On Thursday, May 21, 2015, the Lord called home our dear father, Horace Hilton Harvey. He went by Hilton, but always initialed things HHH. Dad was a lifelong resident of Hamilton County. He

He worked along side his father, Ervin Harvey, farming with a team of horses on their home place near Baker's Corner. He was raised there with his sister, Geraldine, by his loving mother, Edith Cropper Harvey. His home church growing up was the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Baker's Corner.

The entire family played instruments or sang for enjoyment. Music was part of the common thread that brought

our mother, Virginia Moore Harvey, and father together. Mom's father had founded the Landis Moore Music Club, where local musicians would congregate once a month at the shelter house in Sheridan to share music and pot luck dinners. Both sides of our family were involved with this Saturday night affair. We have great memories of all this time.

As a child, Dad had an infection that left him handicapped in one leg. Because of this, he did not qualify for service during World War II. Instead, he was given the opportunity to train as a draftsman. During the war he was employed by a firm that required him to be on call sitting at a desk, sometimes around the clock, to provide specs for government war needs. After the war, he landed a job with Firestone Rubber Products in Noblesville. He retired as supervisor of the drafting department after more than three decades of service.

Our parents married during wartime. He called her Ginny and she called him Hilly. They were married for nearly sixty years before Mom's passing in 2002. Dad joined Mom's home church of Hortonville United Methodist. This loving church environment is where we were nurtured and raised in our Christian faith. They had three daughters: Leonida (passed away at infancy) and us, Alana Lee Harvey Faiz (married to Faiz M. Faiz) and Lenita Jane Harvey Curry (married to Jim Curry). Mom and Dad were both passionate about their family and stood behind each one through thick and thin, good times and bad. We also had a lot of fun!

Their union provided a strong backdrop for the generations that came next. His five grandchildren and their spouses in order of birth: Anisa Clingenpeel (Aaron), Amina Flowers (Rodney), Omar Faiz (Rae Ann), Adam Curry, Amanda Myles (Jason). His nine great grandchildren in order of birth: Luke Flowers, Josiah and Nathaniel Flowers, Jacob Clingenpeel, Abby Clingenpeel, Alea Flowers, Saleh Faiz, Zakir Faiz, Nadine Faiz.

Our father had and insatiable curiosity for life. He and Mom homesteaded their own farm: built their house, raised cows and chickens and sheep and pigs, planted crops, put up hay, harvested apples and pears, planted victory gardens, canned food~and raised us around all this.

As a younger man, Dad coached a local basketball league team, he sang with Mom at revivals, played guitar and banjo at Music Club and worked tirelessly at the Hortonville Church. In midlife, Dad fulfilled his lifelong dream of getting his private pilot's license. He flew as far as he could in his Piper Cherokee. If you said, "let's go flying!" he was ready to go. Dad never really retired. He self-educated himself in computers and Ham radio. He was always busy doing something. There was no idle time in our household. If something needed fixing he could fix it, sometimes with duct tape and bailing twine; but it would be fixed. He spent 83 of his 95 years with a handicapped leg. It never slowed him down. He never thought of himself as handicapped, but instead pushed himself that much harder to achieve because of it. He accomplished much in his long life. What we will remember most though, was his unconditional love for family and for his Savior. Now he has two good legs with which to bow at the feet of our Lord. We will miss him.

We love flowers, but if you wish to make a donation in lieu of flowers, we would suggest either the Hortonville United Methodist Church or the Gideons. Dad had the privilege to serve as a Gideon for many years.







## Miller softball blasts its way to sectional title

It had been five years since the Noblesville softball team had been in a sectional championship game, but the Millers were back there Friday night.

Noblesville made the most of that opportunity, using two huge innings to beat Carmel 14-4 for the Class 4A Sectional 8 trophy at Fishers. It was the first sectional championship since 2008 for the Millers, who will host Kokomo at 7 p.m. Tuesday for the regional title.

"Even though we had the bye, I felt like we had as tough a road as anybody in the tournament, having to fight our way through Schnaiter and Fishers and then Eckl and Carmel," said Noblesville coach Mike Ramsey. "Carmel's every bit as talented a hitting team as we are."

The Millers got the first run of the game in the top of the second when Taylor Bounin hit a solo home run.

"I didn't feel like I was going to hit a home run, but I felt that a hit was coming, and it was just right there in my zone and I

took it out," said Bounin.

The Millers scored seven runs on the fourth inning to break the game wide open. Prior to playing for U of I Parker played three years at Vanderbilt University. Head basketball coach Kevin Stalling said "We are extremely saddened with the news of Dai-Jon's death. Everyone who watched him play basketball knew what kind of athlete he was.

He always had a smile on his face and I will always remember him for that smile and the positive spirit he had.
