Community meeting on Thursday to discuss...

Noblesville’s Planning Jurisdiction

The City of Noblesville will host a community meeting to discuss a proposal to modify the city’s planning jurisdiction at 7 p.m. Thursday, May 28 at Fire Station No. 7, 15251 Olivo Rd. Noblesville has experienced significant growth pressure in recent years, particularly southeast of the city. This proposal is an attempt to channel future growth closer to where existing infrastructure is located. In addition, there are parcels that currently exist in northeast Noblesville Township where the planning ju-

risdiction is split between Noblesville and Hamilton County. The city is proposing to expand its planning and zoning jurisdiction along the western and southwestern portions of unincorporated Wayne Township. Current jurisdiction lines divide certain parcels, leaving half of the property within the City of Noblesville planning jurisdiction and the other half of the property in Hamilton County jurisdiction. “By correcting the lines and including whole parcels confusion is eliminated be-

tween the city, county and property owners,” Noblesville Assistant Planning Director Andrew Wert said. “The proposed acquisition of additional property into the City of Noblesville’s planning jurisdiction re-establishes a transitional buffer between incorporated land and rural countryside.” Any potential jurisdiction changes will not affect property taxes, schools districts, maintenance of roads or require involuntary annexation. Existing agricultural structures on property being used as farmland will not be required to follow zoning regulations.

Clauson, Daly return to IMS...

Two Noblesville drivers in the 500

As race fans count down the hours to Sunday's Indianapolis 500 - some have already started throwing their race parties - there's a special reason for Noblesville to pay attention to this year's 500-Mile Race. Two Noblesville drivers will compete in the 500. Bryan Clauson and Conor Daly have taken different paths in their racing careers - Clauson has become a star on the USAC circuit, Daly is following in his father's footsteps in the Grand Prix circuit. But they will be running together Sunday at the Indianapolis part of the field off 33 that take to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. Both made their ways into the line-up during last Sunday's qualifying. There was end-of-the-day drama involved Clauson, who was sitting on the bubble (33rd place) after the first session of

qualifying Sunday. Clauson ran a four-lap average of 220.523 mph in his Jonathan Byrd's/Cancer Centers of America Chevrolet machine, car No. 88. There were 34 entrants into qualifying on Sunday, but as the first session of qualifying continued, former winner Buddy Lazier didn't bring his car on to the track. That fueled the possibility that he wouldn't attempt a run, which would guarantee a spot in the field for Clauson. But Lazier elected to makes his attempts during the second session of qualifying, in which the cars in positions 31-33 plus any unqualified cars would have until 7 p.m. to get in the field. Thus began the drama of watching the speeds and the clock. Clauson made his first run and improved his speed to 221.358, but was quickly pushed back down after runs by Stefano Coletti 222.001 and Jack Hawksworth 223.738.

Then came Lazier. His first run was well behind Clauson, coming in at 219.438. He pushed the clock to the limit, finally making one last attempt a few minutes before 7 p.m. Lazier found a little more speed, but his 220.153 was still well short. "Dramatic is good sometimes, I guess," said Clauson afterwards. "Took a couple years off my life." "There's a lot of work that's gone into this project. Certainly would've liked to have been in a little bit earlier, but I'm just proud of everybody for continuing to work...we kind of lost a little bit of speed there at a bad time, and just struggled to find it." This will be Clauson's second race at the Indianapolis 500. He made it into the field in 2012, qualifying in 31st place. Unfortunately, he wound up 30th, suffering me-

Noblesville Planning Jurisdiction map

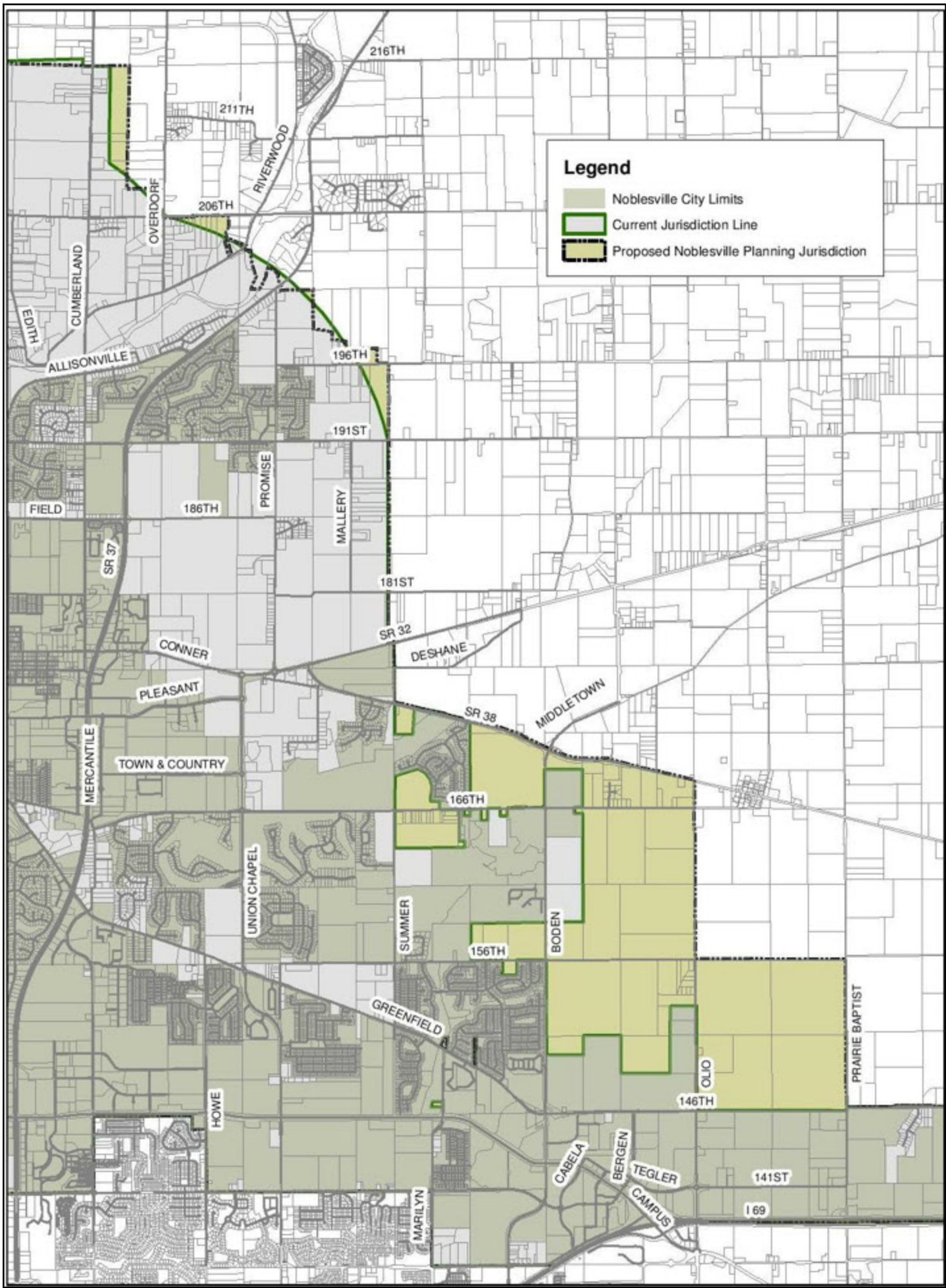

chanical problems that only allowed him to finish 46 laps.

"It's been great," said Clauson. "Happy to get through qualifying session without any big issues like 2012. Excited to be back." Clauson wrecked on the first day of qualifying in 2012, but was able to get in the field the next day.

This will also be Daly's second go at the Speedway. He qualified for the 2013 edition of the 500, and ran a steady race to finish 22nd.

Just like his race two years ago, Daly's Sunday qualifying run was solid and uneventful. Racing for Schimdt Peterson Motorsports in a car No. 43 that has the best name of all the cars - "FUELED by BACON Special Honda" - Daly qualified 25th in a speed of 223.482.

"We've had a long week of work and it's all gone well," said Daly. "We've made the progress that we've wanted to make. Although today, it was a bit different than we thought it would be."

Rain washed out Saturday's scheduling qualifying attempts, forcing all the action on to Sunday. Qualifying was delayed further after a frightening crash involving Ed Carpenter, the two-time Indy 500 pole winner. Carpenter's incident followed a series of harrowing crashes that involved three-time champion Helio Castroneves, and other popular drivers such as Pippa Mann and Josef Newgarden. Those incidents had already created an uncomfortable buzz among the Speedway about safety.

After Carpenter's crash, qualifying was pushed back to the afternoon, with the cars required to undergo safety changes. Mark Miles, the CEO of Hulman and Company, the parent company of IMS and INDY-CAR, issued the following statement:

Noblesville's Conor Daly qualified for the Indianapolis 500 on Sunday, with a time of 223.482. Daly originally qualified in 25th, but was moved up to 22nd after drivers had to withdraw.

"As a precautionary measure, INDY-CAR will require that the cars qualify today in the same aero setup that they will run in the Indianapolis 500 next weekend. Also, for today, boost levels will return to race conditions. Given these changes, we have elected to not award points for today's qualifications."

"That was a shame to see how everything turned out," said Daly. "We are in, we've got a good race car so we've just got to keep working on tomorrow and on Carb Day."

Although they respectively qualified 25th and 33rd, Daly and Clauson have been moved up the starting grid. Daly will now start the race 22nd, with Clauson starting in 30th place.

The changes were set in motion after a terrible crash on Monday. James Hinchcliff hit the outside wall in Turn 3 and suffered serious injuries to his upper left thigh, and pelvic area. Hinchcliff was immediately taken to surgery and spent Monday night in Methodist Hospital's ICU unit.

Hinchcliff's condition has been improving all week; on Friday night, he posted on Twitter that he will be "knocking out 5ks in no time!" - Hinchcliff is known for his offbeat sense of humor. But he is out of racing for a while; veteran Australian driver Ryan Briscoe has replaced Hinchcliff in the No. 5 car.

Another driver, Carlos Huertas, was not medically cleared to race despite already qualifying. He was replaced by France's Tristan Vautier, who had already qualified the No. 19 car. In turn, Vautier was replaced in the No. 19 by Australian driver James Davison. Per INDYCAR rules, the substitute drivers must start in the back of the field, thus advancing Daly, Clauson and others up the starting grid.

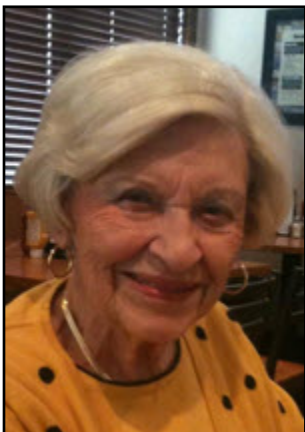

Small fire at Carmel apartment building causes \$20,000 in damage

At 1:26 a.m. Friday morning, Carmel Firefighters responded to a small fire in an apartment building. The apartments at 9816 Seasons East Drive were under construction and had no occupants at the time. Upon arrival, fire crews found the sprinkler system had been activated and the building was full of smoke.

Firefighters made entry into the building and quickly found the origin of the fire near the stove in the kitchen. Fire was under control due to the activation of the sprinkler system and the direct efforts of the suppression crews.

The cause of the fire is under investigation. Damage to the building is estimated at \$20,000.

‘Hounds win 24th sectional in a row

The Carmel girls tennis team continued its sensational sectional streak on Friday.

The Greyhounds, ranked No. 1 in the state all season, won their 24th consecutive sectional trophy by defeating No. 9 Guerin Catholic 5-0 at the Todd Witsken Tennis Center. The Golden Eagles were in the midst of their best season ever, but Carmel was simply too much.

The Greyhounds won all their matches in straight sets. Guerin was also hampered by the loss of its regular No. 1 singles player, Reiley Harrington, to injury; Greyhounds coach Mike Bostic said it would've been a "closer match" with her in it.

"I feel for them," said Bostic. "Injuries happen, it happened to us. Unfortunately, their 1 couldn't continue. They had a great season, a great team. We were ready for it."

Carmel's team is remarkably young, but it's also talented. The No. 1 singles player is Kiersten Carlson, and she won her match 6-1, 6-1. Carlson has only lost three games in two sectional matches so far. At No. 1 doubles, Emma Love, half of last year's individual doubles state champion team, paired with Lauryn Padgett to win 6-0, 6-1. Molly Fletchall played with Love last year on their journey to state; she is playing at No. 2 doubles in the tournament this season.

"I thought we played well," said Golden Eagles coach Kevin Gill, whose team was at one point ranked as high as No. 4 during the season. "That's the best I've seen them play and Mike has them ready to go. Different weather conditions this time and they just played great, so all credit to them."

Carmel will now head to the Kokomo regional to begin that round on Tuesday. The 'Hounds take on Eastern, winner of the Kokomo sectional.

"Just like any tournament, you take it one step at a time," said Bostic. "I think it gives us a couple more days to recover. We got Molly at 2 doubles with an ankle injury that still needs some time to heal, and I think that's going to help us out."

Royals defend sectional title

The Hamilton Southeastern girls tennis team had a chance to make history on Friday, and it did.

For the first time, the Royals defended their sectional championship. Southeastern beat host Noblesville 5-0 to make it two titles in a row. Those are the first two sectional titles for HSE in girls tennis. Southeastern will play at the North Central regional on Tuesday.

"We've never won back-to-back, so it kind of makes it extra-special," said Royals coach Kirk Webber. "It's good to establish some tradition of winning here with the girls program."

Southeastern is ranked No. 18 in the state, and played well against a Millers team that was young, but had improved over the course of the season. The Royals also have a relatively young team, with a freshman No. 1 singles player. Ashley Sparrison won her match 6-1, 6-0.

Meanwhile, Noblesville coach Tim Samons was happy with how his young team competed, and about the future of Millers tennis.

"It was really nice that they got a win with the first round of the sectional, I think that'll go a long way in their future to make them tougher when they get in this situation next time," said Samons.

Bonzi Wells named Grand Park Fieldhouse director of basketball operations

Grand Park Fieldhouse is pleased to announce that former NBA star Bonzi Wells will be the new director of basketball operations. Wells, a native of Muncie, had a standout career at Muncie Central High School as he was runner up for Mr. Basketball (Bryce Drew) and received a full scholarship to Ball State University where he played from 1994-1998.

Wells was named the Mid-American Conference (MAC) freshman of the year in the 1994-1995 season. On February 21, 1998, he broke Ron Harper's record of 2,377 points. Wells also led the Mid-American Conference in steals in 1998 with 73, averaging 3.55 steals in 29 games. He led the conference in steals during all four years at Ball State and finished his career as the Mid-American Conference all-time career record holder in points (2,485) and steals (347). While at Ball State, Wells averaged 21.4 PPG, 3 SPG, 7.3 RPG. In 2004, Ball State retired his jersey, number 42, in recognition of his achievements.

Following his career at Ball State, Wells was selected eleventh overall by the Detroit Pistons in the 1998 NBA Draft. He never played for the Pistons, as his draft rights were traded to the Portland Trailblazers for the Blazers' 1999 first round pick. Wells played professionally for 11 years in the NBA (Portland Trailblazers, Memphis Grizzlies, Houston Rockets, Sacramento Kings and New Orleans Hornets-now Pelicans). He averaged a career high 17 PPG during his 2001-2002 season with the Portland Trailblazers.



Rod Sinn, President of Operations for Grand Park Fieldhouse (GPFH) says, "I was thrilled to get someone of Bonzi's stature to head up basketball at GPFH. This really sets us apart from other facilities. Having a former college and NBA star helping kids improve their game on a day to day basis is better than I could have imagined. What really impresses me the most, however, is Bonzi's passion for helping kids on and off the court. This is another reason why GPFH is so blessed to have him on board."

Friday night's win was the opening game of a six-game road trip for the Indians. Indianapolis (24-18) received a great start from Chris Volstad (2-1), as he went six innings and struck out five while conceding two runs.

Castroneves, Team Penske make history at TAG Heuer Pit Stop Challenge

Castroneves, Team Penske make history at TAG Heuer Pit Stop Challenge

The long-running epic battle between Team Penske and Chip Ganassi Racing jumped from the track to pit lane on Friday to decide the winner of the 2015 TAG Heuer Pit Stop Challenge during Coors Light Carb Day at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

When the smoke cleared, it was three-time Indianapolis 500 winner Helio Castroneves and his Team Penske crew winning in 12.561 seconds in the No. 3 Shell V-Power Nitro+ Team Penske Chevrolet over Charlie Kimball and his No. 83 Novo Nordisk Chip Ganassi Racing Chevrolet squad, who finished the contest with a time of 13.017 seconds.

With today's TAG Heuer Pit Stop Challenge triumph, Team Penske has won the event a record 15 times. Castroneves owns the most TAG Heuer Pit Stop Challenge titles by a driver with seven, all with Team Penske. Castroneves and his crew will take home the \$50,000 first place prize out of the total TAG Heuer Pit Stop Challenge purse of \$100,000.

"This is just perfect," Castroneves said. "We started the month great and had a little blip on the radar with that

accident going out, but we're back on track. The Shell V-Power car was unbelievable and these guys, it's unbelievable. For us it's nerve-racking because you don't want to screw up. Just a great effort from Team Penske."

In two of Castroneves's three Indianapolis 500 victories, he also won the Pit Stop Challenge (2002, 2009). Will that happen again on Sunday?

"I tell you what, I believe in any omen right now and if that's where it takes it, I'll believe it, but at this point it's just great, fantastic effort by the Shell V-Power Nitro+ boys, great job everyone," Castroneves said.

Castroneves's winning team includes chief mechanic Travis Law, Patrick Stewart, Gary Yingst, Joel Svensson, John Turpin, Trevor Lacasse and Keenan Watson.

In reaching the final for the first time, Kimball and his crew - who earned the runner-up reward of \$15,000 -- had an impressive run in defeating two-time defending champion Scott Dixon and the No. 9 Target Chip Ganassi team in the quarterfinals, and Marco Andretti and his No. 27 Andretti Snapple Honda squad in the semifinals.

Twelve Verizon IndyCar Series teams competed in head-to-head

competition in four rounds of exciting pit stop action. Each team was timed while performing a pit stop that required crews to change four tires and execute a simulated fuel hookup during each round of competition. Teams with the fastest time advanced to the next round.

Final practice: The field of the 99th Indianapolis 500 delivered 1,195 laps of safe practice on Friday, making final preparations for Sunday's race.

Will Power, driver of the No. 1 Verizon Team Penske Chevrolet, topped the speed chart at 229.020 mph. Scott Dixon, Sunday's polesitter, was second at 228.585 in the No. 9 Target Chip Ganassi Racing Chevrolet. The top Honda was Takuma Sato, fifth on the chart at 228.242 mph.

"You're just kind of doing little tweaks here and there, pit stop practice, practicing coming into the pit off (Turn) 4," Power said. "It's just those type of things, getting in the groove for the race."

Power won the Angie's List Grand Prix of Indianapolis two weeks ago on the IMS road course and will try to become the first to sweep both May races.

Driver change: Driver Carlos Huertas has been ruled out of the

Indianapolis 500 with an inner ear condition, according to Dr. Terry Trammell, INDYCAR medical consultant. Huertas will have to undergo further evaluation before being cleared to return to Verizon IndyCar Series competition.

Huertas was scheduled to start 18th in the No. 18 Dale Coyne Racing Honda. Tristan Vautier, the 2012 Indy Lights champion and 2013 Verizon IndyCar Series Rookie of the Year who qualified the No. 19 Coyne entry for the "500" May 17 while filling in for James Davison, was named to replace Huertas in the No. 18 car.

"It was a bit of a rollercoaster of emotions," Vautier said on Friday after Carb Day practice. "I knew if James was getting the deal with them, I would qualify (the car). That was the first good news."

"Then, yeah, on this one, it's not really the way you want to get back in the car, honestly. I think Carlos deserves to be racing because he did a really good job in qualifying and on practice. Obviously you can't help but be excited to start your second Indy 500."

Freedom 100: Jack Harvey of Schmidt Peterson Motorsports with Curb-Agajanian won the Freedom 100 under caution and made a little history in the process. He won one of the doubleheader races on the IMS road course earlier in the month, so he is the first driver to win on both the IMS oval and current road course configuration.

Schmidt Peterson Motorsports with Curb-Agajanian swept the top four spots with Harvey, runner-up Ethan Ringel, Scott Anderson and RC Enerson. Schmidt-owned cars have won eight of the 13 Freedom 100 races.

Start him up: Justin Wilson's No. 25 Andretti Autosport Honda picked up a unique sponsorship on Friday - The Rolling Stones. The band, playing around the country this summer on its ZIP CODE tour including July 4 at IMS, will have full tour livery on Wilson's car.

"I'm really excited to have the Rolling Stones on the side on the No. 25," said Wilson, who, like the band, hails from England. "For the biggest race of the year, to have one of the biggest rock bands in history is just incredible. Listening to the Rolling Stones was a Sunday tradition in our house. We would wake up and my Dad would have the music on full blast."

Tickets and VIP packages for the Stones' show at IMS are on sale at IMS.com.

Legends Day: Saturday at IMS is Legends Day honoring Al Unser presented by Firestone, and the legend himself always loves to return even though his last "500" was 1994.

"Indy's a place that has so much to it and enthusiasm around it," the four-time winner said. "It gets me hyped up as many years as I've been retired from it. It just shows that it's a race that you want to win and want to do well in."

The Unser family has six Indianapolis wins - with Al Unser having won in 1970, 1971, 1978 and 1987. Al Unser Jr. won in 1992 - in the closest finish in race history - and 1994.

"With the success we've had, it's just a great feeling," Unser Jr. said. "It's hard to put into words. Indy means our life. That is what it means to the Unser family."

As part of Legends Day, Unser will participate in an autograph session at 9 a.m. in Pagoda Plaza and a Q&A at 11 a.m. in mong the drivers wearing helmets featuring Lee's custom designs.
