

Ditslear smashes record

The leader of the pack won another four-year term and a couple of young pups emerged as the new super stars of the Noblesville Republican party as the primary election in the city drew few surprises Tuesday evening.

Those who did go to the poll swept Mayor John Ditslear to a record fourth Corbett. In the last city election, Corbett challenged Ditslear in the general election

in November. This time Ditslear defeated Corbett in the primary, 58.38 percent to 41.62 percent.

"I'm flattered to be elected again," Ditslear told a crowd of family, friends and supporters early Tuesday evening. "We think we have done a great job for Nobles-It was another light year of voter turnout. ville and look forward to continuing to do great things.

The Jim Brainard Era continues in Carmel as the 20-year incumbent swept to victory yesterday in one of Indiana's most publicized city elections. He won 7,612 to 4,624 (with one precinct out) over his toughest challenger in six elections, Rick Sharp who gave up his city council seat to run for the top job.



ment was made by Blue-Sky Monday through a press release from the com-



"The new area will

feature the already approved Federal Hill Commons, which will provide walking trails, green space and an outdoor amphitheater, among its notable attributes. The City of Noblesville Economic Development Department, the mayor and the Chamber of Commerce are all looking for the park's amenities to attract commercial development and businesses to the area."

Groundbreaking, BlueSky said, is scheduled for the summer of 2015 and the project is slated for completion in the fall of 2016. BlueSky said it has committed to Indianapolis-based American Structurepoint and Fishers-based Meyer Najem for the design and construction of the estimated 40,000 square foot facility

In its appearance in front of the Common Council back in late February Irwin and Warne promised Noblesville that BlueSky would make its decision by the middle of March. At that time BlueSky was rumored to be in discussion with another Hamilton County community.

Noblesville man dies in tractor accident

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office is investigating the death of a Noblesville man after a farm accident on Sunday.

Deputies were dispatched to the 19300 block of Summer Road shortly before 6:00pm on Sunday on a report of a person who had been run over by a tractor. Jimmie J. Adams, age 76 of Noblesville, died from injuries sustained in the accident.

According to an initial investigation, Adams and another family member were servicing a tractor in a field and did not realize the tractor was in gear. When the tractor started, it began to move forward with no one driving. Adams attempted to climb aboard the tractor to bring it under control but slipped and fell in the path of the tractor. The tractor stopped after running over Adams and hitting other farm equipment in the field. Family members were able to assist Adams and call 911 at the scene.

Noblesville medics attempted to rescue Adams but he succumbed to extensive injuries before an air ambulance could transfer him to a medical facility.





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

The election will send Noblesville into a Second Class City in 2016. Nine, not seven, council seats will be filled. Mayor Ditslear will appoint a City Manager, a new position for Noblesville government. There will not be an elected clerk treasurer in the Noblesville government of 2016.

There were few surprises in a Common Council race which saw a pair if newcomers fill new seats and a veteran former councilperson and mayor returning to local gov-

Mary Sue Rowland, certainly one of the most known candidates for the three atlarge seats, drew 16.6 percent of the vote. The other two at-large members with be Mark Boice with 22.06 percent and Brian Ayer with 18.35 percent.

Incumbent Jeff Zeckel was beaten for an at-large seat as were Patrick Berghoff, Dave Johnson and Ray Ade. Berghoff was coming off serving on the Noblesville School Board.

A (current) school board member, Gary Duvall, was defeated by incumbent Rick Taylor in District 3.

Leading the Council ticket with 71.77 percent was political newcomer Christophr Jensen in District 2. Jensen and Boice could be the top candidates for major should Ditslear choose not to run for a fifth term in four years.

The return to the Council of Rowland is interesting, because the former mayor and the current major have had their disagreements during their political careers

A newcomer who won was Wil Hampton, beating out incumbent Steve Wood in District 4. The district produced a strong race among Hampton, Wood and another newcomer, Darren Peterson.

Other incumbents returning for another term are Roy Johnson in District 1 and unchallenged Gregory O'Connor in District 5.

In new District 6 Megan Wiles defeated Sean Brady, both running for a first time.


Caldwell, the Judge winning a tight battle over Trenna Parker. Paul Paclor was a distance third in the race.
