# Campus Parkway crash kills Cicero woman

Two car accidents took place in the southeastern part of claiming the life of a Cicero woman.

Tuesday morning at approximately 11:02 a.m., police officers and firefighters from the Noblesville Police & Fire Departments responded to the intersection of Campus Parkway and Bergen Boulevard in Hamilton Town Center in reference to a report of a two-car motor vehicle crash. Officers and firefighters arrived on the scene a short time later and began to investigate.







Graham Rahal finished third in the No. 15 Steak 'n Shake Honda for Rahal Letterman Lanigan Racing for his third podium in the last five races. Tristan Vautier gave Dale Coyne Racing its best finish this season in fourth after starting 23rd and Marco Andretti, runner-up in Race 1 on May 30, finished fifth in the No. 27 Merchant First/Snapple Honda for Andretti Autosport.

Pole sitter Juan Pablo Montova, who led a field-high 35 laps, slipped to 10th on the final lap as the No. 2 Verizon Team Penske Chevrolet ran out of fuel. The recentlycrowned Indianapolis 500 winner still maintained the championship points lead (315-294 over Power) at the halfway point of the Verizon IndyCar Series season.

Bourdais inherited the lead on Lap 51 when Daly pitted under caution for fuel and a change from rain tires to Firestone alternates, and was aided in fuel conservation by four yellow flags over the duration.
