## Sheridan Community Schools lowers tax rate

Director of Business, Robin Popejoy, and Superintendent Dave Mundy have reported to the Sheridan Community School Board that the district recommends dropping the schools tax rate to around \$1.36 for this coming year. This is a reduction from the previous rate of \$1.40. This is made possible due to the six percent increase in assessed value across the district. Mrs. Popejoy stated, “This change in assessed value and revenue is allowing the district to

help recover a small amount of the revenue that has been taken away from school districts over the last few years, but still be fiscally responsible in setting our tax rate for the community.” Mrs. Popejoy and Dr. Mundy also expressed to the school board that this keeps the district’s referendum promise to the community true; the district would not raise their rates during the seven-year referendum period and would do what they can to lower it.

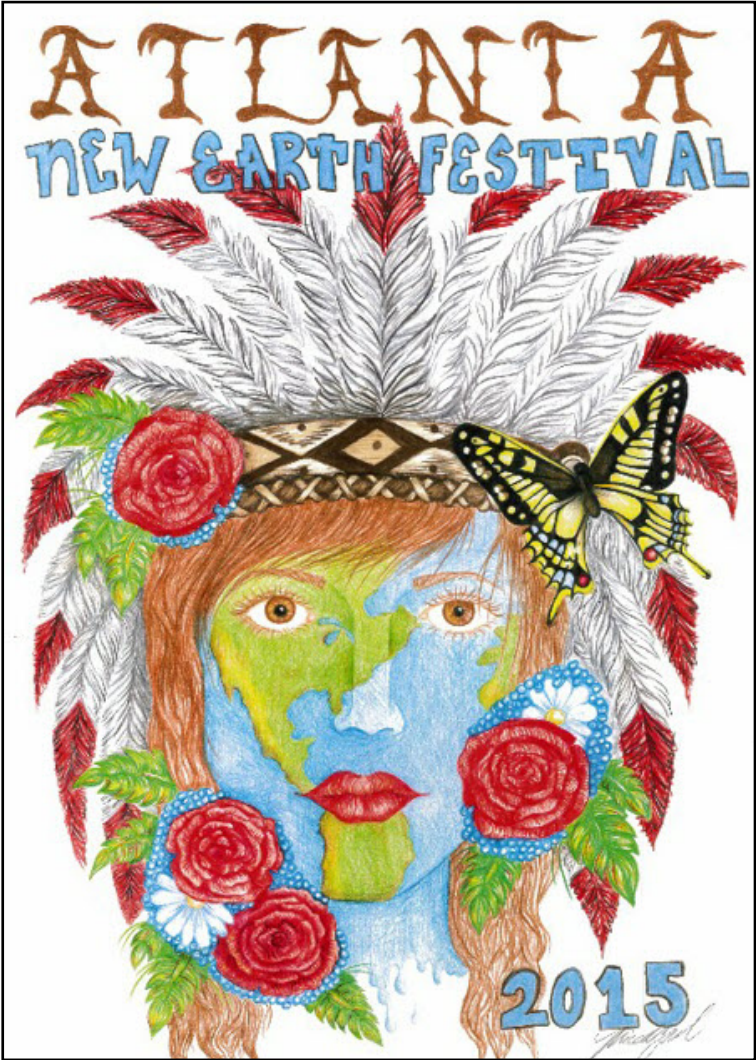

Cicero Triathlon Weekend announces title sponsor

Riverview Health will be the title sponsor of the Cicero Triathlon Weekend on June 20-21, 2015. The weekend will consist of the 32<sup>nd</sup> Annual Cicero Triathlon on Saturday and the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Strawberry 5K and Kids Triathlon on Sunday. All events will be staged at Cicero's Red Bridge Park and Morse Reservoir. The Hamilton North Chamber of Commerce, working with race management company Heartland Endurance Sports, will host the events.

"Riverview Health has been a valued supporter of our Chamber through the years and now they have picked up the title sponsorship of one of the longest running triathlons in the state. A few course changes have been made to make the Cicero Triathlon a true "sprint triathlon". The swim portion will be a box course with participants entering Morse Reservoir at the town docks at Red Bridge Park. They will swim out and around buoys marking the course and back to the swim exit at the emergency ramp at the south end of the park. The swim course is 500 meters. The bike course will be extended by .5 mile to make a 10 mile ride. The course will include a jog around Bear Cub Drive off of Mill Creek Road. The 5K run course remains the same.

"These subtle course changes bring the race distance in line with other 'common' sprint distance races. We are also excited to add a duathlon, an aquabike and an aquathon category for 2015", explains TJ Tryon, owner of Heartland Endurance Sports. "We are very excited to include Riverview Health in helping us bring this great race weekend to the area."

This year's winners include:

**Corporate Volunteer Award – Peterson Architecture**

Peterson Architecture founder, Darren Peterson, initiated the Noblesville Main Street Thursday Market in 2013 and was co-chairman of the inaugural White River Celebration last year. Peterson is an active member of Nickel Plate Arts development committee, Chamber of Commerce Busi-

ness Advocacy Group and past member of the Noblesville Façade Grant Committee.

Through Noblesville Main Street, Peterson Architecture initiated Noblesville Can-Struction in 2013 which has created two colossal replicas of the historic courthouse made entirely from canned and non-perishable food items. This program has donated 9,000 non-perishable food items to the Noblesville Township Trustees Office and raised \$10,000 to relieve hunger anxiety locally. The staff also hosts an holiday ornament contest coordinated with the company's annual food and clothing drive

and works to activate the alleys in downtown Noblesville through wine tastings, markets, festivals, art shows, music programs and more. In addition, all employees volunteer time to their own special projects and causes.

**All-Around Volunteer – Anita Hagen**

Hagen was nominated by fellow volunteers of the Hamilton County Harvest Food Bank in Noblesville, where she volunteers an immeasurable amount of time to ensuring that Hamilton County's food pantries are stocked. Hagen served as the first president of Hamilton County Harvest Food Bank and continues to volunteer in that capacity for the organization when it is necessary. "Anita's selflessness and compassion for others serves as an inspiration to everyone in the community," was written by fellow volunteers in her nomination. With her help, The Harvest Food Bank have collected and distributed more than 235,000 pounds of food to local pantries.

**Faith-Based Volunteer – Becky McGriff**

McGriff is founder and "chief organizer" of the Body in Training Track and Cross-Country Club. She spends more than 25 hours a week at practices, working on event registration, updating results on the website, coaching and organizing the meets for the faith-based youth sports organization. It is no surprise that her organization has grown enormously over the past few years and now has 168 athletes. Parents of the participating youth have expressed their gratitude for McGriff's dedication and devotion to helping kids grow physically, mentally and spiritually.

**Youth Volunteer Award – Michael Firks**

Firks, also known as Cpt. Firks of the Noblesville Police Explorers, has directed

his childhood interests in law enforcement to volunteer work in our community. He has served more than 250 hours at the city's Fourth of July parade and festival, Hamilton County 4-H Fair and the Noblesville Street Dance. Lt. Lucas Chisham of the Noblesville Police Explorers said that Firks refuses to accept breaks from his work because "he prefers to take advantage of every volunteering opportunity available."

**Mayor's Choice Award – Dallas Wischaupt**

There is always an unsung hero, a person whose dedication makes a difference in Noblesville in the areas that we might take for granted. Wischaupt has made notable achievements in the way of education during the course of his career, and even after retirement has found a way to immensely improve the lives of middle school students in our community. He volunteers during the school day for students at Noblesville West Middle School who need extra assistance with math. After school he is a tutor for the Step Up Program through the Noblesville Youth Assistance Program twice a week. "There is no way to measure the number of lives that Dallas has touched or continues to touch on a daily basis by his volunteerism," NYAP Early Intervention Advocate Joy Petty said.

**Nonprofit Volunteer Program Award – Boys & Girls Club of Noblesville Auxiliary**

Nominated by Becky Terry, The Boys & Girls Club Auxiliary provides high-quality, low-cost programs for youth members with the help of donors and sponsors. In 2014, 2,121 youth were served and membership continues to grow. The auxiliary awards scholarships to youth, finances special events for kids, hosts fundraisers and sponsors community opportunities throughout the year. In her nomination, Terry said that "the activities they are involved with change on an annual basis but their commitment to the Club and the kids never waivers."

**Dr. Earl Brooks Outstanding Environmentalist – Glen Schwartz**

Schwartz has given much of his life to volunteering and community involvement since fire fighters saved his life after a car crash in 1985. Although Schwartz serves at least 40 hours each week at his business, he devotes another 20 hours towards his volunteer efforts. He is on the advisory board of the Jackson Township Trustee's Office, participates in annual daffodil plantings, donates more than 200 hours to regular beautification projects and events, and serves on the Keep Noblesville Beautiful Board of Directors. In particular, Schwartz's contributions have assisted more than 230 homeowners during the past four Neighborhood Clean-Up Blitzes.

**Lifetime Volunteer Award – Julia Nicholson**

The Lifetime Volunteer Award recognizes an individual who has shown unwavering dedication to making Noblesville a better place for everyone. Nicholson has been giving back to the Noblesville community since 1975 by directing Bible school programs, volunteering at the Summer Trace retirement home, participating in the Noblesville Good Samaritan Thanksgiving Program and Meals on Wheels, and countless other volunteer positions. Her time spent volunteering is incalculable, but as Nicholson's husband said, "service is not measured with the amount of time that is donated; it is measured by the number of lives that can be impacted and improved with volunteer service." While she has already proved her devotion to volunteering, Nicholson continues to inspire her grandson and other future volunteers to live a life of volunteering.

## State Fair hiring more than 500 seasonal positions

The Indiana State Fair Commission will be hosting the seventh annual Job Fair where it hopes to hire more than 500 seasonal positions, Thursday, May 28 at the Indiana State Fairgrounds Ag/Hort Building from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. Lt. Governor Sue Ellspermann will attend the event and interview a few lucky candidates.

"The Indiana State Fair requires a large temporary workforce to provide the best Hoosier Hospitality to thousands of Fair visitors each year. This job fair is an excellent outreach to the fairgrounds neighbors. These positions allow them to help host this great event and even begin a career at the Fair," Lt. Governor Ellspermann said.

Each year the Indiana State Fair hires about 1400 seasonal employees. Of the 218 current year-round employees, 130 started as a seasonal or summer employee.

Job Fair attendees will have the opportunity to fill out an application for employ-

ment and receive an initial interview. Applicants should be at least 14 years of age and dress is informal. A resume is not required but if the candidate has one available it will be considered. The line for the Job Fair begins forming at 2 p.m. All candidates have the same opportunity for hire regardless of when they arrive at the event as long as they arrive before 6:00 p.m. and participate in an interview. Available positions include but are not limited to: ticket sellers, gate supervisors, parking attendants, parking supervisors, facility maintenance personnel, security personnel, tractor shuttle staff, information booth staff, livestock barn staff and educational exhibit staff.

## Quick action saves family in Sunday evening fire

The Noblesville Fire Department was dispatched to a reported residence fire at 19568 Heather Lane late Sunday evening. Upon fire suppression crews arrival they noted smoke showing, and benchmarked that all four occupants of the structure were out safely.

The homeowners were asleep in bed when they were awakened by the activation of their smoke detectors. As they search for what was causing their smoke detectors to sound; the homeowners discovered that their basement was full of smoke. The homeowners, Tom & Andrea Wilburn quickly got everyone out of the house. Once outside Mr. Wilburn called 9-1-1 for help.

The fire has originated in the family room of the basement. A plug in triplex outlet adaptor was connect to the structural electrical wall plug. The appliance that was connected to the triplex outlet adaptor was an extension cord that was connected to a space heater. The fire has originated at the wall electrical outlet assembly.

The incident has caused approximately \$15,000 in damage. There were no injuries.

The fire was contained to the basement. Due to the quick response of the homeowners, and the rapid interior attack on the fire by fire suppression personnel the family can still occupy their home.

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# Don't get too sweet on sugar

*"Sugar in the morning, sugar in the evening, sugar at suppertime ..."*  
*McGuire Sisters, 1958*

I imagine that when the McGuire Sisters recorded this tune many years ago (gosh I sure hope you know who they were!) it was not the intent of their lyrics to include over consumption of sugar and related health issues. But yes, you guessed it - that is exactly my topic this week!

There are several reasons why we should be wary of sugar consumption, one reason being too much added sugar can crowd healthier foods from a person's diet; calories unaccompanied by fiber, vitamins, minerals, and other nutrients.

Sugar-sweetened beverages such as sodas, energy drinks, and sports drinks are by far the biggest sources of added sugar in the average American's diet. They account for more than one-third of the added sugar we consume as a nation.<sup>1</sup> Other important sources include cookies, cakes, pastries, and similar treats; fruit drinks; ice cream, frozen yogurt and the like; candy; and ready-to-eat cereals. I especially want to point out fruit juices - even the "healthiest" juices have quite a bit of sugar. Most of us don't consider added sugar in canned fruits and vegetables - yes, even vegetables. Manufacturers' goals are to make us "happy consumers" which includes what I consider to be the addiction of sugar.

According to the National Center for Health Statistics, an astounding 62 percent

of adult Americans were overweight in 2000, up from 46 percent in 1980. Twenty-seven percent of adults were so far overweight that they were classified as obese (at least 30 pounds above their healthy weight)—twice the percentage classified as such in 1960. Alarming, an upward trend in obesity is also occurring for U.S. children. What that portends for our future I shudder to consider.

One hundred and fifty-six pounds... That's how much added sugar Americans consume each year on a per capita basis, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). Imagine it: 31 five-pound bags for each of us. Only about 29 pounds of it comes as traditional sugar, or sucrose, according to The Sugar Association, a trade group of sugar manufacturers. The rest comes from foods.

In addition to candy, soda, and junk food, plenty of sugar is hiding in places where you might not expect it. Some types of crackers, yogurt, ketchup, and peanut butter, for instance, are loaded with sugar -- often in the form of high-fructose corn syrup, or HFCS. Use of this sweetener has increased 3.5% per year in the last decade, according to the World Health Organization (WHO). That's twice the rate at which the use of refined sugar has grown. An interesting activity I might suggest for my readers is to do a HFCS inventory in your kitchen pantry and frig, very enlightening I predict.

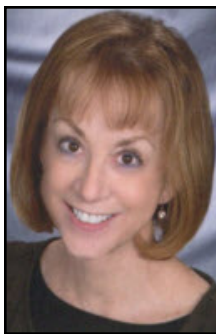
Well this is all rather negative as we approach picnic season - sure we have lots of fresh fruits (some of which can be a source of sugar) and vegetables, but we know we just love that blueberry pie, strawberry shortcake with whipped cream, and banana pudding...oh my. However, if we make a concentrated effort to limit our sug-

ar intake of other foods and beverages by paying attention to added sugars and reading the ingredient labels, we can sometimes indulge in a special treat as long as we practice mindful consumption and get back on the healthy eating track!



## Rule change means more regional qualifiers for county in track

There's always been a high number of Hamilton County track and field athletes that qualify for the West Lafayette girls regional.

This year it could be even higher, due to a change in how athletes advance from sectionals to regionals.

In years past, it had always been the top four at the sectional in each event qualify for regionals, plus any athlete that meets or betters the three participant standard. Since four sectionals feed into each regional, there's always at least 16 athletes or relay teams in each event.

This year, however, only the top three automatically qualify from sectionals to regionals, along with anyone who reaches the time/distance standard. However, none of the four sectionals that feed into West Lafayette had that happen.

So, the next best four times/distances are taken in each event, and they are to advance to regional. Since the Guerin Catholic sectional (in which all Hamilton County teams participate) is usually very strong, several county athletes that finish outside of the top three have a good opportunity to advance.

The Reporter went through the results from the Guerin sectional, along with the other three (Benton Central, Harrison and Zionsville) that feed into West Lafayette. While these are all unofficial, it should give a good indication as to who has likely earned a regional spot - which gives them an opportunity to compete for a place at the state meet.

Provisional qualifiers from the champion Carmel include Olivia Suggs and Cailyn Etgen in the 100 dash, Samantha Miller in the 400 dash, Carly Markley and Elle Hawkins in the 200 dash and Kaila Kolodkin in the pole vault.

Meanwhile, Hamilton Southeastern's 4x800 and 4x400 relay teams appear to be in the regional. Other provisional Royal qualifiers are Deneen McKinney in the 100 dash, Sabrina Bippus in the 1600 run, Ashley Mager in the 400 dash, Breanna Wright in the 300 hurdles, Rachel Nichwitz in the 800 run and Chelsea Maxey in the shot put.

Fishers also has fast enough times in the 4x800 and 4x400 relays. Abigail Bartholomew and Claire Vahary in the 100 hurdles, Elizabeth Rogers in the 1600 run, Corinne O'Leary in the 3200 run. Another possible qualifier is Claire Fletchall in the pole vault.

Abi Little looks to be into the regional in the 1600 run, as do Abby Crouch and Megan Line in the 800 run. Aleksandra Andersen should qualify in the pole vault, as should the 4x100 relay.

Westfield's Taylor Rogers in the 800 run, Karen Hubbard in the 200 dash and Becca Carr in the 3200 run all appear to be advancing to regionals. Audrey Bullock in the pole vault is a possible qualifier.

Guerin Catholic's Lindsay Wisdorf should qualify in the 100 hurdles, Lily Hess in the 200 dash, Megan Slamkowski in the 3200 run and the 4x100 relay.

Finally, Hamilton Heights should be advancing in the 4x100 and 4x400 relays, along with Macey Policka in the 300 hurdles and Lily McCormick in the long jump.
