### Indiana Agriculture Report...

## Onnosite extremes across state

Storms and heavy rainfall brought un- and 94% in the South. Soybeans were 84% wanted excess moisture to many areas of the State, but dry conditions in some areas persisted, according to the USDA, NASS, Great Lakes Region. Precipitation in Kokomo has been six inches more than normal since April 1, but almost four inches short in Greensburg, only 85 miles away. Much of the state experienced above average rainfall along with strong winds and hail which left fields ponded and halted fieldwork. However, the Southern portions of the State were highlighted as abnormally dry on the June 9 drought monitor. Days suitable for fieldwork was 3.2. down from last week. By region, the North had 2.0 days available for fieldwork, 3.1 days in Central, and 5.6 days in the South.

Regionally, winter wheat mature was 1% in the North, 15% in Central and 47% in the South. By region winter wheat harvested was 1% in the North, 4% in Central, and 4% in the South. Soybeans planted was 93% complete in the North, 94% in Central

emerged in the North, 82% in Central and 84% in the South.

Some winter wheat fields that saw heavy rains and wind flattened out due to the excess water in the fields. Some corn and soybean fields have yellowed and show signs of over saturation, leading to some concerns about the root conditions once the soils dry out. Farmers were unable to get into the fields to replant the drowned crops, and spent much of their time digging drain trenches. While pastures and hay fields remain lush and are growing well, many growers have been unable to cut and bale their fields. In the South, livestock farmers are concerned about the dry pastures and hot weather on the animals. Watermelon plants have been set, and pumpkin farmers prepare for planting. Other activities for the week included spraying fields, side dressing corn and wheat, hauling grain, and mowing roadsides.

# Second state title in three years

There is no doubt that the Westfield boys golf team's Class of 2015 has left a

remarkable legacy. The seniors in this year's group were part of four state appearances by the Shamrocks. That includes a state championship two years ago and a runner-up finish last season - and another state title this year.

Westfield won its second state championship Wednesday, taking the crown at the first-ever state finals to be played at Prairie View Golf Club in Carmel. Already the leader after Tuesday's first round, the 'Rocks quickly stretched their advantage as the second round began, and never looked back to earn a four-shot lead over runner-up Center Grove.

"I don't think this day really sinks in until it's all over," said Keith Ponsler, one of a two-under 70 for his second round. He the Shamrock seniors. "You just got to enjoy the moment. The first one was great, this one feels just as good."

Westfield totaled an eight-over par 584 for the two days; shooting a one-over 289 for the second day. Shamrock coach Jon Hoover called the Wednesday score "fantastic," and for his team "to put up 289 on the final day under these conditions, I thought it was really good."

The weather played its own games with the golfers, first delaying the start of the second round by an hour, then teasing everyone during the latter stages of the day with off and on sprinkles. It wasn't until the very end of the tournament that the clouds let loose with rain, but all that did was move Westfield's celebration inside.

With Zionsville and Center Grove close behind at the beginning of the day, the Shamrocks made their move right away.

Westfield played the first five holes at fourunder par, and that gave it the momentum.

"In team golf, I think momentum's big," said Hoover. "We got it to four-under pretty quick, and got the guys fired up. You could just see the bounce in their step, everything. I think it helped us tremendously to get it going early."

The 'Rocks hung on during the last few holes, even as the Trojans were making a last-minute push. But birdies on the 18th hole by senior Jeremy Ray and junior Thomas Lewis helped to seal the deal.

"As a team, we're really consistent and the guys we have are solid down the stretch," said senior Timmy Hildebrand. "Even though they were coming back, I felt like the whole time if we just kept playing our game, then we'd close it out."

Hildebrand had a fantastic day, shooting and Thomas Lewis finished as part of a six-way tie for third place (yes, you read that right) with even par 144s. Both were named to the All-State team at the conclusion of the meet.

Westfield's consistency was on full display at state. Freshman Andrew Lewis finished with a two-under 146, Ponsler scored 152 and Ray totaled 154 for his two days.

"It feels awesome that I get to contribute to something that our school's going to remember forever, considering it's our second boys state championship ever amongst any sport," said Ray.

The senior roster also includes Austin Welch, who didn't play at state but is definitely part of the Shamrocks' sensational class. All four Westfield seniors will be continuing their golf careers in college: Hildebrand is headed to Purdue, Ponsler is

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As if a second team state championship wasn't enough, Westfield senior Timmy Hildebrand received another big honor at Wednesday's state meet.

Hildebrand won the Fred A. Keesling Mental Attitude Award. The award is given to a senior who participated in the state meet; the IHSAA Executive Committee selects the winner based on excellence in mental attitude, scholarship, leadership and athletic ability.

"Golf is more than a game and there's on course and there's off course, and I'd say 'off course' is just as important as the 'on course," said Hildebrand. "I'm certainly blessed to have the opportunity to get an award like this."

The IHSAA listed a brief biography of Hildebrand on its Web site:

"Hildebrand maintained a 4.3 gradepoint average during his four years of high school and was named a Distinguished Scholar. He was a member of the National Honor Society, the French Honor Society, was named an Outstanding English Student as a senior and also was very active with his church and its youth activities.

"Athletically, he played for Westfield in all four state finals, finishing tied for third overall today and was a member of two state championship teams (2013, 2015) and last year's runner-up team (2014). He also played basketball for the Shamrocks as a freshman and sophomore.

"He is the son of Michael and Kathleen Hildebrand and plans to study Chemical Engineering at Purdue University and play golf for the Boilermakers.

"The Committee presented \$1,000 to Westfield High School's general scholarship fund in the name of Hildebrand."

Welch is headed to IU-Kokomo.



Hamilton County had two other teams at the boys golf state meet Wednesday, and both had reasons to be happy about how the tournament went.

Hamilton Southeastern received medals for the second year in a row, finishing tied for fourth place. Noblesville tied for ninth as a team, and its senior leader placed in the individual Top 10 - making it to the All-State team.

The Royals finished third last year, but what made this year's team special is that HSE earned a high finish with no seniors in its front five. In fact, the average age of the Royals team is on the young side, with two juniors and three sophomores.

Alex Bullington, one of those sophomores, had Southeastern's best score of the event with a two-day total of 150; that included a one-under par 71 for his second round. His classmate Drew Alexander finished with 151, while Nick Kuster, a junior, scored 152. Junior Cedric McAree and sophomore Jake Hutmacher each finished

Bullington and Alexander both led HSE in birdies with four, while McAree and Kuster both made two.

Southeastern finished with a team score of 605, matching Bishop Dwenger's final total. Both teams weren't far out of third place, which went to Zionsville. The Eagles carded a 603; that finish gave the Hoosier Crossroads Conference three of the top five

Noblesville's appearance at the meet made it four of the Top 10 for the HCC. The Millers are a young team as well, with a junior and three sophomores. But the focus of those golfers was making sure their senior teammate, Josh Keating, got down to state so he could try for a spot on the All-State team.

Keating made it, finishing in a threeway to for ninth place. He carded a two-day total of 145, one-over par.

"Oh, it feels awesome," said Keating. "This is something I've watched other seniors (like) Jackson Wright get in the past, and just feels great to join in with this hon-

Keating had three birdies in his second round at Prairie View.

"I definitely feel like I left some shots out there," said Keating, who will play golf for Indiana-Purdue Fort Wayne (IPFW) next year. "I'm sure most people do. But 73 is still a great score out here, especially with the rain that was on and off all day."

"He's worked hard these four years." said Noblesville coach Gary Sewell. The coach said that since Keating knew he had to get to the state meet to make the All State team, it "shows the kind of character" that Keating has.

The Millers were making their 19th appearance at the state meet. This one might be the most memorable, considering how far Noblesville had to come to get there.

Miller coach Gary Sewell said that "if you'd talked to people about a month ago, nobody even thought that we had a chance or a prayer to be down here. But, the kids worked hard. They kind of bought in to what we were trying to do, and things fell together at the right time, and we were able to compete in the sectional and the regional to get here."

All five Noblesville players had at least one birdie in the second round. Sophomore Noah Lodin joined Keating with three birdies, while junior Collin Kinkead and sophomores Mitchell Compton and Parker Deakyne all had one.

Carmel junior Palmer Tweedy competed as an individual, finishing with a twoday score of 163.

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
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


