


tle of his life. In a four-person race, which included Jim Crask and Susan Jennings, Redick defeated Rex Dillinger by 10 votes. No, your eyes aren't playing tricks. That's 10 votes. Redick had 1,594 votes and the primary election of 2007. Ditslear, was Dillinger 1,584. That's Rex Dillinger, not unopposed for mayor. And, in just four Steve. Rex Dillinger did not ask for a recount, so, as normal, Redick was all set to in Steve Wood, Mark Boice, Roy Johnson and November to be elected to a second term.

But, between the primary in May and the general election in November, Redick was arrested on an alcohol-related charge while attending a concert at Deer Creek Music Center.

That opened the door in the general election. Ditslear, as an independent, put his hat in the circle as did Democrat Karen Goldstein and independent Larry Snair. In November, the battle was fought between Redick the incumbent mayor, and Ditslear, whose only government service to this time was serving on the Noblesville School

Ditslear blew away Redick, capturing 3,504 votes to the Mayor's 1,874.

The Republicans were shocked. Well, many of them were shocked. You have to think several Republicans voted for Ditslear in the general election.

The Republicans put on a good face. "Dennis Redick was a good mayor,"

said Lee Ann Cook, Chairman of the Re- his third run for mayor, the primary of publican Party. "We need to get the Party back together."

That is what the Republicans did, just four years later when Ditslear ran for a second term, this time as a Republican.

That, too, was an interesting election, the position to stack the deck, a little.

Ditslear endorsed political newcomers Greg O'Connor. You may have heard about this foursome. All won that year and all four won election on the Republican ticket in the recently completed primary.

Wood ran against Alan Hinds, who had served 16 years on the Council. Boice defeated Katie Stretch, running for a second term. The big shocker, if you will, was Johnson's victory over Busby, who had served a record 25 years on the Council. O'Connor ran unopposed. Laurie Jackson, after 16 years on the Council, decided not

Wood, Boice, Johnson and O'Connor joined newcomers Brian Ayer, Mary Sue Rowland and Dale Snelling when the new Council was seated in 2008. It was the first time since 1980 that all seven members of the Council were new.

When Ditslear became mayor in 2008, he became the first sitting mayor to return since Joe Butler in 1968.

Ditslear had a Democratic opponent in 2011. He received 73.7 percent of the votes and defeated Steve Brown.

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

> Evaluate Social Security options. Under this strategy, her spouse, upon reaching full retirement age, files for retirement benefits and then immediately requests to have those benefits suspended. As a result. your mother can file for spousal benefits, which would be larger than what she would receive at her full retirement age. 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
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He is a comfort for the brokenhearted mother

"Behold, children are a heritage from the LORD, The fruit of the womb is a reward" Psalms 127:3 (NKJV). Children of all ages are a blessing to their mothers and while there is no greater joy than that of bringing a human life into the world for many moms the maternal heart breaks and the soul

sinks as the sun rises on Mother's day. The pain from the loss of a child to the world, to death, to separation of whatever sort can easily eclipse any joy that occupied the heart. I can't even begin to fathom how Eve, the mother of humanity's first child born to man and woman, must have felt. Cain fathered a city (Gen 4:17) but did Eve ever see her wandering son again, how about the grandchildren, "the crown of the aged" (Prov 17:6 ESV), how she must have longed, dare I say ached, to hold them. Eve lost children both to death and to the world.

There seems to be a growing trend of adult children abandoning their mothers, cutting off all contact without explanation for whatever perceived wrong making no explanation at the charge leveled against the perceived offence. It is not the natural order of things for a child to abandon all relationship with his or her parents. 'Therefore shall a man leave his father and his mother, and shall cleave unto his wife" (Gen 2:24), and a daughter will leave and become one with her husband. However there was meant to be a balance between leaving and cleaving and honoring your parents. There is a story, a parable, of a rebellious son – a son gone wild with the ways of the world. The story never makes mention of Mother Prodigal but I take license with the theme of the story and ponder; oh how her heart must of broke. wonderfully made", knit together in the comprehension she is forced to accept the the broken hearted! When He is lifted up in fact that no answer would come, not that any answer would disperse the pain of the afflicted mother's crippled heart and spirit. I am convinced that just as the father watched eagerly for the sons return, Mother Prodigal was right there with him wringing her hands and in constant prayer to The *Father* for her child – the blessing that was the fruit of her womb. How she must have grieved for the one who counts her as dead. Yes there was a second son. Just as loved as the other, but one with a differing countenance. The comfort of another child's presence to the mother of a prodigal leads me to wonder, do we take for granted the loyal ones whom we love so dearly with a love no less precious and no less in measure then that of the love for the estranged or capricious one. The love we have for our children is overpowering! In pain and suffering may we never overlook the love that is right in front of us! There was a happy ending to this parable with the restoration of the lost child back into the family. Burdened with shame the son returns to find and learn of the unconditional love and forgiveness of a parent – an example of God's grace for the repentant sinner! And in God's grace he is never far from us in our pain. Weak and unable to change the circumstances thrust upon us we can rely on His unfailing love. We can call on Him, "The righteous cry out, and the LORD hears" (Psalms 34:17), He "is near to those who have a broken heart" (Psalms 34:18). He that numbers the stars and calls them by name; He heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds (Psalms 147:3-4). His word says the Lord is at hand and if we go to Him in prayer, with thanksgiving, the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard our hearts and minds through Jesus (Phil 4:5-7). And when you don't know what to pray anymore, when the words won't come and when there are no more words left to describe the pain nor the supplication, rest assured the Spirit indwelled within you will make intercession for you before the throne of God (Rom 8:26). Are you a burdened and afflicted mother, then praise Him. "Those who seek Him will praise the LORD. Let your heart live forever" Psalms 22:26 (NKJV)! As He is raised high so is the spirit that is bound with Him through the sacrifice



Power dominates for Grand Prix victory

From a crazy start to a smooth finish, Will Power had everything under control Saturday at the Indianapolis Motor Speed-

Power won the Angie's List Grand Prix of Indianapolis, negotiating his No. 1 Verizon Team Penske Chevrolet around the 14-turn, 2.439-mile IMS road course effortlessly to win the second staging of the Grand Prix. The Australian led 65 of 82 laps and won by 1.5023 seconds over Graham Rahal, who raced in the No. 15 Steak 'n Shake Honda of Rahal Letterman Lanigan Racing. Juan Pablo Montoya, the 2000 Indianapolis 500 champion who made a solid return to the Speedway last year, finished third.

The race started off somewhat dicey, as five cars came into contact with each other right in Turn 1. Helio Castroneves and James Hinchliffe were able to keep going, while Scott Dixon, Jack Hawksworth and Josef Newgarden received assistance but were able to get back on the

But nothing perturbed Power, as he sailed along at an average speed of 116.842 mph. At one point he led runnerup Rahal by four seconds. During the last 14 laps of the race, Power's lead fluctuated from anywhere between 1.4 and 2.4 seconds. Everything went right for the Aus-

tralian, who regained the lead from Charlie Kimball on Lap 63 and held it to the finish.

"We did everything we needed to do to win," said Power.

The race-opening caution lasted two laps, and that was the only yellow flag of

Power led wire-to-wire, and everyone else in the top five moved up. Rahal started 17th, while Montova began the race fourth. Sebastian Bourdais finished fourth, up from a seventh-place start, while Charlie Kimball went from 14th at the green flag to fifth at the checkered flag.

Rahal was encouraged by his strong finish. He led nine laps of the race.


