Another reservoir in Fishers...

More Water

Citizens Energy Group today announced a plan to develop an 88-acre quarry into the largest water reservoir in Central Indiana since 1968. When complete in 2020, the new Citizens Reservoir will store 2.7 billion gallons of water or more than 40 percent of the storage capacity of Geist Reservoir.

“Citizens Reservoir is a cost effective and sustainable solution for providing Central Indiana the water supply it needs for continued population growth and economic development,” said Jeff Harrison, Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer. “The new reservoir will also be a vital component to helping the region endure serious drought conditions like those that led to mandatory water use restrictions in 2012.”

The 230-foot deep limestone quarry, located along Olio Road and immediately adjacent to Geist Reservoir, will capture water that is now lost over the Geist Dam during periods of heavy rain. Following a detailed feasibility study, Citizens will acquire the quarry from Irving Materials, Inc. (IMI) and will develop the quarry for water storage purposes by 2020.

Meeting to inform develops into...

A split council cat fight

It was billed to be an informational session. An opportunity for the Hamilton County Common Council to seek information from the Hamilton County Commissioners concerning the proposed county-wide Public Safety Training Facility, located in Noblesville near 161st Street and River Road and owned by the City of Westfield.

Members of the Council were given a well-prepared pamphlet by Hamilton County Director of Administration Dan Stevens and the same information had been delivered by Stevens to the cities of Carmel, Noblesville, Westfield and Fishers.

So, when the Council and Commissioners met Monday evening the stage was set for what became not so much a meeting of information sharing but instead a min-backyard war as a “divided” Council squared off against each other and some against the plans of Commissioners Steve Dillinger, Christine Altman and Mark Heirbrandt.

A divided Council but, of course, not an evenly divided Council since this group consists of the uneven number of seven.

It appeared that one side was a group of four who were not in total support of the plan, a group led vocally by

Councilman Brad Beaver and Councilman Fred Glynn and also included Councilman Rick McKinney and Councilman Paul Ayers.

Supporting the Commissioners’ plan appeared to be a group led vocally by Commissioner Steve Schwartz, along with Commissioner Amy Massillamany and Commissioner Jim Belden.

Belden, the former Carmel football coach, at one point suggested things could be settled “if I had my defensive line with me.”

Although the comment was made more than once questioning whether Hamilton County, without a fire department, should be funding a plan to build a training center, those opposed said they favor a training center but not at the price tag the county is being asked to pay.

Schwartz countered with, “This (the center) is not just about fire training.”

Beaver and Glynn opened the meeting asking where is the Commissioners’ priority with the training center.

“You’ve got State Road 37; the extension of the government Center; the expansion of the jail, how much can we fund,?” asked Beaver.

“We’re talking about 2 percent of the funds we have available,” answered Schwartz.

Basically, two viewpoints came out of the meeting.

Those opposed to the plan want the cities and townships to chip in more money and the county to pay less. The cities of Carmel, Noblesville, Westfield and Fishers each has signed off to annually fund \$40,000 to maintain the center. The Commissioners are asking \$3 million to appropriate the funding to construct three capital improvement features that will enable the center to be a first class facility.

All of the county’s funding must be approved by the Council.

“Go get \$1.5 million from the cities and townships and you have a done deal with us for the other \$1.5 million” said Beaver.

“I’m sticking to the plan; go vote on this,” said Schwartz.

That vote could come as early as the Council’s July meeting but likely will come at the August session.

If, as now expected, that is a 4-3 vote against funding the \$3 million, what is next?

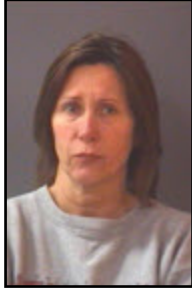
Several Hamilton County schools were among those that were participants in the President's Education Awards Program.

Richard Perrillo was apprehended by Federal Marshalls on June 11 in San Diego, California.

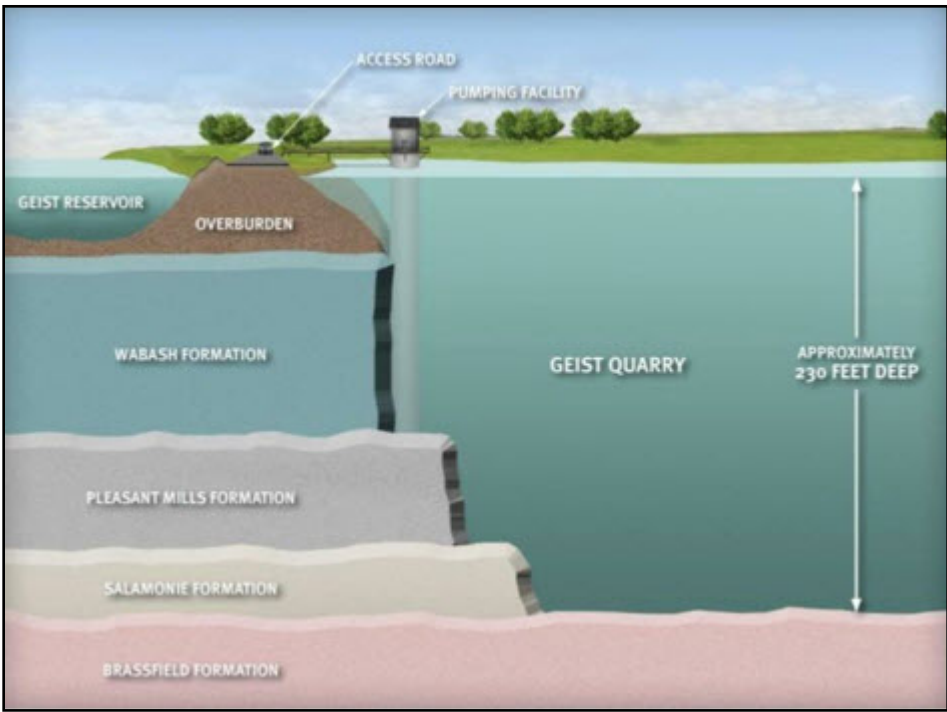
Noblesville man takes own life

A Noblesville man and Indianapolis Metro Police Department officer took his own life Sunday evening.

At approximately 8:17 p.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to the address of 15722 Chapel Park Drive East in reference to a report of a person threatening to harm themselves. Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and begin to investigate.

Officers located the individual in the backyard of the address and made an attempt to communicate with him. A few moments later officers reported that the individual took his life as a result of a gunshot wound.

The individual has been identified as Robert “Keith” McCauley, 49, of Noblesville. McCauley was a police officer with the IMPD since 2005.

“Developing the quarry into a drinking water reservoir is a key step toward ensuring Fishers and communities across Central Indiana have the water supply necessary to support a growing population and a vibrant economy,” said Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness.

Preparing for the Future

Recent studies by Citizens Energy Group and the Indiana Chamber of Commerce indicate Central Indiana will need an additional 50-80 million gallons of water per day

in order to meet the region’s growing demand over the next 25 years. Citizens has already addressed a portion of this need with new water supply facilities and system optimization projects. The new Citizens Reservoir will provide up to 25-million gallons per day of additional water that can be used during the summer months across the utility’s 8-county service territory.

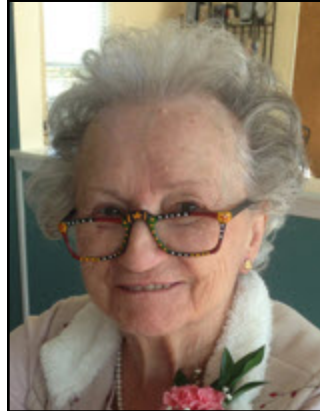

Coming into this event, I felt like I had the game to put myself in contention, but the competition is great and I know it will take tremendous golf the next couple of days to win it.”
