Preliminary Resolution for IDI Expansion

The Noblesville Common Council has approved the preliminary resolution designating an economic revitalization area for Industrial Dielectrics, Inc., 407 S. Seventh St., Noblesville.

"Industrial Dielectrics, Inc. is a longstanding business in Noblesville and it is great to see them continue to grow and add to the economic development within the city," Mayor John Ditslear said.

The facility expansion will be a capital investment of \$300,000 and will include an additional 175 square feet in the entry area and some conversion work within the building. Total capital investment for this project will be approximately \$1.3 million. Personal property capital investment is estimated at \$1 million.

"Once again, Industrial Dielectrics, Inc. has chosen downtown Noblesville to expand here through the purchase of personal property for research and development. They have several locations across the world and they could put this anywhere they are located," Economic Development Director Judi Johnson said. Gilliam was born and raised in Noblesville. He was a 1970 graduate of Noblesville High School and graduated from Wabash College in 1974 with a degree in economics. Gilliam started working for Noblesville Fire on Feb. 16 during his final semester at Wabash.

While they may be new to their positions, two of them aren't new to the school. Shane Sumpter will switch to the head coach of the boys basketball team after seven highly successful seasons as the head coach of the Shamrocks' girls basketball

Sumpter coached the Westfield girls for seven years, compiling a 122-36 record. He also guided the

ers into overdrive for spring planting during the week ending May 10, according to the USDA, NASS, Great Lakes Region. Spotty soybean fields while the weather was warm, rains and warm temperatures were conducive to seed germination and plant growth. Most of the rain fell in the Northern region of the state, while the central and southern regions experienced minimal amounts of rainfall. Temperatures were above average throughout the state, keeping the soil moisture adequate for farming equipment. Days suitable for fieldwork remained at 4.7 this Regionally, winter wheat jointed week. was 63% complete in the North, 74% in Central, and 83% in the South. Winter wheat was 2% headed in the North, 13% in Central and 27% in the South. By region, corn was 56% planted in the North, 47% in Central, and 58% in the South. By region,

Temperatures increased, pushing farm- corn was 12% emerged in the North, 8% in Central, and 14% in the South.

> Farmers continued to plant corn and prior to the rainy weather towards the end of the week. Warm temperatures throughout the state led to quicker emergence in planted fields. Vegetable fields are also beginning to emerge. Winter wheat conditions have improved and are growing well. Hay is growing quickly and pasture fields are lush and in good condition. Rains towards the end of the week led to some ponding in fields and muddy conditions for livestock. Herbicide applications have begun for weed control. Other activities for the week included tilling, applying fertilizer and pesticides, clearing fences, and hauling grain.

Fishers releases proposal request

The City of Fishers Redevelopment Commission (FRC) announced a call for applicants to submit a plan for acquisition and development of a parcel on Lantern Road in the Nickel Plate District. The parcel is currently owned by the City of Fishers and will be transferred to the FRC as part of the plan to continue the redevelopment of downtown Fishers.

"The RFP continues the next phase of redevelopment in the Nickel Plate District," said Tom Dickey, Fishers' Director of Community Development. "The time is right for a shift in redevelopment efforts, and our strategy has set the stage for smaller-scale, private opportunities in the heart of Fishers."

The .46 acre parcel is located at 11671 Lantern Road, and the FRC will consider any proposals that further the goals and policies of the redevelopment and economic development initiatives for the Nickel Plate District, including a mixed-use development with commercial and residential uses. Proposal responses should be submitted no later than noon (EST) on Friday, June 12, 2015.

City officials are requesting a construction schedule along with the proposal that includes a completion date by the spring of 2016. For more information or for a copy of the RFP, please visit www.fishers.in.us

As part of the resolution, the common council has approved the location as an economic revitalization area eligible for a four-year tax phase-in for its \$1 million personal property investment. Subject to the adoption of a confirmatory resolution, the tax phase-in allows 100 percent of the assessed value of the personal property to be deducted the first year and 25 percent less each of the following three years.

During those four years, the city will earn an estimated \$17,809 of net property taxes and the developer will save approximately \$33,191. In exchange, IDI will create one new job and retain 98 employees with an average wage of \$68,890 with benefits.

May 12 was the preliminary resolution, which is the introduction to an economic development project and lays out the initial request for approval with council. Because the "first look" resolution was passed, a public hearing and confirmatory resolution will be held at the next council meeting on May 26.

"The fire actually occurred on my duty day but went through the night to the next day when I was supposed to be taking this exam. I went and told the professor and he said, 'I've never heard that excuse before, it's got to be true so I'll let you take it."

Recalling his early years, Gilliam said being a fire fighter and its demands were different than today.

'You were on call every day of your life. If you even went out of town on your day off, you had to call in and say 'I'll be out of town,' because since there were only 13 of us everybody had to show up to every fire. We didn't get overtime in those days, if you got called in it was just part of the deal. We didn't have quite as many runs compared to today, but every run you had you went on so we were actually quite busy," he said.

When Gilliam became fire chief in 1993, Noblesville had three fire stations. Because of a change in city leader-

James Andrew "Jim" Perry, Sr. September 3, 1919 - May 9, 2015

James Andrew "Jim" Perry, Sr., 95, Anderson, passed into eternal rest with our



heavenly Father on Saturday, May 9, 2015. His devoted wife of 40 years, Helen Louise, preceded him in death in 1984 and welcomed him to heaven.

He was born on September 3, 1919, in Anderson, Indiana to Lewis "Andy" and Bertha (Osborne) Perry.

Jim was very proud to have served this country from 1941 to 1945 in the U. S. Army's 128 th Anti-Aircraft Battalion out of Fort Bliss, Texas. He met his sweetheart, Helen Godbehere, while stationed in Galveston, Texas and spent the early days of their marriage overseas, as part of General Patton's Third Army. His European Tour included landing on Utah Beach in the Normandy Campaign and

advancing through Northern France, Rhineland, and Central Europe. He later wrote that the most horrid destruction he saw was an Auschwitz Concentration camp after U.S. soldiers had taken control, freed the captives, and were burying the dead in trenches. Upon returning home to the States, Jim and Helen settled in Anderson where Jim learned the water well drilling trade from his father and later formed Perry Well Drilling, which his two sons continue to operate.

Jim was an avid fisherman. With his family, he traveled from the beaches in Galveston to most of the fresh water lakes in the states between Florida, Texas, and Indiana, trying his hand at catching that "big one." Jim and Helen had a lake cottage in northern Indiana where the family spent almost every summer weekend fishing, boating, and enjoying the outdoors.

After retiring, Jim followed in his parent's footsteps, living in Florida during the winter months, fishing on Lake Okeechobee.

He was a member of Bethel United Methodist church; a lifetime member of the Indiana Groundwater Association; Lapel American Legion Post 202; and the Aqua Bassmasters.

As a great father and role model for his five children, he taught them responsibility, the value of hard work, a love of nature, and of course, how to fish. He never tired of "just one more cast."

He is survived by five children, James Andrew (wife, Barb) Perry, Jr., Steven E. (wife, Vicky) Perry, Shirley Perry all of Anderson, Janice Perry and Mary Helen Hicks both of Houston, TX; twenty-two grandchildren, twenty-five great-grandchildren; a sister, Donna Smith of Alexandria; and numerous nieces, nephews, and extended family members in Indiana and Texas.

He was preceded in death by his parents; his first wife, Helen Louise (Godbehere) Perry; his second wife of 14 years, Helen Campbell Perry; three brothers, William, Willard, and Rhue Perry; and a sister, Marybelle Perry.

James Perry was truly a man who knew no strangers. He will be greatly missed by all who knew him and loved him.

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

JOINS INDIANS

Clayton Richard, a former Indiana Mr. Baseball and Mr. Football from Lafayette, Indiana, has officially been activated on the Indianapolis Indians' roster as of Tuesday afternoon. The left-handed pitcher is the Tribe's probable starting pitcher tomorrow - Wednesday, May 13 - for the finale of a three-game series in Pawtucket at 12:05 p.m.

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Richard is slated for his first appearance at Victory Field as the Indians' starting pitcher on Monday, May 18.

Tomorrow's start against the Triple-A Red Sox will mark Richard's first career appearance with the Indians and his second overall outing of the 2015 season. He originally debuted on May 7 for the Bradenton (Fla.) Marauders, where he struck out five over six innings with no earned runs for the Hi-A Minor League affiliate of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

A two-sport standout at McCutcheon High School, Richard was the first athlete in Indiana to be named both Mr. Football (2002) and Mr. Baseball (2003). He played both sports collegiately at the University of Michigan before being selected by the Chicago White Sox in the eighth round of the 2005 MLB Draft (245th overall).

The southpaw's decorated stint in the minors featured an All-Star Futures Game selection and praise from Baseball America as the White Sox's No. 5 prospect and as possessing the "Best Control" in the International League in 2008. Richard made his Major League debut with Chicago during the 2008 campaign, and after pitching in 39 games (22 starts) with the White Sox from 2008-09, was acquired by the San Diego Padres as part of a package deal for former Cy Young Award winner Jake Peavy at the trade deadline in 2009.

Richard owns a career record of 46-47 with a 4.33 ERA and 480 strikeouts in 147 MLB appearances (129 starts) between the White Sox (2008-09) and Padres (2009-13). He established a career high in innings pitched (218 2/3) and matched his personal bests in wins (14) and starts (33) during his last full season in the Majors with the Padres in 2012.

In addition, Richard has also posted a 30-33 record with a 3.37 ERA and 323 strikeouts in 90 career Minor League appearances (86 starts).


