NHS Walk for Water raises money and awareness

By accepting the challenge of a simple task, several Noblesville High School students had their eyes opened about the world's water crisis.

Those students participated in the NHS Walk for Water Thursday afternoon. The walk looked deceptively simple: Carry a five-gallon bucket from the high school on a 1.5 mile route to the White River, fill it with water, then carry it back to the school. As many of the walkers learned, five gallons of water actually weighs quite a bit - 42 pounds, according to information on the Walk

for Water Web site (nhs.walk-for-water.org)

"The walk was actually a lot more difficult than I thought it was going to be," said Brett Bell. The Noblesville sophomore was the event leader of NHS Walk for Water. "I can't imagine having to make that walk 2-3 times a day."

Brett learned about the water crisis and wanted to do something to help, which didn't surprise his mother Jackie - she said her son has "a servant's heart."

Brett, a student in the NHS Innovations class, decided to "bring a fundraiser to the students of Noblesville" to help residents in Kawiya, a village in western Kenya. Participants raised money for the walk, registered on Thursday afternoon, and then began making the three-mile round trip walk that took them to the river and back.

"I have always wanted to help Africa in some way because of how hard the people have it and they face problems daily that would usually never cross our minds, like where our next drink of water will come from," said Brett Bell. Indeed, the number of people without daily access to clean water numbers nearly a billion.

"The walk raised money for a great cause but it also let people experience a major problem in Africa and it made me, as well as others, not take our water for granted," said Bell.

The NHS Walk for Water raised around \$1,500, but donations are still being accepted for the next few weeks. Anyone who wishes to donate should visit nhs.walk-for-water.org, you will find a donation page, as well as information about the walk itself and the global water crisis.

"This event could definitely become a tradition at Noblesville High School," said Bell. "The walkers loved it and I would happily put it on again."

Manson Edmund Church
March 23, 1925 - April 26, 2015

Manson Edmund Church, 90, of Indianapolis, Indiana and Fort Myers, Florida, died on April 26th, 2015 in Fort Myers. Son of the late Rev. Dallas M. Church and Lorene Hughbanks Church, he is



survived by his wife of 66 years, Phyllis L. DuPouy Church, his two sons, David M. Church of Los Angeles and Daniel E. Church of Indianapolis and his grandson, Grant Church of Indianapolis. He is also survived by his sister, Mae Ellen Gale of Fishers and brother, Meredith Church, of Anderson, Indiana. His brothers Leonard and Dallas Eldon Church pre-deceased him.

Manson was born in Marion County, Indiana on March 23rd, 1925, graduated from Anderson High School in 1943, and was immediately inducted into the U.S. Army during WWII. He served in England and France and was discharged in 1946. He enrolled at Butler University and graduated in 1949 with an A.B. degree. He then entered the Indiana

University School of Law (Indianapolis) where he received a J.D. degree in 1952.

Manson was admitted to the practice of law in Indiana, the Federal District Court and the United States Supreme Court. He practiced law in Noblesville since 1952, initially with the law firm of Roberts & Roberts, which was established in 1880. The firm is presently known as Church Church Hittle & Antrim. Although he retired in 2002, he continued on with the firm in the role of “Of Counsel” until his death. His practice was primarily focused on probate, municipal government and municipal finance. Manson was a fellow of the American College of Trust and Estate Council, the Indiana State Bar Association, where he served on the Board of Managers and as the Chairman of the Probate, Trust and Real Property law sections, as well as the Hamilton County Bar Association. In addition, he served on the Indiana Probate Code and Study Commission for 14 years and was named a “Sagamore of the Wabash” for his contributions.

Manson was a member of the First United Methodist Church in Noblesville where he served on various boards. In addition, he was a member of the Columbia Club, Harbour Trees Golf Course, Cypress Lake Country Club, American Legion, and the Noblesville Elks Club. In 1956 Manson was named Noblesville’s “Man of the Year” by the Jaycees. There will be a calling at the Noblesville First United Methodist Church on Tuesday, May 12th at 10 a.m. with a service to be held at 11 a.m. A Celebration of Life will follow at the Harbour Trees Country Club.





Romero named Indians’ Player of the Month

Third baseman Deibinson Romero has been named the Indianapolis Indians’ Player of the Month for April. He was presented with the award – a custom-made watch courtesy of Windsor Jewelry – prior to tonight’s 7:05 p.m. home game against the Lehigh Valley IronPigs, Triple-A affiliate of the Philadelphia Phillies.

Romero projected as the top-rated free agent prior to the 2015 season and made his organization debut as one of the most dangerous power hitters in the International

League through the first month of the campaign. The 28 year old led the Indians and ranked tied for third in the IL with four homers, including two in one game on April 20 at Columbus, while producing the league’s second-best slugging percentage of .640. He was also one of only two Tribe batters to produce double-digit RBIs in April, and his team-high 14 runs driven in were good for a share of the third-best total during the season’s opening month.

“Deibinson made some nice adjustments toward the end of Spring Training in big league camp and he’s carried it into the season with him real well,” Indians hitting coach Butch Wynegar said. “He can use the whole field to hit, he’s got some power in his bat”

Beginning April 18, Romero hit safely in what still ranks as the Tribe’s current season-best hitting streak of eight straight games, through April 28. His produced four multi-hit and multi-RBI efforts during the

impressive stretch, and collected both a hit and at least one RBI in seven of those eight games.

The Dominican Republic native capped April with a .320 batting average (16-for-50), four doubles, four homers, 10 runs scored, 14 RBIs and 13 walks. He reached base safely in 15 of 17 games to rank second among International League hitters and 10th in all of Minor League baseball with his .463 on-base percentage.

As of May 2, Romero is batting .302 (16-for-53) with eight extra-base hits and 15 RBIs. He boasts a .437 OBP and is currently second in the league in slugging (.604).

Indians walk-off on Morel’s two-run single

Brent Morel delivered a game-winning, two-run single with the Indianapolis Indians down to their last out on Saturday night against the Lehigh Valley Iron Pigs. The comeback began in the fifth with the Tribe trailing 5-1, and Indianapolis chipped away at the lead before plating three runs in the ninth to walk-off, 6-5.

The first run of the bottom of the ninth scored when Tony Sanchez grounded out to third with the bases loaded. It moved runners to second and third base with two outs. Jose Tabata scored to tie the game on Morel’s single, and Lombardozzi was right behind him and crossed to clinch the end of the game.

Indianapolis (14-10) is now a season-high 4.0 games above the .500 mark, and extended their lead over the Columbus Clippers to 2.5 games for first place in the International League’s West division.

Bobby LaFramboise (1-0) worked a scoreless top of the ninth to get the win for the Tribe. Hector Neris (1-2) surrendered the lead and took the loss for the IronPigs (6-18).
