Several injured in Southeastern Parkway accident...

Campus Parkway crash kills Cicero woman

Two car accidents took place in the southeastern part of Hamilton County over the past two days, with one of them claiming the life of a Cicero woman.

Tuesday morning at approximately 11:02 a.m., police officers and firefighters from the Noblesville Police & Fire Departments responded to the intersection of Campus Parkway and Bergen Boulevard in Hamilton Town Center in reference to a report of a two-car motor vehicle crash. Officers and firefighters arrived on the scene a short time later and began to investigate.

Based on witness statements and evidence at the scene, it appears that a 2001 Buick passenger car was traveling southbound on Bergen Blvd. when it was struck by a 2004 International cargo truck that was traveling westbound on Campus Parkway.

The driver of the Buick, Betty J. Pritchard, 64, was transported by ground ambulance to St. Vincent (Fishers) and later by air ambulance to St. Vincent (Indianapolis), where she was pronounced dead shortly after her arrival. There were no additional occupants in the vehicle. The driver of the International was identified as Michael L. Klepfer, Jr., 46, of Westfield, IN. The driver did not sustain any injuries as a result of the accident. There were no additional occupants in the vehicle. Investigators from the NPD Accident Reconstruction Unit were summons to the scene to collect evidence and gather information. As a result of the lengthy investigation, traffic was diverted around the intersection of Campus Pkwy. and Bergen Blvd. until around 3:16 p.m. on Tuesday.

The Hamilton Town Center crash followed an incident Monday night where a crash on Southeastern Parkway left six children and one adult hospitalized, and another driver under arrest.

Shortly after 7 p.m. on Monday, the Hamilton County Dispatch Center received multiple 911 calls regarding a serious motor vehicle crash on Southeastern Parkway. According to the 911 caller, the crash involved a Chrysler van and a Chevrolet passenger car. Fishers police and fire personnel responded to the scene. Upon their arrival, officers located six children (ages 5-16 years old) and one adult suffering various injuries. All

Theft and burglary suspects in Fishers

Sheridan fire might have been arson

A fire that occurred on May 28th shortly after 3:00 a.m. in a downtown Sheridan has area residents nervous.

The Sheridan Fire Department reported the fire was located at Kidpsych Inc. 104 W. 3rd Street.

Sheridan Fire Chief Bret Merriman stated, due to vandalism discovered at the fire scene his department and the Fire Marshall's Office are conducting an arson investigation. "Right now we are still waiting on lab results taken from evidence at the scene," said Merriman.

Fire investigators also stated they are investigating other fires that may be related.

Due to the ongoing investigations fire officials would not comment if graffiti found spray painted on the side of 104 W. Main Street was related.

Recently Sheridan police have received reports of the word "HEX" being spray painted on vehicles, homes, fences and the Sheridan Water Department. "HEX" was also found spray painted on west wall of the most recent fire.

One Sheridan resident stated vandals have on two separate occasions spray painted "HEX" on her home and vehicle. "It is scary. I was home when it happened."

Fliers advertising the Arson Hotline telephone number have been posted in several Sheridan businesses. Merriman said, "There is a reward for information leading

seven victims were transported to IU Health Methodist Hospital (Indianapolis) by the Fishers Department of Fire and Emergency Services. Those injured were occupants of the van. The three occupants in the passenger car were not injured. The uninjured remained at the scene and cooperated with Investigators.

The Fishers Police Department Crash Team arrived to collect evidence and interview witnesses. Based on evidence at the scene it appears the passenger car was traveling eastbound on Southeastern Parkway when it left the roadway and lost control. The passenger car returned to the roadway, crossed the centerline, and struck the van as it was traveling westbound.

Southeastern Parkway was closed in between Blessed Mother Boulevard and 126th Street for three and a half hours.

The driver of the passenger car, Carter Lynn James, 21, Fishers, was arrested without incident and transported to the Hamilton County Jail. James was charged with two counts of Operating a Vehicle While Intoxicated Causing Serious Bodily Injury, a Level 6 Felony, and Operating a Vehicle While Intoxicated, a Class “A” Misdemeanor.

TUESDAY FIRE CAUSES \$80,000 DAMAGE

A Tuesday afternoon fire in south Carmel caused \$80,000 in damage.

At 3:15 p.m., Carmel Fire Department responded to a fire at 43 Manchester Ct, which is located near 111th and Meridian streets. The initial dispatch stated the fire was in the kitchen and the house was filling with smoke. The first fire engine on scene reported smoke showing from the residence and then began an initial attack.

The homeowner was the only resident home at the time, and had exited the house prior to the arrival of the fire department. Carmel firefighters made a quick knock-down of the fire and kept it from spreading to any other part of the home.

Damages are estimated at \$80,000 and the fire is under investigation.

No firefighters or residents were injured during the fire.

A large crowd was on hand to watch the Noblesville softball team host its Class 4A regional game with Kokomo on Tuesday.

The Millers gave their fans plenty to cheer about. Noblesville scored a 10-0 victory over the Wildkats, giving the Millers their second regional championship in

school history. Noblesville won its other regional in 2002.

"It's always been a challenge to get out of our sectional, and to get out and to then take it one step further even, and win a regional is just a great honor for us," said Miller coach Mike Ramsey.

With that, the Millers are heading to a familiar place - Harrison, the site of the Class 4A northern semi-state. Noblesville takes on Lake Central in the second semi-final Saturday afternoon; that follows an 11 a.m. game between Homestead and Penn. The championship is scheduled for 7 p.m.

The Millers broke the game open in the second inning, scoring seven runs. It started with a hit by Cassie Neal, then Brooke Herron and Ariel Gaskill were both hit by Kokomo pitches.

That sent up Kimi Box, and her sacrifice fly scored Maggie Hampton, who had come in to courtesy run for the catcher Neal. Herron advanced to third base on Box's fly, and she attempted a squeeze when Grace Smith came up to bat.

It worked - Herron scored, although Smith got to first on her bunt anyway. Smith soon followed Gaskill home, as they scored on a Wildkat error. Maddie Moore gets credit for the two RBIs, as she advanced to second.

Karley Blankenship's single moved Moore to third, and she scored on a fielder's choice; Aly Compton had the RBI. As for Blankenship, she got home thanks to a big two-run home run from Zoe Schafer.

Noblesville added three more runs in the third inning. Taylor Bounin reached on an error, was moved around by Box and Smith, then scored when Moore smacked a double. Smith scored as well. Blankenship then singled to get Moore home. That gave the Millers 10 runs, and their strong defense carried them through the fourth and fifth innings, where the game ended on the run rule.

"I thought we played well," said Ramsey. "We knew coming into the game that

Kokomo was going to be a very formidable opponent. At this point in time, we're playing very well and we're hitting the ball very well. So we were very fortunate to have a few breaks in the course of the game, hit the ball well and score some runs. Very pleased by our overall effort and certainly by the outcome."

Blankenship, Neal and Smith all had two hits on the game. Moore totaled four RBIs.

Kristen Melloh pitched four innings for the win, only allowing Kokomo two hits on the game. Sammi Minton finished the job, throwing the fifth inning.

Saturday's semi-state appearance will be the first for Noblesville, as that level of the state tournament wasn't played between 1998 and 2009. The 2002 Miller team went right from regionals to the four-team state finals.

Heights wins regional

“We call her ‘Rookie,’ but tonight she earned her stripes,” said Hamilton Heights coach Landi Lockwood.

Jessica Kaurich, a freshman who 24 hours earlier hit a two-run home run to lead Hamilton Heights to 3-0 sectional championship victory over Delta, Tuesday evening hit a one-out, two-run homer in the bottom of the seventh inning to give the Lady Huskies an 8-7 regional championship win over a stunned Norwell team.

“Those are Jessica’s only two varsity home runs,” said Lockwood.

“It was incredible,” said Kaurich. “My adrenaline was pumping throughout the whole game. Coming up to that last at-bat, I just said to myself ‘It’s going to be okay, just trust in your mechanics.’ And I did not expect that to happen, and it did, and I couldn’t be more thankful for the team I had and how much trust we have in each other to come out for that win.”

The win was the first-ever regional championship for Heights, which advances to Saturday’s Class 3A semi-state at Twin Lakes on Saturday. The Huskies will play

the winner of tonight’s regional between South Bend St. Joseph and Northwestern; it was delayed a day because Tuesday was graduation day for St. Joseph.

It was definitely a whirlwind for Heights, which can claim the unique accomplishment of winning a sectional and a regional on back-to-back nights. Blame it - or credit it - on the weather.

“It was a little bit, I’m not going to lie,” said Kaurich when asked if it was weird to play two championship games in a row. “But, you do what you have to do.”

The regional title game, also on the Huskies’ home turf, was completely different than the sectional championship win when sophomore Ashley Roberts threw the shutout against Delta. Roberts started on the mound last night, but lasted just 1.2 innings.

“After last night’s game, she just didn’t have a lot left to come back tonight,” Lockwood said.

So, in came Mandy Hasty and the senior slinger managed the Huskies through a game which produced great offenses from both teams. Hasty finished strong, blanking Norwell the last two innings, and in the seventh got out of a bases-loaded jam.

Still, Norwell carried a 7-6 lead into the bottom of the seventh.

After Claire Schildmeier led off the seventh by popping to first, Hasty reached base when Norwell catcher Saddle Dunnuck dropped a pop up just in front of the plate. That brought Kaurich to the dish and she exploded with the walk-off home run over the right field fence.

“We struggled at times on defense, but the girls kept fighting,” Lockwood said. “This team never gives up.”

This was a back-and-forth offensive struggle. Norwell hit a pair of home runs in the first three innings, but the Huskies never gave in.

“They didn’t quit, we didn’t quit, and we just happened to end up on top tonight,” said Lockwood. “That was a good team and that was a good fight. It was a good game.”

Norwell took a 7-5 lead by scoring three times in the sixth. The Huskies cut that disadvantage to 7-6 in the sixth on a single by Rachel Cross and a double by Morgan Burtron. That got Heights just close enough for Kaurich to play the hero in the bottom of the seventh.



In those two innings, Westfield tried to be aggressive, but nothing worked as Zionsville protected the 6-1 margin and headed to the sectional championship game.

"It was tough," said Bunnell, "but we were beaten by the better team today."

Sebastien Bourdais held off Takuma Sato over the final three laps of Race 2 of the Chevrolet Dual in Detroit presented by Quicken Loans to collect his 33rd career Indy car victory. The race win made Bourdais the seventh different winner in eight Verizon IndyCar Series races this season and brought him to within one win of Al Unser Jr. for seventh on the all-time Indy car victory list. Conor Daly, substituting for the injured James Hinchcliffe in the No. 5 Arrow/Lucas Oil Schmidt Peterson Motorsports Honda, led 12 laps early and finished sixth. "Well, that was very interesting," said Daly. "Such a crazy race up and down but our Arrow car was fantastic the whole time - wet and dry. To lead the race, and to lead the race with the strength that we did, makes me over the moon. We got a

little bit unlucky with the yellows but to come back and finish sixth, was so great. It was my goal to try and be here at the end of race two. I almost had a tear in my eye because I enjoyed it so much. It was wild and crazy, but I'm just happy to have it here and have a great finish." The front runners were all low on fuel when a red flag was displayed on Lap 65 of the scheduled 70-lap race as the Holmatro Safety Team cleaned up debris from an incident involving Team Penske teammates Will Power and Helio Castroneves, who made contact in Turn 2 of the 14-turn, 2.35-mile street circuit on a restart. INDYCAR called for a timed race, and Bourdais - whose No. 11 Team Mystic E-Cigs KVSH Racing Chevrolet likely

The four-time Indy car champion, who started ninth on entrant points after a downpour cancelled the late-morning qualifications, finished 1.7644 seconds ahead of Sato in the No. 14 ABC Supply AJ Foyt Racing Honda.

Graham Rahal finished third in the No. 15 Steak 'n Shake Honda for Rahal Letterman Lanigan Racing for his third podium in the last five races. Tristan Vautier gave Dale Coyne Racing its best finish this season in fourth after starting 23rd and Marco Andretti, runner-up in Race 1 on May 30, finished fifth in the No. 27 Merchant First/Snapple Honda for Andretti Autosport.

Pole sitter Juan Pablo Montoya, who led a field-high 35 laps, slipped to 10th on the final lap as the No. 2 Verizon Team Penske Chevrolet ran out of fuel. The recently-crowned Indianapolis 500 winner still maintained the championship points lead (315-294 over Power) at the halfway point of the Verizon IndyCar Series season.

Bourdais inherited the lead on Lap 51 when Daly pitted under caution for fuel and a change from rain tires to Firestone alternates, and was aided in fuel conservation by four yellow flags over the duration. Sato overtook Montoya on a Lap 65 restart before the yellow flag flew for the Castroneves-Power contact, which was instigated by Power's No. 1 Verizon Team Penske car being clipped from behind.

Sato, who started 15th, earned his first podium finish since Sao Paulo, Brazil, in 2013.

In Race 1, Carlos Munoz earned his first Verizon IndyCar Series victory.
