Winter not as bad on Hamilton **County roads**

Winter may have been rough on streets and roads, out probably not as bad on most Hamilton County roads as was the case in neighboring Marion County and some other areas of the state.

> County Highway Director Brad Davis says the nu-

merous freeze and thaw cycles made conditions a little worse than usual, but his department has been able to keep up reasonably well with patching the chuckholes that have developed.

The highway department is now looking toward its summer paving season when 50 to 60 miles of road surface will be improved. That will include up to 12 miles of contract reconstruction on Mill Creek Road from 161st Street to Ind. 32, 256th Street from DeVaney Road to Scherer Road, 241st from Ind. 19 to Overdorf and 96th Street west of the Hancock county line.

Another 45 miles of chip seal will be laid down at various locations on rural roads. Two more roundabouts are set to be built, one at Carrigan Road and Hague Road and another at 96th and Cumberland. And, the department will continue its replacement of "small structures" which means culverts and bridges of less than 20 feet in length.

The highway department has "a little more money this year" for its projects than last year, Davis said. About \$3 million will be spent of road surfaces and probably \$2 million on the roundabouts. The county is responsible for

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
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



House Republicans announce accomplished agenda

Speaker of the Indiana House of Representatives, Brian C. Bosma (R-Indianapolis), announced the end of session, or *Sine* Die. on Wednesday evening with many accomplished priorities for the House Republicans. The House Republican agenda, which was released in October, focused on four key categories: Budget Integrity, Education Funding, Ethics Reform and Public Safety.

House Republicans championed a twoyear budget that is honestly balanced and does not increase taxes on Hoosiers or placing an unsustainable financial burden on future generations. The budget also protects Indiana's healthy reserves and strong structural surplus, which are both critical to maintaining Indiana's triple-A credit rating.

"Our state's budget reflects our team's core priorities. House Republicans have improved our state's fiscal picture by con-

tinuing to adopt a budget that lives within our means.
