## Two Purdue programs coming to Fishers

Two Purdue University programs have committed to calling the City of Fishers home. The Purdue University College of Pharmacy's Center for Medication Safety Advancement (CMSA) and Purdue Manufacturing Extension Partnership (MEP) have signed on to occupy the second floor of The Switch on Municipal Drive.

The Switch is a \$28 million dollar mixed-use project located in Fishers' Nickel Plate District. The project consists of office space, retail, a parking garage, and apartments. In addition, The Switch will be home to a new Transit Plaza and additional programming space for Fishers.

One of the keys for Purdue's move to Fishers was the transformation of the Nickel Plate District into an economic development catalyst with a focus on innovation and entrepreneurship.

"The Nickel Plate District was designed to attract innovative organizations and a talented workforce. Purdue's commitment to The Switch is a testament to the latest market-driven project in the area and we are thrilled to welcome them to Fishers," said Scott Fadness, Mayor, City of Fishers.

In 2010, through the generous support of the Lilly Endowment, the Purdue University College of Pharmacy

founded the Center for Medication Safety Advancement with the mission of making safe medication use common practice. Currently, there are over 1.5 million incidents per year in the United States where people are harmed unintentionally from medication use. CMSA strives to reduce these unfortunate events through discovering new practices and engaging with the community to spread the adoption of safe medication use practices.

"Throughout our existence, partnerships have been essential to the work we do. Identifying with others who

### Applications being accepted for Big Cicero Creek watershed funding

Jane Hardisty, State Conservationist for Indiana's USDA Natural Resources Conservationist for Indiana's USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) announced today that NRCS is accepting applications until June 19 to be considered for funding to improve two subwatersheds in the Big Cicero Creek Watershed.

NRCS is investing \$60,000 through the Mississippi River Basing Healthy Watersheds Initiative (MRBI) that will help improve water quality and strengthen agricultural operations. MRBI funding will be focused in the Prairie Creek and Tobin Ditch watersheds located in Tipton, Hamilton, Boone and Clinton counties.

"We are working with partners to encourage farmers to put in conservation practices in these two small watersheds because of water quality concerns," Hardisty said. "By targeting MRBI dollars to address critical resource concerns we can make a greater impact on the health of streams and lakes in the area."

MRBI funding comes from the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), to help farmers adopt conservation systems to improve water quality and habitat. Conservation systems implemented in these areas will reduce the amount of nutrients flowing from agricultural land into waterways, curb erosion and improve the resiliency of working lands in the face of droughts and floods. Cover crops are of particular interest because they address multiple resource concerns. Other core practices to address resource concerns in this area are: Conservation Crop Rotation, Conservation Cover, Critical Area Planting, Grassed Waterway Denitrifying Bioreactor, and Filter Strips.

"These conservation practices will help clean and conserve water, make agricultural operations more resilient, and stimulate rural economies," said Hardisty.

## Four hour search for suspect...

# Traffic stop on I-69 in Fishers leads to two arrests

Fishers police officers arrested a man and woman following a traffic stop and extensive area search along Interstate 69 Wednesday night.

Shortly after 7 p.m. a Fishers police officer stopped a vehicle, for a traffic violation, near the 211 mile marker of Interstate 69. During the stop one of the vehicle's four occupants exited and ran into a wooded area. The three remaining occupants were detained without incident.

Several officers from multiple agencies set a large perimeter and

began searching for the suspect. Three K-9 units and a police helicopter assisted in the search. After nearly four hours, officers located the suspect near the intersection of 141st Street and Cyntheanne Road. The suspect continued to resist and was apprehended by a police canine. The suspect, Nicholas Webb, 23, Indianapolis, was transported to Riverview Hospital for injuries sustained as a result of the canine apprehension. After being medically cleared the suspect was transported to the Hamilton County Jail and charged with the following: Probation Violation-Serious Violent Felon with a Handgun (Active Warrant), Unlawful Possession of a Firearm by a Serious Violent Felon, Theft of a Firearm, Resisting Law Enforcement (7 counts),

Synthetic Identity Deception and Carrying a Handgun without a Permit.

Fishers Chief of Police George Kehl would like to thank the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office, the Carmel Police Department, the Noblesville Police Department, the Indiana State Police, and the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department for their assistance in capturing this serious violent felon.

Officers also arrested a female occupant, Samantha Jackson, 23, Indianapolis after it was discovered she was in possession of a stolen gun. She was taken into custody without incident and transported to the Hamilton County Jail and charged with Theft of a Firearm and Carrying a Handgun without a Permit.

Hamilton County Surveyor Kenton C. Ward adds to the points Hardisty makes. "The Big Cicero Creek Drainage Board supports these practices in order to help minimize flooding within the watershed. The Board has identified such practices as two staged ditches, filter strips and cover corps as methods of reducing flood impacts."

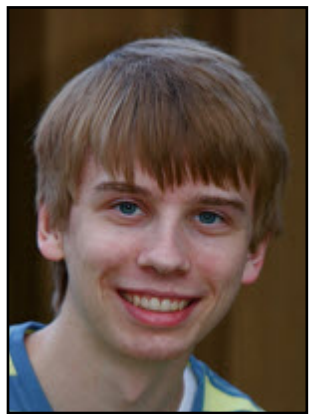

## Indiana agriculture report...

# Spring planting is in full force

A warm, dry week pushed spring planting in full force for most of the State during the week ending May 3, according to the USDA, NASS, Great Lakes Region. Sparse rain made fields accessible for corn and soybean spring planting. There were 4.7 days suitable for the week. Farmers made significant progress in fieldwork from the warm weather.

Regionally, winter wheat jointed was 40% complete in the North, 49% in Central, and 72% in the South. Winter

wheat has not yet headed in the North, but was 3% at that stage in Central Indiana and 5% in the South. By region, corn was 30% planted in the North, 13% in Central, and 19% in the South. By region, soybeans planted was 6% completed in the North, 4% in Central, and 2% in the South.

The warm temperatures stimulated wheat growth, pasture recovery and crop germination. Farmers took advantage of the excellent weather to get out into the fields to till

and plant. Ponding and flood areas are beginning to recede, although many fields in the central region of the state are still very wet. Pastures are looking lush and well, keeping the livestock healthy. Burn down of weeds and cover crops continued as the weather permitted. Other activities for the week included applying herbicides and fertilizer, tilling, and clearing fence rows.

## ISDA director adds responsibilities

Lt. Furthermore, we have an outstanding team

at ISDA which will maintain the highest levels of service and support to Indiana agriculture under his direction."

Victor Smith explained that Indiana's competitive business environment with business-friendly tax and regulatory policies is as important to agri-businesses as to any other industry. "These companies will make multi-million dollar investments in our state, either in expansion of current operations or in new facilities, which will be important to Indiana's economic strength. Ted's successful career in the agri-business world makes him an ideal representative for recruiting and expanding the presence of those companies in our state. We want to take full advantage of and even enhance the current relationship between the IEDC and ISDA in these efforts."

Accepting this added responsibility, Ted McKinney commented, "The agriculture industry has always been a vitally important economic engine for our state but there are even greater opportunities for growth and expansion. Major players in the agriculture industry have already invested in Indiana, and we know that others are looking here. I am looking forward to closing deals and finding new prospects that will invest in Indiana and create jobs for

Hoosiers. This is Indiana's time for agriculture development, and we want to show the world that Indiana is 'a State that Works for Agriculture.'"

Ted McKinney was appointed Director of the State Department of Agriculture and a member of Governor Pence's cabinet in January 2014. He is also on the Executive Committee of AgriNovus Indiana. McKinney grew up on a family farm in Tipton County. After graduating with a degree in Agriculture Economics from Purdue University where he was named Outstanding Male Graduate, he began a successful career with Elanco Products, DowElanco and Dow AgroSciences. Most recently he was Director, Global Corporate Affairs for Elanco Animal Health, a division of Eli Lilly and Company.

In addition to his professional career, Ted has held leadership positions in Indiana FFA and National FFA (formerly Future Farmers of America), the Indiana 4-H Foundation and the Purdue Agricultural Alumni Trust Fund. He led the effort to recruit the National FFA Center and national conventions to Indianapolis. He has also served on the State Fair Commission since 2005.

## NPD honors Patrolman Francis Castor

In recognition of National Police Week, the Noblesville Police Department would like to ask the community to take a few minutes to remember one of NPD's own, Patrolman Francis Castor.

On the evening of July 28, 1948 at approximately 8:30 p.m., the City of Noblesville and Noblesville Police

Department tragically lost one of their own in a motorcycle accident on the north side of Forest Park.

Patrolman Francis W. Castor, 28, was on duty at the time of the accident operating a department issued motorcycle. It is believed that Patrolman Castor was possibly chasing a speeding vehicle just prior to colliding into the rear of another automobile. Patrolman Castor was thrown from the motorcycle and suffered severe injuries to

his head and neck. Patrolman Castor passed away before arriving at the hospital. The speeding vehicle was never located.

Patrolman Castor was hired by the Noblesville Police Department on July 16, 1948. He had only been with the department for 12 days prior to his death. Patrolman Castor was buried in the Prairie Baptist Cemetery and he left behind a wife, Mrs. Mildred (Lavelly) Castor; his mother, Mrs. Effle Castor and six sisters. The couple had no children of their own.

Prior to joining the Noblesville Police Department, Patrolman Castor served three years with the 13th Air Force, serving in Africa and the India, Burma, China theater. The City of Noblesville and the Noblesville Police Department honor the memory of Patrolman Castor each year on National Peace Officer's Memorial Day (May 15) and throughout National Police Week (May 10-16). Patrolman Castor's name is inscribed on the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Wall located in Washington, DC on Panel 26E, Line 8.

# Close battles are expected tonight

Expect a battle to the finish in both the girls and the boys competitions at tonight's Hamilton County Track and Field meet.

The annual event takes place at Carmel Stadium, and begins at 5:30 p.m. The Greyhounds are in the running as they try to defend the boys championship and get past perennial winner Hamilton Southeastern in the girls meet, where Fishers will be in the mix as well. All three have the depth and the stars to win the trophy. In addition, Noblesville and Westfield will have a number of contending athletes.

The Royals have the top seed in the 3200 run, with Courtney Pfanstiel coming in a with a seed time of 11:11.55. That's right ahead of Carmel's Anna Schmitz, who is seeded at 11:11.66. Meanwhile, Rachel Nichwitz is the defending champion in the 1600 run, winning last year in record time of 4:56.0. She could challenge that record again, along with top seed Haley Harris, who comes in with a seed time of 4:56.35.

Harris is one of seven top seeds for Carmel. The others are Rachel Dixon (400 dash), Jessie Cowen (300 hurdles), Maddie Dalton (800 run), Jill Sutton (high jump) and the Greyhounds' 4x400 relay and 4x800 relay teams.

Meanwhile, the Tigers have six top seeds as well. That includes defending long jump champion Lexi Smith. Freshman sensation India Johnson is seeded first in the 200 dash, while the Tigers' 4x100 relay team is also a top seed.

Another defending Tigers champion is Blake Inglis, who won the shot put last year. This year, Inglis is seeded second to her teammate Katie Thompson, who also is the first seed in the discus. Emily Fletchall is the pole vault's top seed.

Westfield's Karen Hubbard is a top-seeded defending champion, returning in the 100 dash. Macey Policka has a top seed for Hamilton Heights, in the 100 hurdles.

In the boys meet, Carmel and Southeastern will be battling in the team competition, with Noblesville, Fishers and Westfield not too far behind. The individual events are spread around when it comes to defending champions and top seeds.

The Greyhounds have top seeds in five events: Ben Veatch in the 1600 run, Jalen Walker in the 300 hurdles, defending champion Vince Laconi in the shot put and Car-

mel's 4x400 and 4x800 relay teams. Veatch won the 3200 run last year, but isn't running this year.

Noblesville and Hamilton Heights share a top seed in the 100 dash, as the Millers' Jake Owens and the Huskies' Michael Defoe each have a seed time of 11.00 in the

event. Both are seeded in other events: Owens is the top seed in both the 200 and 400 dashes, while Defoe leads the 110 hurdles list. Noblesville has a fourth top seed in Eric Ferguson, who leads the discus.

Southeastern's top seeds are Jordan Wright in the 800 and three great field event

performers: Francis Ehigbai in the high jump, Ethan Bray in the pole vault and Tiger Guillory in the long jump.

Fishers is seeded first in the 4x100 relay, while Westfield has the top seed in the 3200 run, in Aaron Bennett.

## Breaking Down The Boys

**Boys 4x800 Relay:** Carmel has the best seed time at 7:59.87 with a stable which includes James Pescio, Andrew Rigsbee Jimmy Snyder, Kenji Tomozawa, Teddy Browning, Spencer Gudgel, Crayson Jenkins and Ben Veatch. Southeastern and Guerin Catholic are tied for second-best at 8:15.00. The meet record is a 7:53.35 by Carmel in 2011.

**100 Dash:** This should be quite a battle between Noblesville's Jake Owens (11.00) and Hamilton Heights' Michael Defoe (11.0). The meet record, set in 1982, is a 10.80 by Carmel's Bill Davis.

**110 Hurdles:** Hamilton Heights' Michael Defoe has a county best of 14.20 and Southeastern's Aaron Brown is second at 14.92. Defoe was fifth last season. The record of 14.32 was set in 2010 by Southeastern's Jeremiah Wright.

**200 Dash:** Top two seed times are a 22.33 by Noblesville Jake Owens and a 22.54 by Guerin Catholic's Nick Sarpa. Owens won last year in 22.51. The meet record of 21.71 was set by Hamilton Heights' Zac Bardonner in 1998.

**1600 Run:** A Carmel runner leads the field, Ben Veatch at 4:15.33. Southeastern's Jordan Wright has the second fastest tie at 4:20.00. The meet record is a good one, a 4:10.13 by Carmel's Chris Walden in 2011.

**4x100 Relay:** The best seed time is a 42.99 by Fishers, with Tres Carver, Jeremy Chinn, Jontel Hackett, Jordan

Hernandez, Josh Lloyd, Roosevelt Potts, Noah Rogers and Princeton Rush in the Tigers' stable. Carmel is second-best with a 43.01. The county record is 42.47 by Carmel in 2007.

**400 Dash:** This one could be a fight between Noblesville's Jake Owens a 49.11 and Fishers' Josh Lloyd at 49.50. The meet record of 48.84 was established by Ryan Davis in 2013. Owens is the defending champion with a 50.12 his junior season last spring.

**300 Hurdles:** Top two seed times are owned by Carmel's Jalen Walker at 39.37 and Southeastern's Aaron Brown at 40.14. The record is a sizzling 37.02 by Zach Reitzeg back in 2013. Walker finished third last season.

**800 Run:** Southeastern's Jordan Wright has a 1:55.18 and Westfield's Alec Hartman has been clocked at 1:56.50. Wright was fourth last season. The runnerup last season, Guerin Catholic's Christopher Bluish, has a 1:58.00 this season. The record of 1:54.30 was set in 1985 by Carmel's Mark Rodholm.

**3200 Run:** Westfield's Aaron Bennett has the county's best time at 9:48.40 and Fishers' Josh Roth has been clocked at 9:41.0. Carmel's Ben Veatch is the defending champion but isn't entered in the event. He won as a sophomore. Carmel's Bill Shuey set the county record with a 9:03.30 in 1980.

**4x400 Relay:** The fastest time this season is Carmel's 3:21.96. Greyhound runners available are Nic Ash, Teddy

Browning, James Griffin, Jalen Walker, Spencer Gudgel, James Pescio, Andrew Rigsbee and Ben Veatch. Second-best clocking is owned by Noblesville, a 3:24.00. The 3:16.45 county record was set by Southeastern in 2013.

**High Jump:** Southeastern's Francis Ehigbai has cleared 6-8 and teammate Devin Lloyd has jumped 6-7. Todd Beyerlein of Carmel set the record at 7-0 in 1996.

**Pole Vault:** Southeastern's Ethan Bray has been 15-0 and Carmel's Ryan Lipe has vaulted 14-4. Bray, as a sophomore, broke the county record with a 14-6 vault last season. Lipe, as a freshman, was third with a 13-0 vault.

**Long Jump:** The best leap this season has been a 23-9 by Southeastern's Tiger Guillory. Carmel's Isaac James has leaped 22-9 and Fishers' Tres Carver has jumped 22-8. The county record is a 23-1.75 in 2007 by Brandon Leap-Hall.

**Discus:** Noblesville's Eric Ferguson has a 154-4 sling and Hamilton Heights' Joe Boser is second at 153-9. Boser was sixth and Ferguson ninth last season. The county record is 191-8 by Carmel's Langston Newton in 2012.

**Shot Put:** Best toss this season has been a 60-5 heave by Carmel's Vince Laconi. That is better than the county record of 58-8 by Tyler Hiatt in 2008. Laconi is the defending champion, having won with a 57-8 toss. Second best heave this season is by another Greyhound, Jake Herr at 54-0.

**4x800 Relay:** Carmel (9:29.05) has a 12-second better seed time over second place Noblesville (9:41.0). Eight Lady Greyhounds...Diana Gorin, Haley Harris Megan Kress, Samantha Miller Hannah Blystone, Maddie Dalton, Kelsey Harris, Alex Waples. Meet record of 9:17.85 set by Carmel's Bennett, Chitwood, Kahre and Gibson in 2011.

**100 Dash:** Junior Karen Hubbard, the defending champion, is the favorite with a 12:32 season-best. Top challengers appear to be Fishers' India Johnson (12.45) and Guerin Catholic's Cassidy Lindley (12.47). Hubbard could challenge 1993 meet record of 12.50, set by Hamilton Heights' Alicia Bundy. Hubbard won as a sophomore with a 12.54 clocking.

**100 Hurdles:** Macey Policka, now a sophomore, was second last year to sensational Hamilton Heights teammate Sierra Brown. Policka has the best seed time going in (15.60). Only other hurdler in the 15's is Southeastern's Meghann Cullen (15.99). The meet record is 14.94, set by Southeastern's Portia Bailey in 2007.

**200 Dash:** This one could be close with four choices, India Johnson of Fishers (25.44), Camille Christopher of Southeastern (25.63), Karen Hubbard of Westfield (25.77) and Lily Hess of Guerin Catholic (25.81). Johnson was fifth as a

freshman last year. Meet record is 25.57, set in 2004 by Westfield's Hilary McEwen.

**1600 Run:** Carmel's Haley Harris is the leader of the pack with a 4:56.35 seed time. Closest are Southeastern's Rachel Nichwitz at 5:04.78 and Carmel's Maddie Dalton at 5:09.80. Nichwitz, as a junior, set a meet record of 4:56.0 last year and defeated Harris as a junior (4:58.30) last year. This could be one of the evening's best races.

**4x100 Relay:** This could be a Battle of the Mudsock between Fishers' 48.47 seed best and Southeastern's 48.88. Fishers' foursome will come from India Johnson, Danielle Harrison, Brooklyn Banks, Paris Carver, Salynda Berndt, Maryna Clark, Brianna Grace and Toni Grace. **300 Hurdles:** The only hurdlers close to Carmel's Jessie Cowen (46.75) are Hamilton Heights' Macey Policka (47.50) and Carmel teammate Alexandra Schultz (47.95). Noblesville Deja Cox, as a

sophomore, was the county champ last year at 46.96 and Alexandra placed third. Cox is not entered in the event this time. Carmel's Mary Steffel set the county record at a quick 46.67 in 2000.

**800 Run:** The best two seed times are held by a pair of Carmel runners, Maddie Dalton at 2:20.01 and Kelsey Harris at 2:20.61. Southeastern's Rachel Nichwitz has been clocked at 2:20.65. Nichwitz was second and Kelsey Harris third last season. Last year's champ, Carmel's Haley Harris, has been clocked at 2:15.40. She is listed as an alternate.

**3200 Run:** Entering the action tonight, Southeastern's Courtney Pfanstiel has an 11:11.55; Carmel's Anna Schmitz an 11:11.66 and Carmel's Stacy Morozov an 11:12.17. Morozov was second last season in 11:05.66. Carmel's Renee Wellman set the record at 10:44.18 in 2012.

**4x400 Relay:** Carmel has the best seed time with a 4:03.38 and Fishers is second at 4:03.66. Carmel's stable includes Rachel Dixon, Haley Harris, Kelsey Harris, Megan Kress, Maddie Dalton, Samantha Miller, Alexandra Schultz and Sydney Scott. Fishers lists Danielle Harrison, Maryna Clark, Paris Carver, Allie Harris, Kennedie Rush, Stephanie Wicker and Toni Grace. The meet record of 3:57.97 was set for Carmel in 2003.

**High Jump:** Carmel's Jill Sutton has cleared 5-4 and Fishers' Sydney Street and Southeastern's Sydney Encinas 5-3. Sutton, as a junior, cleared 5-2 and placed fourth last season. The record is 5-7 by Cori Werling in 1993.

**Pole Vault:** Fishers' Emily Fletchall has an 11-9 and Noblesville's Dilan Palmer has cleared 10-6. Fletchall was second with an 11-0 vault last year. The record of 12-1 was established by Rachel Mather in 2013.

**Long Jump:** Defending champion Lexi Smith of Fishers won with an 18-4 jump last season. She has a county's best 17-8.75 and teammate Adrianna Murphy has jumped 17-5. Smith broke the county record last season.

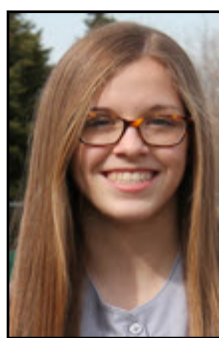

Team manager Charles Crews explained the thinking behind the JTC. "Last year, Ricardo and I developed a long-term strategic plan for the team. The plan is to slowly expand into desirable racing series while remaining focused on the current ones. Creating a technical center for all of our programs to be based in one central location was key."

sion welcomed us with arms wide open and we are thankful to be part of such a renaissance within Speedway."

Most recently, Juncos Racing claimed the 2014 Pro Mazda Championship presented by Cooper Tires. The team currently includes two Indy Lights drivers and four Pro Mazda drivers.

According to Doug Boles, Indianapolis Motor Speedway president, "Professional auto racing in central Indiana is a major economic driver that stretches well beyond the hospitality and tourism industry. Racing teams like Juncos Racing provide quality jobs and add to our community pride and image. I have known the team at Juncos

Racing for several years and watched as they have grown to become one of the sport's best and brightest and we are thankful they have chosen to invest in Speedway and we look forward to watching them continue to excel for years to come."

"I'm sure the Juncos Racing headquarters will become a landmark to visit on Speedway's Main Street," said David Lindsey, president of the Speedway Town Council.
