

Deck collapses in South Harbour

Saturday, at approximately 12:58 p.m., the Hamilton County Communication Center dispatched the Noblesville Fire Department to 213 Redwood Circle in the South Harbour housing addition on a report of a collapse of an outside wooden deck.

The incident involved one side of a wooden deck collapsing and the occupants that were on the deck slid to the ground

There were 12 occupants on the deck. Two of those occupants were transported to Riverview Health in Noblesville. None of the injuries sustained were life threatening, the Fire Department told the Hamilton County Reporter.

The home owners are Chad & Rebecca

The Fire Department would not release the names of those injured in the accident.

"Being our agency is an ambulance transporting/billing fire department, we fall under all HIPPA regulations," said Rick Russell, Division Chief. "You will find that all of my press releases regarding a fire, or rescue incident will only list the number of civilian and firefighters, not their names,

The Fire Department, said Russell, is the only agency in the city that falls under HIPPA regulations. The Noblesville Police Department does not. The NPD, Russell said, does not provide an ambulance service. They are not a billing agency, nor do they provide emergency medical services.

There is nothing I can do unless I have written permission from the individual(s) that are injured," Russell added.

Citizens Energy Group has opened its new Harbour Ground Water Treatment Plant near Morse Reservoir to serve growing water demand in Hamilton County. Citizens hosted an open house at the plant on Monday to allow neighbors and other community residents an opportunity to see how the plant functions.

The new \$15 million plant is able to supply an additional 6 million gallons per day of water supply capacity to the growing residential and commercial markets in Hamilton County.

"The addition of our new Harbour Ground Water Treatment Plant provides significant benefits to our water system because it is located near high demand areas, reduces stress on our water distribution system and lowers energy and pump costs. The construction of this plant is part of our ongoing commitment to a sustainable long-term water supply for the people of Central Indiana," said Jeff Willman, Vice President, Water Operations for Citi-

She also spoke about how important it is for cities to work together: no city is an island, they must coexist by working together. Communities that work together are generally much stronger than those who do







His counterpart Bowden (2-1) also went five innings but earned the win with a scoreless effort through his longest outing of the season.

After Bowden gave way to the bullpen, Deibinson Romero drove home the Tribe's (21-16) lone run with a double to left field off Pedro Beato in the bottom of the sixth.

Hunter Morris singled in the ninth inning to put the tying run on base with no outs, but Norfolk (20-16) closer Oliver Drake retired his next three batters to halt the rally and preserve the victory.
