

Three arrested after robbery at Noblesville CVS

Three people were arrested after allegedly robbing the CVS Pharmacy in southern Noblesville on Monday afternoon.

At approximately 1:58 p.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to a report of a robbery at the CVS Pharmacy located at 14835 Sunny Dell Lane in Noblesville. Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and began to investigate.

Initial information from the caller alleges that a subject came into the store and presented a note to employees in the pharmacy. As a result, employees provided the suspect with items from the pharmacy and the suspect then reportedly fled the scene. Witnesses stated that they observed the suspect flee on foot towards the Kroger's located just east of the CVS. The witnesses were then able to provide a vehicle description, license plate number and direction of travel. It was reported that the vehicle traveled south on Hazel Dell Road and then west on 146th Street.

At approximately 2:09 p.m., officers from the Carmel Police Department located a vehicle matching the description of the suspect vehicle in the area of Keystone Parkway and Carmel Drive. A total of four occupants were located in the vehicle and

all were questioned by NPD investigators. The following individuals have been arrested in connection with the robbery: Kenneth L. Scott Jr., 31, Indianapolis, charged with Robbery and Possession of a

All three suspects were transported to the Hamilton County Jail.



Application for a license in the district is the same set forth elsewhere in the community.

The district designation provides the opportunity to allow an unlimited number of three-way and two-way licenses sold at the state designated purchase rate as opposed to the private market rate. This provides Noblesville new opportunities to increase the number of restaurants and nightlife that can be located in the dis-

"This Riverfront Redevelopment District designation will put Downtown Noblesville well on its way to becoming a true dining destination and improve the visitor experience in an already vibrant downtown," said Dave Pumphrey, owner of Copper Still Kitchen

The proposed redevelopment district is another way the city is working to advance and expand downtown. Since Jan. 1, 2013, \$2,682,980.17 has been spent to improve the downtown area, including \$1,463,316 by the City of Noblesville for public infrastructure and \$242,816.62 in its façade grant program. The City of Noblesville anticipates spending \$9.7 million in the next two years in the redevelopment district for the Federal Hill Commons and BlueSky projects.

Yield before turning left at two new flashing yellow arrows

Indiana Department of Transportation contractors are scheduled to turn on modernized traffic signals on Friday, June 12, weather permitting, at the intersections of State Road 37 with 126th and 131st streets.

Drivers may encounter congestion while the signals operate on a default setting until technicians can install new timing sequences, including the flashing yellow left-turn arrows. Once the flashing yellow arrows are activated, signs mounted alongside the signals will advise drivers: "Left turn yield on flashing yellow arrow."

National research has shown that the flashing yellow arrow signal is more intuitive for drivers, results in fewer crashes and moves traffic more efficiently at intersections. The signals have already been adopted by most states.

Flashing yellow arrow signals allow left-turning traffic to yield the right-of-way to oncoming traffic and pedestrians and turn when a suitable gap is available. This type of signal improves intersection efficiency by using cross-traffic gaps to allow more left turns.

INDOT installed the first flashing yellow arrow signals in Indiana in 2013 and plans to replace most of its five-section or "doghouse" left-turn signals with the new national standards featuring a flashing yellow arrow.



Westfield's city council voted to move forward with a special census Monday evening, in an effort to track the community's rapid growth for funding purposes.

2014 population estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau show that Westfield's growth outpaced that of all other Hamilton County communities since the 2010 census, with the city's population increasing 17.4 percent to a total of 35,297.

"So much of how we receive funding from state and federal agencies is tied to per capita calculations," Westfield Mayor Andy Cook said. "With so much growth happening so quickly in our city, we want to make sure we have the most accurate information available when it comes time to seek dollars for our community."

The estimated total cost of the project is \$625,000, with an expected increase in annual revenue of \$330,000 every year. The census will begin in July.

Residents will be updated on the progress of the census via the city's social media channels, namely Facebook, Twitter and Nextdoor.



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


