## Celebrate July 4 responsibly

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership, a consortium of law enforcement agencies across Hamilton County, in partnership with the Governor’s Council on Impaired & Dangerous Driving and the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI), would like to remind all Indiana motorists to celebrate July Fourth responsibly by driving sober and safe.

“All too often accidents are preventable with just an ounce of safe practice,” said Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen. “With the increased celebration and travel during the upcoming holiday weekend, we will be stepping up enforcement as we remind motorists drinking and driving don’t mix. So celebrate responsibly and help keep our Indiana roadways safe.”

During the 2014 July Fourth holiday period (6:00 p.m., July 3 through 5:59 a.m, July 7), there were nearly 1,400 traffic collisions in Indiana. Of those, 96 were alcohol-related, with 65 percent involving a driver with a blood alcohol content (BAC) of 0.08 or greater. In total, there were 58 injuries and 6 deaths as a result of alcohol-related accidents.

“Even one life lost to impaired driving is one too many,” said Council Chair, Todd Meyer. “It’s important to recognize the role we can all play in keeping each and every motorist safe this holiday weekend.”

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership, the Governor’s Council, and ICJI would like to remind motorists that accidents and deaths resulting from impaired driving can be prevented with the following precautions:

- Before the celebration begins, **plan a safe way home**
- **Do not drive or ride impaired**
- If you do drink, **use a taxi, public transportation, ridesharing service or designate a sober friend or family member and give them your keys**
- **If you see a drunk driver on the road, call 911**
- If you know someone who is about to drive or ride impaired, **take their keys and help make arrangements to get them home safely**

## Douce arrested on additional charges

Michael Douce, a former Noblesville High school choir director, is facing additional charges related to his arrest in January for alleged inappropriate sexual conduct with two students.

Douce, previously charged with burglary, child seduction, dissemination of matter

harmful to minors, contributing to the delinquency of a minor and child exploitation, now faces charges of invasion of privacy.

A probable cause affidavit filed in Hamilton County Superior Court 3 indicates Douce, following his initial hearing in January, was served with a no contact order prohibiting him from having contact with a victim in the January incident.

Noblesville Police Officer Michael Saller reported on June 22 he conducted an

investigation of phone records that revealed Douce violated the no contact order.

A jury trial scheduled for later this month, on the January charges, was canceled by Judge Steven Nation on June 16 after Douce requested to change his plea to guilty.

Douce was arrested on June 25 for the invasion of privacy charges. Douce is currently being held in jail on a \$102,500 bond.

# Excessive moisture damages crops

Prolonged floods and ponding in fields prevented farmers from applying much needed nutrients to stressed and deteriorating crops which continued to bring down crop conditions, according to the USDA, NASS, Great Lakes Region. While there was less rainfall across the state than last week, many crops remained in standing water. Fieldwork remains very limited while the fields remained saturated. Lodging, yellowing, and snapped stalks has become more widespread as the storms continued bringing strong wind and hail. There were 1.5 days available for fieldwork this week, up 0.4 days from the previous week.

Soil surpluses continued to be abundant, especially in low lying fields and areas that cannot drain the excess

moisture. Many farmers have been unable to apply nitrogen to corn, which continued to become pale and yellow from lack of nutrients. Weed pressure has increased across the state. Storms also brought more strong wind and hail, flattening some fields with shallow root systems. Many winter wheat fields were unable to be harvested, and have become prone to vomitoxin and lodging. Drier conditions in the southwest corner of the State allowed growers to harvest wheat, as the window of opportunity to plant double cropped soybeans got shorter. Although the full extent of the damage to the crops is unclear, many areas that have been damaged or destroyed will not be replanted.

Feedlots remain soaked and in poor condition. Hay fields continue to be green and grow, but many have been left uncut and in standing water. Mint harvest has begun. Other activities for the week included ditch draining, mowing roadsides, hauling grain, and certifying crop acres with FSA.

Regionally, winter wheat mature was 45% in the North, 65% in Central and 89% in the South. By region winter wheat harvested was 1% in the North, 10% in Central, and 39% in the South. Soybeans blooming was 1% complete in the North, 2% in Central and 3% in the South. Corn silking was 0% complete in the North, 0% in Central and 2% in South.



In a way, the 2015-16 basketball season will be different for Guerin Catholic. Or, maybe not. Because of the IHSAA's success factor ruling, the Golden Eagles will move from Class 3A, where they won the state championship last season, to Class 4A. They will play in the local sectional.

"All of the kids after a busy June are in the mix for varsity spots," Smith said.

"We had a good month of June with open gym at 7 a.m."

"We didn't have Lindley due to soccer so Godfrey and Fremion and even Munson got some good experience playing point. As of now we don't know if Lindley will be able to play basketball next season due to soccer."

"Munson really had a great month," Smith continued. "He is working to get more comfortable playing more around the basket. He still is able to step out and knock down his 3-point shot."

"Godfrey has really worked on his scoring abilities, which will be key for us. He's not a natural point guard, but does a good job when he plays there."

"Cunningham played well in league games. He's just undersized for being one of our post players. I also like he progress Jack Hensen made this summer."

## Fever's Catchings among WNBA All-Star vote leaders

Skylar Diggins of the Tulsa Shock and Elena Delle Donne of the Chicago Sky lead their respective conferences after early returns of WNBA All-Star Balloting 2015 presented by Boost Mobile. Diggins, a 2014 All-Star, has 11,099 votes compared with 10,589 for Delle Donne, who last year paced all Eastern Conference players in the balloting.
