Information meeting is June 22...

Showdown time for center

Hamilton County should learn soon the status of a proposed building of an emergency training center in Westfield. A plan to build the center and partial funding of the center was approved earlier by Hamilton County's four largest cities. Carmel, Noblesville, Fishers and Westfield approved a plan to provide \$40,000 a year in supporting of the training center. The final hurdle to clear is the Hamilton County Common Council. Hamilton Coun-

ty has been asked to commit \$3 million to the project. The Hamilton County Commissioners, the engineers behind the program, have appeared not to have overwhelming approval from their Council, the government unit which would write the \$3 million check. In a meeting of the Carmel Common Council, the last city to approve the plan, two Hamilton County Councilmen, Rick McKinney and Brad Beaver, expressed their concern over the County's commitment of the funds. "The Commissioners have gone out to support their views," McKinney told The

The Commissioners (Steve Dillinger, Christine Altman and Mark Heirbrandt) responded that they understood the Council's concerns. A workshop to answer questions and help the Council better understand will be held at the Judicial Center on June 22 at 6 p.m. The workshop is open to the public. Following that session the Council is expected to vote, either at its July 1 or August 5 meeting.

Hamilton County man part of Custer's calvary

I saw the other day that a new TV documentary on Col. George Custer is coming out soon. Most Americans know of this tragic, flamboyant and perhaps fool-hearty figure for leading his cavalry troops to death at the Little Bighorn in June 1876.

What probably won't been told in the upcoming TV version is that one young Hamilton County soldier was with Custer when the 7th Cavalry rode into the Black Hills in search of Sitting Bull, Crazy Horse and their overwhelming force of Sioux and Cheyenne warriors.

While many believe that all of Custer's command died in the ill-fated offensive, of course there were many survivors from the entire force of 670 because Custer divided his force into three groups hours before the famous battle.

The reasoning behind the cavalry move against the Indians was a report of settlers and miners being attacked by the Sioux in the Black Hills. The area had been held by the Indians who considered the Black Hills sacred.

William O'Mann was born July 14, 1849 in Hamilton County. He knew horses, probably working with them in a livery stable or on the family farm. When he enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1875 he listed his

Hamilton County leaders have weighed in on the discussion.

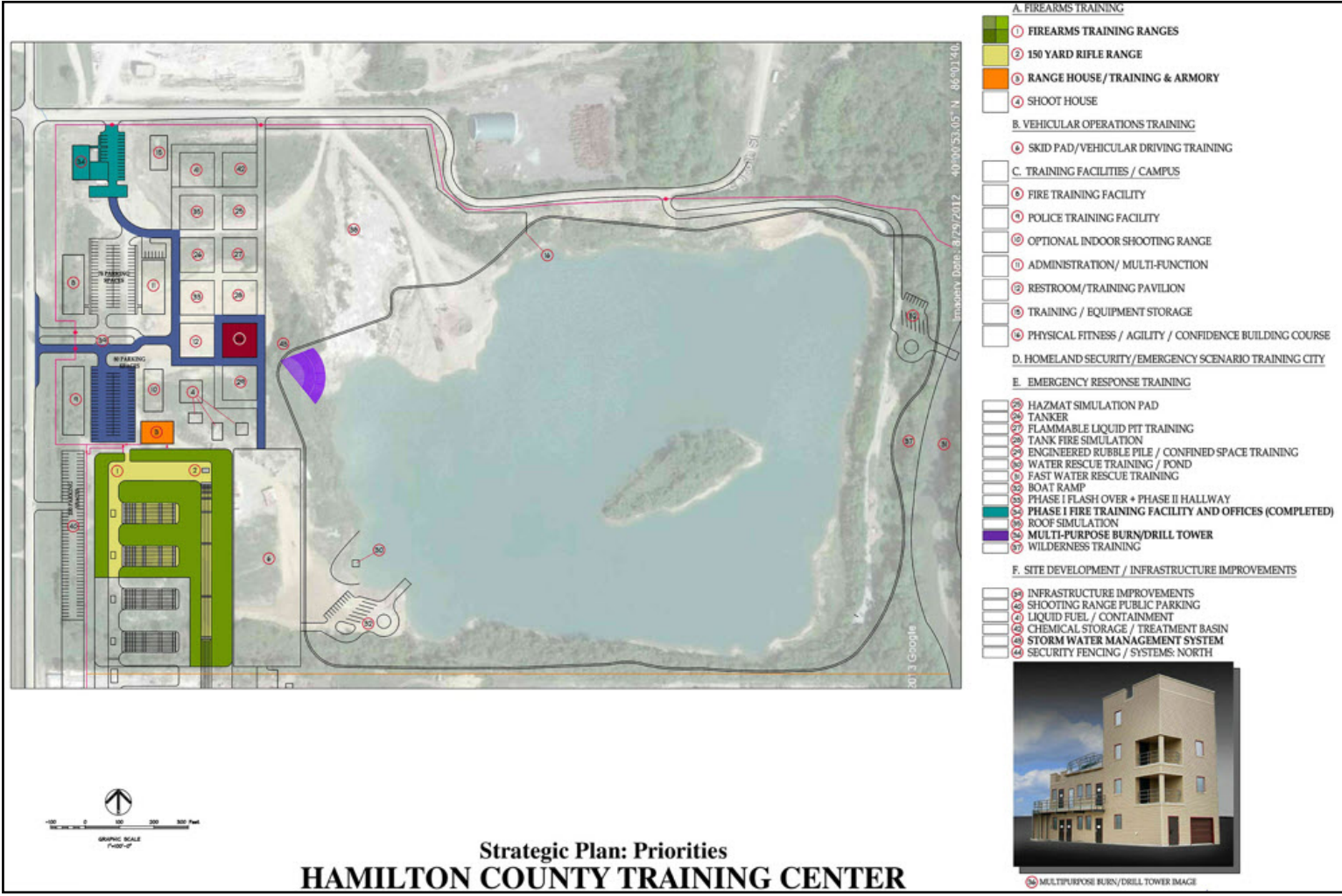
"We first started talking about this in 1980," said Superior Court Judge Steve Nation. "We didn't have the land then. We do now."

occupation as a hostler, meaning one who is employed to care for horses. Because of this he was assigned to the cavalry.

Pvt. O'Mann was one of the lucky ones. When the Custer force was divided O'Mann was assigned to Major Marcus Reno's column. The group of only 132 men actually engaged the Indians before Custer, but realizing they were outnumbered they retreated to a defensive position about four miles from where Custer met his fate.

The third column, led by Capt. Frederick Benteen, was circling the large Sioux encampment which was the target of the campaign. On June 25 Custer and about 260 cavalrymen moved toward the target and were met by hundreds of warriors. The soldiers made a stand on the slight hill overlooking the Little Bighorn River. All were killed.

Indians also continued their attack on Reno's men who sustained heavy losses.

But Pvt. O'Mann survived. Historians believe the Sioux pulled away when they got reports of more cavalry troops coming. Eventually reinforcements did arrive and rescued the remains of Custer's forces.

O'Mann continued to serve in the Army until 1880 when he was honorably discharged at Fort Lincoln in the Dakota Territory. He may have remained in the West, there is no record of him returning to Hamilton County. His five years in the military is found in Army records, but little else is known about him.

Custer who was nationally known as something of a hero in the Civil War, has become the subject of many books and movies. But, something that is not widely known is the speculation after his death that he had harbored ambitions of being President. Many historians have dismissed that as only a myth.

Wandering black bear confirmed in St. Joseph County

Department of Natural Resources wildlife biologists Friday confirmed the presence of a wild black bear in northern Indiana after the bear walked in from Michigan.

The DNR received reliable reports earlier in the week of the wandering bear northwest of South Bend in St. Joseph County and made the confirmation after wildlife biologist Budd Veverka examined waste material submitted to the DNR and identified it as bear scat.

“With black bears in some surrounding states, we were expecting a bear to show up eventually,” said Mitch Marcus, Wildlife Section chief for the DNR Division of Fish & Wildlife. “It’s quite unusual and exciting for a Michigan lakeshore black bear to move this far south. Michigan DNR officials told us this is the southernmost black bear movement in more than a decade.”

Although there have been occasional unconfirmed reports of bears in Indiana, this is the first verified presence of a bear in the state in more than 140 years.

Young black bears are known to disperse in the spring-time as they seek new territory in which to settle.

“Indiana does not have a breeding population of black bears, and we expect this one to turn back north eventually,” Marcus said.

Indiana DNR encourages citizens to report sightings of the bear to dfwinput@dnr.IN.gov or by calling (812) 334-1137 during regular business hours. Photos or videos can be sent to the same email address. The maximum file size is 15 MB.

Black bears are shy by nature and tend to avoid human contact. Attacks are rare. Black bears are non-aggressive in most instances and prefer fleeing from humans when given the chance. DNR wildlife biologists offer the following bear awareness tips:

- Don’t intentionally feed bears. If a bear becomes accustomed to finding food near your home, it may become a “problem” bear.
- Eliminate food attractants by placing garbage cans inside a garage or shed.
- Clean and store grills away after use.
- Don’t leave pet food outside overnight
- Remove bird feeders and bird food from late March through November
- Don’t add meat or sweets to a compost pile
- If encountering a bear, don’t run. Shout, wave your arms and back away slowly.

As European settlers began arriving in the 1700s in what is now Indiana, black bears were found throughout

the territory. Loss of habitat and demand for furs of all sorts led to the bears’ demise. Shipment records of Vincennes fur trader Francis Vigo from 1777-87 include 2,669 bear hides. The Ewing family, which operated out of Fort Wayne and Logansport in the early 1800s, shipped 2,623 bear hides from 1836-41.

According to the book “Mammals of Indiana” by John O. Whitaker, Jr., and Russell E. Mumford, the last confirmed report of a resident wild black bear in Indiana was in 1850. Whitaker and Mumford report a bear sighting in northwest Indiana in 1871 but note it was forced south from Michigan to escape a series of fires known historically as the Great Michigan Fire.

Black bears are now listed as an exotic mammal and protected under Indiana Administrative Code 312 9-3-18.5 (b-1), which prohibits the killing of a black bear except by a resident landowner or tenant while the animal is “destroying or causing substantial damage to property owned or leased by the landowner or tenant.”

Michigan DNR estimates a population of 15,000 to 19,000 black bears in the state, with 90 percent of them living in the Upper Peninsula. Black bears also have recolonized in the eastern portions of Kentucky and Ohio.

We are the clay, and thou our potter

“Between those children of the night and ourselves, in this still uncertain state of human knowledge, only thou canst rightly distinguish--thou who dost test the heart and who dost call the light day, and the darkness night” (Confessions of St. Augustine Book 13, chapter 14).

If man had his way he would never allow you to break out of the mold of what you once were. Are we too busy, and I sometimes wonder if not too shallow for any true fellowship to occur when new kin try to join the ranks of the family. I wonder, do we give our brothers and sisters room for growth and change while on their walk. What we forget is that we are all on our own walk, transforming while under grace, guided by the Holy Spirit who has called us to Him. This thought process of remembering and fixating on what someone once did or what someone once was, and may not yet be far removed from, does nothing other than help the enemy. A sinner's own guilt demon does well enough on his own, we don't need to help the enemy who takes great pleasure in heaping the burden of condemnation (not to be confused with holy conviction) onto God’s servants. Is it the fear of possibly letting a weed grow in their garden that keeps the ranks of a church closed? I have not an answer, but understand this, in the process of thrusting up the garden wall you may crush the delicate flowers straining to bloom in the landscape. I heard a song once,

tongue in cheek on the surface yet literally too close for comfort with words something like this: “they couldn’t make it without me. I teach Sunday school, I sew and bake, I’m in charge of the Christmas play....hope you’ll come back next week. But if you do, don’t get in my parking space, don’t sing so loud, wear a coat and tie, come early for Sunday school, stay out of my kitchen, but most of all....stay out of my pew”! The last I checked the only one we could not make it without is Jesus Christ. To those seated in churches with closed ranks remove yourself from the seat of honor for “**when you are invited by anyone to a wedding feast, do not sit down in the best place, lest one more honorable than you be invited by him; and he who invited you and him come and say to you, 'Give place to this man,' and then you begin with shame to take the lowest place**” Luke 14:8-9 (NKJV). The family of God is not closed, there is room for new members, new believers, new kin. Welcome them as God and Jesus who is the head of the family would have you do. Jesus declares “**Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep which was lost!**” I say to you that likewise there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine just persons who need no repentance” Luke 15:6-7 (NKJV). If you can’t behave as Soldiers of the Cross stop singing Onward Christian Soldier because members of the same army do not fight one another nor sabotage their new recruits! Now, you are children of the light therefore “walk as children of light” Eph 5:8 (NKJV), “be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, just as God in Christ forgave you” Eph 4:32 (NKJV) “for you

Bostic retires after many championships...

Love/Padgett win doubles, Carlson plays tough in singles

As Carmel's 2015 girls tennis season came to a close on Saturday, one era was ending and another was just beginning.

The Greyhounds won a third consecutive team state championship last weekend, and sent their No. 1 singles player Kiersten Carlson and No. 1 doubles team of Emma Love and Lauryn Padgett into the individual state finals at Park Tudor. Love and Padgett dominated the day on Saturday by winning the state title, while Carlson wowed everyone with a gritty and courageous performance in reaching the final.

It also marked the final event for Carmel coach Mike Bostic, who retires from coaching with a legacy of state championships and sportsmanship.

Love and Padgett, both juniors, received a bye into Saturday's semi-finals, which they easily won: 6-1, 6-0 over the Seymour team of senior Karen Dringenburg and junior Emma Wood. That sent the Carmel duo into the final, which was just as easy: Another 6-1, 6-0 match. The 'Hounds defeated Floyd Central seniors Alexis Applegate and Erin Patterson. Bostic called Love and Padgett a "guaranteed point" every time.

It was the second consecutive state title for Love, who won last year with Molly Fletchall.

"Last year we lost the first set really quickly, and I was so nervous," said Love. "And then this year, having that experience really helped."

Padgett hadn't played in state before, but she had seen it: Her sister Bailey Padgett had played in the individual singles tournament. Bailey is now playing college tennis for Butler University.

"It's different playing," said Lauryn Padgett. "It was fun."

Love and Padgett had wrapped up their match at about the same time Carlson had won the first set of the singles final against Denise Azcui, the Bloomington South senior who was also the defending champion. The two put on a remarkable display of championship tennis in humid conditions, easily playing one of the best high school tennis matches in the state tournament's history. It was the old guard (Azcui is a senior) versus the new guard (Carlson is a freshman).

Carlson won the first set 7-5, then battled Azcui all throughout the second set. Azcui broke to 5-4, giving her a chance to serve out the set, but Carlson broke back to 5-all. Azcui got another service break, then held to win the second set 7-5.

After a 10-minute heat break - conditions were humid - The players exchanged service breaks several times before Azcui held to go up 5-2. Carlson made one last run, cutting Azcui's advantage to 5-4, but Azcui held to win the third set.

The final score was 5-7, 7-5, 6-4 in favor of Azcui, who went undefeated (51-0)

in her last two seasons. But Carlson's performance served notice that she will be a force in Indiana tennis over the next three years.

"It was definitely an experience for me," said Carlson. Since she's a freshman, Carlson noted that "it's all about the experience right now. But it was a lot of fun and the most exciting thing I've ever played in."

Carlson played three three-set matches in the tournament. In the Friday quarter-final, she upset North Central junior Claire Reifeis 6-4, 4-6, 7-5, getting past a player

that had beaten her twice in the regular season. That sent her into the Saturday semi-finals against Fort Wayne Canterbury's Leah Barnes, and she came from behind to win that match 6-7 (4), 6-4, 6-1.

After the tennis was over, it was time for hugs and pictures - including one last set of photos for Bostic. A fine tennis player himself - he reached the doubles final in 1990, playing for Lawrence North - Bostic leaves Carmel with an unimpeachable record of success: Five boys team state championships (2003-04-10-11-12), five boys dou-

bles champions (2000-01-10-12-14), three girls team state championships (2013-14-15) and two girls doubles champions (2014-15).

"I'll be around tennis," said Bostic. "I'll still play with the kids (Bostic and his wife have two sons) and watch their matches if they decide to play for their schools. And who knows? Maybe I'll come back someday. But for now, my focus is my wife and my kids, and spending as much time as I can when they're at this age."

A Carmel junior, Stacy Morozov, was fifth and a Carmel senior, Anna Schmitz, was ninth in the 3200 run.

Mia Mackenzie, a freshman from Hamilton Southeastern, placed seventh in the 300 hurdles. Overall, the 2015 girls track and field season was a year for youth and lots of those young athletes will be better next season, even in the field events.

Boys state golf finals begin Tuesday

A new golf course will be the setting as Indiana’s top high school boys golfers will settle this year’s team and individual state champions this week.

The 79th Annual IHSAA Boys Golf State Finals will be played at Prairie View Golf Club in Carmel for the first time, the seventh different course to host the event. The finals had been played at The Legends Golf Club in Franklin the previous 14 years. All competitors will play 36 holes over the two-day event. A total of 15 teams have advanced five golfers each and 25 individuals have moved on without their

squads for a total of 100 participants. Groups will be teeing off the 1st and 10th tees at 8 am ET / 7 am CT on Tuesday. The first round tee times and pairings are available [here](#).

New state champions are assured for both team and individual honors as Columbus North did not qualify this season and last year’s co-medalists and teammates Christian Fairbanks and Michael VanDeventer both graduated.

Seven of the top 10 teams in the final poll from the Indiana High School Golf Coaches Association have found their way including top-ranked Center Grove.

The Trojans are one of seven returning teams from last year’s field after winning the Providence regional at Champions Pointe on Thursday. Their 290 that day tied with Floyd Central for the best score so far this state tournament. CG’s Chris Heck is one of two returnees that finished in last year’s top 10 tying for 10th place. The other is Corydon Central’s Mitchell Frederick of Corydon Central who tied for fifth place.

Four of those seven returning teams also won regional championships including Center Grove, Fort Wayne Bishop Dwenger, Hamilton Southeastern and Westfield. For Dwenger, it was the school’s first regional crown.

Dwenger and Westfield each will be making their fourth consecutive appearance in the state finals while Hamilton Southeastern will be playing in its third straight. Oak Hill advanced to the state finals for the first time in school history courtesy of its third place finish at the Muncie Central regional held at The Players Club.

Castle, which took the Washington regional crown at Country Oaks, qualified for its first state finals in eight years and ended a 31-year regional championship drought for the Knights.

The best individual score so far was the 67 put up by Colton Kuppler of Sullivan at the sectional. He qualified as an individual through the Washington regional held at Country Oaks.
