The County Line

Almost all municipal elections already decided

It's now virtually official, 58 of the 62 offices at stake in this fall's Hamilton County municipal elections have been elected early by default. The July 6 deadline for filling vacancies or independent filing passed without any additional candidates coming forward. All of the 58 winners are Republicans. Democrats and independents failed to make an application by Monday's deadline.

In four county communities there will not be any election at all. Carmel,

Westfield, Sheridan and Atlanta's GOP candidates have no opposition and thus under state law there need be no election. Noblesville, Cicero, Fishers and Arcadia will hold elections because there is token opposition for one or more positions.

Noblesville, now a second class city, will elect a nine-member city council for the first time. Mayor John Ditslear has been re-elected. Only two Democrats for city council will be on the November ballot.

The county's three other mayors are also unopposed: Jim Brainard in Carmel, Scott Fadness in Fishers and Andy Cook in Westfield. Fishers, like Noblesville, will have an election since one Democrat is running for city council. Cicero has one Democrat, for town clerk, and Arcadia has an independent seeking a town council seat.

In spite of claims that they are working to build a party in the county, Democrats will not get far again this year with almost candidates. They would have had the opportunity to fill ballot positions not filled in the May primary, but failed to do so.

Voter turnout in the communities where an election is scheduled is expected to be very light. But, the communities will still have the same expense of holding an election, about \$30,000 in Noblesville and \$40,000 in the case of Fishers.

Only city and town offices are up for election this year. Residents living in unincorporated areas of the county will not be going to the polls.

Three county cities make safest city list

Three Hamilton County cities were listed among the SafeWise Report's 30 safest cities in Indian list, which was released on Monday.

SafeWise, a Web site that helps people compare security systems, analyzed FBI Crime Report statistics (comparing violent and property crimes) from cities with populations over 4000 people in 2013. Carmel came in sixth, Fishers was seventh and Westfield placed 14th.

Among SafeWise's findings were that Carmel had only 20 violent crimes reported to the FBI in 2013 - this despite

the city having the highest population of those on the list. The violent crimes ratio was 0.23 per 1000.

Fishers' violent crime rate was even lower, a ratio of 0.19 per 1000 people. Both cities also scored well on the property crime ratio, with Carmel at 8.76 per 1000 and Fishers at 9.90 per 1000.

Westfield achieved its mark with a violent crimes ratio of 0.64 per 1000 and a property crimes ratio of 14.92 per 1000.

“Keeping Westfield safe is our top priority,” said Westfield Mayor Andy Cook. “Our police department works diligently to ensure our citizens are safe, which is one of the main reasons families are moving to Westfield.”

The No. 1 city on the list is close by: Zionsville, just over the line in Boone County, placed first for the second year in a row. Zionsville's violent crime ratio is a remarkable 0.08 per 1000 - the city reported only two violent crimes in all of 2013 - and a property crime ratio of 2.57 per 1000.

BackPack Attack in Hamilton County

A county-wide school supply drive is running through July 19. United Way of Central Indiana, in conjunction with the Boys and Girls Club of Noblesville, Fishers YMCA, and PrimeLife Enrichment, has launched the second year of Hamilton County’s BackPack Attack program. Affiliated with Indy BackPack Attack, the Hamilton County program collects and distributes new school supplies to help the 8,000 Hamilton County students in need.

Over 20 community partners have agreed to help collect school supplies, including businesses, service organizations, churches, and others. The donated school supplies will be distributed to schools in Hamilton County during the first week of August.

On July 18 and 19, BackPack Attack will be hosting Fill the Bus events at Wal-Mart stores across Hamilton County. Shoppers will be asked to purchase school supply bundles from Wal-Mart and fill the bus with the donations.

Donations of new school supplies may be brought to any of the three drop-off sites listed above. Cash donations are also accepted. Checks can be made out to United Way of Central Indiana with “Hamilton County BackPack Attack” written in the memo line and sent to the UWCi Hamilton County office at 650 E. Carmel Drive, Suite 340, Carmel 46032.

Cops Cycling for Survivors is Monday

Monday, July 13, 2015, will mark the start of the 12th annual Cops Cycling for Survivors bicycle ride around Indiana. A departure ceremony will be held at 8:30 a.m. EDT at the Law Enforcement/Firefighter Memorial, adjacent to the State Capitol, in downtown Indianapolis. The cyclists will depart shortly after the key note comments by Franklin College head football coach, Mike Leonard. Coach Leonard was Officer Nick Schultz’s (Merrillville PD, EOW 9/7/2014) coach when he attended Franklin College. After the 9:00 a.m. departure from the memorial the cyclists will head north to Indianapolis Metro Police North District to honor IMPD Officer Perry Renn (EOW 7/5/2014). The cyclists will ride through Noblesville and then onto Tipton where they will honor Tipton County Deputy Jacob Calvin (EOW 6/28/2014). Their journey will last 13 days and cover nearly 1,000 miles riding the perimeter of Indiana honoring fallen police officers and their families.

Cops Cycling for Survivors Foundation, Inc. annual bike ride consists of active and retired police officers, law enforcement survivors, law enforcement family members and friends of law enforcement riding their bicycles around the perimeter of Indiana to raise funds and awareness of the sacrifices made by Hoosier law enforcement families across Indiana. Funds raised from this event are used to perpetuate the memories of officers killed in the line-of-duty and to aid surviving family members and co-workers of those officers. Previously raised funds have been directly donated to foundations, scholarships and camps that have been started in memory of fallen officers or by Indiana survivors in honor of their fallen heroes. In addition, funding has been donated to Concerns of Police Survivors, the Indiana Chapter of Concerns of Police Survivors and Project Blue Light at the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy.

This year the cyclists are recognizing the sacrifice made by four Indiana police officers killed in the line of duty in 2014:

Deputy Jacob Calvin, Tipton County Sheriff’s Office, end of watch: June 28, 2014

Officer Perry Renn, Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Dept, end of watch: July 5, 2014

Patrolman Jeffrey Westerfield, Gary Police Dept., end of watch: July 6, 2014

Patrolman II Nickolaus Schultz, Merrillville Police Dept., end of watch: September 7, 2014

The ride is scheduled to conclude on the afternoon of Saturday, July 25, 2015, at Crown Hill Cemetery, Heroes of Public Safety Section. The closing ceremony will begin at 2:30pm EDT. Survivor Mike Laird, father of IMPD Officer Jake Laird (EOW 8-18-2004) will provide the closing message. All are welcome to attend.

member of Women of the Moose in Arizona City.

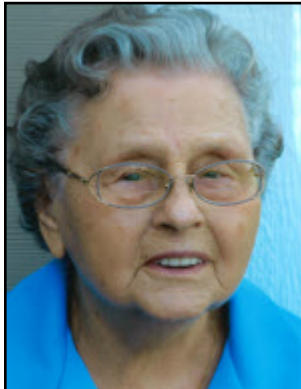





Summer basketball....

Defense will try to stop Gunn

Last season Hamilton Southeastern finished 9-17, most un-Royal like. HSE's last losing season had been in 1998-99.

But, the way the Royals ended the season gave hope for the future to veteran coach Brian Satterfield. Southeastern won two games in the sectional, beating Westfield and Zionsville, before falling by only seven points to Carmel.

So, now comes the summer of 2015 and Satterfield says things look better, although one woe of 2014-15 could carry into 2015-16.

Can ace shooter Zach Gunn shake all the double teams and special defenses thrown at him last season?

"The special defenses keyed on Gunn," Satterfield said. "Our 3-point shooting percentage fell from 43 percent to less than 30 percent."

Gunn averaged 18 points a game.

Satterfield says he has four or five shooters who can take the pressure off Gunn. Four saw solid varsity action last season, Greg Miller, Austin Holzum, JD Bemby and Carter Poiry. Miller was the highest scorer in the group, averaging 6.8 points a game. Holzum, Bemby and Poiry all played in 26 varsity games.

There some "bloodline" in the group. Jack Davidson and Brock Burns are brothers of former HSE stars. Jack Habagger, another junior, is the son of former HSE coach and now HSE athletic director Greg Habagger.

Other Royals to watch are junior Connor Rottermann, junior Trevin Trabue, and sophomore Noah Smith, and Zach Mutchner, Aaron Shank and Aaron Etherington and a big 6-7 sophomore, Brennan Schofield, who played in 24 varsity game last season.

Still, Gunn is the key.

"He's learning to play both ends of the court," said Satterfield. "He's a good rebounder and a great decision maker. He needs to learn a little more about taking care of the basketball."

Gunn is being scouted by Indiana University, Butler, Ball State and others.

"I'm not sure how soon he might commit," Satterfield said. "I think the month of July and playing AAU will decide a lot."

This summer, Southeastern won its pool in the big tourney held at Warren Central and Carmel and then lost to Carmel in the tourney round.

Zack Hodgins, who as a freshman got into 17 varsity games, is the only other player returning with varsity playing time.

"Three sophomores will see a lot of time," said Lafferman. "They are Halblieb, Hodgins and Josh Watson."

"Watson has grown to 6-3 and he had a good summer season."

"We'll be under-sized a little," Lafferman added.

University's highlight of the summer was playing in a tourney at Wabash College. The Trailblazers played Roncalli and Western and also had a good game against Pike's junior varsity.

There is no question who will be the leader on this team this coming season. Holly is the senior leader and also is a most talented basketball player.
