Sheridan **Community Schools** lowers tax rate

Director of Business, Robin Popejoy, and Superintendent Dave Mundy have reported to the Sheridan Community School Board that the district recommends dropping the schools tax rate to around \$1.36 for this coming year. This is a reduction from the previous rate of \$1.40.

The reduction is made possible due to the 6% increase in assessed value across the district. Mrs. Popejoy stated, "This change in assessed value and revenue is allowing the district to help recover a small amount of the revenue that has been taken away from school districts over the last few years, but still be fiscally responsible in setting our tax rate for the community."

Mrs. Popejoy and Dr. Mundy also expressed to the school board that this keeps the district's referendum promise to the community true; the district would not raise their rates during the 7 year referendum period and would do what they can to lower it.

Cicero Triathlon announces title sponsor

Riverview Health will be the title sponsor of the Cicero Triathlon Weekend on June 20-21, 2015. The weekend will consist of the 32nd Annual Cicero Triathlon on Saturday and the 2nd Annual Strawberry 5K and Kids Triathlon on Sunday. All events will be staged at Cicero's Red Bridge Park and Morse Reservoir. The Hamilton North Chamber of Commerce, working with race management company Heartland Endurance Sports, will host the events.

"Riverview Health has been a valued supporter of our Chamber through the years and now they have picked up the title sponsorship of one of the longest running triathlons in the state. We think the connection between Riverview's commitment to the health of Hamilton County residents is a good fit with the Triathlon/5K/Youth Triathlon weekend.", says Jane Hunter, Executive Director of the Hamilton North Chamber of Commerce.

A few course changes have been made to make the Cicero Triathlon a true "sprint triathlon". The swim portion will be a box course with participants entering Morse Reservoir at the town docks at Red Bridge Park. They will swim out and around buoys marking the course and back to the swim exit at the emergency ramp at the south end of the park. The swim course is 500 meters. The bike course will be extended by .5 mile to make a 10 mile ride. The course will include a jog around Bear Cub Drive off of Mill Creek Road. The 5K run course remains the same.



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"Sugar in the morning, sugar in the evening, sugar at suppertime ..." McGuire Sisters, 1958

I imagine that when the McGuire Sisters recorded this tune many years ago know who they were!) it was not the intent of their lyrics to include over consumption of sugar and

yes, you guessed it - that is exactly my topic this week!

There are several reasons why we should be wary of sugar consumption, one reason being too much added sugar can crowd calories unaccompanied by fiber, vitamins, minerals, and other nutrients.

Sugar-sweetened beverages such as sodas, energy drinks, and sports drinks are by far the biggest sources of added sugar in the average American's diet. They account for more than one-third of the added sugar we consume as a nation. 1 Other important sources include cookies, cakes, pastries, and similar treats; fruit drinks; ice cream, frozen yogurt and the like; candy; and ready-to-eat cereals. I especially want to point out fruit juices - even the "healthiest" juices have quite a bit of sugar. Most of us don't consider added sugar in canned vegetables - yes, even fruits and vegetables. Manufacturers' goals are to make us "happy consumers" which includes what I consider to be the addiction of sugar.

According to the National Center for Health Statistics, an astounding 62 percent of adult Americans were overweight in 2000, up from 46 percent in 1980. Twentyseven percent of adults were so far overweight that they were classified as obese (at least 30 pounds above their healthy weight)—twice the percentage classified as such in 1960. Alarmingly, an upward trend in obesity is also occurring FlexAbility4u@aol.com for U.S. children. What that portends for our future I shudder to consider.

One hundred and fifty-six pounds... That's how much added sugar Americans consume each year on a per capita basis, physician for any issues you may have

according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). Imagine it: 31 fivepound bags for each of us. Only about 29 pounds of it comes as traditional sugar, or (gosh I sure hope you sucrose, according to The Sugar Association, a trade group of sugar manufacturers. The rest comes from foods.

In addition to candy, soda, and junk food, plenty of sugar is hiding in places where related health issues. But you might not expect it. Some types of crackers, yogurt, ketchup, and peanut butter, for instance, are loaded with sugar -- often in the form of high-fructose corn syrup, or HFCS. Use of this sweetener has increased 3.5% per year in the last decade, healthier foods from a person's diet; according to the World Health Organization (WHO). That's twice the rate at which the use of refined sugar has grown. An interesting activity I might suggest for my readers is to do a HFCS inventory in your kitchen pantry and frig, very enlightening I predict.

> Well this is all rather negative as we approach picnic season – sure we have lots of fresh fruits (some of which can be a source of sugar) and vegetables, but we know we just love that blueberry pie, strawberry shortcake with whipped cream, and banana pudding...oh my. However, if we make a concentrated effort to limit our sugar intake of other foods and beverages by paying attention to added sugars and reading the ingredient labels, we can sometimes indulge in a special treat as long as we practice mindful consumption and get back on the healthy eating track!

are simply used as tools to cut seat belts or pry loose something that might have a person trapped in an accident or other emergency.

Carmel Police Chief Tim Green says his department has not asked for any of the military surplus that is no longer being offered or under consideration for recall. Several years ago the CPD did acquire a bullet-proof Peacekeeper vehicle which can be used to give officers protection when approaching a barricaded suspect or other such dangerous situations.

While the likelihood of violent civil unrest in Hamilton County is very remote, the police chiefs say that in such an event mutual assistance agreements would allow them to get immediate help from State Police or other agencies that could bring the manpower and equipment needed to handle the situation.

So, local law enforcement is not going to be disarmed or left in need of military weaponry. But, the question arises as to whether restricting certain weapons in Baltimore or any city will have the desired effect of reducing future violence. Time will tell, but it's hard to imagine how reducing police access to weapons will discourage anyone interested in creating trouble.



Millers end regular season winning two out of three


It was a pressure-packed two days of baseball for Noblesville last Thursday and Friday to end the regular season, with the real battle ahead this week at the Zionsville Sectional.

Former NBA Star Bonzi Wells named Director of Basketball Operations at Grand Park Fieldhouse

Wells, a native of Muncie, IN., had a standout career at Muncie Central High School as he was runner up for Mr. Basketball (Bryce Drew) and received a full scholarship to Ball State University where he played from 1994-1998.


Wells was named the Mid-American Conference (MAC) freshman of the year in the 1994-1995 season. On February 21, 1998, he broke Ron Harper's record of 2,377 points. Wells also led the Mid-American Conference in steals in 1998 with 73, averaging 3.55 steals in 29 games. He led the conference in steals during all four years at Ball State and finished his career as the Mid-American Conference all-time career record holder in points (2,485) and steals (347). While

at Ball State, Wells averaged 21.4 PPG, 3 SPG, 7.3 RPG. In 2004, Ball State retired his jersey, number 42, in recognition of his achievements.

Following his career at Ball State, Wells was selected eleventh overall by the Detroit Pistons in the 1998 NBA Draft. He never played for the Pistons, as his draft rights were traded to the Portland Trailblazers for the Blazers' 1999 first round pick. Wells played professionally for 11 years in the NBA (Portland Trailblazers, Memphis Grizzlies, Houston Rockets, Sacramento Kings and New Orleans Hornets-now Pelicans). He averaged a career high 17 PPG during his 2001-2002 season with the Portland Trailblazers.

CanStruction in 2013 which has created two colossal replicas of the historic courthouse made entirely from canned and nonperishable food items. This program has donated 9,000 non-perishable food items to the Noblesville Township Trustees Office and raised \$10,000 to relieve hunger anxiety locally. The staff also hosts an holiday ornament contest coordinated with the company's annual food and clothing drive and works to activate the alleys in downtown Noblesville through wine tastings, markets, festivals, art shows, music programs and more. In addition, all employees volunteer time to their own special projects and causes.

All-Around Volunteer - Anita Hagen. Hagen was nominated by fellow volunteers of the Hamilton County Harvest Food Bank in Noblesville, where she volunteers an immeasurable amount of time to ensuring that Hamilton County's food pantries are stocked.
