Although his name is not widely recognized today, Pelley was nationally known in the years leading up to World War II. He headed an organization known as the Silver Legion, a

group accused of being pro-Nazi and anti-Semitic. Pelley organized chapters of his Legion in nearly every state and held mass rallies attacking the national administration, with the principal theme being isolationism.




### Hamilton County Junior Golf Championship is July 7
