Conner Prairie Civil War Days are May 16-17

Thousands of guests from throughout Indiana and neighboring states will be immersed in the Civil War era May 16-17 as more than 500 re-enactors will help transform Conner Prairie into the 1860s Union and Confederate camps for the weekend.

Conner Prairie's annual Civil War Days runs from 10 a.m.-5 p.m. both days. Guests will be immersed in life as it was on the Hoosier homefront during the Civil War

and can interact with soldiers, march in the infantry, study battle tactics with soldiers, help doctors at field hospitals, witness artillery and cavalry demonstrations and watch a daily battle between the North and the South at 2:30 p.m. each day.

During the two-day event, Prairietown is transformed into 1863 and guests can learn about Union and Confederate camp life, battle tactics, foods of the time, technologies used during wartime, medicine and how artillery of the time worked. Guests can witness the firing of an authentic Civil War-era cannon and fire an authentic rifle. President Abraham Lincoln will be on hand to talk about his presidency and what

it was like leading the country during the Civil War.

New this year, short plays will be performed each day depicting the women who served in uniform, the effect that the war had on free blacks in Indiana and how spies decoded and deciphered intercepted messages.

Warrants issued for Fishers robbery suspects

For the past three months, Detectives with the Fishers Police Department have been working closely with the Fort Wayne Police Department to identify the suspect(s) in the robbery of the Fishers' Kroger Pharmacy on March 3.

Recently, arrests warrants for three suspects were issued by Hamilton County Superior Court. Two of the suspects are currently being held in the Allen County Jail. They are Jared B. Burkhart, 27, and Jacob S. Burkhart, 21, both of Huntertown. They are both charged with Robbery Level 5 Felony and Theft, a Class A Misdemeanor. They will be transported to Hamilton County after facing charges in Allen County.

The third suspect has been arrested and has bonded out of the Hamilton County Jail. He is Charles D. Walter, 23, of Fort Wayne, and faces the same charges as the other two suspects.

Several county companies on Best Places to Work list

Hoosier companies from throughout the state with stellar workplace practices were recognized tonight at the JW Marriott in downtown Indianapolis. Uncertain future for Bolden's

Bolden's, the longtime downtown Noblesville dry cleaners, has been closed since suffering a fire March 26. Some customers of the business at 151 N. 8th Street say they have been unable to learn the status of clothing items in the building at the time of the fire.

In the days after the fire phone calls were answered with a recorded message saying the future of the business was in the hands of the company's insurance agents and lawyers. More recently phone calls are answered by voice mail which says there is no one available and the caller may leave a message.

The longtime, locally owned cleaners has been located in its present building for more than 20 years and was a staple business for many years previous to that on the Courthouse Square.

The building appears intact with little evidence of any structural damage since the fire six weeks ago. Fire Department inspector Todd Estes says his investigation is complete. He ruled the fire as accidental, originating around an electrical box in the ceiling.

Damage, although hard to establish, was estimated at \$200,000 and will depend on cost of equipment plus smoke and water damage to the contents of the area. The matter has been turned over to Bolden's insurance company which will conduct their own investigation.

There has been no announcement of when the business will re-open. Attempts to locate the insurance agent have so far been unsuccessful. Estes said he did not have a contact for the insurance company.

One feature attraction each day will be a 15-minute play titled “The Right to Fight: African American Pioneers in the Civil War,” presented in partnership with Asante Children's Theater. Throughout the day in Featherston Barn, the play portrays life on the Roberts Settlement, the first mixed-raced settlement in Hamilton County in 1863. The families of the Roberts Settlement have survived the journey from inhospitable North Carolina and built successful farmsteads in Indiana and the Civil War may jeopardize the current lives they live.

Civil War Days are free to Conner Prairie members and with paid general admission to Conner Prairie. Admission is \$16 for adults, \$15 for seniors, \$11 for youth ages 2-10 and free for children ages 2 and under. For more, visit connerprairie.org.

-Medium companies' category (between 75 and 249 U.S. employees): Project Lead The Way, Inc., a non-profit education organization headquartered in Indianapolis

-Large companies' category (between 250 and 999 U.S. employees): Sikich LLP of Indianapolis, an accounting, advisory, technology and managed services group

-Major companies' category (1,000 or more U.S. employees): Edward Jones, an investment firm with 457 branch offices throughout the state

For Sikich this marks the third straight year to finish number one. It's also a return to the top spot for both Edwards Jones (last time was 2008) and E-gineering (2011).

Free workshop on pond shoreline enhancement

On Saturday June 13, the Hamilton County Soil and Water Conservation District is partnering with the Hamilton County Urban Conservation Association, Hoosier Aquatic Management, and the Indiana Native Plant and Wildflower Society to host a "Shoreline Enhancement Workshop" at Ridgefield Subdivision in Fishers.

There are over 1,000 neighborhood stormwater ponds in Hamilton County and many are plagued by issues such as erosion, algae blooms, Canadian Geese infestations, and high maintenance costs. This free workshop will cover how shoreline vegetation and native plants can help decrease or eliminate these concerns. An installation demonstration will be given by Hoosier Aquatic Management and Dan McCord, a resident of Ridgefield Subdivision will guide attendees through the process his neighbored under-

took to improve their common areas and ponds. He will discuss challenges and management as well as the significant maintenance cost reductions Ridgefield has seen from their investment in their ponds. Attendees will have the opportunity to view the established plantings at Ridgefield to get a better vision of what is possible in their communities. Claire Lane of the Hamilton County Soil and Water Conservation District will discuss free assistance that is available to interested individuals and communities as well as financial assistance options to get projects started.

This workshop will take place at 9AM on Saturday, June 13 at Ridgefield Subdivision in Fishers (From HW 37 go east on 131st St. and turn right on Promise Road. Make immediate right onto Alamosa Drive) is free and open to

Numerous records broken...

Tiger girls win first-ever team trophy, Carmel boys defend

Yes, it's still possible to make history at a track and field meet that has lasted for over 100 years.

Just ask Fishers. The Tigers' girls team won its first ever Hamilton County Track and Field Meet, which took place Friday at Carmel Stadium. Fishers dominated the field events and got solid performances from its runners as well, getting ahead of Carmel 139-128. Defending champion Hamilton Southeastern placed third and Noblesville was fourth.

Meanwhile, the host Greyhounds defended their boys championship by a comfortable margin, with Carmel outscoring the runner-up Royals 156-140. Fishers and Noblesville tied for third; the Millers were led by an outstanding performance from sprinter Jake Owens.

The Lady Tigers proved that the field portion of track and field is just as important as what happens on the track. Fishers scored 65 of its points in the field events, including four of five victories.

Sydney Street placed first in the high jump, Emily Fletchall won the pole vault, Alexxus Smith defended her long jump championship by a quarter of an inch, and Blake Inglis was the shot put winner - also by a quarter inch.

"Our field events were phenomenal tonight," said Tigers coach Andrew Belloli.

The Tigers picked up a fifth win by taking the 4x100 relay. Paris Carver, Brooklyn Banks, Danielle Harrison, and newcomer India Johnson finished in a new county record time of 48.57, over two-and-a-half seconds ahead of second place.

Carmel, as usual, excelled in the middle to long distance events. Rachel Dixon finished the 400 dash first, Kelsey Harris won the 800 run, Stacy Morozov cruised to victory in the 3200 run, and the Greyhounds' 4x400 relay team of Haley Harris, Kelsey Harris, Megan Kress and Dixon won that race as well. Natalie Cotherman won the discus, the only non-Fishers athlete to win in the field.

Westfield's Karen Hubbard made some history of her own, as she won two events in record-setting time. Hubbard won the

100 dash in a new county record of 12.39, then later easily won the 200 dash, setting a new mark of 25.47. Both times, the veteran Hubbard - she's a junior - beat out Fishers freshman Johnson, who has established herself as an exciting new track star.

Another double winner was Hamilton Heights' Macey Policka, who swept to wins in the 100 and 300 hurdles. Policka received the girls top point scorer award at the end of the meet.

Southeastern's Rachel Nichwitz defended her title in the 1600 run. Noblesville's 4x800 relay team of Abby Crouch, Megan Line, Abi Little and Susanna Sharples-Gordon won that race, edging Carmel by exactly one second.

MORE HISTORY FOR THE BOYS

The girls had a great meet, but the boys wouldn't be outdone. They broke four records at the meet.

One of those records was broken by Noblesville's Jake Owens, who had a spectacular night. Owens won four events.

First, the senior won the 100 dash, by .06 seconds. Next up was the 400, which Owens won in new record time of 48.56.

Rather than tire, Owens poured it on in the 200 dash, winning that race by over seven-tenths of a second.

Owens saved his best for last, as part of a 4x400 Miller relay team that ended the night with a win. Owens joined Dontay Wells, Joel Taylor and Jack Lang to get the victory.

The Greyhounds won four events, and showed their versatility in those wins. The 4x100 team of Jalen Walker, Isaac James, Collin Pearson and Ryan Stoebick set a new record in finishing first, with a time of 42.43.

Walker was back on the track soon after, and scored a comfortable victory in the 300 hurdles. This was all after Ben Veatch won the 1600 run. Out in the field, Vince Laconi continued his great performance in the shot put, winning that event by over six feet.

Carmel coach Ken Browner said that getting through the meet healthy was the big thing, and the Greyhounds did that.

"We ran some kids in some off events, and they competed well," said Browner. The coach said his team is "just trying to get ourselves set up for the state tournament run," which begins in less than two weeks with the sectional.

Runner-up HSE won four events as well. Ben Wagoner cruised to the 3200 run championship, winning by almost nine seconds. The Royals had a great field event night: Francis Ehigbai and Devin Lloyd finished 1-2 in the high jump, Tiger Guillory won the long jump with a new record leap of 23-3.5, and Ethan Bray defended his pole vault crown by breaking his own record - an astonishing 16-3.

Noblesville wound up with the most individual wins. Four of those went to Owens, but Eric Ferguson got the Millers a fifth by winning the discus.

Fishers started the meet with a 4x800 relay victory, with Nick Butler, Jake Kleist, Tristan Strobel and Peter Werling getting the win. Westfield's Alec Hartman finished first in the 800, while Heights' Michael Defoe won the 110 hurdles.

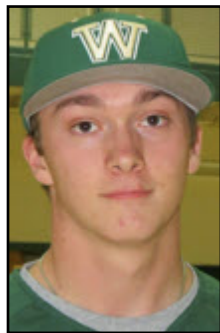
Beam, Ayers triple....

Is Sumpter moving to boys ranks?

If rumors that Shane Sumpter, coach of Westfield's Lady Shamrock basketball for the last seven years, is resigning to accept another coaching position are true, Sumpter may not need to call Mayflower. His new position isn't that far away.

Sumpter, if rumors are true, will move just down the hall at Westfield and become the school's head boys basketball coach, a position Eric Rauch recently left after coaching the Shamrocks the last six seasons.

The Hamilton County Reporter has not been able to confirm the rumor. Westfield athletic director Bill Davis has said that the new coach will be named next Tuesday at a school board meeting. Sumpter has been unavailable for comments.

In the girls program, Sumpter has compiled a 122-36 record in his seven seasons at Westfield. Overall, he has coached girls

basketball eight years and has a 137-48 mark.

Sumpter has won two sectional championships while coaching the Lady Shamrocks.

His record at Westfield includes seasons of 16-7, 17-4, 21-3, 14-9, 17-5, 21-3 and 16-5.

Sumpter came to Westfield one year earlier than the now-departed Rauch. In the last six seasons, the Shamrocks have just two winning records, 13-9 in Rauch's first year and 11-10 two years later.

A graduate of Frankton High School and Anderson University, Sumpter began his coaching career as a girls basketball assistant for three seasons at Frankton. He then was a boys basketball assistant for one season at Westfield before moving to Anderson as a boys basketball assistant for six seasons.

Sumpter then moved back to the girls game, becoming the Anderson girls head coach for one season, compiling a 15-10 record and sharing the North Central Conference championship. In 2008-09 he became the Westfield girls coach and since that time has led the Lady Shamrocks to seven consecutive winning seasons.
