## Ditslear smashes record

The leader of the pack won another four-year term and a couple of young pups emerged as the new super stars of the Noblesville Republican party as the primary election in the city drew few surprises Tuesday evening.  
It was another light year of voter turnout. Those who did go to the poll swept Mayor John Ditslear to a record fourth term. For a second year in a row, Ditslear polled more votes than did challenger Mike Corbett. In the last city election, Corbett challenged Ditslear in the general election

in November. This time Ditslear defeated Corbett in the primary, 58.38 percent to 41.62 percent.  
"I'm flattered to be elected again," Ditslear told a crowd of family, friends and supporters early Tuesday evening. "We think we have done a great job for Noblesville and look forward to continuing to do great things."  
"I think we have done an above average job of building Noblesville's corporate campus and we've won some very compet-

## Brainard Era to continue

The Jim Brainard Era continues in Carmel as the 20-year incumbent swept to victory yesterday in one of Indiana's most publicized city elections. He won 7,612 to 4,624 (with one precinct out) over his toughest challenger in six elections, Rick Sharp who gave up his city council seat to run for the top job.  
Some said it would be a close race. It wasn't. Voters gave every indication they like Brainard's "build-it-and-they-will-come" approach to redeveloping downtown, building inspiring entertainment venues, scenic parks and, of course, more roundabouts than any community in America.  
And, better yet for the visionary mayor is the fact that he will have a friendlier city council next year. The current council has urged caution in spending and has blocked the mayor in efforts to move Carmel into second class city status. Such a move would eliminate the office of clerk-treasurer and enlarge the council to nine members from the current seven.  
With their votes Carmelites indicated the cost of all the city improvements doesn't frighten them. The city's debt, alleged to stand at nearly \$1 billion, was the only

major issue of the election. And with no claims of bad roads, high crime or high taxes, Brainard sailed to victory with 62 percent of the vote.  
The new city council will have six members who were Brainard choices, and a new clerk-treasurer, Christine Pauley, who will likely be the last to hold the office, also had the mayor's blessing. She defeated incumbent Diana Cordray, 6,133 to 5,287. City Court Judge Brian Poindexter was re-elected without opposition.  
Winning council seats in the Brainard landslide were incumbents Ron Carter, Kevin Rider and Sue Finkam. Three other Brainard allies Bruce Kimball, Laura Campbell and Jeff Worrell were also elected. One who did not have the mayor's support, Carol Schleif, an incumbent, won. All are Republicans and nearly certain of victory in November since no Democrats have shown interest in running. Carmel is overwhelmingly Republican.  
Money may not have made the difference in the election, but Brainard's \$247,000 war chest probably helped his slate of fellow candidates and also aided in getting out the vote, poor as it was. The elections office reported only about 14 percent of eligible voters went to the polls.

# The ‘Sky’ is ‘Blue’

## Council questions “how blue”

BlueSky Technology Partners, a leading e-Commerce and digital marketing consultancy, has announced it is relocating their U.S. corporate headquarters on the east side of Noblesville to the new Federal Hill District on the near west side.

The announcement was made by Blue-Sky Monday through a press release from the company.

“The Federal Hill District is being developed as part of a project that will incorporate the west side to downtown Noblesville and provide a year-round community that mixes fun and business,” the press release read. “The new area will

feature the already approved Federal Hill Commons, which will provide walking trails, green space and an outdoor amphitheater, among its notable attributes. The City of Noblesville Economic Development Department, the mayor and the Chamber of Commerce are all looking for the park’s amenities to attract commercial development and businesses to the area.”

Groundbreaking, BlueSky said, is scheduled for the summer of 2015 and the project is slated for completion in the fall of 2016. BlueSky said it has committed to Indianapolis-based American Structurepoint and Fishers-based Meyer Najem for the design and construction of the estimated 40,000 square foot facility

In January, several BlueSky employees participated in a “visioning session” with

American Structurepoint and Meyer Najem, which gave employees the opportunity to contribute ideas for the new office space.

“We’re very excited about this location for our new U.S. headquarters,” Todd Irwin BlueSky CEO, said in the press release. “Federal Hill Commons provides our company the green space and community aspects that we were seeking. Combine that with the walking access to downtown Noblesville and everything it has to offer, we feel the location is ideal.”

“We are experiencing tremendous growth and have quickly outgrown our current space,” Eric Warne, BlueSky COO, said. “Our plans for the new headquarters will accommodate our growth and provide our local employees, as well as our remote employees, with a modern workspace designed specifically for them. We believe the office and the area will foster collaboration and creativity across the entire organization, as well as assist us in our recruiting and relocation efforts to bring talent to the area.”

The announcement yesterday appears to have caught some members of the Noblesville Common Council off guard, the Hamilton County Reporter has learned.

A question asked is, why did it take BlueSky so long to announce its decision? In its appearance in front of the Common Council back in late February Irwin and Warne promised Noblesville that BlueSky would make its decision by the middle of March. At that time BlueSky was rumored to be in discussion with another Hamilton County community.

Has Noblesville sweetened the city’s offer since the February meeting to land BlueSky?

When BlueSky was contacted by the Hamilton County Reporter on Monday, media contact Terri Kershner said there actual-

ly had not been a delay and that Irwin and Warne had been traveling a lot.

Councilman Mark Boice told The Reporter late yesterday that the Council had approved the agreement presented at the February meeting and therefore the City could sign the agreement with BlueSky, but if any additions had been made since that time the Council will have to approve a new agreement.

“I don’t know if the City has signed or if any changes have been made,” Boice said. “We haven’t been told.”

“If the pot has been sweetened, I’m not sure it will pass,” Councilman Steve Wood told The Reporter.

“I would agree with that,” added Boice. Councilman Brian Ayer, who along with Councilman Rick Taylor were on vacation and missed a 5-0 vote in favor of the agreement in the February meeting, said he believes the final agreement will have to be brought to the Council at its next meeting (a week from today).

“I will want to see what is in that final agreement,” Ayer told The Reporter.

The City of Noblesville is investing approximately \$3.5 million in the project.

BlueSky wants a new office building and parking lot on land located on the southwest corner of John and Osborn streets on the west side of Noblesville. Under the proposal the City is offering, Noblesville will purchase the vacant parcel of land which contains approximately 1.5 acres. The real estate then will be conveyed to BlueSky for the construction of the building.

Noblesville City will design, permit and construct all improvements on the real estate necessary to accommodate construction of the building.

The proposed parking lot real estate and future parking on a lot north of Osborn Street will be conveyed to the company in a lease for a nominal amount.

The City will waive or pay all road impact fees and sewer tap-on fees.

“It’s expanding our downtown,” Mayor Ditslear told the Council at the February meeting. “It will bring growth to the downtown.”

The hill on which BlueSky will build, once a doctor’s office, has not been occupied in the last 25 years. Repeated attempts to sell the property have failed.

BlueSky has been voted the last five years as one of the best places to work in Indiana.

At the end of 2013, it was reported, BlueSky had 50 employees, 26 of which were located in Noblesville. In 2015 the company has grown to 85 employees with between 55 and 60 located in Noblesville. The company hopes to make its move in 2016 and at that time will employ between 100 and 110 employees, 70 to 75 here locally.

“The City of Noblesville has been very supportive of Blue-Sky since we opened our doors here,” Warne said in the press release. “In fact, they’ve demonstrated great vision that aligns to our aspirations as a company and we’re proud to be part of the Noblesville community. As a company we always strive to give back and be a partner to the community. We are hopeful our commitment to Noblesville and Federal Hill District will help spur economic development and bring similar types of companies to Noblesville.”

Mayor Ditslear commented through BlueSky’s press release.

“We are looking forward to the relocation and expansion of BlueSky, the mayor said. “Having them downtown is just the beginning of Noblesville’s attraction potential for Federal Hill Commons and BlueSky will be a catalyst to west side economic development. There is substantial growth within the information technology industry and award winning BlueSky Technology Partners is exactly the type of state-of-the-art company we want to see locate here.”

Noblesville’s investment is somewhat risky. BlueSky in February, 2014 opened a second office in Toronto, Canada. What, in the future would keep BlueSky from leaving Noblesville? At the February meeting, the two sides said they would be meeting to work on that agreement.

Hopefully, all will come together at the Common Council meeting next Tuesday.

# Noblesville man dies in tractor accident

The Hamilton County Sheriff’s Office is investigating the death of a Noblesville man after a farm accident on Sunday.

Deputies were dispatched to the 19300 block of Summer Road shortly before 6:00pm on Sunday on a report of a person who had been run over by a tractor. Jimmie J. Adams, age 76 of Noblesville, died from injuries sustained in the accident.

According to an initial investigation, Adams and another family member were servicing a tractor in a field and did not realize the tractor was in gear. When the tractor started, it began to move forward with no one driving. Adams attempted to climb aboard the tractor to bring it under control but slipped and fell in the path of the tractor. The tractor stopped after running over Adams and hitting other farm equipment in the field. Family members were able to assist Adams and call 911 at the scene.

Noblesville medics attempted to rescue Adams but he succumbed to extensive injuries before an air ambulance could transfer him to a medical facility.

## Closures of northbound US 31/SR 32 ramps begin today

Before today’s morning rush hour, crews plan to close the northbound US 31 exit ramp to SR 32 and the SR 32 entrance ramp to northbound US 31 to tie together the pavement for the new ramps.

Noteworthy changes as part of the US 31/SR 32 ramp closures include:

A new traffic signal added at 161st/Union streets. Crews will monitor this area regularly to make signal timing adjustments when necessary. Please note, traffic patterns will take up to a couple of weeks to stabilize in this area following the ramp closures, and again following the opening of the ramps.

Westfield Police will direct traffic during the evening rush hour at 161st Street/Oakridge Road.

The right lane of northbound US 31 will be closed just south of SR 32. This lane currently serves as the dedicated exit lane to SR 32.

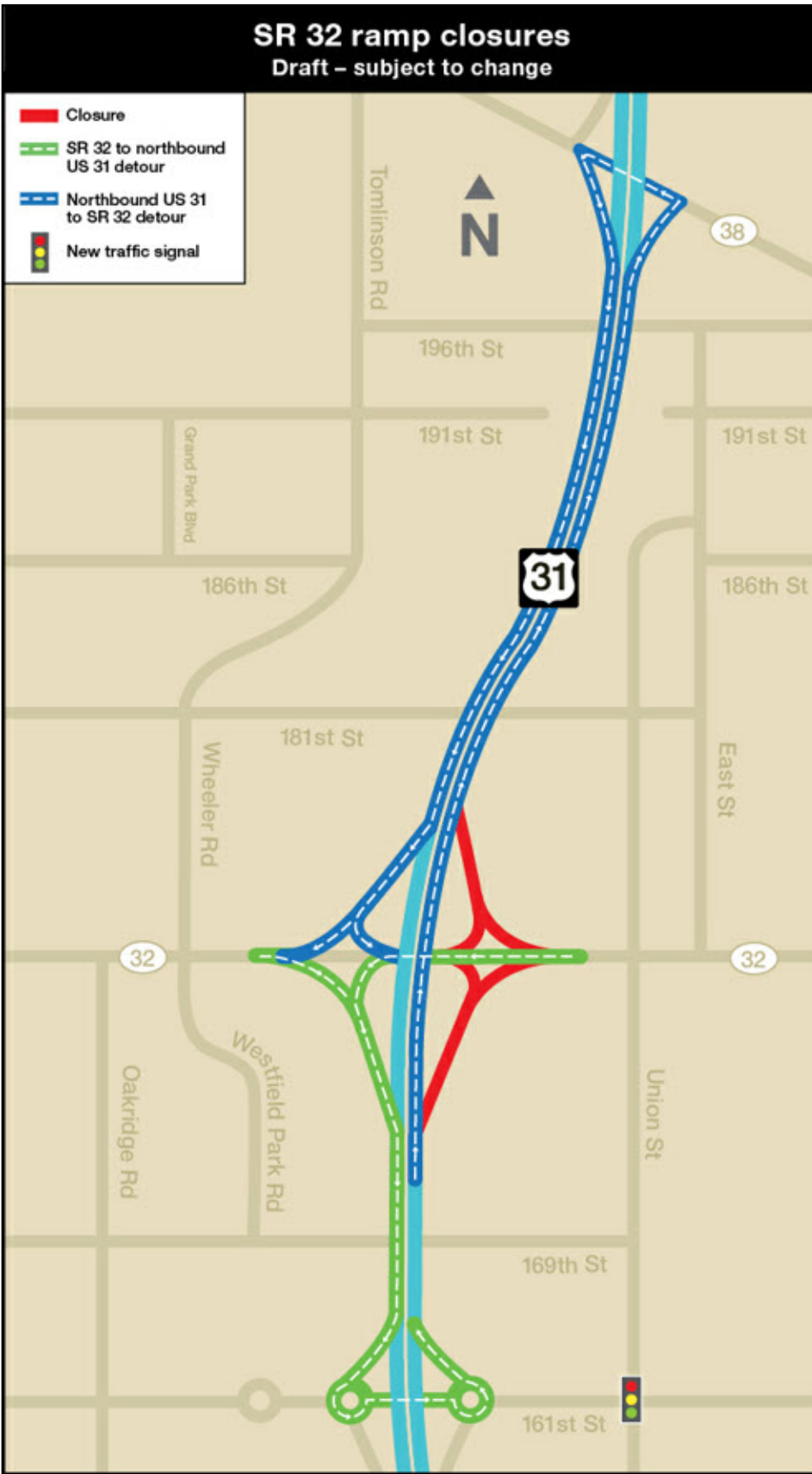
Eastbound/westbound lanes on SR 32 will be shifted to the north side of the road-

way. This is a minor change, with no impacts to access or lane capacity.

Crews anticipate opening the northbound US 31 exit ramp to SR 32 before Memorial Day (May 25), followed by the SR 32 entrance ramp to northbound US 31 about one week later. This schedule is subject to change, pending unforeseen circumstances, such as inclement weather.

Detour for northbound US 31 to SR 32 (noted in dark blue at right) - Motorists traveling northbound on US 31 must continue north to the interchange at SR 38, exit and reenter US 31 going southbound and take the exit from southbound US 31 to SR 32.

Detour for SR 32 to northbound US 31 (noted in green above) - Motorists traveling in either direction on SR 32 must enter US 31 headed southbound to the 161st Street interchange, exit and then reenter US 31 going northbound.

itive projects and hope to fill some of the still vacant land that exists.”

The election will send Noblesville into a Second Class City in 2016. Nine, not seven, council seats will be filled. Mayor Ditslear will appoint a City Manager, a new position for Noblesville government. There will not be an elected clerk treasurer in the Noblesville government of 2016.

There were few surprises in a Common Council race which saw a pair if newcomers fill new seats and a veteran former council-person and mayor returning to local government.

Mary Sue Rowland, certainly one of the most known candidates for the three at-large seats, drew 16.6 percent of the vote. The other two at-large members with be Mark Boice with 22.06 percent and Brian Ayer with 18.35 percent.

Incumbent Jeff Zeckel was beaten for an at-large seat as were Patrick Berghoff, Dave Johnson and Ray Ade. Berghoff was coming off serving on the Noblesville School Board.

A (current) school board member, Gary Duvall, was defeated by incumbent Rick Taylor in District 3.

Leading the Council ticket with 71.77 percent was political newcomer Christophr Jensen in District 2. Jensen and Boice could be the top candidates for major should Ditslear choose not to run for a fifth term in four years.

The return to the Council of Rowland is interesting, because the former mayor and the current major have had their disagreements during their political careers

A newcomer who won was Wil Hampton, beating out incumbent Steve Wood in District 4. The district produced a strong race among Hampton, Wood and another newcomer, Darren Peterson.

Other incumbents returning for another term are Roy Johnson in District 1 and unchallenged Gregory O'Connor in District 5.

In new District 6 Megan Wiles defeated Sean Brady, both running for a first time.

Noblesville voters also sent back to office Noblesville City Court Judge Greg

Caldwell, the Judge winning a tight battle over Trenna Parker. Paul Paclor was a distance third in the race.

Fishers Mayor Scot Fadness was unopposed. Westfield Mayor Andy Cook drew 60.96 percent of the votes while challenger Jeff Harpe picked up 39.04.

For Council seats at Westfield, Jim Ake and Cindy Spoljaric captured the two at-large seats. Westfield School Superintendent Mark Keen wasn't challenged in District 1; Steve Hoover won in District 2, Joe Edwards was the winner in District 3, Chuck Lehman won in District 4 and Robert Horkey won a close fight over Brian Ferguson in District 5.

The only race for a Town Council seat in Cicero was a close one, Christopher Lutz beating Brett Morrow by less than three percent.

There were two surprises in Sheridan, Darryl Waters unseating Brenda Bush in District 1 and Glen Bougher doing the same against Silas Devaney III in District 2.

A few big changes for county school...

# IHSAA releases new sectional groups

The IHSAA released its sectional assignments for class sports on Monday, and once again, the only thing constant is change.  
Even the sectionals involving Hamilton County's big schools will see a couple new

teams in most sports. Meanwhile, the smaller schools - they should be used to it by now - will be on the move once again.  
One sectional that didn't change is football Sectional 4, which involves the county's four Class 6A teams. Carmel, Fishers, Hamilton Southeastern and Noblesville will once again play in that sectional. In Class

5A, Westfield will continue to play in Sectional 11. There is one change in that group: Lafayette Jeff replaces Kokomo, which got moved to Sectional 12. The Bronchos dropped from 6A to 5A for this reclassification period. Harrison and McCutcheon also remain in Sectional 11.  
In Class 3A, Hamilton Heights and Guerin Catholic will no longer play in the same sectional. Both teams had been in Sectional 30, but both were moved into different groups. The Huskies are now in Sectional 28, with Benton Central, Crawfordsville, North Montgomery, Tipton, Twin Lakes, West Lafayette and Western Boone. Heights will also be in the north semi-state this period, after spending the past two years in the south.  
The Golden Eagles are still in the south semi-state, but this time will play in Sectional 29. Other teams in the sectional are Bishop Chatard, Brebeuf Jesuit, Danville, Greencastle, Northwest, Tri-West and West Vigo.  
Sheridan, a Class 1A stalwart, also got moved into the south semi-state. The Blackhawks will compete in Sectional 45, joining Covenant Christian, Fountain Central, North Vermillion, Riverton Parke, Rockville, South Putnam and Turkey Run.  
As for the other sports, the success factor has affected the groupings and the classifications of several county teams. This is especially true in the four-class sports (volleyball, basketball, baseball and softball), as the concept of every sport having the same sectional teams is no longer the case.  
In boys basketball, Class 4A Sectional 8 - the "local" sectional, will continue to have seven teams. The five big county schools (Carmel, Fishers, HSE, Noblesville and Westfield) are still there. But North Central and Zionsville have been moved out, and Anderson and Guerin Catholic have been moved in.  
The Golden Eagles' appearance in the sectional is not a surprise. Guerin earned enough success factor points to move up from its natural 3A class to 4A after winning state this year and a regional last year. Anderson, meanwhile, is not too far of a stretch to be added into the local sectional, as it is right next door to Hamilton County.  
Hamilton Heights - hold on to your hats! - is actually playing in the same sectional again, Class 3A Sectional 24. And with most of the same teams. Blackford, Delta and Yorktown will still be a part of the six-team sectional.  
Moving in to Sectional 24 are Marion (which drops from 4A) and Tipton (which moves up from 2A). Muncie Central and Muncie Southside are no longer in the group, as Southside was closed and consolidated into Central, which thus moved up to 4A.  
Sheridan is still in Class 2A, but got moved from Sectional 39 to Sectional 40 and will be in with a whole new cast of opponents. Sectional 40's other teams are

Frankton, Lapel, Monroe Central, Muncie Burris and Wapahani.  
University is staying in Class 1A Sectional 58, which drops to a seven-team sectional. Other teams are Bethesda Christian, Indiana School for the Deaf, International, Math & Science, Metropolitan and Tindley. Fall Creek was removed from the sectional; it is no longer an IHSAA school.  
The girls basketball sectionals are nearly the same as the boys. The only differences are in Sectional 8, which is six teams (Anderson, Carmel, Fishers, HSE, Noblesville and Westfield) and Sectional 24, which is seven teams (Delta, Guerin, Heights, Heritage Christian, Marion, Tipton and Yorktown). The Golden Eagle girls are playing in 3A, while Heritage was moved up from 2A due to the success factor.  
The volleyball sectionals are mostly the same as basketball. Sectional 8 mirrors the girls basketball group with six teams, while Sectional 24 is the girls basketball group minus Heritage Christian. In Sectional 40, Wes-Del is part of the basketball group, again another team moving up due to the success factor.  
Baseball is where things get tricky, as it is mostly the same teams with a couple changes. In Sectional 8, the five big county schools are joined by North Central instead of Anderson. In Sectional 24, Guerin Catholic and Heights are joined by Delta, Jay County, Tipton and Yorktown.  
Meanwhile, Sheridan will be playing baseball in 1A instead of 2A. The Blackhawks have been placed in Sectional 58, joining Bethesda Christian, ISD, Lutheran, Tindley and University.  
As for softball, the 4A and 3A sectionals involving county teams are the same as baseball. Sheridan softball is in 2A with Blackford, Eastbrook, Eastern, Elwood, Madison-Grant and Taylor. However, the Blackhawks are the lowest enrollment 2A school in the softball classifications, so if any 1A team moves up due to the success factor, Sheridan will be moved down to 1A.  
University softball is just like the other sports, in 1A Sectional 58. That group consists of five teams: Bethesda Christian, Emience, Indiana Deaf and Lutheran.  
Finally, there's soccer, which has two classes in both boys and girls. In Class 2A for the boys, Sectional 16 remains Anderson, Fishers, HSE, Noblesville and Pendleton Heights. In Sectional 17, Lebanon has been replaced by Guerin Catholic, which is now 2A enrollment-wise, although the back-to-back 1A state champion Golden Eagles would've been moved up by the success factor anyway.  
As for 1A soccer, Hamilton Heights remains in Sectional 46, with Anderson Prep, Liberty Christian, Muncie Burris and Wapahani. Sheridan was moved from Sectional 46 to Sectional 47, joining Heritage Christian, Broad Ripple, Park Tudor and University.  
In girls soccer, the county's 2A groups are the same as the boys. The 1A schools will compete in the same sectionals as last year, with a couple changes.  
Heights and Sheridan will continue in Sectional 40, which is now seven teams. The other schools are Eastern, Muncie Burris, Tipton, Tri-Central and Wapahani. Taylor has been moved to Sectional 39.  
University is staying in Sectional 42, which remains eight teams. Other schools are Bishop Chatard, Broad Ripple, Heritage Christian, Howe, International, Park Tudor and Seccina. International and Park Tudor replaced Herron and Lutheran.



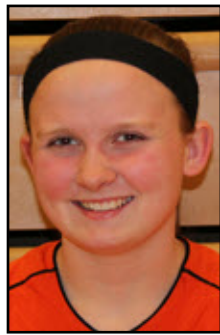
