It's another feather in the hat for the



Mavor John Ditslear's city administration. Land-BlueSky Technology is a big deal for the City of Noblesville. A real big deal as Noblesville attempts to build its near west side, the area along

White River.

Some have talked about improving the "gateway" to Noblesville. I've never seen it that way. After all, how many "gateways" can a city have? To me, it's an area of the city just waiting for an explosion. The land on which BlueSky will be built is becoming more and more valuable because of the river; because of the Federal Hill District; because of the valuable land owned by Riverview Health on the east side of the hospital. And, now, because of BlueSky.

BlueSky isn't a new company moving into Noblesville. It currently is located in a much smaller area on Stony Creek Way on the south side of the city. This is the facility BlueSky will move to the west side.

Noblesville City Attorney Mike Howard was a big voice in convincing BlueSky to stay here. He was a big voice in convincing seven members of the Noblesville Common Council on Tuesday evening that it's a good move for Noblesville to approve a \$3.4 million incen-

Mayor John Ditslear has announced that Noblesville resident and Hamilton County Judge Steve Nation will serve as the grand marshal for the 2015 Noblesville Fourth of July Parade.

"For more than 30 years, Judge Nation has been a well-respected member of the community that has impacted and improved Noblesville. I am pleased to honor the work Judge Nation has done for the city and Hamilton County, and acknowledge how he and his family continue to be excellent role models to Noblesville residents through their continued service to local families and children," Ditslear said.

The Honorable Steve Nation has been serving Hamilton County continuously since 1979 and has been a Noblesville resident since 1977.

"When there are people in our community in need, I have always enjoyed working with others to get those needs satisfied. It has always been important to me that the people are helped, not who gets credit for the accomplishment," Nation said. "I appreciate this honor, and I accept it for all the people I've worked with in the public to help better the community, I'm riding for them."

Nation graduated from Cathedral High School in 1968 and Indiana University in 1972 with a bachelor's degree in political science. After graduating from IU School of Law-Indianapolis in 1975 he began practicing law in Indiana. Nation began serving the public as deputy prosecutor in Hamilton County for two years. In 1979, Nation started his first of four terms as prosecutor and worked in that role until 1995. Nation then began his first term as Hamilton Superior Court No. 1 judge and has been in that position ever since.

"My first real efforts in Hamilton County were in 1974 and 1975. I was an intern and prosecuted more than 120 cases before I ever even graduated from law school," Nation said.

tive package to keep BlueSky in our backyard.

Mike Corbett, running against Ditslear in last week's primary election, challenged Ditslear on the BlueSky deal. But, in today's world, especially so here in Hamilton County, even your good neighbors will try to make backyard deals. Noblesville had to out bid other communities, and that's what Ditslear was able to accomplish on Election Eve.

Ditslear talked, and campaigned for, BlueSky being the door which will open up the west side. He proved his point to BlueSky. He proved his point to a current seven-member Council which, arguably, is a more friendly Council than the nine-member body which will take office in January. And, again arguably, the Mayor proved the point to the voters.

BlueSky Technoogy Partners is a leading e-Commerce and digital marketing consultancy which also has offices in Canada. It's headed by a couple of top-notch people in Todd Irwin and Eric Warne. They appear to be the type of business owners who will be good partners with the Noblesville community.

BlueSky is planning a groundbreaking this summer and the facility is slated for completion in the fall of 2016. The company is planning to build on what often is called "the hill," a piece of property which hasn't been used the past 25 years. It's a piece of property that the Ditslear administration has transferred into one of the most valuable in Noblesville.

The new building and parking lot will be located on the southwest corner of John and Osborn streets. BlueSky is expected to have between 70 to 75 employees within a

And, at the Tuesday Council meeting, BlueSky threw a couple of new cards on the table when announcing it is planning on a three-floor building which will include a first floor, 6,000 square foot restaurant which would pay property taxes to the City of Noblesville every year.

It is exciting thinking of BlueSky leading what could be an explosion on the west side.

The new city park, hopefully, is just around the corner.

It shouldn't be too long before Riverview Health announces plans.

All of which leaves only a meeting between Ditslear and the Hamilton County Commissioners to discuss the county's parking lot on the south side of Conner Street into a part of Noblesville's new west side. Hopefully.

Should I dare suggest. Nob City is becoming more Carmel-like. At the least, more Fishers-like.

Body scanner installed at Hamilton County Jail

Hamilton County Jail is an even safer place. displays results allowing jail officers to see Recently, the jail installed a full-body, digital screening system that performs an Xray scan on all inmates entering the facility. The scanner, made by SecurPass, is able to detect all types of dangerous and illegal substances such as drugs, liquids, metals,

Inmates booked into the jail, whether from an initial arrest, returning from a trip to court, arriving to serve time, or any other reason, are scanned for potential contraband. Previously, correctional officers would do a limited hands-on search for contraband. The new scanner allows a quick and thorough process for detecting contraband. The instrument is safer and more effective to determine if an inmate is trying to smuggle unauthorized items into the jail.

Captain Jason Sloderbeck, the Hamilton County Jail Division Commander, explained, "Inmates arriving at the jail will attempt to smuggle contraband such as tobacco or drugs into the cell blocks. The scanner provides the best tool available to detect these items as there is no privacy issue for the inmates and the scanner can detect contraband that may be difficult for an officer to find."

Thanks to modern technology, the The scanner creates an X-ray image that contraband. A printout can then be stored in the computer system for future comparison and review if needed.

> "The X-ray dosage involved in the scan is much less than a typical chest X-ray performed in a medical facility so there are no health concerns," Sloderbeck continued. "The whole body scan takes seconds and does not require the removal of clothing to create a virtual image. Although the system scans the entire body, it does not show as much soft tissue detail as an airport scanner, for example, so an inmate's privacy is pro-

> Officers are trained to recognize anything that would not naturally be part of a normal person's body image. If the scan reveals anything suspicious, officers then conduct a further investigation to determine if there is contraband. In the months since the scanner was installed, officers have already confiscated contraband such as tobacco, drugs and narcotics, paraphernalia, and other items. Those arriving at the jail with contraband may face additional charges if contraband is discovered.

> A similar body scan system has also been installed at the Community Corrections Work Release building.

Hours extended this week for discounted rain barrels purchase

Clean Storm Water Program.

The rain barrels are available at 1717 Pleasant St., Suite 100, in Noblesville. The office is open 8 a.m. through 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. As part of the extended hours, the office will be open until 5:30 p.m. Thursday, May 14 and from 8 a.m. to noon Saturday, May 16. Residents may then buy a rain barrel retail value of rain barrels is normally \$80 or higher but available at a lower cost courtesy of the Noblesville Clean Storm Water Program. There is a limit of one rain barrel per address.

In order to qualify for this program, residents/business must do two things: 1) Provide a City of Noblesville Wastewater Utility bill that shows his/her name and online clean water improvement pledges at www.clearchoicescleanwater.org.

"This is the third year we have partnered with the Soil & Water Conservation Noblesville residents and businesses. Capturing rain water to use for gardening is not only good for your plants, but it also

Girls basketball teams that compete in other sectionals are probably tired of hearing it by now: "Sectional 8 is the toughest sectional in the state."

But here's the thing: People keep saying it because it's true. Name any other sectional that, last season, had five teams with at least 16 wins and five teams that finished in the top 20 of the Sagarin ratings.

Since these schools are in close proximity with one another, it was no surprise that Carmel, Fishers, Hamilton Southeastern, Noblesville and Westfield remained in the Class 4A sectional when the IHSAA announced the regrouped sectionals a week ago. Everyone is in agreement that it's best for these neighboring teams to stay together.

"I think it's great that we are staying together," said Donna Keck, coach of the sectional champion Millers. "Having big county rivalry match-ups is great for the players, coaches and fans.'

"I think keeping them together makes the sectional special and more like the old 1 class sectional which I wish we would revisit," said Greyhounds coach Tod Windlan.

It also means the competition won't be lacking again. Very rarely, it seems, do any of these five schools come into the season with a bad record.




