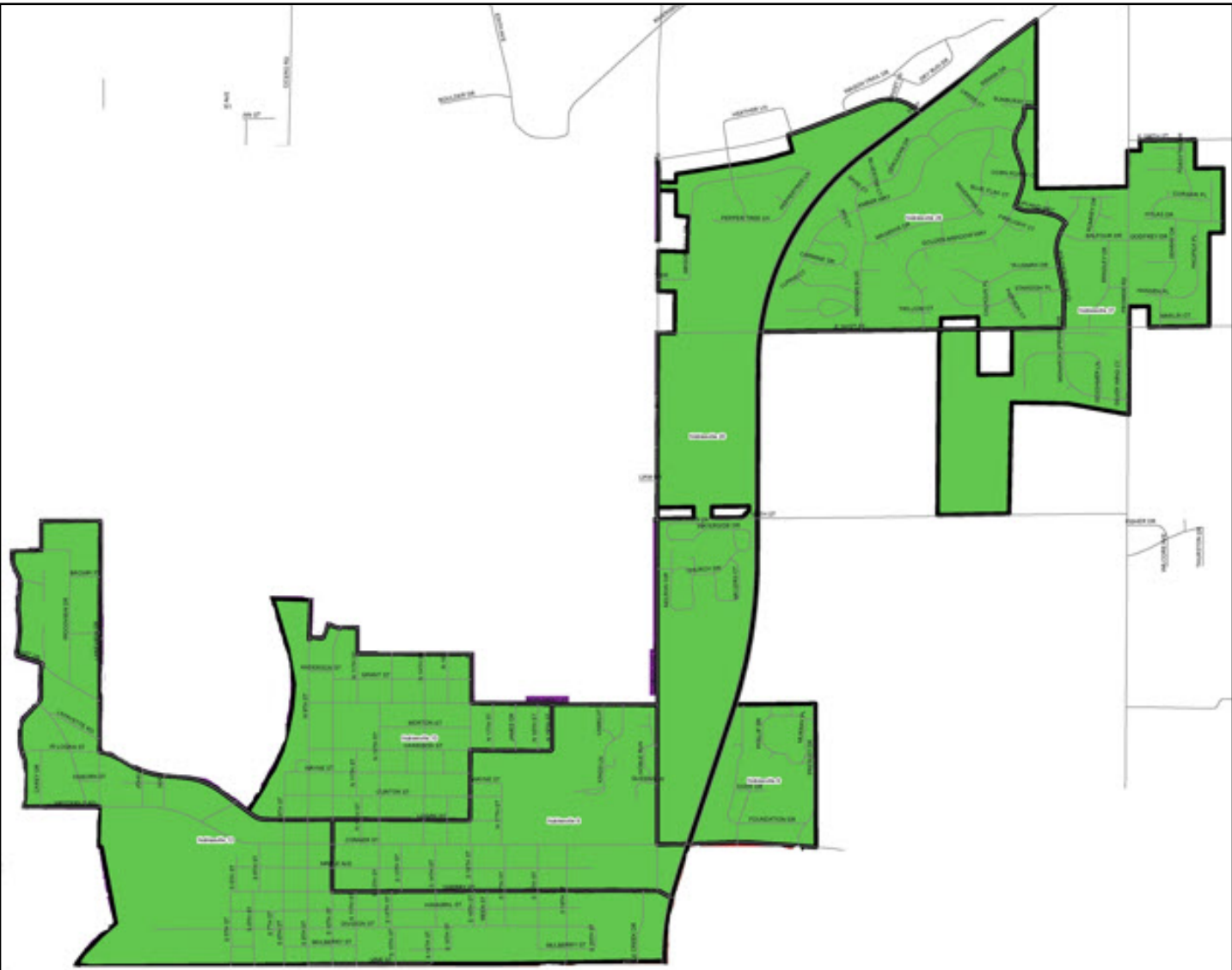

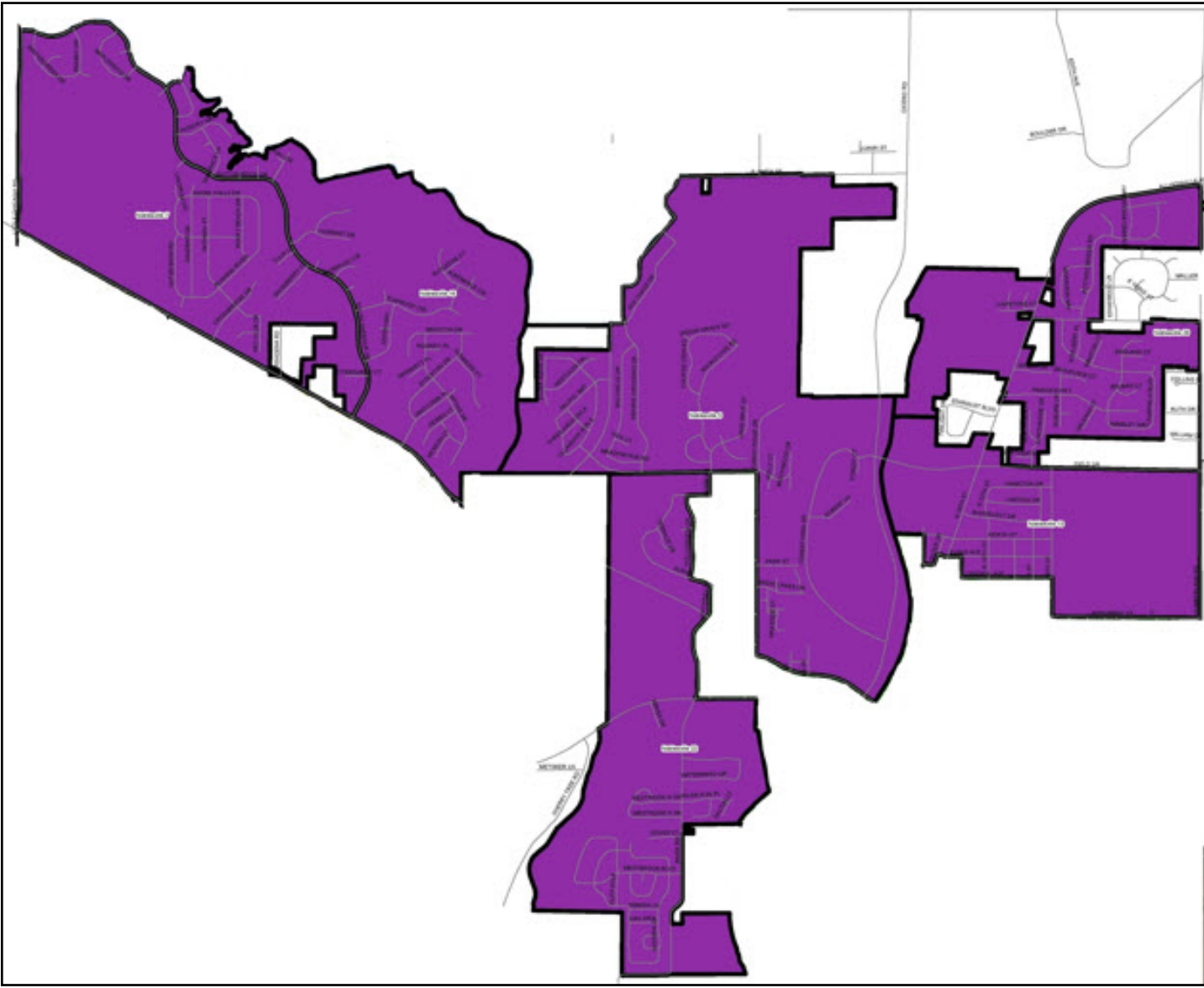

## House Republicans announce accomplished agenda

## Press Release

Speaker of the Indiana House of Representatives, Brian C. Bosma (R-Indianapolis), announced the end of session, or *Sine Die*, on Wednesday evening with many accomplished priorities for the House Republicans. The House Republican agenda, which was released in October, focused on four key categories: Budget Integrity, Education Funding, Ethics Reform and Public Safety.

House Republicans championed a two-year budget that is honestly balanced and does not increase taxes on Hoosiers or placing an unsustainable financial burden on future generations. The budget also protects Indiana's healthy reserves and strong structural surplus, which are both critical to maintaining Indiana's triple-A credit rating.

“Our state’s budget reflects our team’s core priorities. House Republicans have improved our state’s fiscal picture by con-

tinuing to adopt a budget that lives within our means. Because of this, we have been able to provide a record increase to K-12 education funding, while meeting our strategic investment objectives and maintaining our reserves, truly making our state the fiscal envy of the nation," said Speaker Bosma.

Nearly two-thirds of this year's biennial budget is devoted to Indiana's education system. In fact, by increasing K-12 appropriations by \$474 million, this budget contains the largest increase in K-12 education in the state's history. House Republicans also led and successfully passed legislation that provides teachers who purchase their own classroom supplies with a \$100 tax credit. Additionally, the House Republicans fixed the funding formula by substantially reducing the spending gap between the traditionally highest and lowest funded public schools.

“From the very beginning, I pledged that this would be the education session, and our legislative accomplishments reflect that. Providing teachers with a tax credit and substantially increasing our investment in education are just some of the many accomplishments to support our educators,” said Speaker Bosma.

House Republicans have a long track record of public accountability initiatives and added to that list this session. In a bipartisan effort, historic ethics reform legislation passed unanimously this session increasing accountability by strengthening reporting requirements and disclosure of conflicts of interest.

“We enacted unprecedented ethics reforms. It is my hope this will work to limit conflicts of interest and bolster the public trust,” said Speaker Bosma.

House Republicans also worked to address several public safety concerns includ-

ing domestic violence victim support, infant mortality reduction and criminal justice funding. Through the budget, House Republicans doubled funding for domestic violence prevention and treatment and dedicated \$59 million of new money over the biennium for investments in community corrections programming and capacity building. Additionally, the budget included a \$13.5 million appropriation to fund the Safety P.I.N. (Protecting Indiana's New-borns) grant program to reduce Indiana's incredibly high infant mortality rate.

"We pledged to address these critical issues this session and we have delivered. Through our commitment to fiscal integrity, education, ethics and public safety, we have made great achievements for Hoosiers," said Speaker Bosma.

# Westfield closes out first quarter with \$46.6 million in improvements

“These numbers only reinforce our strategy here in Westfield,” said Mayor Andy Cook. “Projects like Grand Park and Grand Junction Plaza, our world-class schools and high quality of life are attracting residents and businesses to invest in our community for the long haul. We are encouraged by our first quarter and expect to see more as we continue through the year.”


