A fire severely damaged a home near 131st Street and Howe Road on Sunday.

Fire fighters made a quick interior attack but had to pull out when the staircase burned.

The fire was knocked down from a defensive attack and then crews went back inside to extinguish the remaining fire. Units from the Carmel Fire Department and the Fishers Police Department assisted.

There were no injuries reported. Quick actions of two neighbors saved the family dog. The residence will be a near total loss.

Fishers, Hamilton Southeastern among teams to play...

High school football at Victory Field

In October high school football will be played for the first time under the Friday night lights of Victory Field. The inaugural Victory Field Gridiron Classic presented by the Indiana National Guard will feature Fishers against Cathedral on Oct. 2 and Brownsburg vs. Hamilton Southeastern on Oct. 16. Both games will kick off at 7 p.m. It will be the first time football games will be played on the field that, since 1996, has been the home of the Indianapolis Indians.

Tickets will go on sale to the public Aug. 3 for \$8. Indians season ticket holders will receive a special opportunity to purchase tickets in advance. Children age 2 and under will receive free admission.

The football field configuration will stretch north-to-south, parallel to the third base line. The configuration was tested last fall when Brownsburg High held a practice at the ballpark.

Southeastern coach Scott May said that the Bulldogs asked the Royals if they wanted to play there. The game was originally to be a Brownsburg home game.

"We thought it would be a cool thing for the kids and fans to play in a venue like that - something different," said May.

Fishers will wind up being one of the first two teams to play there, which gives the Tigers a chance to make the same history they did in 2008. Fishers and Noblesville played the first football game in Lucas Oil Stadium, and the Tigers wound up scoring the first-ever touchdown in the building.

"The Indiana Army National Guard is excited to be able to participate in the inau-

gural Gridiron Classic at Victory Field this Fall, the event gives Indiana the ability to showcase young talent all while giving these students an opportunity of a lifetime," said Lieutenant Colonel Shawn Gardner, Indiana Army National Guard Recruiting and Retention Battalion Commander.

Victory Field's playing surface continues to be among the most-respected in all of professional baseball. Following the 2014 season Indians head groundskeeper Joey Stevenson was recognized as the Triple-A Groundskeeper of the Year by the Sports Turf Managers Association. It was the third time in four years Stevenson and Victory Field were presented this award.

Other special sporting events outside of Indians baseball games have been held on the Victory Field surface. Each year it hosts the Indiana High School Athletic Association state baseball championships, the City and County Baseball Tournament finals, and since 2009 the Indiana Children's Wish Fund Celebrity Softball Challenge. Victory Field also hosts a few college baseball games each spring – most recently Indiana vs. Notre Dame on Apr. 21. The most unusual event to take place on the Victory Field playing surface was when it was converted to the world's largest indoor beach during Super Bowl XLVI in 2012.

Horace Hilton Harvey

May 21, 2015

On Thursday, May 21, 2015, the Lord called home our dear father, Horace Hilton Harvey. He went by Hilton, but always initialed things HHH. Dad was a lifelong resident of Hamilton County. He graduated from Sheridan H.S. during the 1930's when times were hard. He worked along side his father, Ervin Harvey, farming with a team of horses on their home place near Baker's Corner. He was raised there with his sister, Geraldine, by his loving mother, Edith Cropper Harvey. His home church growing up was the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Baker's Corner.

The entire family played instruments or sang for enjoyment. Music was part of the common thread that brought our mother, Virginia Moore Harvey, and father together. Mom's father had founded the Landis Moore Music Club, where local musicians would congregate once a month at the shelter house in Sheridan to share music and pot luck dinners. Both sides of our family were involved with this Saturday night affair. We have great memories of all this time.

As a child, Dad had an infection that left him handicapped in one leg. Because of this, he did not qualify for service during World War II. Instead, he was given the opportunity to train as a draftsman. During the war he was employed by a firm that required him to be on call sitting at a desk, sometimes around the clock, to provide specs for government war needs. After the war, he landed a job with Firestone Rubber Products in Noblesville. He retired as supervisor of the drafting department after more than three decades of service.

Our parents married during wartime. He called her Ginny and she called him Hilly. They were married for nearly sixty years before Mom's passing in 2002. Dad joined Mom's home church of Hortonville United Methodist. This loving church environment is where we were nurtured and raised in our Christian faith. They had three daughters: Leonida (passed away at infancy) and us, Alana Lee Harvey Faiz (married to Faiz M. Faiz) and Lenita Jane Harvey Curry (married to Jim Curry). Mom and Dad were both passionate about their family and stood behind each one through thick and thin, good times and bad. We also had a lot of fun!

Their union provided a strong backdrop for the generations that came next. His five grandchildren and their spouses in order of birth: Anisa Clingenpeel (Aaron), Amina Flowers (Rodney), Omar Faiz (Rae Ann), Adam Curry, Amanda Myles (Jason). His nine great grandchildren in order of birth: Luke Flowers, Josiah and Nathaniel Flowers, Jacob Clingenpeel, Abby Clingenpeel, Alea Flowers, Saleh Faiz, Zakir Faiz, Nadine Faiz.

Our father had an insatiable curiosity for life. He and Mom homesteaded their own farm: built their house, raised cows and chickens and sheep and pigs, planted crops, put up hay, harvested apples and pears, planted victory gardens, canned food~and raised us around all this.

As a younger man, Dad coached a local basketball league team, he sang with Mom at revivals, played guitar and banjo at Music Club and worked tirelessly at the Hortonville Church. In midlife, Dad fulfilled his lifelong dream of getting his private pilot's license. He flew as far as he could in his Piper Cherokee. If you said, "let's go flying!" he was ready to go. Dad never really retired. He self-educated himself in computers and Ham radio. He was always busy doing something. There was no idle time in our household. If something needed fixing he could fix it, sometimes with duct tape and bailing twine; but it would be fixed. He spent 83 of his 95 years with a handicapped leg. It never slowed him down. He never thought of himself as handicapped, but instead pushed himself that much harder to achieve because of it. He accomplished much in his long life. What we will remember most though, was his unconditional love for family and for his Savior. Now he has two good legs with which to bow at the feet of our Lord. We will miss him.

We love flowers, but if you wish to make a donation in lieu of flowers, we would suggest either the Hortonville United Methodist Church or the Gideons. Dad had the privilege to serve as a Gideon for many years.

Services will be held at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, May 30, 2015, at the Hortonville United Methodist Church, intersection of Horton Rd. and 206th St., Sheridan, Indiana. Burial will follow at Crown View Cemetery. Reverend Pete O'Hara will be officiating. Visitation will take place from 5-8 p.m. on Friday, May 29, 2015, at Kercheval Funeral Home, 306 East 10th St., Sheridan, Indiana.

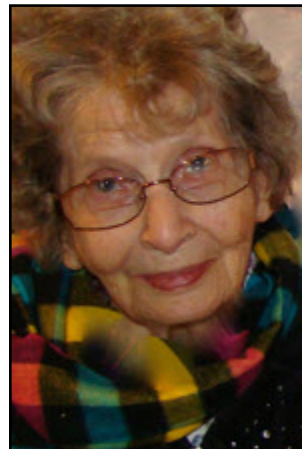

Hubbard wins twice at West Lafayette

It was a tight race for the West Lafayette girls track and field regional trophy Tuesday, and Avon got the edge.

The Orioles squeaked past Carmel 83-81 to claim the regional championship. Still, Hamilton County had four of the top six teams in the event: After West Lafayette's third place finish, Fishers was fourth, Hamilton Southeastern fifth and Westfield sixth.

"We came in 2nd by thinnest of margins, but we feel really good about how our team performed," said Greyhounds coach Aaron McRill. "That West Lafayette Regional is a complete meat grinder, it's by far the most competitive regional in the state. To score as many points as we did is a true statement on how hard our girls have been working."

The Shamrocks were led by Karen Hubbard, who was the only athlete to win two individual events on the night. Hubbard dashed to victory in the 100 and 200 races. She outdueled two young stars to get her blue ribbons, beating Avon's Diamond Mitchell in the 100 and Fishers' India Johnson in the 200. It was the second regional championship in a row for Hubbard in the 100.

The Tigers picked up an individual win from Paris Carver, who edged Carmel's Rachel Dixon for first place. The Greyhounds won two relays, the 4x400 and 4x800, while the Royals were winners in the 4x100.

More importantly, the top three finishers in each event qualify for next weekend's state meet at Indiana University in Bloomington. In addition to the winners, other qualifiers included:

For Carmel, Dixon in the 400, Kelsey Harris and Haley Harris in the 800, Haley Harris in the 1600, Jessica Cowen in the 300 hurdles and Cailyn Etgen in the long jump. Several other times may be good enough to get callbacks; those will be finalized later in the week.

Haley Harris finished fifth in the 800, but gets a ticket to state by beating the standard time. The standard in the 800 is 2:16.53; Haley easily beat that with a 2:15.01.

Fishers' Johnson made it to state in the 100 and 200 dashes, along with the Tigers' 4x400 relay. Emily Fletchall advanced in the pole vault and Blake Inglis qualified in the discus.

Southeastern qualifiers are Camille Christopher in the 200 dash, Rachel Nichwiz in the 1600 run, Courtney Pfanstiel in the 3200 run, Mia Mackenzie in the 300 hurdles and the 4x400 relay. Again, several other times are close enough to get callbacks.

Noblesville had two state qualifiers: The Millers' 4x800 team and Dilan Palmer in the pole vault.

At the boys track and field regional...

Standards will be high at Lafayette

One thing will be certain about Thursday's Lafayette Jeff boys track and field regional: The standards will be high.
And there are several athletes who are capable of meeting them. That may be the only way some of them advance to the state meet.
This year's regional will take place at West Lafayette's stadium due to work being done at Lafayette Jeff's stadium. The meet starts at 6:15 p.m., with the running finals scheduled for 7:30 p.m.
The times that the athletes will be focused on is the three participant standard, which allows one that has a great performance to advance to state regardless of his

place. Normally the top three in each advance to state, but this is not a normal regional.
For example, the top EIGHT performers in the 100 dash that advanced to regional from their respective sectional were under the standard of 11.09. That includes three Hamilton County runners: Carmel's Isaac James, Noblesville's Jake Owens and Hamilton Southeastern's Willie Humphrey. James ran 10.79, Owens 11.00 and Humphrey 11.08.
The top seed in the 100 is Tri-West's Wesley Cook, who ran a 10.78 at the Zionsville sectional. Owens himself is seeded first in the 400 dash. Carmel has two top seeds, Ben Veatch in the 3200 and the Greyhounds' 4x800 relay. Fishers is seeded first in the 4x100 relay, with Trevor Thompson top rated in the 1600 run. Hamilton Heights' Michael Defoe is the 110 hurdles' top seed.

And what about Hamilton Southeastern? Well, expect the Royals to raise the roof in any field event that involves jumping. Southeastern has three legitimate state contenders in those three leaping events.
In the pole vault, Ethan Bray wowed everyone with a record vault of 16 feet, 4.75 inches. Bray will get some competition from Frankfort freshman Colton Crum, who has leaped 16 feet.
Tiger Guillory, who came out for track and field for the first time this year, is the first seed in the long jump, with a sectional jump of 22-5.75. Francis Ehigbai tied with Fishers' Noah Rogers in the high jump; both cleared 6-5 at the sectional.
And yes, all of those distances are well ahead of the state standards.

Breaking down the boys regional

100 Dash: The top three seeds in this event are led by a lightning trio of Wesley Cook, a junior from Tri-West Hendricks (10.78); Isaac James, a senior from Carmel (10.79), and Jake Owens, a senior from Noblesville (11.01). But, down in seventh place is McCutcheon junior Donnie Blount, who last year finished second with a 10.99 clocking.
110 Hurdles: Looking at the seeds, it appears the field will be chasing Hamilton Heights junior Michael Defoe (14.21). He finished fifth, behind four graduating seniors, last year. Second-best seed time is a 14.68 by Carmel senior Ryan Stoebeck and third-best is a 14.80 by Westfield junior Martell Fletcher.

200 Dash: This is a wide-open event which by seed times lists Tri-West junior Wesley Cook (22.44), Brownsburg junior Tyler Kirtz (22.69), Noblesville senior Jake Owens (22.73) and Plainfield senior Andrew Snoke (22.76). Snoke is the top finisher returning from last season. He was sixth.
1600 Run: The defending champion, Brownsburg junior Hari Sathyamurthy, returns but is seeded No. 3 (4:28.44) behind Fishers junior Trevor Thompson (4:21.04) and Carmel junior Teddy Browning (4:28.23). This one should be an interesting race.
400 Dash: Noblesville senior Jake Owens, who finished second behind a senior last year, holds the top seed at 49.50. Second-best is a 49.72 by Fishers senior Josh

Lloyd. Owens and Lloyd may carry all of Hamilton County's colors in this event.
300 Hurdles: Carmel's Jalen Walker, as a sophomore, placed second last year. Avon senior Marcus Griffin did not place. But, entering this year's meet Griffin owns a 39.30 No. 1 seed time and Walker is second at 39.57.
800 Run: Hamilton County may need an upset or two in this event. Hari Sathyamurthy, a Brownsburg junior, is the defending champion and he also has to the top seed time (1:56.07). Zionsville junior Oliver Rigg has a second-best at 157.18, followed by Southeastern senior Jordan Wright (1:57.48) and Guerin Catholic senior Christopher Bluish (1:57.51). Hamilton Heights' Craig Schildmeier, who placed

third as a junior last year, is seeded No. 6 at 1:59.43.
3200 Run: The top seed, by a country mile, is Carmel junior Ben Veatch at 9:02.31. He is followed in seed times by two Southeastern runners, freshman Gabe Fendel at 9:28.08 and sophomore Ben Wagner at 9:28.95. Fourth is West Lafayette junior Cooper Williams, who last year beat Veatch by nearly 12 seconds.
High Jump: Fishers' Noah Rogers, who last year placed fourth behind three seniors, and Southeastern senior Francis Ehigbai have the best jumps to date. Each has cleared 6-5. Southmont senior Jason Christian, who finished fifth last year, has been 6-4.
Long Jump: The defending regional champion, Fishers senior Tres Carver, returns but he has been 22-4.25 this season, second to Hamilton Southeastern senior Tiger Guillory, the big surprise in Hamilton County this fall. Guillory has leaped 22-5.75. In third place is Carmel senior Isaac James at 22-1.
Pole Vault: It's doubtful if anyone can defeat the defending regional champion, Southeastern junior Ethan Bray. He won at 14-7 last year and has a season-best 16-4.75. His biggest threat, believe it or not, could be a Frankfort freshman. Colton Crum has cleared 16-0.
Discus: The defending champion, Avon senior David Schall, is the favorite. His best toss is 164-02. Lebanon junior Kyle Williams has been 158-7 and Noblesville junior Eric Ferguson is third with a 156-0 toss.
Shot Put: Avon senior David Schall is the defending champion and favorite. His season best is 61-2.75. That's better than a 55-1.75 toss by Carmel senior Vince Laco-ni, who finished fourth behind a pair of seniors last year.
Relays: There will be some good races, maybe regional team championship races, in the three relay events.
In the **3200 relay**, Carmel has a 7:57.43 seed tie and West Lafayette is second at 8:01.75.
In the **400 relay**, Fishers is No. 1 seeded at 42.48 and Carmel is second at 42.62.
Brownsburg leads in the **1600 relay** at 3:21.62, followed by Avon at 3:22.63 and Fishers at 3:22.99.

Huskies face big task at Yorktown....

Millers, Eagles out to break tie

They tied for second place in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference with matching 11-7 records.

When going face to face back in mid-April they had a most unusual three-game series.

Tonight, they, Noblesville and Zionsville, will go head to head in the opening game of the loaded Zionsville Sectional.

It's the only game at Zionsville tonight. First round action will be completed on Thursday with Carmel meeting Hamilton Southeastern at 5:30 p.m., followed by a match-up between Fishers and North Central.

The game tonight, weather allowing, is scheduled to start at 6 p.m.

There is little to choose from when comparing the Millers and the Eagles. When they faced in their three-game series, Zionsville won the opener 10-0 at Zionsville; Noblesville captured the second game 6-0 at Don Dunker Field; and Noblesville won Game 3, 3-2, at Zionsville.

In 13 home games, Zionsville has lost only to Noblesville and to Brownsburg, 9-8 in 8 innings.

Zionsville's overall record is 21-8. The defending state champion Millers will enter this year's tourney with a 19-10.

Noblesville finished the regular season with four wins in five games and 11 victories in 12 games. Zionsville has won seven of its last eight games.

Zionsville is an awesome hitting team, batting .292 as a team. It's hard for a pitcher to work through the Zionsville lineup without facing power. Jacob Hurd is batting .381; Jacob Hurtubise .366; Nick Prater .359; Grant Sloan .328; Nolan Elsbury .322, and Jack Pitcher .307.

The Eagles have crushed eight home runs; 11 triples and 39 doubles.

Noblesville has only three starters batting better than .300, but two of the three are way over the .300 mark. Connor Christman is the leader at .429, followed by Travis Gillian at .396 and Bryce Masterson at .306.

Noblesville has five home runs; seven triples ad 35 doubles.

Pitching? Who will pitch the opener? It's a must win, but the team that wins this game will have two more real tough challenges before clinching a sectional championship.

Noblesville's best on the mound has been a junior lefty, Cory Conway. He's 7-2 with a 1.49 ERA and Conway has fanned 83 batters in 56 innings. Next best by the numbers is junior Justin Buchanan with a 3-0 mark and a 1.22 ERA.

Zionsville has three pitchers with 3-1 records and ERA under two. Sloan has a 0.82 ERA and has fanned 25 in 25 innings. Ray Wagner has a 4-1 record with 2.23 ERA and 35 fans in 37 innings.

Unlike in the HCC where the two teams deadlocked, there can be no tie tonight at Zionsville.

Huskies on the road

The other Hamilton County team which will open sectional play tonight is Hamilton Heights.

The Huskies face a gigantic opening assignment in the Yorktown Sectional, meeting the host team at 5 p.m.

Yorktown is 21-4 and 13-0 on its home field. The Tigers had an 11-game win streak snapped by Greenfield Central in their regular season finale.

Hamilton Heights is 8-18.

The Huskies closed their regular season on Saturday, losing a double-header to a very good Frankfort (19-5) team, 9-1 and 2-0.

John Fisher threw a great game in the 2-0 loss, allowing just four hits and fanning eight in six innings.

Ian Nicholson had a big day at the plate, going 4-for6 in the double-header.

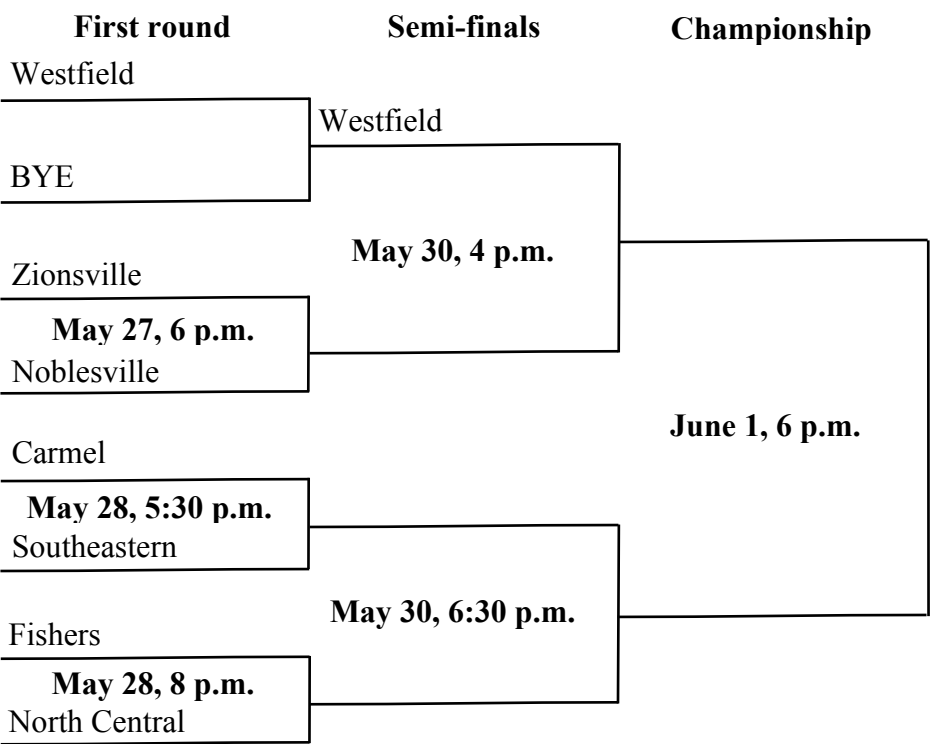

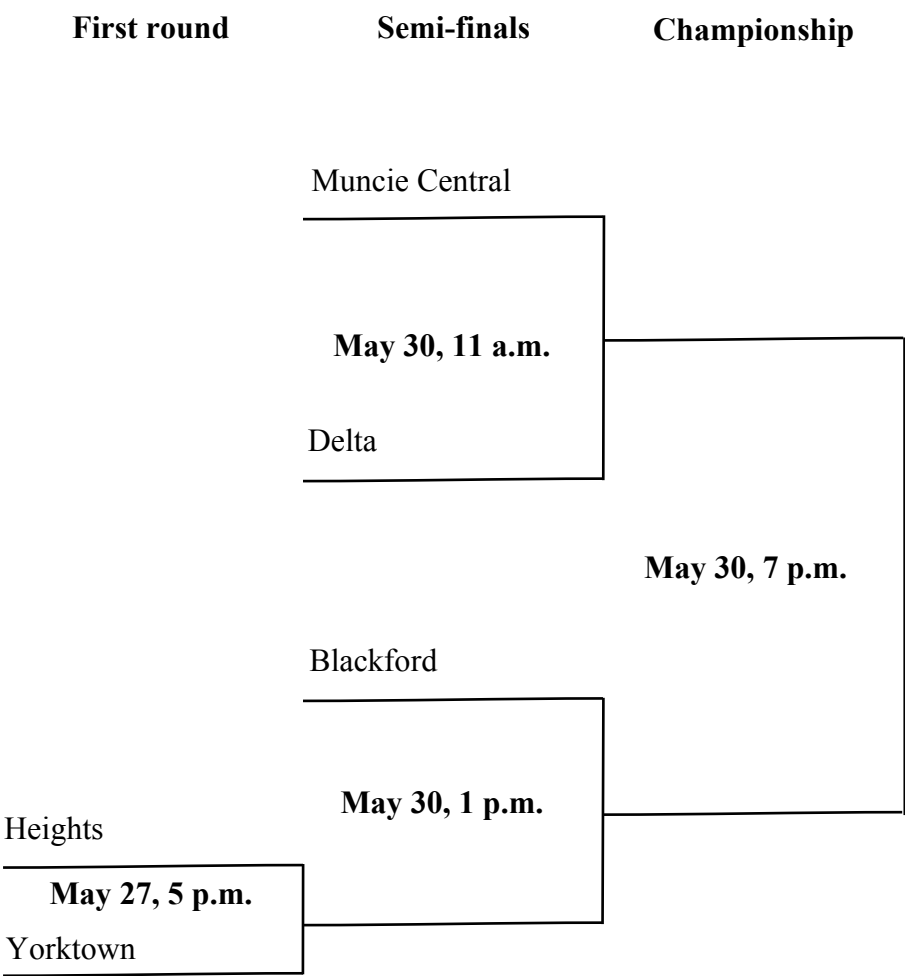

Sectional 8 - At Zionsville

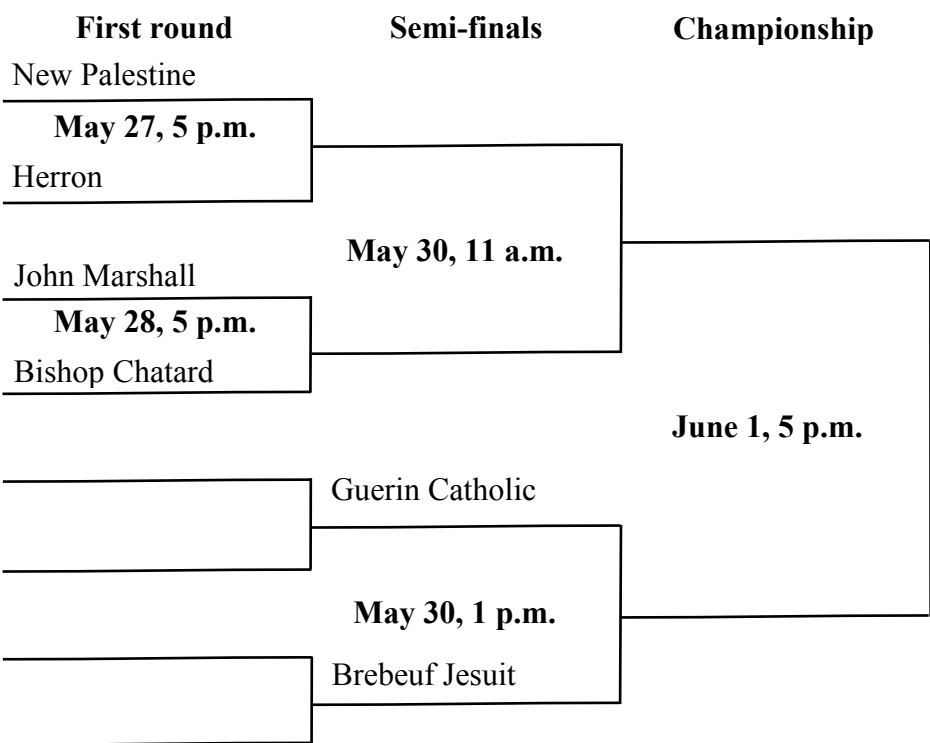


Sectional 24 - At Yorktown

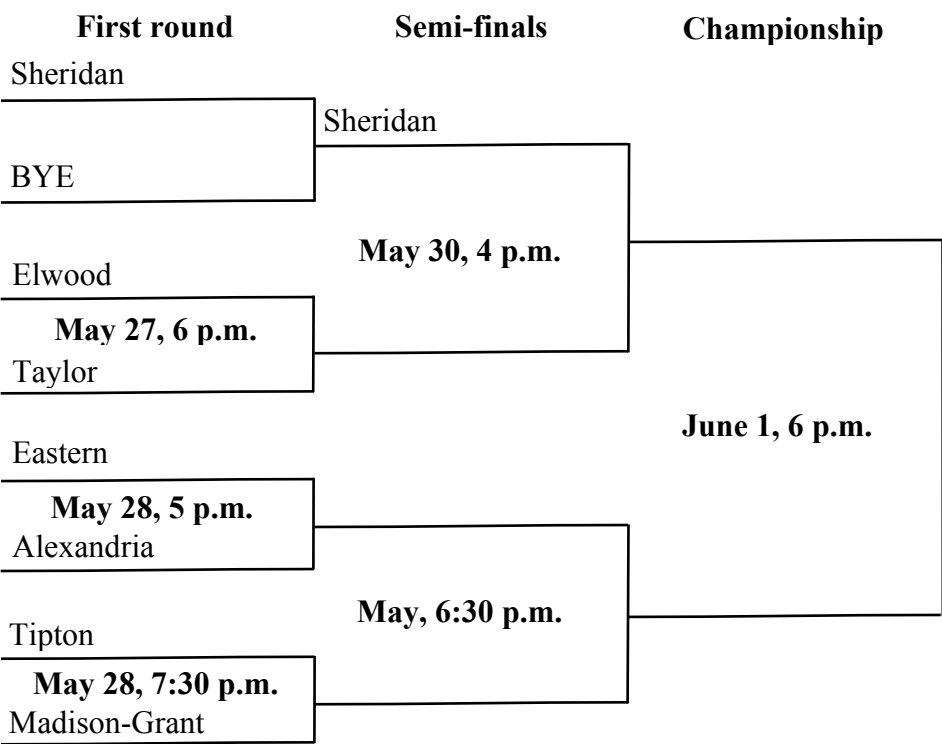
