

Cicero, Jackson Twp. adopt new comprehensive plan

The Town of Cicero and Jackson Township have a new comprehensive plan. The Jackson Township Advisory Board adopted the new combined plan on March 30, 2015, followed by the Cicero Town Council on April 7, 2015. A comprehensive plan serves as the primary guideline for future local decisions on development and redevelopment. It is also anticipated that the Town and the Township will use the Comprehensive Plan as the basis of future grant applications. Planning Director Paul Munoz said, "This Comprehensive Plan is simply guidelines by which the Town will focus their efforts for future growth. The Plan Commission will use the plan to update the zoning ordinances to facilitate and promote the growth the residence want to see. It includes both a future land use plan and a transportation (thoroughfare) plan. The future land use plan shows the general location for new development and identifies redevelopment and infill opportunities. The thoroughfare plan classifies public roads in the jurisdiction and identifies other transportation considerations, including trails." The plan emphasizes Downtown Cicero as the heart of the community, and recommends stepping up efforts to preserve historic structures and improve the appearance, something the new Main Street group will be involved

Mayor names Greg Wyant as new Noblesville Fire Chief

Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear has announced that Greg Wyant will serve as the new Noblesville Fire Chief following the retirement of Ken Gilliam. Wyant, who currently serves as assistant fire chief, will assume his new role on Friday, May 22.

"For the past 20 years Assistant Chief Wyant has served the fire department proudly, risen through the ranks and become a leader within the department," Ditslear said. "We didn't feel the need to do a national search because we are fortunate with the talent we have in-house here in Noblesville. For the past five years, Greg has worked alongside Chief Gilliam and will provide a familiar, stabilizing voice as we transition." Wyant, 47, began working for Noblesville Fire Department in 1994. "I am honored. The consequences of this job are big. It is a lot of responsibility and I don't take that lightly. It is a position that only a small group has held in Noblesville and I'm really proud to be joining those men. I'm very happy the mayor and chief feel I have the capabilities to do this job," Wyant said. Born at Riverview Health, Wyant has lived in, out and around Noblesville most of his life. He attended elementary and middle school at Hamilton Heights and graduated from Hamilton Southeastern High School in 1986. Wyant joined the U.S. Navy on Jan. 12, 1987 and served six years as an engineer with tours on the U.S.S. Forrestal and U.S.S. Detroit. He served a year-commitment in the Red Sea during Operation Desert Storm.

Two road closures begin Monday

Two bridge rehabilitations in northern Hamilton County will result in road closures starting Monday.

First, 276th Street between Devaney Road and Gwinn Road will be closed for the rehabilitation of Bridge #54, 276th Street over Little Cicero Creek. The road is scheduled to be closed to traffic through Aug. 1. The signed detour will consist of Devaney Road, 266th Street, and Gwinn Road. Beck's Hybrids' facilities will be accessible from the east via Gwinn Road.

Also, 266th Street between Lower Road and Ray Parker Road will be closed for the replacement of Bridge #70, 266th Street over Bear Creek. The road is scheduled to be closed to traffic for a period of 100 calendar days. The signed detour will consist of State Road 213, 256th Street, and Ray Parker Road.

All through traffic is advised to follow signed detours or find an alternate routes.

The new cancer center will keep the facility name, Community Cancer Center North, and was designed with input from patients, physicians and staff. It will feature elements that create a home-like atmosphere. Patients will control their surroundings, including room temperature, lighting, entertainment, food choices, and privacy. The cancer center will also feature wellness facilities, quiet workspaces, public Wi-Fi, a knowledge center, and a nature garden.

"At Community, we understand that cancer is a life-changing experience for patients and their families," said Jianan Graybill, M.D., radiation oncologist and lead physician on the project. "Our new center was designed to allow them to carry on much of their usual routine and activities as possible while undergoing treatments. They may use the workspaces to conduct business or use Skype to keep distant family members updated."

Other No. 1 teams include Class 4A Penn which drew a bye and will take on the South Bend Washington-South Bend Riley winner in Sectional 3 at South Bend Adams. Among the other defending state champions, Class A's North Miami, ranked second this week, will meet host North White in Sectional 50. And Class 4A's Bloomington South will host East Central in Sectional 14

Also of note, Tecumseh secured its state record 12th consecutive sectional championship a year ago and will look to extend that run against Northeast Dubois in Sectional 64 at Wood Memorial.


