Patriotic ceremonies scheduled for Memorial Day

For most of our people it's just a Monday off from work, the day after the 500, a time for relaxing with family and friends. But, for a small number of folks Memorial Day is a time to include in their "busy" day a visit to their local cemetery, to take flowers to a family member's grave and be present for a patriotic ceremony presented each year by the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Again this year the Legion and VFW posts in Hamilton County will



conduct ceremonies at several local cemeteries, May 25. In past years the brief ceremonies drew substantial crowds, but now only a few show up in most cases.

There are the veterans groups themselves who place flags on the graves of each veteran plus a few folks who have made the cemetery visit an annual ritual.

In Noblesville the veterans conduct a ceremony at the Courthouse Square war memorial beginning at 11 a.m. A similar ceremony will then be held at Riverside Cemetery about 11:30 followed by Crownland Cemetery veterans memorial at approximately 12 noon.

The Carmel and Westfield veterans organizations combine to hold memorial services at several cemeteries beginning at Hamilton Memorial Park at 9 a.m.

followed by a service at the Westfield Veterans Memorial at 9:30, then on to Little Eagle Creek Cemetery at about 10 a.m.

By approximately 10:45 the honor guard will be at Farley-Blue Cemetery, 106th and Keystone south of Carmel followed by the ceremony at Carmel Cemetery on North Range Line about 11:30.

At Fishers, the Legion will hold its memorial rites on the grounds of the post, 9091 E. 126th St., at noon.

It's not a bad way to spend a half hour or so on Memorial Day to pay respects to the men who fought and died to preserve the nation we enjoy today.

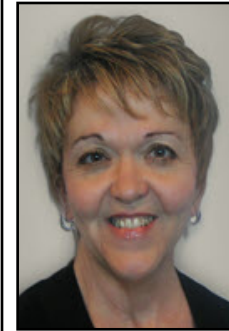
Ready or not...

Monday, May 25 is Memorial Day, more than a day off from work for some, more than a special sale at your favorite store, more than the beginning of summer and so much more to those who have men and women in the service. The day is especially named for those who have given their all for their country. First known as Decoration Day, a day to decorate the graves of the Civil War dead, Memorial Day was created on May 5, 1868 and was first observed on May 30, 1868. The day was

officially set aside to place flowers on the graves of both the Union and Confederate Armies. The first state to observed the day was New York in 1873. It took almost 100 years and an act of Congress to designate the last Monday in May as a National Holiday. A time to honor the defenders of the same principal that made this country great.

From a Memorial Day speech by Johnny Q. Gogue III, "Remember those that gave their lives so that we may continue to live in freedom as spelled out in the Constitution of the United States and the Declaration of Independence, Lest we forget". Every soldier takes the following oath when they enlist in the service of our country. "I do solemnly swear that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic, that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same and that I will obey the orders of the President of the United States and the orders of the officials appointed over me according to regulations and the uniform code of military justice, so help me God."

Men and women in uniform stand very straight and tall because they have a big job to do. To honor them is the very least we can do to give thanks for what this country represents. Notice in the oath that the new soldiers take is reference to the Constitution of the United States. Created in 1787 and ratified in 1788, the United States Constitu-

tion is a document like no other has been and amended twenty-seven times. The first ten amendments, known collectively as the Bill of Rights, offers specific protections of individual liberty and justice and place restrictions on the powers of government. The majority of the seventeen later amendments expand individual civil rights. All amendments are noted at the end of the document and with seven articles and twenty-seven amendments, the United States Constitution is the shortest written constitution of any country. The original is only five pages long written by hand on parchment paper.

There are still some pending amendments to the Constitution "The Titles of Nobility" proposed in 1810 would, if ratified, strip citizenship from any citizen who accepted a title of nobility from a foreign country. The amendments always fell short of its necessary number of states needed for ratification. Today an additional twenty-six states would need to agree on pending amendment. Not likely to be a problem.

On this special weekend:

Fly the flag, decorate the graves, reflect on those brave soldiers who protected our freedom and say a prayer for our nation. It starts and ends with each of us. Be a patriot...a person who loves, supports and defends the country and its interests with devotion.

which opened to the community in September 2013, continues to grow in size and scope. in fact, it is thriving with volunteers, support, donations, and a steady stream of patrons who are appreciative and thankful for the service. The selection available at the pantry has also grown from can goods, toiletries and non-perishables to baked goods, fresh food, meat, vegetables, fruits, paper goods, cleaning supplies and much more. The pantry is currently under the supervision of Susan McCoskey, a special education teacher at Heights.

"This experience has shown that not only is there a great need for food but for other basic necessities as well in our community," added Roper. "it's a service that is making a difference for our classmates and their families."

Junior Cody Walden initially signed up to help to earn service hours. But it was the back stories, building new relationships and seeing the real difference that this made in people's lives that has kept him involved.


Henry Marshall has always enjoyed volunteering and helping people. When he

signed up to help with the food pantry he admits he wasn't planning on doing too much. However, it didn't take long for him to get drawn in and becoming involved. "It's addicting and rewarding," he said. Junior Ashley Klopfenstein agrees. Klopfenstein was friends with a couple of students who started the pantry. "I didn't realize there was such a need in our community until I got involved," said Klopfenstein. "Now that I am, like Henry, it's addicting and you just want to do more all the time."

Hannah's mom, Dee Roper, approached me saying she thought I would be a good fit for the club," said Sophomore Ashley Irion. "She was right. I enjoy seeing people smile and making in difference in being able to make a real difference and ensuring there is food and other products are available times get a little rough for friends and families in our community."

One of the goals of the group is to continue to spread the word about the pantry and collect items and funds to keep shelves stocked.

The food pantry currently serves between 100-128 families per month, up from the 25-30 families when it first opened. The pantry is open monthly the third Thursday of every month from 4 to 7 p.m. The families remain anonymous and students can pick up what they need discreetly.

Noblesville High School graduation

It's the day a high school student dreams about and works towards: Graduation.

Noblesville High School's seniors will graduate on June 9. This year, the Millers will conduct their ceremonies at the Pepsi Coliseum at the Indiana State Fairgrounds. Here is some general information about the NHS graduation ceremony:

Students will have a commencement practice the morning of the ceremony. Attending practice is mandatory; students will not be allowed to participate in the ceremony if they don't attend practice. Students must be at NHS by 7:30 a.m. They will be loaded onto busses by 8:15 a.m. to travel down to the Coliseum for practice, then return to the high school by 12:45 p.m.

The ceremony will begin at 7 p.m. Students should park in Lot No. 5 (enter using Gate 3). Parents and guests will park in the infield; State Fair staff will help with parking. Those parking in the infield should enter using Gate 6. Parking is \$5 for everyone. Graduates are responsible for their own transportation to the Coliseum for the commencement ceremony.

The Coliseum doors open at 5:30 p.m. for seating. Parents and guests should enter

using the Coliseum's main doors. Graduates must report to the Youth Arena (Building 17) at 6 p.m. Enter the Youth Arena through the alley doors across from Building 14). Graduates need to bring their caps, gowns and tassels, and are reminded that they must have formal dress under their caps and gowns. Parents and guests are not permitted in the Youth Arena.

Anyone who wishes to take pictures of their graduates in their caps and gowns should do so ahead of time, as graduates will turn in their gowns right after the ceremony. Graduates will keep their caps and tassels.

No tickets are required, seating is first-come, first-served. Handicap seating will be available in the designated areas; seating is located at the top of sections 200, 202, 206, 209 and 216 off the Main Concourse, as well as sections 300 and 302 off the North Deck (3rd Floor). All three floors are elevator accessible. Each person requiring ADA seating will be allowed one companion to remain with them during the commencement ceremony.

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Rest assured in the security of salvation

We live in a constant struggle due to our fallen sin nature which came about through the disobedience of Adam and Eve in Genesis 3. The apostle Paul recognizes this constant struggle in Romans 7:18-24 (NKJV): “For I know that in me (that is, in my flesh) nothing good dwells; for to will is present with me, but *how* to perform what is good I do not find. For the good that I will *to do*, I do not do; but the evil I will not *to do*, that I practice. Now if I do what I will not *to do*, it is no longer I who do it, but sin that dwells in me. I find then a law, that evil is present with me, the one who wills to do good. For I delight in the law of God according to the inward man. But I see another law in my members, warring against the law of my mind, and bringing me into captivity to the law of sin which is in my members. O wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from this body of death?” Yet Paul also told us in Romans 6:6-7 (NKJV): “knowing this, that our old man was crucified with *Him*, that the body of sin might be done away with, that we should no longer be slaves of sin. For he who has died has been freed from sin.”

At first glance this sounds confusing. I’m saved therefore sin’s dominion in me has been abolished but I still practice the evil that I do not want to do! How can this be? The difference lies in being a slave to sin, a deliberate, willing, and dare I say even an eager participant in sin, versus

“hamartano” where we slip, fall short or miss the mark. Please do not mistake the wording to lessen the seriousness of the offense of sin which always carries consequences. But it brings up the age old question - If I sin am I still saved? 2 Cor 13:5 (NKJV) Tells us “Examine yourselves *as to* whether you are in the faith. Test yourselves. Do you not know yourselves, that Jesus Christ is in you?--unless indeed you are disqualified.” Ask yourself. Search your heart and come to a conclusion, if you believe and have faith that Jesus is the virgin born son of God, that He died on the cross as the atonement for your sins, that He rose in body from the grave and now sits at the right hand of God, and you have accepted Him as your Lord and Savior then your salvation is assured. Whether you feel saved or not is not the question as it is by FAITH we are saved. Therein lies the question, are you still saved if you sin? Well let me ask you, have you lost your faith? Have you chosen to disqualify yourself from saving grace and mercy by walking away from your faith? Read and take comfort in the following verses: 1 John 1:7-10 (NKJV) “But if we walk in the light as He is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanses us from all sin. If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us *our* sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make Him a liar, and His word is not in us”, and 1 John 2:1-2 (NKJV) “My little children, these things I write to you, so that you may not sin. And if anyone sins, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous. And He Himself is the propitiation for our sins,

and not for ours only but also for the whole world.” The truly saved Christian takes no pleasure in sin. That is due to the new nature bestowed in us at the time of salvation. Now knowing what Christ has suffered for us in order that we may be reconciled to Him, sin brings about a guilt and sorrow that leads us to repentance. Not simply an admission of wrong doing but a rejection of the offense coupled with a turning toward God in obedience to his desires for our new life in Him. This new nature evokes a deep desire to please God. While the sin nature still dwells in us, the key is to not let it rule in us. This is what Paul was referring to when he wrote about waging war in our members – the conflict between the intellect, emotions, fleshly desires and the spirit. The victory has been won through the power of the resurrected Christ but there is a daily, hourly, sometimes by the minute, battle that remains in our mind, spirit, and body until the day of our glorification. Living for God takes will power, a type of will power that on our own we do not possess. The good news is that at the very moment Christ is accepted as our personal savior we are indwelt with, and become the sanctuary for, His Holy Spirit. It is the power of the Spirit that gives us the strength and the will to wage the war against the temptations and transgressions that we all struggle with. But this Holy Spirit empowered resolve must be deliberately exercised. We must consciously and continuously take control of our thoughts, emotions, actions, and reactions. While I do not believe we fall into sin I do believe we can be weak warriors in the spiritual battle we face in opposition to sin. In His grace we are not left alone to fight the battle. 2 Cor 10:4 (NKJV) proclaims “... the weapons of our warfare *are* not carnal but mighty in

God for pulling down strongholds”. God has given us weapons to use in the battle. These Godly weapons are described in Eph 6:11-18 (NKJV) where we are told to put on the whole armor of God. This armor is not merely a protective defense but likewise should be intentionally used as an offensive weapon to be wielded daily in the battle. We take up the daily assault against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness, and from the struggle that lies within ourselves against our own sin nature for each one of us “is tempted when he is drawn away by his own desires and enticed” James 1:14 (NKJV). Regardless of where we ourselves perceive that the assault is coming from – possibly an attack of weakness, fleshly desires, from within our own vain imaginations or even brought on by the actions of others, in the end (and I also add, to begin with and throughout) our battle is against “spiritual *hosts* of wickedness”. So what are the weapons at our disposal? The primary offensive weapon is the Sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God and without which no warrior is well armed! In the Word you find Truth, which girds and protects us from deception and without leaves us open on every side. We have Righteousness as a breastplate, which is the justification (just as if I had not done it) obtained in Christ through faith. We stand ready and advance toward obedience out of love with our feet shod with the gospel of peace. We have a shield of faith to fend off attacks of the adversary and a helmet of salvation – which is our hope and promise. We are outfitted to stand our ground. And then stand the ground we have won!

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Softball sectionals feature a...

Big triple-header at Fishers on Monday

If you're a softball fan and you live close to Fishers, then that's the place to be on Monday.

The IHSAA softball tournament begins that day, and that includes a triple-header at the Tigers' stadium for the first round of Class 4A sectionals. Action begins with

Zionsville taking on the host Tigers at noon, followed by a big showdown between Carmel and defending sectional champion Hamilton Southeastern at 2 p.m. Westfield plays North Central at 4 p.m. to wrap up the day's games.

Noblesville drew the bye in the sectional, and will play the Zionsville-Fishers winner at 5 p.m. Tuesday in the first semi-final.

The Tigers played the Eagles less than a week ago - on Tuesday to be exact. It's a game that Fishers would rather forget, as Zionsville won 10-2. It's represented one of the very few setbacks for the Tigers, which come into the sectional with a 16-5 record.

While the Fishers-Zionsville game was only a few days ago, the Royals and Greyhounds played each other what seems like

ages ago. Back on March 30. Southeastern beat Carmel 3-1 in that game. Southeastern has gone on to a 23-2 record, including a victory Saturday at the Roncalli Tournament.

The Greyhounds aren't doing too badly either: They hold a 19-8 record which includes a perfect 7-0 in the Metropolitan Conference.

Westfield and North Central didn't meet during the regular season, but the Shamrocks are at a good place coming into the tournament. Westfield is 15-11 after regular-season play, and has won five of its last six games.

While the Fishers sectional will be jumping on Monday, Sheridan softball fans will be making their way to Eastern High School for that Class 2A sectional. The Blackhawks will play Tipton in the third game of a triple-header, with a scheduled first pitch at 2 p.m. The games start with Madison-Grant facing Elwood at 10 a.m., followed by Alexandria playing Eastern at noon.

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
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Fishers isn't giving in...
